1. INTRODUCTION AND WELCOME

The chair introduced himself and welcomed those present at the meeting. He asked councillors and officers to introduce themselves.

2. APOLOGIES

Apologies for absence were submitted on behalf of Councillors Jasmine Ali and Nick Dolezal. Apologies submitted due to council business: Councillors Victoria Mills, Sunil Chopra, Gavin Edwards and Renata Hamvas for lateness.

3. DISCLOSURE OF MEMBERS' INTERESTS AND DISPENSATIONS

There were none.

4. ITEMS OF BUSINESS THAT THE CHAIR DEEMS URGENT

The chair gave notice and agreed to consider the following late and urgent item in supplemental agenda no. 1:

- Item 9.1 – Choumert Grove car park and Bournemouth Close Pocket places schemes.

5. MINUTES FROM THE PREVIOUS MEETING

RESOLVED:

That the minutes of the meeting held on 29 September 2014 be agreed as an accurate record of the meeting and signed by the chair.

6. DEPUTATIONS/PETITIONS (IF ANY)

There were none.

7. CHAIR'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

NHS Southwark Clinical Commissioning Group

Dr Sian Howell from NHS Southwark CCG announced that they were holding a number of consultation events around the borough about making it easier for patients to see their doctor when they need to. This new service would make it easier to access urgent appointments. It would be rolled out in two phases in the south and north of Southwark. Dr Howell further explained that people would have more availability and access for example after closing hours. Also the GP could decide and sign post the patient where they could be seen, i.e. whether it was their own GP practice or somewhere else. A patient's notes would also be available in order to understand the patient's medical history or medication.

Dr Howell encouraged people to register with their GP so that residents have a continuity of care and that support would be available at the access clinic and a physician could decide whether a person needed to be seen. Dr Howell said this was challenging exercise as this was the first time it had been done collectively.

The presenter took questions about the services online, the appointment system and walk in service which people felt did not encourage continuity of care. The meeting was told that a new online system would be adopted which would form an online consultation tool that directed people to the GP or elsewhere.

A question was asked about how would NHS Southwark CCG address issues regarding the telephone services because not everyone could afford the expense of running a telephone or credit on their mobile phone.

Dr Howell explained that most people were contactable by telephone, however understood that people with disabilities, or those whose first language was not English or had complex

needs might not find it easy to get access to this service.

A question was asked about patient confidentiality and what measures were in place to ensure that patient notes were confidential

The presenter agreed to attend a future community council meeting so that residents could receive further information about the list of practices within the Peckham and Camberwell area and details of which GP practices were in their neighbourhoods.

Local Risk Strategy Consultation

The chair announced that the council were carrying out consultation on the local flood risk management which was in accordance with the statement of community involvement (2008) and as required by the Local Flood Authority (LLFA).

The local flood risk management strategy would provide a framework on how the council would manage the risk of flooding arising from surface water, ground water and ordinary water courses across the borough consistent with the flood and water management Act (2010) and the national Flood Risk Management Strategy.

The strategy consultation would be available to the public from the 3 November 2014 to 6 February 2015. Residents were encouraged to visit the council's website, and local libraries: Dulwich Library, Grove Vale Library and Area housing office. library. Police Petition

Councillor Michael Situ, cabinet member for environment, recycling, community safety and volunteering thanked everyone that signed the petition. The council would like to urge the Mayor of London to recruit more police officers. Councillor Michael Situ said people could still sign the petition and they were encouraged to speak to him during the break if they had any questions.

Consultations: Brayards Road and Bellenden area traffic management scheme

The council were consulting the community on Brayards Road area walking and cycling improvements from the 3 November to 21 November 2014.

The second traffic scheme was the Bellenden area traffic management scheme. The consultation was from 1 December 2014 to 19 December 2014. It was noted that as part of the consultation process consultation documents would be posted out to residents within these areas. 8. PECKHAM RYE STATION SQUARE - UPDATE

Peckham Rye Station

Cany Ash from Ash Sakula Architects was present and gave an update on Peckham Rye Station. The presenter thanked the community council for inviting him to the meeting and acknowledged that Peckham Rye station and square was a big project which had nearly come to the end of the improvements stage.

The feedback that the council received from residents and local businesses was that more public space was needed in order to make it more desirable for people to meet and enjoy the open space.

Alistair Huggett, planning projects manager played an audio of what people thought about Peckham Rye Station and the following comments were heard at the meeting:

- In regard to the series of construction – ensure all improvements were maintained.
- Keeping a balance of everything for example the hair & beauty shop and coffee shops.
- To give people the capacity to compete with everyone else.
- Change people's attitude towards working together and improve management and operation of public realm.
- Gathering intelligence of what could work and what doesn't.

