RECOMMENDATION

1. That the Sub-Committee considers an application by the Metropolitan Police for a review of the Premises Licence granted under the Licensing Act 2003 to Mr Bahader Singh Mahil in respect of the premises known as B D Wines, 1 Braganzar Street, London SE17 3RD.

2. Notes

- a) The grounds for the review are stated in paragraph 10 15 of this report.
- b) A copy of the Council's approved procedure for hearings of the Sub-Committee in relation to an application made under the Licensing Act 2003, along with a copy of the Hearing Regulations, has been circulated to all parties prior to the meeting.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 3. The Licensing Act 2003 came into effect on 25 November 2005 The Act's introduction provided a new licensing regime for the retail sale of alcohol; the provision of regulated entertainment; and the provision of late night refreshment.
- 4. Under the Act a premises user wishing to provide any of the licensable activities listed in paragraph 3 of this report must secure a premises licence from the local licensing authority for the area in which the business concerned is located. Where the retail sale of alcohol is involved a designated premises supervisor holding a personal licence issued by the local authority for the area in which that individual lives must be named upon the premises licence.
- 5. The premises licence once issued remains valid for the life of the business unless surrendered or revoked. However, under section 51(1) of the Act it remains open to any responsible authority or interested party to apply to the local licensing authority for a review of the premises licence where there are concerns regarding one or more of the four stated licensing objectives.

MATTERS FOR CONSIDERATION

The Premises Licence

6. On 11 February 2005, during the transitional period of the implementation of the Act, an application was made under Schedule 8 by Bahader Singh Mahil for the conversion of existing Justices Licence into a Premises Licence, in respect of B D Wines, 1 Braganzar Street, London SE17 3RD for the ground floor convenience store and off licence. The application sought a straight conversion of the existing licence - no variation of the existing licence was sought.

- 7. In the absence of any police representations the application was duly granted on 22 December 2005. As a result Mr Mahil holds a Premises Licence which authorises the retail sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises for the convenience Store and Off licence on:
 - a) Monday-Saturday from 10.00 to 23.00
 - b) Sundays from 12.00-22.30
- 8. The Designated Premises Supervisor named on the licence at the time this review is Mr Bahader Singh Mahil.
- 9. A copy of the Premises Licence is attached to the report as Appendix 1.

The Application for a Review of the Premises Licence

- 10. On 28 May 2009 an application requesting a review of the premises licence was received from PC Paul Compton of the Metropolitan Police. A copy of the application is attached as Appendix B. The grounds for the review relate to the following licensing objectives and are summarized as follows:
 - a) **The Prevention of Crime and Disorder –** Supply of controlled drugs openly (sold) at the premises.
 - b) **Protection of Children From Harm** During a recent Test Purchase Operation carried out in conjunction with the Local Authority Trading Standards Unit staff at these premises sold intoxicating liquor to a person aged under eighteen.
- 11. A copy of the review application is attached to the report as Appendix 2.
- 12. Additional information in the form of witness statement by supplied by two officers of the Metropolitan Police are attached as Appendix 3 to the report.

Other Representations Submitted following Advertisement of the Review Application

13. In accordance with the provisions of the Act the application for a review of the premises licence was advertised on a post immediately outside of the premises; on the Council's web site; and at the Southwark Town Hall. Checks were made to ensure that posters displayed in the street and the premises remained in position. Further representations could be made up until 26 June 2009.

Responsible Authorities

14. Additional information supporting the review application was made by the Councils Trading Standards on the grounds of the licensing objective— prevention of children from harm. A copy of the representation is attached as Appendix 4 to the report.

Interested Parties

15. There have been no further representations made by interested parties.

The Local Vicinity

16. A map of the local vicinity is attached as Appendix 5.

RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

17. No fee is payable in respect of an application for a licence review.

CONSULTATIONS

18. Consultation undertaken upon this application has been carried out in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. Responses are detailed elsewhere in this report.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES IMPLICATIONS

19. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

SOUTHWARK STATEMENT OF LICENSING POLICY

- 20. Council Assembly approved the Southwark Statement of Licensing Policy on 2 April 2008. Sections of the Statement that are considered to be of particular relevance to this application are
 - a) Section 3 which sets out the purpose and scope of the policy and reinforces the four licensing objectives;
 - b) Section 4 which sets out the arrangements for the administration, exercise and delegation of functions;
 - c) Section 5 which sets out the Council's approach with regard to the imposition of conditions including mandatory conditions to be attached to the licence;
 - d) Section 6 details other relevant Council and Government policies, strategies, responsibilities and guidance, including the relevant Articles under the Human Rights Act 1998;
 - e) Section 7 provides general guidance on dealing with crime and disorder and deals with licensing hours;
 - f) Section 8 provides general guidance on ensuring public safety including safe capacities;
 - g) Section 9 provides general guidance on the prevention of nuisance; and
 - h) Section 10 provides general guidance on the protection of children from harm.
- 21. The purpose of Southwark's Statement of Licensing Policy is to make clear to applicants what considerations will be taken into account when determining applications and should act as a guide to the Sub-Committee when considering the applications. However, the Sub-Committee must always consider each application on its own merits and allow exceptions to the normal policy where these are justified by the circumstances of the application.

CONCURRENT REPORT BY THE STRATEGIC DIRECTOR OF COMMUNITIES LAW AND GOVERNANCE - LEGAL ISSUES

22. The Sub-Committee is asked to determine, under Section 52 of the Licensing Act 2003, an application, made under Section 51 of the same act, for a review of premises licence. At any stage, following the grant of a premises licence, a responsible authority

or an interested party may ask the licensing authority to review the licence because of a matter arising at the premises in connection with any of the four licensing objectives.

Principles for making the determination

- 23. The principles, which Sub-Committee members must apply, are set out below.
- 24. The licensing authority must hold a hearing to consider an application for review of a premises licence where -
- (a) the application is properly made in accordance with Section 51 of the Act.
- (b) the applicant has given notice in accordance with Section 51(3) of the Act.
- (c) the advertising requirements provided for under Section 51(3) of the Act are satisfied.
- (d) the licensing authority has considered the ground(s) of review not to be frivolous, vexatious or repetitious.
- (e) The licensing authority has considered the ground(s) of review to be relevant to one or more of the licensing objectives.
- 25. The four licensing objectives are -
- (a) the prevention of crime and disorder.
- (b) Public safety.
- (c) The prevention of nuisance.
- (d) The protection of children from harm.
- 26. Each objective must be considered to be of equal importance
- 27. The authority must, having regard to the application and any relevant representations, take such of the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are to-
- (a) modify the conditions of the licence by altering, omitting or adding any condition.
- (b) exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence.
- (c) remove the designated premises supervisor.
- (d) suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months.
- (e) revoke the licence.
- 28. For the purpose of determining a relevant representation under section 52 of the Act a "relevant representation" means representations which -
- (a) are relevant to one or more of the licensing objectives.
- (b) are made by the holder of the premises licence, a responsible authority or an interested party within the prescribed period
- (c) have not been withdrawn
- (d) if made by an interested party (who is not also a responsible authority), that they are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority frivolous or vexatious.
- 29. Modifications of conditions and exclusions of licensable activities may be imposed either permanently or for a temporary period of up to three months.
- 30. The authority may decide that no action is necessary if it finds that the review does not require it to take any steps necessary to promote the licensing objectives.
- 31. In deciding what remedial action if any it should take, the authority must direct it's mind to the causes or concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action should

- generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than a necessary and proportionate response.
- 32. It is of particular importance that any detrimental financial impact that may result from a licensing authority's decision is necessary and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives in the circumstances that gave rise to the application for review.

Reasons

- 33. Where the authority determines an application for review it must notify the determination and reasons for making it to –
- (a) the holder of the licence.
- (b) the applicant
- (c) any person who made relevant representations
- (d) the chief officer of police for the area (or each police area) in which the premises are situated

Hearing Procedure

- 34. Subject to the Licensing Hearing regulations, the Licensing Committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that
- The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Crossexamination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations
- Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing
- The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to
 - Address the authority
 - o If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
 - o In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
- The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant
 - o to the particular application before the committee, and
 - the licensing objectives.
- The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
- In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.
- 35. This matter relates to the review of a Premises Licence under section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regulation 26(1)(a) requires the Sub-Committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

Council's multiple roles and the role of the Licensing Sub-Committee

36. Sub-Committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the Council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the Council as authority responsible

- respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health, and safety and as the planning authority.
- 37. Members should note that the Licensing Sub-Committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The Sub-Committee sits in quasi-judicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing of the application. In this case, Members should disregard the Council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the Licensing Law, Guidance, and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.
- 38. As a quasi-judicial body the Licensing Sub-Committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The Sub-Committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The Licensing Sub-Committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.
- 39. The Licensing Sub-Committee is entitled to consider events outside of the premises if they are relevant, i.e. are properly attributable to the premises being open. The proprietors do not have to be personally responsible for the incidents for the same to be relevant. However, if such events are not properly attributable to the premises being open, then the evidence is not relevant and should be excluded. Guidance is that the licensing authority will primarily focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, working or engaged in normal activity in the area concerned.
- 40. Members will be aware of the Council's Code of Conduct, which requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The Code applies to Members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, Members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.
- 41. The Sub-Committee can only consider matters within the application that have been raised through representations from interested parties and responsible authorities. Interested parties must live in the vicinity of the premises. This will be decided on a case-to-case basis.
- 42. Under the Human Rights Act 1998, the Sub Committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The Sub-Committee has a duty under section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent crime and disorder in the Borough.
- 43. Interested Parties, Responsible Authorities and the applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the Sub-Committee to the Magistrates' Court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against.

Guidance

44. Members are required to have regard to the DCMS Guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood,

members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

1000 No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence -

a.At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence; or b.At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended.

1001 Every supply of alcohol under the Premises Licence must be made, or authorised by, a person who holds a Personal Licence.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

- 2700 Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during the permitted hours. In this condition the permitted hours means:
- a.On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, 8.00.a.m. to 11.00.p.m.
- b.On Sundays, other than Christmas Day, 10.00.a.m. to 10.30.p.m.
- c.On Christmas day, 12 noon to 3.00.p.m. and 7.00.p.m. to 10.30.p.m.
- d.On Good Friday, 8.00.a.m. to 10.30.p.m.

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- i)During the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises, unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel
- ii)The ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the dispatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- iii)The sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- iv)The sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces.
- 2701 Alcohol shall not be sold in an open container or be consumed in the licensed premises.
- **2800** Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is sold or supplied, except alcohol sold or supplied:
- a. With and for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time, consumed with the meal and paid for together with the meal;
- b. For consumption by a person residing in the premises or his guest and paid for together with his accommodation:
- c.To a canteen or mess.

1) The Prevention of Crime & Disorder.

Police received information that controlled drugs were openly being supplied (Sold) from the off Licence, B D Wines, 1 Braganza Street SE17 3RD. On 12.03.09 police were called to the premises regarding three males smoking drugs outside. Three males were stopped and searched and two found to be in possession of controlled illegal drugs, one of the males detained worked at the premises and stated he was on a break.

As a direct result a search warrant was obtained under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 and this being executed @ 17.02hrs on Friday 15th May 2009 by the Southwark Police Operational Support Unit. At the premises at the time were Mr Satvinder Mahil & his brother Bobinder Mahil the sons of the Premises Licence holder & Designated Premsies Supervisor (DPS) Mr Bahader Mahil. A thourough search of the premises was condcuted with the assistence of a drug search dog in accordance with the drug search warrant. Also present on the premises were four males who had been found in the past on the premises or within the vicinity in possession of controlled illegal drugs.

A quantity of drugs were found in various locations around the premises: A number of self sealed bags containing herbal cannabis were found in the rear stockroom, which also smelt strongly of cannabis. Behind the till area further self seal bags containing herbal cannabis were found along with five wrapped lumps of cannabis and £60 in cash, not in the till.

A white mecedes sprinter van registered to the Premises Licence holder & Designated Premises Supervisor parked outside the premises was also searched under the warrant. No items were found but the vehicle smelt strongly of cannabis and it is thought that this vehicle is used to transport the drugs to the premises.

Th search also found two offensive weapons behind the counter, one (1) baseball bat & one (1) gravity friction lock baton. (The same type as issued to Metropolitan Police Officers and by definition an offensive weapon. Members of the public are not permitting to legal hold such an item)

The two sons of the premises licence holder & designated premises supervisor were arrested at the time the search warrant was executed for possession of controlled drugs with intent to supply and for possession of two offensive weapons. Both of these males are the sons of the Premises Licence holder & Designated Premises Supervisor and both reside at the same address of the Premises Licence holder. A short while later the Premises Licence holder & Designated Premises Supervisor attended Walworth Police Station and was arrested for possession of controlled drugs with intent to supply and for possession of two offensive weapons. All three males were interviewed and bailed to return to the police station pending forensic analysis of the drugs seized.

During a previous visit to the premises on 28.03.09, the premises licence holder & Designated Premises Supervisor was found to be in possession of a similar gravity friction lock baton as on this occasion and received an adult caution after admitting he had the item for his own protection.

