1. INTRODUCTION AND WELCOME

The chair welcomed councillors, members of the public and officers to the meeting.

2. APOLOGIES

Apologies for absence was received from Councillor Norma Gibbes (Chair).

3. DISCLOSURE OF MEMBERS' INTERESTS AND DISPENSATIONS

There were none.

4. ITEMS OF BUSINESS THAT THE CHAIR DEEMS URGENT

There were none.

5. MINUTES FROM THE PREVIOUS MEETING

RESOLVED:

That the minutes of the meeting held on 22 June 2011 be agreed as a correct record of that meeting and signed by the chair.

7. COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENTS AND EVENTS

The chair announced that officers would be available at the break to talk about the following:

Oxjam and Eid event – an all day festival across SE5

Michael Armstrong from Oxjam Camberwell Takeover activity was present at the break to talk about a joint event in Camberwell, working in partnership with Mumtaz Banu to plan a local celebration of Eid-al-Fitr that would take place on 22 October 2011.

Local cemeteries

This item was about a borough wide consultation on cemeteries. The borough's three main cemeteries were now full or near to capacity. Therefore the council would need to develop a long term plan which involved looking at a range of options including acquiring land outside the borough or using the existing plot of the sites. The council's website listed eight options for the future of cemeteries details. The council organised a number of sessions and workshops including a public consultation on which took place on 24 September 2011 at Honor Oak Recreation Grounds.

Democracy Commission

Kevin Dykes, Senior Development Officer from the community engagement team was present to highlight the work of the Democracy Commission Phase 2. This was to look at

the role and function of community councils as a result of the council's decision to make a saving of £344,000 from April 2012 and the aim to identify improvements to community councils. As part of the work of the Commission, officers were engaged in a process to find out what residents think about community councils which had been done through focus groups, questionnaires, workshop sessions and discussions at community councils.

Affordable housing

Alison Squires from Planning Policy talked about the consultation that had taken place on affordable housing.

The guidance document followed on from one adopted in 2008 and subsequent ones like the Aylesbury Action Plan and the Core Strategy. The new document provided guidance on student accommodation, the minimum of 35% affordable housing for developments with 10 or more units, and payments in lieu of on-site affordable accommodation.

Affordable housing meets the needs of households whose incomes were not enough to allow them to buy or rent decent and appropriate housing in the borough.

8. SAFER NEIGHBOURHOOD TEAMS UPDATE

Sergeant Kristian Leighton from Camberwell Green Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) reported on the following:

Camberwell Green ward priorities:

 Robbery, burglary anti-social behaviour and vehicle crime across the wards. Most of the anti social behaviour occurred around Southampton Way.

Brunswick ward priorities:

Robbery – personal property, ASB Strategy (all wards), and ASB by groups of youths.

South Camberwell ward priorities:

• Burglary, theft and/or taking of motor vehicles and Robbery – personal property.

Sgt Leighton announced that Brunswick and South Camberwell Safer Neighbourhood Teams would in future be sharing the same sergeant. This would be mean overseeing and working in both teams, reviewing and dealing with priorities in both wards.

The meeting, at this juncture, discussed some of incidences which occurred during the riots in the borough.

In response to a question about what the Police were doing about hate crime, Sgt Leighton explained that there were a dedicated team of investigators in the borough to

tackle homophobic, race and disability related hate crime. Such crime would be dealt with seriously in the courts.

The chair thanked Sergeant Leighton for his attendance.

9. RECYCLING IN CAMBERWELL - VEOLIA ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES

lan McGeough from Veolia Environmental Services explained that the food waste pilot was a huge success that they would extend the scheme to other properties in the area. Residents would shortly receive information and leaflets about food waste. In addition from October 2011 the recycling team would take tetra packs or juice cartons which previously had not been recyclable. The team would like to come back to the community council next year to discuss the waste facility in the Old Kent Road.