Copies of the Peckham co-design booklet (Peckhamcodedesign.org) were available at the meeting. The co-design project was initiated by the community of Peckham which involved local residents and businesses who wanted a greater participation in shaping their local neighbourhood. This led to the council commissioning the co-design project. The council and the GLA were jointly committed to fund the creation of a new public square in front of Peckham Rye station. The booklet contained a list of aspirations for the area and most people said they would like:

- More places to sit in public spaces
- More trees
- More public space
- Better lighting
- More places to walk
- The area tidier
- More small businesses
- More arts, culture heritage and cafes
- More cycling and community diversity

In response to questions, the next stage would be for the council to appoint designers and the brief on the co- design would then go out to consultation where people's views would

be taken on board.

Residents also referred to businesses that were located within the arches and whether they would be kept in Peckham. Alistair Huggett explained that the council were negotiating with the businesses in question to see if they would like to stay in temporary premises and return when the regeneration was completed. The council were looking at various options. The officer agreed to stay during the break to address any of the residents' concerns.

There were further questions about local businesses and where would public realm fit in all of this. The presenters stated that as this was a small variable scheme it was difficult to say how this would fit in with public realm.

Concerns were raised about the scrap and car repair businesses that might have dangerous canisters on the premises and that these types of premises should not be under the arches.

Councillor Jamille Mohammed said he attended the work groups and thanked the community for taking part in the project.

The chair thanked those that participated and supported the project.

9. THEME ON TRAFFIC AND PUBLIC HIGHWAYS

Steve Kearns from Transport for London (TfL) was present at the meeting to give an overview of the Bakerloo line extension and the east west cycle superhighway.

Bakerloo line extension

Steve explained that the city was growing at a fast rate which had an average population of 8 million especially in big cities like London, Birmingham, and Manchester. Figures indicate that the population would have a major impact on transport and as result there was a need to address the increase the tube would demand – especially on Saturday night. The plan would be to run trains through the night at weekends on core parts of the network and to support London's vibrant night-time economy (possibly from 2015).

TfL are considering options for extending the Bakerloo line extension beyond Elephant & Castle. The proposal would tunnel to Lewisham via Camberwell, Peckham or Old Kent Road to Lewisham and to Beckenham junction and Hayes via the existing rail.

This would support employment and the population growth as well as improving public transport. The cost of extending the Bakerloo line and the Northern line extension would be approximately 3 billion pounds depending on the consultation. Also a bill would have to go through parliament. The time scale for opening the Bakerloo line extension would be in 2034.

The Bakerloo line extension would put southeast London on the Tube map, improving public transport accessibility and journey times.

Cycle Superhighway consultation

Steve explained that there were two consultations and he urged people to go online and submit their views. In response to questions, Steve mentioned that TfL would not consider both options for the cycle superhighway because of the space capacity and the fact it would not suit demand. If approval was to be given then further consultation would take place at a later date.

Consultation on the East to West cycle superhighway from Tower Hill to Action went out to consultation on the 3 September 2014 and closed on 9 November 2014.

Southwark Living Streets

Jeremy Leach from Southwark Living Streets presented this item.

Summary:

- Referred to the regeneration in Peckham High Street and Rye Lane.
- Reported there were an increased number of road casualties in the area.
- Regeneration around Woodene community space.
- Peckham High Street and Rye Lane – reduce street clutter and which makes it unsafe for pedestrians.
- Talked about the regeneration around the Peckham Town centre.
- Ideas would be for the area not to be dominated by vehicles and fully utilise the area's open spaces.
- The council and Transport for London (TfL) should think about the role of buses, clutter and maintain shared space, parks and open spaces.

Air Quality in Southwark

Bill Legassick, principal environmental health officer gave a brief overview of air quality in the borough. He outlined there were two air quality monitors located in the Old Kent Road and the Elephant and Castle. Details of the air quality information was available on the council's website. The officer spoke about the air quality strategy action plan for 2012 – 2017 and stated that the council was working closely with TfL to reduce air pollution in the borough.

The mayor of London had identified air focus areas in Peckham High Street, Hangar Lane and the Old Kent Road and other parts of the borough. Hybrid buses were introduced along these routes.

Community group – PEM people

Nicholas Okulu spoke about the bike shop and the group they run in the area. The project was funded in Peckham and Livesey in 2013. Nicholas thanked those who helped set up the project. He also thanked the met police and the volunteers and local clubs who have

helped run the project.