	It is obviously of great concern that a local store frequented by local residents and should be involved in the supply of illegal controlled drugs, especially given the fact that the premises is located in an area designated as a "Drug Hotspot".
	3) Protection of Children from Harm.
	As part of a continuous programme to ensure that young persons are not supplied with alcohol at licensed premsies, a number of Test Purchase Operations are conducted with collegues from LBS Trading Standards. On 28.02.09 @ 12.20pm a fifteen year old female who was assisting Police & Trading Standards, purchased a bottle of WKD Blue Vodka from the shop and this being supplied by the Premises Licence Holder & Designated Premises Supervisor. This resulted in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued.

During this time the dog indicated to several areas within the store. These areas where manually searched and various items of evidential value where recovered. At 1710hrs PC820MD Munck found four (4) carrier bags containing quantity of cannabis (Fifteen (15) herbal cannabis self-seal bags and four (4) cannabis resin wraps) on the first shelf on rack on right of storeroom. These I seized and sealed in police evidence bag D41772043 which I produce as exhibit ARH./1. At 1715hrs I took three (3) ICEFLO photographs showing the location of exhibit ARH/1 which I later sealed in police evidence bag C32858527 which I produce as exhibit ARH/11. As a result of what had been found I spoke with Bobinder about what had been found. I said to him, 'Do you know what it is?' He replied, 'It's skunk isn't it'. I said, 'Whose is it?' He replied, 'I ain't got a clue. I know it's what they're all smoking.' I said, 'All who?' He replied, 'What Wayne, Scott and Dean are all smoking'. I said, 'You have no knowledge of this?' At 1810hrs PC820MD Munck found one (1) CCTV tape in the CCTV recorder which I seized and sealed in police evidence bag C33343304 which I produce as exhibit ARH/8. At 1825hrs PC202MD Baster found one (1) self seal bag of herbal cannabis underneath the CCTV recorder which I seized and sealed in police evidence bag A13876894 which I produce as exhibit ARH/9. Following the search of the premises I completed a sketch plan of the venue, BD Wines, 1 Braganza Street, London SE17 3RD which I produce as exhibit ARH/10. I have since been made aware that all three males, Satvinder, Bobinder and Bahader Mahil have been bailed to return to Peckham police station on Tuesday 28th July 2009 at 1000hrs where they are likely to all be charged with the offences of possession with intent to supply a controlled drug namely cannabis and possession of an offensive weapon.

when searched found to be in possession of illegal drugs. A thorough search of the premises was conducted with the assistance of a drugs search dog and a quantity of illegal drugs was discovered at various locations around the store. In a rear stockroom a number of self sealed bags containing herbal cannabis were found. The officers searching noted that this rear stockroom smelt strongly of cannabis. Behind the till area further self seal bags were found also containing herbal cannabis along with five (5) lumps of cannabis and £60 in cash. (Not in the till) A white Mercedes sprinter van registered to the Premises Licence Holder & Designated Premises Supervisor, Mr Bahader Singh Mahil, was parked outside the premises and also subjected to a full search. No items were found although the searching officers noted that there was a strong smell of cannabis inside the vehicle and officers commented that it was likely that vehicle was used to transport illegal drugs to the premises.

Along with the illegal drugs discovered inside the premises, two offensive weapons were found behind the counter: One (1) Baseball Bat & One (1) Gravity Friction Lock Baton(The same type as issued to Police Officers and by definition are offensive weapons)

The two sons of the Premises Licence Holder & Designated Premises Supervisor were arrested for possession of controlled drugs with intent to supply and for the possession of two offensive weapons and conveyed to Walworth Police Station were they were interviewed and bailed to return to the Police Station at a later date, pending a full forensic analysis of the items seized. It is worthy of note that both sons gave their home address as the same as their father Mr Bahader Singh Mahil, the premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor.

Later during the evening of 15th May 2009, Mr Bahader Singh Mahil, attended the front counter at Walworth Police Station where he was subsequently arrested for possession of controlled drugs with intent to supply and for possession of two offensive weapons. The reasons for this are that he is the Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor and therefore should be in full control of activities that take place inside the premises. Enquiries have revealed that during a previous visit made by Police to the premises on 28th March 2009 Mr Bahader Singh Mahil was found to be in possession of a similar Gravity Friction Lock Baton for which he received an adult caution after admitting he had the item for his own protection. Mr Bahader Singh Mahil was interviewed and bailed to return to the Police Station at a later date.