In response to questions Ian explained there was a 50% success rate for food waste and hoped during the fortnightly recycling collection the success rate would increase.

lan explained that rolling out the food waste collection to other properties would not incur any added expense to residents. Residents would be consulted on further changes to the recycling facilities and the collection.

A resident asked a question about the state of Camberwell New Road which in his view looked like a rubbish dump and why Veolia Environmental Services were unable to clean the streets. Ian explained this was not the responsibility of Veolia but should be down to Southwark's cleaning contractors.

The chair thanked Ian McGeough for attending the meeting.

10. LIBRARY REVIEW CONSULTATION

The Library service review was presented by cabinet member, Councillor Veronica Ward and Pam Usher, Library Services Manager.

Councillor Ward mentioned cuts to the services, that 5,000 people responded to the survey and that the public meetings were well attended. It was noted that officers from the library services and Councillor Ward attended community council meetings in each of the eight areas and the feedback from all was positive.

Councillor Ward talked about the new Library in Canada Water and the proposal for a new Library in Camberwell. People applauded at the proposal. Pam Usher said quite a few people completed the survey online with a great deal of positive feedback from young people that use the libraries for their home work and general studies.

Details of the survey are given below and the findings of the survey would be complied in a report for the council's cabinet meeting which took place on 18 October 2011.

After the presentation people asked questions and provided comments on the library review.

In response to questions, Pam explained that the council would consider shared space or accommodation for libraries like sharing a building with a local housing office or other type of community space.

Councillor Govier commented on the council looking at other means of funding libraries and to look at other local boroughs which offer a free library service similar to the one located in Upper Norwood (Westow Hill, London SE19).

If this model were adopted by the council, no libraries would need to close. Councillor Ward stated that all options would be investigated but that time and working progress on this were limited. It is not the council's wish to close any libraries.

In response to a question regarding improved access and disabled toilets in libraries, Councillor Ward mentioned the council were trying to improve access for all Southwark libraries like the Canada Water Library, Blue Anchor Library and the Dulwich Library all have disabled access. The council would continue to engage as widely as possible on these issues especially with regard to disabled toilets, which had been an ongoing issue which has to be addressed further.

It was noted that further information on the library review would be given at a future community council meeting.

The chair thanked Councillor Ward and Pam Usher for their presentations.

11. GROVE VALE FIRST AND SECOND STAGE PARKING CONSULTATION

Paul Gellard from Public Realm presented the report

He outlined that 22 roads had been consulted about whether residents would agree to a controlled parking zone in their area. Full details of this would be provided in mid October. This would include an initial design and questionnaire for people to complete. A report providing feedback on the survey would be brought back to the Camberwell Community Council on 10 January 2012. It was noted that public exhibitions on the scheme would be held in public libraries in the area.

Members advised officers that they should consult those mostly affected by these changes (e.g. the Albrighton Community Centre) and others who would be displaced as a result of the proposed CPZ. In addition the consultation should include those that reside outside the CPZ zones so their views could be noted.

The presenting officer agreed to do this.

RESOLVED:

- 1. That the report outlining the consultation methods and boundaries for the Grove Vale first and second stage parking consultation be noted and approved.
- 2. That a further report be presented at Camberwell community council meeting on 10 January 2012, after which it would be taken as a IDM (individual decision making) report in February 2012 and, if approved, statutory consultation should take place in March 2012.

Q1 The council's Hate Crime strategy; I understand this has not gone through yet why?

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- A1: A follow up response will be given at the next meeting.
- Q2: To Camberwell Green ward councillors: The last administration ensured the road sweepers were out in force keeping our streets clean. This has not happened with the present administration. Please could you look into this?
- A2: The chair said this matter would be looked into and a response given at a future meeting.
- Q3: Why does the open Camberwell agenda contain 14 blank pages that has 'document is restricted'?
- A3: This occurred in error when the agendas were published. Officers stated this would not happen again.
- Q4: Recycling collection: It has been noted that there has been a successful increase with people recycling items based on weekly collections. Does the council propose to make recycling collections on a fortnightly basis?
- A4: Follow up response at a future community council.
- Q5: Why cannot individual requirements be canvassed before bins are allocated?
- A5: Follow up response at a future community council.
- Q6: Now that the Town Hall is closed would members of the community council consider using the 'House of Praise' church as a meeting venue which would be available free of charge?
- A6: This was noted.
- Q7: Walworth Road was recently repaired of all its cracks and potholes. Now whenever it rains the same problem seems to be re-occurring?
- A7: Councillor Martin Seaton, chair of Walworth Community Council who was in attendance responded by confirming there had been an audit on this and contractors have been employed to deal with the problem.