10. CHOUMERT GROVE CAR PARK AND BOURNEMOUTH CLOSE POCKET PLACES SCHEMES

RESOLVED:

1. That the community council agreed with the recommendations that were made to the cabinet member for Regeneration, Planning, and Transport regarding the Pocket Places Peckham scheme.
2. That due to the support shown by local stakeholders and the wider local community, the community council agreed that the scheme proceeds to implementation subject to necessary statutory procedures.

11. YOUTH COMMUNITY SLOT

The community council noted the youth community council (YCC) were in the process of recruiting young people to the YCC. Future updates would be given at a future meeting. This would include the type of activities available for young people at the Damilola Taylor centre.

13. BUDGET CHALLENGE - CONSULTATION

Councillor Fiona Colley, cabinet member for finance, strategy and performance talked about the budget challenge and the council's spending and proposed cuts.

During the last round of cuts people said they wanted to retain front line services, and bring some services in house which meant it would be more effective to collect council tax payments. It also meant council tax would remain the same without any increase. Also keep libraries open and provide free healthy school meals in Southwark.

The council would be adopting 10 new fairer future challenges. This involved looking at services that could be provided online. This would be more effective joined up work with other government agencies and review those services that were duplicated.

Residents were invited during the break to take part in this year's budget consultation exercise. This involved a red and green cheques interactive session that enabled residents to show which areas of council spending they thought should be reduced and which areas should be protected in the future.

14. DRAFT SOUTHWARK PLAN CONSULTATION

Amanda Squires from the planning policy team highlighted information about the new Southwark plan. The officer explained the core strategy was adopted in 2007 and the new Southwark plan would contain information about "area visions" for example Peckham and Nunhead. It would also include the new (proposed) planning policies that would be done over a three year period and this would be the first stage of the consultation.

The officer encouraged people to visit the council website in order to look at the various options. It included new (reviewed) map of the borough, the area action plan, new planning policies and the supplementary planning documents. The new planning policies for deciding a planning application would involve some of the following, travel, home, town centres, social infrastructure and sustainability

The consultation would be from 31 October 2014 until 6 March 2015. Officers from the planning policy team would be attending community events and workshops in the area in order to consult as wide as possible.

The 2nd stage would be working out the options for the planning policies. The 3rd stage would be to submit the final version of the Southwark plan to the central government for examination.

Revitalise Peckham Rye Public Questions

Date: 30th October 2014

Questions from Rye Village Resident's Association, Peckham Rye

Question 1

Will members of this community council communicate a plan of action to reassure park user's and local resident's that this facility will be saved, renovated, and put back to full use to ensure families are not excluded any longer from this public children's service that ought to be fully operational from this public building in the middle of Peckham Rye Common. It is not fair to see it still being hired out privately to people who can afford to hold private parties there yet on the other hand it is not fully accessible to the public whom want to the continue having access to the children's service during the week days.

Answer

The current playroom building is managed on the Council's behalf by Ivydale Primary School and Children's Centre. They operate a fully accessible public service, with free 'stay and play' groups currently taking place four days a week, as well as a free session for childminders with the children they look after. We would wish this continue. The facility is occasionally hired out for children's parties to raise funds for the Centre, but only at weekends when the building is not otherwise in use.

The existing building was built as a temporary prisoner of war hut and is not fit for the current purpose as a playroom. Rather than renovate we are planning to demolish the building and the area will be landscaped (see response to question 2). New playroom facilities will then be built adjacent to the Adventure Playground building. The Council will work to ensure continuity of the facility to avoid disruption to the playroom users when they move to their new space.

Question 2

Many local Peckham Rye Park and Common users seem to be confused about the consultation process currently taking place right now to do with Peckham Rye Common & Park Improvements. This is because it does appear to some of us that you have already made a clear decision to remove the existing play room building operating from the Prisoner's of War Hut on Peckham Rye Common known as the One O' Clock Club. Will this community council please explain whether the decision to demolish the Prisoner of War Hut was made in advance of the consultation commencement date?

Answer

Demolition was agreed by Nunhead and Peckham Rye Community Council on 22 July 2009. Consultation was recently carried out between January-May 2014 to understand how the public use the range of facilities in the park and to inform the strategy for the Playroom project. The next round of consultation is being arranged to begin soon. This will respond to queries which were raised in the last consultation and will provide an update on how the project is progressing.