As part of a continuous programme to ensure that young persons are not supplied with alcohol at licensed premises, a number of Test Purchase Operations are conducted with colleagues from London Borough of Southwark Trading Standards. On 28th February 2009 at 12.20pm a Test Purchase Operation was conducted at BD Wines 1 Braganza Street SE17, where a fifteen (15) year old female purchased a bottle of WKD Blue Vodka from the store. The Premises Licence Holder & Designated Premises Supervisor, Mr Bahader Singh Mahil sold

I entered the store immediately after the sale with my colleague PC Stephen McNally and spoke with Mr Bahader Singh Mahil and an appointment was made for him to attend Walworth Police Station the following week, where he accepted a Fixed Penalty Notice for supply of alcohol to a person under the age of 18. It is of great concern to Police that the Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor, Mr Bahader Singh Mahil, would appear to be involved in the supply of illegal drugs. I am aware that at the time of writing this statement no decision has been taken as to what, if any, criminal charges should be levelled at Mr Bahader Singh Mahil and his sons. However as the Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor, Mr Bahader Singh Mahil is legally bound to be in "Day to Day control" of the premises and therefore should be fully aware of what activities are taking place inside the premises.

Statement in Support of Application for Review of Premises licence

BD Wines, 1 Braganza Street, London SE17 3RD

Southwark Trading Standards were carrying out test purchasing exercises of alcohol with Police Licensing Officers on 20 February 2009 and again on 20 March.

28 February 2009

The volunteer was carefully selected by Trading Standards. She was photographed and measured prior to the exercise. She was of slim build, 5ft 5in (166cm) tall and dressed in casual clothes consistent with her age; 15 years. She was briefed in accordance with the LACORS code of practice and was not wearing make up in order to make appear older. She was always given money in the form of a note in order for the prospective seller to have extra time to assess her age. When she was in a shop attempting to purchase alcohol she was always observed by a member of Trading Standards' staff and any conversation could be heard.

At 12.20pm she attempted to purchase of bottle of alcohol at the above premise. A sale was made. Nothing was said to her about her age nor was she challenged in any way as to any proof of age. She handed over a £10 note. Once out of the shop she gave the Trading Standards Officer her change. She gave him £8.01 plus what she had purchased. She had been charged £1.99 for one bottle of WKD Vodka and a chocolate bar.

There were 11 test purchases carried out on that day by the same underage volunteer. She was refused at 7 of the premises where she attempted to purchase alcohol.

20 March 2009

Another test purchase was carried out at the premises. The test purchase was carried out by a different volunteer to the test purchase of 28 February 2009. The volunteer was a 15 year old girl. Again she was of slim build, dressed in casual clothes consistent with her age. She was shorter in height being 5ft 3in (160 cm). She was briefed in accordance with the LACORS code of practice and was not wearing make up in order to make appear older. She was always given money in the form of a note in order for the prospective seller to have extra time to assess her age. When she was in a shop attempting to purchase alcohol she was always observed by a member of Trading Standards' staff and any conversation could be heard. A sale did not take place on this occasion. The sales assistant was on the point of making a sale when he observed another adult in the shop; this being the Trading Standards observer. At this point he refused the sale outright, not even asking for any proof of age. This volunteer was younger than the first one used in February.


In relation to the test purchase, the young person was more than two years below the legal age to purchase alcohol and looked her age.

There were 10 test purchases carried out on that day by the same underage volunteer. She was refused at 9 of the premises where she attempted to purchase alcohol.

Within Southwark, this council wholly administers the licensing responsibility.

- 3. The Act requires the licensing authority to carry out its functions under the Act with a view to promoting the four stated licensing objectives. These are
- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- The promotion of public safety

- The prevention of nuisance; and
- The protection of children from harm.
- 4. In carrying out its licensing functions, a licensing authority must also have regard to
- The Act itself:
- The guidance to the Act issued under Section 182 of the Act;
- · Secondary regulations issued under the Act;
- The licensing authority's own statement of licensing policy
- The application, including the operating schedule submitted as part of the application
- Relevant representations
- 5. The Act established a transitional period between 7 February 2005 and 6 August 2005 under which holders of existing justice's licenses, public entertainment licenses and night café licenses were able to apply to the local licensing authority for "grandfather rights" conversion of those existing licenses into the relevant licenses under the new system. Licenses that were so converted were converted on existing terms, conditions and restrictions. The 6 August date having passed, operators must now apply for new licenses.
- 6. The premises licence application process involves the provision of all relevant information required under the Act to the licensing authority with copies provided by the applicant to the relevant responsible bodies under the Act. The application must also be advertised at the premises and in the local press. The responsible authorities and other interested parties within the local community may make representations on any part of the application where relevant to the four licensing objectives.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