RECOMMENDATION

1. To agree the works to be funded from the proposed schemes in the Camberwell Community Council area as set out in appendix A or to agree alternative schemes subject to officer investigation and feasibility.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2. The declining quality of public highway coupled with extreme weather events has led to further deterioration in recent years with some non principal, unclassified roads being particularly affected. Given the nature of these roads and the lower level of traffic flows it is unlikely that such locations will feature in any major resurfacing programme. Without the necessary capital allocation to attend to such locations, complaints of poor road surfaces can only be dealt with through the reactive maintenance programme.
- 3. The Council's non-principal road investment programme prioritises works on non-principal roads on a borough-wide basis and this investment forms the largest part of the annual investment programme.
- 4. However, as part of the approved Highways capital investment programme for 2012/13 a proportion has been devolved to each community council area. Each Community Council will receive £100,000 for highways surface improvements (carriageway or footway) of their choice. These can be spent on any non-principal road on the area. Any under spends from previous years can also be allocated, up to the available funding outlined in Appendix 1.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

Officers (Engineers) Selections

5. As an aid to the selection process officers have provided a range of required works and indicative costs for their implementation. These exclude works already programmed as part of the borough-wide priority programme. These are shown in Appendix 1. Appendix 1 also includes detail of under spends remaining from previous years.

Community Council Selections

7. This money can be spent on any asset renewal or replacement project selected by the Community Council with the caveats that it cannot be spent on traffic safety or parking schemes, non functional or decorative installations and / or non-essential works. In addition to the resurfacing selections provided it, the money (or part thereof) could be spent on minor patching and pothole repairs should a Community Council wish to do so.

Delivery

8. Once the Community Council has made their selections by the method of their choice they will be designed and delivered as soon as possible in 2012/13. Any under spends or projected overspends will be reported back to Community Council for resolution or reallocation.

Community Impact Statement

9. There are no specific community impact issues arising from the recommendations.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That Camberwell Community Council notes the financial savings and deficits for relevant projects as set out in Appendix 1 and approve the re-allocation of a total of £16,650 to two projects where additional expenditure will be required.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. Cleaner Greener, Safer (CGS) is part of the London Borough of Southwark's capital programme. Between 2003 and 2010 £3.25m has been made available each year for local residents to apply for awards to make their local area a better place to live. The programme attracts hundreds of proposals ranging from a few hundred pounds for bulb planting to brighten up open spaces to tens of thousands of pounds to create community gardens. These projects often introduce new ideas such as outdoor gyms in public spaces, community gardens, public art and energy saving projects which not only make the borough cleaner, greener and safer but greatly contribute to a sustainable public realm by involving residents in the funding process and in the delivery of projects.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

- 3. Appendix 1 highlights four projects which have a total underspend of £38,093.
- 4. It is recommended that project [00372] Masterman House, Elmington Estate is aborted and £4,343 funding is reallocated to projects where additional expenditure is required.
- 5. It is recommended that project [00779] Grosvenor Terrace Grot Spot is aborted and £9,750 funding is reallocated to projects where additional expenditure is required.
- 6. It is recommended that project [104459] Traffic Speed Flash Indicators is aborted and £13,000 funding is reallocated to projects where additional expenditure is required.
- 7. It is recommended that project [104621] Grove Crescent bin collection is aborted and £11,000 funding is reallocated to projects where additional expenditure is required.
- 8. Appendix 1 highlights two projects that require a total of £16,650 funding to proceed.