Question 3

How much will it cost to remove the existing play room building operating from the Prisoner's of War Hut (One O' Clock Club) located in Peckham Rye Common together with the current changing room containers in order to make way for a new open access play area for children?

Answer

The options are still being developed and so this detail of information is not yet available.

The new playroom and changing rooms would be purpose built and will be designed with input from users of both the playroom and changing rooms.

Question 4

How much will it cost to renovate the existing play room building operating from the Prisoner's of War Hut (One O' Clock Club) in Peckham Rye Common which is located next door to the Cafe on Rye to include a suitable new access play area for children and fit for purpose modern play room with new children's age appropriate outdoor play apparatus?

Answer

The renovation of the playroom is not a viable option as the temporary building is not fit for purpose. See response to question 2.

Question 5

What children's age range is this new access play area aimed at in Peckham Rye Common, for example will it be a suitable play area for children aged 0-5 years, 6- 10 years, 10 - 16 year olds and all park users?

Answer

We will aim to provide a range of play equipment for toddlers to 16 year olds. The new play area will be of a similar high quality to the Goose Green play area.

The adventure playground will continue to provide free sessions for 5-15 year olds.

Question 6

Please will this Community Council detail exactly what work has been to done to renovate the Prisoner of War Hut which currently holds the play equipment and has space inside for children to play, and whether you will ensure that the contractor's pay for the clear up of the water play area which is unfit for purpose ever since it was first opened.

Answer

The Council has maintained the playroom building for many years but as explained above we are committed to replacing the current building with a purpose-built facility in the park rather than refurbishing the present building.

The removal of the prisoner of war hut from this area provides an opportunity to re-landscape the whole site providing more attractive views to and from the cafe. An element of water play will be included in the new play area and this will be carefully designed to ensure that it is fit for purpose.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the Peckham and Nunhead Community Council considers a deputation request from representatives of Peckham Planning Network

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The deputation request was submitted by representatives of Peckham Planning Network. A deputation can be submitted by a person of any age who lives, works or studies in Southwark. Deputations must relate to matters which the council has powers or duties or which affects Southwark.
3. The deputation states:

The Peckham Planning Network has a petition to present to the council about the protection of Peckham's Rooftop views. A copy of the petition is available on the website at

<http://www.peckhamvision.org/wiki/images/f/f7/Rooftop_views_petition_v.02_-_landscape.pdf>

4. It expresses concern about the plans for a tall building in front of the rooftop views from two of the town centre's cultural hubs which have emerged over the last few years. We would like to ask the community council to present the petition on our behalf to the council.
5. The reason for seeking to present it to this community council meeting is that the council is currently consulting on the new Southwark plan.
6. For Peckham an important part of the new Southwark plan is the future of the site which includes the cinema and multi storey car park. The view towards central London from the roof of the car park, and also from the Bussey building, is a very significant part of the success of the new cultural activities in both of those buildings, which are a significant feature of the growing cultural sector in Peckham's town centre economy.
7. It therefore seems appropriate to present the petition during the council's consultation on the new Southwark plan which includes the future of the cinema/multi storey car park, and which ends on 6 March.

8. Its future has implications for planning policy for the whole area, and needs to be covered in this consultation on the new Southwark plan. We would welcome an update to the community council and the public from the regeneration department on the status of the site and how potential future uses will be explored.
9. In the spirit of the CoDesign process the council has adopted for major development sites in Peckham town centre, we would be grateful if you would enable us, following the update, to mention very briefly some ideas on this work, and our willingness to support the work of the Regeneration dept on it.
10. At the meeting, the spokesperson for the deputation will be invited to speak up to five minutes on the subject matter. The community council will debate the deputation and at the conclusion of the deputation the chair will seek the consent of councillors to debate the subject. Councillors may move motions and amendments without prior notice if the subject does not relate to a report on the agenda. The meeting can decide to note the deputation or provide support if requested to do so. The community council shall not take any formal decision(s) on the subject raised unless a report is on the agenda.
11. Any relevant resource or community impact issues will be contained in the comments of the strategic director.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

12. The deputation shall consist of no more than six persons, including the spokesperson.
13. Only one member of the deputation shall be allowed to address the meeting, her or his speech being limited to five minutes.
14. Councillors may ask questions of the deputation, which shall be answered by their spokesperson or any member of the deputation nominated by her or him for up to five minutes at the conclusion of the spokesperson's address.
15. If more than one deputation is to be heard in respect of one subject there shall be no debate until each deputation has been presented. The monitoring officer shall, in writing, formally communicate the decision of the meeting to the person who submitted the request for the deputation to be received.