The premises licence application

- 7. On the 29th May 2009 Mr Frank Boxer applied to this council for the grant of a new premises licence in respect of the premises known Franks Cafe & Campari Bar, Level 10, Peckham Rye Car Park, 95A Rye Lane, London, SE15 4ST.
- 8. A copy of the application for the new premises licence is attached to the report as appendix A.
- 9. The premises licence application form provides the applicant company's operating schedule. Parts F, M, O and P set out the proposed operating hours and operating controls in full, with reference to the four licensing objectives as stated in the Licensing Act 2003
- 10. The application is summarized as follows:
 - The provision for the supply of alcohol on the premises and recorded music –
 11.00hrs to 22.00hrs on Thursdays through to Sundays
 - Opening hours –
 11.00hrs to 22.00hrs on Thursdays through to Sunday

Operating history

- 11. The premises has not held any licence under the Licensing Act 2003.
- 12. Mr Boxer has given the council three Temporary Event Notices to be held at the premises for the following dates:

Designated premises supervisor

13. The proposed designated premises supervisor is Mr Frank Boxer who has been granted a personal licence by Lambeth Council.

Representations from interested parties

14. There are no representations from interested parties.

Representations from responsible authorities

- 15. There are three representations received from responsible authorities, the police the health & safety team and the environmental protection team.
- 16. The fire service and the planning authority have replied to the consultation and raise no objection.
- 17. Copies of the representations and replies from responsible authorities are attached as appendix B.
- 18. A site visit was made with the licensing officer, health and safety team and the environmental enforcement team. Following this visit the applicant agreed to add extra conditions to his operating schedule to address the representations made, which are as follows:
 - I. The licensee shall ensure that the actions from the risk assessment submitted to the licensing unit on 20th June 2009 shall be implemented and adhered to.
 - II. Stewards shall be nominated to prevent drinks being removed from beyond the licensable area marked in red on the plans.
 - III. Emergency lighting shall be provided
 - IV. Electricity shall be supplied through fused mains and not extension leads

- V. The means of escape provided for all persons on the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, immediately available and clearly identifiable in accordance with the approved arrangements allowing safe means of access and egress at all times. Where tables and seats are provided, clear gangways to exits shall be maintained, in accordance with the approved arrangements to the satisfaction of the Council
- VI. Any music played shall be as background music and shall not exceed 60 decibels or that of normal conversation.
- 19. The risk assessment and plans referred to in points one and two are attached as appendix C
- 20. As a result of this the health and safety team and the environmental enforcement team have withdrawn their representations. Conciliation statements and replies withdrawing the representations are attached as appendix D
- 21. In an attempt to conciliate the police representation, the applicant agreed to carry over the conditions that were attached to his recent temporary event notices to this time limited premises licence application and also gave assurances addressing other concerns within the police representation. The police declined to conciliate because the premises is within the saturation zone and say this application should be determined by the licensing committee. See attached documents as appendix E.

Disability discrimination act

22. The Southwark Disablement Association have no comments regarding this application.

Southwark council saturation policy for Peckham

- 24. Council assembly approved the introduction of a special policy for Peckham on the cumulative impact of a concentration of licensed premises (saturation policy) on 05 November 2008.
- 25. The decision to introduce saturation policy was taken with regard to the committee's concern over rising trends of late night alcohol related violence against the person and late night disorder and rowdiness associated with late night licensed premises in the area.
- 26. The effect of this special policy is that is to create a presumption that applications for new premises licences or variations that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, following relevant representations, unless the applicant can demonstrate in their operating schedule that there will be no negative cumulative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives.

27. The applicant has been advised to address the committees concerns around cumulative impact at the meeting.

Southwark council statement of licensing policy

- 28. Council assembly approved the third revision of Southwark's statement of licensing policy on 5 November 2008. Sections of the statement that are considered to be of particular relevance to this application are
- Section 3 which sets out the purpose and scope of the policy and re-inforces the four licensing objectives
- Section 5 which sets out the council's approach with regard to the imposition of conditions including mandatory conditions to be attached to the licence
- Section 6 details other relevant council and government policies, strategies, responsibilities and guidance, including the relevant articles under the Human Rights Act 1998
- Section 7 provides general guidance on dealing with crime and disorder and deals with licensing hours
- Section 8 provides general guidance on ensuring public safety including safe capacities
- Section 9 provides general guidance on the prevention of nuisance
- Section 10 provides general guidance on the protection of children from harm.
- 29. The purpose of Southwark's statement of licensing policy is to make clear to applicants what considerations will be taken into account when determining applications and should act as a guide to the sub-committee when considering the applications. However, the sub-committee must always consider each application on its own merits and allow exceptions to the normal policy where these are justified by the circumstances of the application.

RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

30. A fee of £315 has been paid by the applicant in respect of this application being the statutory fee payable for premises within non-domestic rateable value band C.

CONSULTATIONS

31. Consultation has been carried out on this application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. A public notice was placed in the 11th May 2009 edition of the Southwark News and a similar notice exhibited outside of the premises.

COMMUNITY IMPACT STATEMENT

32. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Strategic director of Communities, Law & Governance

- 33. The sub-committee is asked to determine the application for a premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 34. The principles which sub-committee members must apply are set out below.

Principles for making the determination

- 35. The general principle is that applications for premises licence applications must be granted unless relevant representations are received. This is subject to the proviso that the applicant has complied with regulations in advertising and submitting the application.
- 36. Relevant representations are those which
- Are about the likely effect of the granting of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives
- Are made by an interested party or responsible authority
- · Have not been withdrawn.
- Are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority, frivolous or vexatious.
- 37. If relevant representations are received then the sub-committee must have regard to them, in determining whether it is necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives to
- to grant the licence subject to-
- The conditions mentioned in section 18 (2)(a) modified to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and any condition which must under section 19,20 or 21be included in the licence
- to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
- to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
- to reject the application.

Conditions

- 38. The sub-committee's discretion is thus limited. It can only modify the conditions put forward by the applicant that is consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, or refuse the application, if it is necessary to do so. Conditions must be necessary and proportionate for the promotion of one of the four licensing objectives, and not for any other reason. Conditions must also be within the control of the licensee, and should be worded in a way which is clear, certain, consistent and enforceable.
- 39. The four licensing objectives are
- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- Public safety;
- The prevention of nuisance; and
- The protection of children from harm.
- 40. Members should note that each objective is of equal importance. There are no other licensing objectives, and the four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.
- 41. Conditions will not be necessary if they duplicate a statutory position. Conditions relating to night café and take away aspect of the license must relate to the night time operation of the premises and must not be used to impose conditions which could not be imposed on day time operators.
- 42. Members are also referred to the DCMS guidance on conditions, specifically section 7, and Annexes D, E, F and G.

Reasons

43. If the sub-committee determines that it is necessary to modify the conditions, or to refuse the application for a premises licence application, it must give reasons for its decision

Hearing procedures

- 44. Subject to the licensing hearing regulations, the licensing committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that
- The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Cross examination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations
- Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing
- The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to
- Address the authority
- o If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
- o In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
- The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant
- o to the particular application before the committee, and
- o the licensing objectives.
- The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
- In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.
- 45. This matter relates to the determination of an application for a premises licence under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regulation 26(1) (a) requires the sub-committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

Council's multiple roles and the role of the licensing sub-committee

- 46. Sub-committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the council as authority responsible respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health and safety and as the planning authority.
- 47. Members should note that the licensing sub-committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The sub-committee sits in quasi-judicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing of the application. In this case, members should disregard the council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the licensing law, guidance and the council's statement of licensing policy.
- 48. As a quasi-judicial body the licensing sub-committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The sub-committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of

relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The licensing sub-committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.

- 49. The licensing sub-committee is entitled to consider events outside of the premises if they are relevant, i.e. are properly attributable to the premises being open. The proprietors do not have to be personally responsible for the incidents for the same to be relevant. However, if such events are not properly attributable to the premises being open, then the evidence is not relevant and should be excluded. Guidance is that the licensing authority will primarily focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, and working or engaged in normal activity in the area concerned.
- 50. Members will be aware of the council's code of conduct which requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The code applies to members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.
- 51. The sub-committee can only consider matters within the application that have been raised through representations from interested parties and responsible authorities. Interested parties must live in the vicinity of the premises. This will be decided on a case to case basis.
- 52. Under the Human Rights Act 1998. the sub committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The sub-committee has a duty under section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent crime and disorder in the borough.
- 53. Interested parties, responsible authorities and the applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the sub-committee to the Magistrates' Court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against.

Guidance

54. Members are required to have regard to the DCMS guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood, members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.

There is no specific reference to the prevention of public objective in relation to the Saturation Area

I write with reference to an application by Frank Boxer for a grant of a time-limited Premises Licence to permit the sale of alcohol and the provision of recorded music at the above premises between 30th June 2009 and 30th September 2009.

Police would wish to advise that these premises, being labelled as a bar, fall within the scope and area of the Peckham Saturation Zone which basically means that the applicant has to prove how, should he be granted a Licence, his premises would not have an adverse effect on the crime and disorder in the area - a matter obviously for determination by the Licensing Committee.