- 9. It is recommended that £13,650 is reallocated to [103010] The Jessie Duffet Hall Restoration.
- 10. It is recommended that £3,000 is reallocated to [104324] Camberwell Green memorial bench.
- 11. It is recommended that the remaining £21,443 which has not been reallocated to a project is returned to the Community Council, to be reallocated to suitable projects as soon as practicable.

Policy implications

12. N/A

Community impact statement

13. The reallocation of funding will have a positive impact on the community. Wyndham Estate will benefit from an improved community hall with new double glazed windows. This will encourage greater usage of the facility by local residents. Users of Camberwell Green will benefit from a memorial bench to Sidney Bates V.C. which will help to spread knowledge of Camberwell's historic significance.

Resource implications

14. This is the reallocation of existing CGS funding that was originally awarded in 2006-07, 2007-08 and 2010-11. CGS funding is devolved to Community Councils to spend on suitable projects. Management of the reallocation of the funding will be contained within existing budgets.

Consultation

15. All Cleaner Greener Safer projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents and Tenants and Residents Associations where appropriate.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the following local parking amendment, detailed in the appendices to this report, is approved for implementation subject to the outcome of any necessary statutory procedures:
 - Flodden Road Remove existing Permit holders only bay and Install zone hours waiting restrictions
 - Grace's Mews Relocate proposed Permit holders only bay from northeast side to southwest side
- 2. The shortlist for potential future car club locations (Table 1) be approved
- 3. That two of the shortlisted locations be implemented during 2011/12 (recommended: Avondale Rise and Rainbow Street)
- 4. That four of the shortlisted locations be implemented during 2012/13 (recommended: Councillor Street, Daneville Road, Gairloch Road and Grove Lane)
- 5. prior to implementation, each car club location is subject to local (informal) consultation and the completion of any necessary statutory procedures

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 6. This report presents proposals for a number of local parking amendment schemes, which are matters reserved to Community Council for decision under Part 3H of the constitution.
- 7. The origins and reasons for the proposals are discussed in the main body of the report.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

Flodden Road - 1112Q2024

8. The public realm projects (parking design) team was asked by a local resident to remove a section of permit holders only bay and install zone hours waiting restriction (SYL) in front of an existing dropped kerb that allows access to No.15 Flodden Road.

- An officer from the parking design team has investigated the location and notes
 there is an existing dropped kerb. The parking in front of the dropped kerb makes
 access difficult and can lead to access or egress being prevented.
- 10. It is recommended, as shown in Appendix 1, that 6m of permit holders only parking bay is removed and 6m of zone hours waiting restrictions (single yellow line) is introduced.

Grace's Mews - 1032_DD_LG

- 11. The public realm projects (parking design) team was asked by a local resident to relocate the proposed permit holder only bay from the northeast side of Grace's Mews to the southwest side.
- 12. This bay has been proposed as part of the Lucas Gardens (LG) controlled parking zone (CPZ) consultation.
- 13. During the statutory consultation a resident objected to and highlighted an access issue if the permit bay is installed as originally proposed. A senior engineer meet with a resident at the location to discuss this issue and agreed that relocating the bay to the opposite side of the highway would improve access to the gated (private) section of Grace's Mews, without any loss of proposed parking space. This resulted in the statutory objection being withdrawn.
- 14. It is recommended as shown in Appendix 2, that the proposed permit holders only bay is relocated from the northeast side to the southwest side of Grace's Mews

Car Club background

- 15. The council's Transport Plan sets out our policy to ensure that there is a car club vehicle within five to ten minutes walk of each of household by 2014.




