AMENDMENTS

ITEM 2.1: POLICY AND RESOURCES STRATEGY 2017/18 – 2019/20 REVENUE BUDGET (see pages 1 - 150 of the main agenda)

AMENDMENT A

Moved: Councillor Catherine Rose Seconded: Councillor Evelyn Akoto

Following recommendation 3 insert new recommendations:

School funding

- 4. Council assembly welcomes the contribution from Schools Forum from the Dedicated Schools Grant to fund the shortfall in Education Support Grant (ESG) services in 2017/18, but notes its concern about the ending of ESG, which funds the important work that the council's school improvement team undertakes working with local schools.
- 5. Council assembly notes that this change comes alongside a proposed new national funding formula, which will have a damaging and disproportionate impact on schools in Southwark by reducing funding by 2.7%, alongside existing additional budget pressures.
- 6. Council assembly believes that at a time when some schools in Southwark could be losing £1,000 per pupil in funding, it is more important than ever that the council is able to continue supporting schools to improve opportunities for Southwark children.
- 7. Council assembly calls on the cabinet to work with schools in Southwark to protect school improvement, continue to encourage school-to-school support and increase collaboration within the Southwark family of schools.
- 8. Council assembly also calls on councillors to support the Southwark campaign for fair funding, and to work with schools, parents and other London boroughs to campaign against cuts to funding for London schools.

Moved: Councillor Rosie Shimell Seconded: Councillor Ben Johnson

Insert new paragraphs 1-5:

1. **Southwark Liberal Democrats will stop Labour's council tax rise** which hits the poorest the hardest. Instead, we will balance the books by reducing council waste, increasing fees for developers and making polluters pay.

2. Fighting for the rights of everyone

Labour is increasing people's council tax bills while slashing vital social care support for older and disabled residents and people with learning disabilities. We will stop these short-sighted cuts while we ask the people who are most affected how the Council can best support them while spending residents' money wisely.

3. Fighting for local democracy

Labour's lack of consultation with local people over the services which affect their lives is shameful. We will work with service users, the voluntary sector and the NHS to design alternative proposals for services which Labour wants to cut.

4. Fighting for a cleaner, greener Southwark

Labour's £16 bulky waste collection charge has contributed to increased flytipping on Southwark's streets and estates while discriminating against residents without access to a car or on lower incomes. We will scrap this unfair waste tax and instead crack down on businesses and individuals who engage in illegal flytipping.

5. Fighting for more homes

Southwark desperately needs more homes, but the Labour council allows too many developments that don't provide enough housing that local residents can afford. We will reverse Labour's proposed cuts to the planning team and invest to:

- ensure officers spend as much time talking to residents as they do to developers;
- train planning lawyers to fight residents' corner and stand up to developers;
- speed up the construction of affordable homes Southwark residents need.

"...increase the Southwark element of the council tax for 2017-18 by 1.99%"

and replace with:

"...freeze the Southwark element of the council tax for 2017-18."

"Agrees the recommendations of the 7 February 2017 cabinet for a general fund budget requirement (after specific grants and use of reserves) for 2017-18 of £274.3m"

and replace with:

"Agrees a general fund budget requirement (after specific grants and use of reserves) for 2017-18 of £274.3m subject to the changes detailed in the following schedules being made to appendices of the cabinet report and to make any necessary consequential amendments to the reports and tables in items 2.1 and 3.1 as a result of the above."

AMENDMENT D

Moved: Councillor Anood Al-Samerai Seconded: Councillor James Okosun

Council assembly recognises the invaluable contribution made by migrants and refugees living and working in Southwark, including citizens of fellow European Union countries.

Council assembly further recognises that since the EU referendum on 23 June 2016, there has been a rise in reported hates crime in London and many refugees and EU citizens have become increasingly anxious about their status and how they are perceived.

Council assembly notes the report "Am I Welcome" produced by Citizens Advice Southwark on the barriers facing refugees and migrants in Southwark in accessing statutory services and building successful new lives in our borough.

Council assembly also notes the report on the Resettlement of Syrian Refugee Households considered by cabinet on 13 December 2016, outlining the council's commitment to rehouse 25 Syrian refugee families over 5 years.

Council assembly further notes that Special Responsibility Allowances for councillors have not been reduced since 2010 and that the Policy and Resources Strategy 2017-18 proposes a combined increase in council tax of 4.99% across the borough.