Further, the applicant has made very little effort in his addressing of the Licensing Objectives. In fact, the only steps shown to promote the 'prevention of crime and disorder' are that 'the premise is to serve light refreshments to exhibition visitors only' and that 'alcohol will not be served to anyone who appears drunk'.

I am aware that entry to the Level 10 area of the Car Park is via a locked metal gate on Level 6. On a recent site visit I was unable to gain egress from the site using the keys held by the Council as the locks had seemingly been replaced by the occupiers. This obviously gives rise to concerns about access should there be any cause for Police - or other similar bodies - attendance.

There is no mention in the applicant's Operating Schedule as to how he intends to deal with monitoring and controlling the numbers of people attending the venue at any one time (with details of any Security Company to be employed if applicable) or details of any necessary evacuation, fire and First Aid procedures to be employed.

21 will be asked for valid proof of age and identity and if none is available the sale of alcohol will be refused

No alcohol bought on site will be permitted to be taken off site. All members of the staff will monitor this. Also signs will be in place to make visitors aware that alcohol is not permitted to be taken off site

The café is designed to host no more than a manageable number of clients (50) at any one time during opening hours. Furthermore, opening hours (11am - 10pm) are designed to host clients during the afternoon and early evening as opposed to late night entertainment. It is the intention to only serve drinks to accompany food consumption and therefore prevent any irresponsible or risky behaviour.

Measures in place to prevent clients to fall from the 10^{th} level of the building: 1.2m concrete barrier in place surrounding the entire premise preventing any falls of clients through carelessness.

Anyone seen attempting to climb the barriers due to irresponsible or risky behaviour will be immediately stopped by a specifically designated member of staff

In the designated area for the consumption of drinks, a structural 'Lip' will be put in place to prevent objects such as glasses, plates or cutlery to fall off the barrier

Any items circulated on the designated premise area will not be allowed to be taken from this area and a designated member of staff will prevent clients from doing so. Furthermore, signs visible from any point in the café will make clients aware of this.

In view of the above Police would wish to make a formal representation to this Notification on the grounds that the applicant would appear, at this stage, to have taken insufficient steps to ensure the safety of the public and prevent the possibility of crime and disorder

A) MEANS OF SAFE ACCESS AND EGRESS FROM THE PREMISES

Existing safe access and egress facilities are sufficient to allow safe operation of Franks Café and Campari Bar which has a maximum capacity of 50.

General access to the 10th Floor of the premises is via an iron gate between level 6 and 7. The gate will be unlocked during opening hours and provides access and egress via ramps for pedestrians, wheelchair users and small vehicles (e.g. First Aid cars). General access to and egress from level 6 is possible either via lifts to/from the Ground level (entrance next to the Cinema on 95 Rye Lane) or via staircases parallel to the lifts.

In case of an emergency there are two staircases directly from level 10 to the ground floor on the eastern and western side of the building. An additional staircase is provided on level 9 directly onto the Ground level. Wheelchair users can use ramps from level 10 to the Ground floor.

B) CROWD MANAGEMENT

Franks Café and Campari Bar operates on a business plan of an average of 30 clients per day and a peak capacity of 45 clients seated plus 5 clients standing at any one time. The reason for operating this café is to give clients the opportunity to enjoy the vista from the 10th level of the building and therefore only serves a small selection of coffee and drinks and light refreshments. It is not the intention to gather crowds above 50 people in the café and from experience from previous projects run by Frank Boxer (Italo Delicatessen, SW8, and Open Park Day – Bonnington Square Festival, SW8) crowds larger than 50 are not to be expected.

Frank Boxer, Personal Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor (Mobile: 07917 198 285) will be on site continuously during opening hours and will be responsible for crowd management.

All access and egress facilities have been approved as sufficient for the operation as a carpark with at least 20 cars per level. This would be sufficient to provide safe access and egress for up to 50 clients of the café at any one time.

Measures planned for the unlikely event of more than 50 clients on the premises:

- New clients will be refused access at the gate between level 6 and 7.

Unfortunately, however, as stated in my earlier E-Mail, the fact that the application is for a bar venue that falls within the area of the Peckham Saturation Zone means that, in this case, Police will *not* be able to fully withdraw their representations.

The reason for this is that, by withdrawing the representations, the opportunity would then be afforded (as per the legislation) to the Licensing Unit to issue the Premises Licence as applied for

Police feel that as the venue is within the aforementioned Saturation Zone this decision should properly be made by the Licensing Committee