Figure 1 - Existing car club locations

- 16. Southwark commenced the introduction of car club bays in March 2010. Since then over 100 on-street car club bays have been installed providing convenient neighborhood cars to over 8,500 car club members in the borough. Figure 1 identifies all car club sites in Southwark and neighboring boroughs.
- 17. There are 9 existing car club bays in this community council area
- 18. Car clubs provide mutual benefits to residents, businesses and to the council.
- 19. To residents and businesses they provide the convenience of being able to use a clean, modern and reliable vehicle for those trips you cannot do by using public transport, cycling or walking. They provide a convenient alternative to using a privately owned vehicle because car club members only pay for what they use and

- therefore do not have to worry about tax, insurance, parking permits, servicing or repairs. There are none of the hassles of owning and maintaining a car.
- 20. To the council they help improve traffic and parking conditions, reduce carbon emissions and improve air quality. Car clubs achieve this through the use of a clean, efficient vehicle fleet and the fact that each car club car replaces around 24 private cars (through members choosing to sell their own private car or deferring purchase of a new one). This, in turn, benefits residents.
- 21. An extensive range of vehicles are available to Southwark members, including small cars, medium cars, premium cars and vans.
- 22. Cars are reserved online or by phone, and can be collected and returned 24/7 using a high-tech smartcard. You can use a car for as little as 30 minutes or as long as six months.
- 23. Each car has its own dedicated bay where you will pick-up and return your vehicle. They are placed in areas where they are easily accessible for residents and businesses.

Car Club expansion

- 24. Southwark has a contractual partnership with Zipcar (after Streetcar and Zipcar recently merged). Zipcar, a multinational car club company, populate the bays with their vehicles and manage the membership and operation of the club. Southwark provide dedicated car club bays on the public highway for each vehicle to park.
- 25. Officers have been working closely with Zipcar to identify potential locations for new car club bays. Table 1 shortlists locations that are suitable (from a traffic and parking perspective) for a new car club bay in this community council area. The locations are shown on a map in Appendix 3.
- 26. Officers have identified more potential locations than we can install during 2011/12 and 12/13 (for market reasons) so the shortlist must be prioritised. Remaining sites on the shortlist will be delivered as growth of the car club further increases.
- 27. The prioritised locations have been identified jointly between officers and Zipcar and are strongly recommended for their potential as a successful site.
- 28. The locations are expected to be successful based upon projected vehicle use, usage of existing nearby bays and demand analysis (Appendix 4). Delivery of these 11/12 and 12/13 bays will also help achieve the stated policy objective.

- 29. A similar short listing process is being conducted with each community council and a full list of bays can be found in Appendix 5.
- 30. Local, informal, consultation will be carried out prior to implementation; this will include information about how car clubs work and their benefits to the neighbourhood.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

- 31. The recommendations contained within this report are consistent with the polices of the council's Transport Plan and the Parking and Enforcement Plan, particularly:
 - Policy 1.1 pursue overall traffic reduction
 - Policy 1.5 ensure that there is a car club bay within five to ten minutes walk of each household in the borough by 2014
 - Policy 2.3 promote and encourage sustainable travel choices in the borough
 - Policy 4.2 create places that people can enjoy
 - Policy 8.1 seek to reduce overall levels of private motor vehicle traffic on our streets

COMMUNITY IMPACT STATEMENT

- 32. The policies within the Transport Plan and Parking and Enforcement Plan are upheld within this report have been subject to an Equality Impact Assessment (EqIA).
- 33. The proposals will support the council's equalities and human rights policies and will promote social inclusion by:

 Providing increased availability of access to a car club, as a shared local resource with economic and environmental benefits to the community.

RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

34. All costs arising from implementing the proposals, as set out in the report, will be fully contained within the existing local parking amendment budget and funding from Transport for London specifically for car club expansion.

CONSULTATION

- 35. No informal consultation has been carried out.
- 36. Should the community council approve the item, statutory consultation will take place as part of the making of the traffic management order. A proposal notice will be erected in proximity to the site location and a press notice will be published in the Southwark News and London Gazette. If there are objections a further report will be re-submitted to the community council for determination.
- 37. The road network and parking manager has been consulted on the proposals and has no objections.
- 38. No consultation or comment has been sought from the borough solicitor & secretary or the chief finance officer.





Car club expansion 2011/12, 12/13 and 13/14
