#### RECOMMENDATION

1. For the community council to agree £29,065 Borough, Bankside and Walworth community council funding.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

- 2. The Community Council Fund provides revenue grants of between £100 and £1,000 for community projects. Applications are considered by the borough's five community councils, which have a total of £122,000, for projects that will benefit the community.
- 3. The Community Council Fund was first launched in 2004. It is intended to encourage small and 'hard to reach' groups to organise activities and events which would benefit their community. It is designed to promote the work of community councils and provide opportunities to engage with some marginalised communities. Over the years the scheme has become very popular amongst local communities with more than 250 applications being received on average in a typical round. The fund is targeted to build and improve community cohesion by creating opportunities for bringing different communities together in local activities.

#### **KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION**

#### **Community impact statement**

- 4. The allocation of the Borough, Bankside and Walworth Community Council Fund will, in the main, affect the people living in the Borough, Bankside and Walworth Community Council area. However, in making the area a better place to live and improving life chances for local people, the Borough, Bankside and Walworth Community Council Fund activities will have an impact on the whole of Southwark.
- 5. The Borough, Bankside and Walworth Community Council Fund aims to increase community participation and activity within the area and provide such groups with the support that they would have not been able to access otherwise.

#### **Resource implications**

6. The budget for the Borough, Bankside and Walworth Community Council Fund is £29,065 to be spent by the 31 March 2013.

#### **Legal/Financial implications**

- 7. The Localism Act 2011 gives councils a general power of competence whereby they have power to do anything that individuals generally may do. This power can be used even if legislation already exists that allows a local authority to do the same thing. However the general power of competence does not enable a local authority to do anything which it was restricted or prevented from doing under that previous legislation.
- 8. The Council can under the Act to provide funding to voluntary organisations but in exercising this power regard must be had to the Council's sustainable community strategy. These grants, from the community fund, are from revenue budgets.
- 9. The power to allocate community council funds by the community council is set out in part 3H of the constitution. The money can be granted to community projects ranging from cultural celebrations to providing equipment for local sports teams.

  - Inspiration
  - Respect

#### Who can apply?

- New and emerging local groups
- Small local organisations
- Any constituted local group
- Any group or individual that has a constituted local organisation to administer the funds on their behalf
- Groups that are active within the community council area

#### Who cannot apply?

- Organisations not established in the UK
- Organisations which do not have any local links
- Political groups or organisations

#### What kind of things will not be funded?

- Loans or interest payments
- Political groups or activities promoting political beliefs
- Activities which have happened or started before the grant decision date
- Activities that finish after 31 March 2013
- Activities that do not benefit people living in the community council area
- Anything which is capital funding, for instance building works or large playground equipment

#### How much can groups apply for?

From £100 up to £1,000. Groups can only submit one application per community council area.

Elected councillors will be responsible for making decisions on all the eligible applications using the priorities outlined below

- Applications that demonstrate at least three of the London 2012 Olympics and Paralympic Games values
- Applications that show a high level of involvement by the local community
- Applications that involve groups working together
- Activities delivered by
  - New and emerging groups/individuals
  - Groups who have not previously received community council funding
  - Groups who are based in the community council area
- Activities taking place within the community council area – unless they involve an outing, or there is lack of space for it within the area
- Where the majority of people benefitting from the activity live within the community council area

Decisions for applications will be made and announced by councillors at the community council meeting which will take place in June or July 2012.

So when planning your activity please make sure that you give enough time for this and that it does not start before at least four weeks after the decision date.

Every applicant will be notified of decisions by a letter no longer than 15 working days after the decision is taken. Successful applicants will be asked to sign and return a condition of funding agreement. It is only once this agreement has been received that we can release the funding.

Please note that groups that are not constituted or individuals who would like to apply with project ideas should get in touch with the community council development officer (contact details below) for advice as soon as possible.

Remember all applications – whether online, email or post must reach us by Friday 25 May 2012, 5pm.

#### RECOMMENDATION

1. That the Borough, Bankside and Walworth Community Council allocate £7,760 of the remainder of Cleaner, Greener, Safer (CGS) revenue fund 2012/13. The projects to be considered for allocation are set out in Appendix 1.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

- 2. A Cleaner, Greener, Safer revenue fund 2012/13 consisting of £210,000 across the borough, with an allocation of £10, 000 per ward, has been introduced as part of the budget strategy agreed at the council assembly meeting on the 29 February 2012.
- 3. The aim of this fund is to give community councils decision making powers over significant amounts of revenue funding that they can allocate to meet locally determined priorities. It is anticipated that the availability of the Revenue Fund will enhance and complement the effectiveness of the Capital Fund.
- 4. On 1 March 2012 the Leader of the Council delegated the executive function to each community council to take the Cleaner, Greener, Safer Revenue funding decisions in their areas.
- 5. Clearer Greener Safer revenue fund was initially considered at Walworth Community Council meeting on Wednesday 18 April 2012. East Walworth and Newington wards allocated all of their funding. Faraday ward partially allocated their funding at the meeting on 18 April 2012. Borough, Bankside and Walworth Community Council will consider allocating the remaining amount of £7,760 to Faraday ward.

#### **KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION**

- 6. The community councils will use the criteria set out below for the allocation of this funding.
  - a. Proposals that make an improvement to an area on the basis of making it cleaner, greener or safer or a combination.

- b. CGS applications from the capital round which were ruled out because they were revenue applications.
- c. The revenue fund could be used to meet the revenue costs associated with a CGS capital award.
- d. A community council may choose to allocate some or all of their revenue resources to their CGS capital allocations.
- e. Subject to the availability of resources, the revenue fund may be used to buy services from the council.
- 7. While the allocation is based on £10,000 per ward a community council can if it chooses decide to aggregate all or part of the funding and spend more than £10,000 per ward.
- 8. Community councils will be free to indicate whether they would like expenditure to be an ongoing commitment over more than one financial year or spending over a fixed timescale for a one-off project. Commitments will be subject to final agreement of the council budget and a decision by each community council on an annual basis.
- 9. As with any executive decision taken by community councils this is subject to the council's existing scrutiny arrangements.

#### Delivery

10. Once the community council has made their selections by the method of their choice they will be designed and delivered as soon as possible in 2012/13. Any under spends or projected overspends will be reported back to community council for resolution or reallocation.

#### **Community Impact Statement**

- 11. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement and community safety as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
- 12. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The Cleaner Greener Safer programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
- 13. In fulfilling the above objectives that community councils have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decisions to the need to:
  - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;

- b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and those who do not share it
- c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.

Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.

Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:

- Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic
- Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who sha relevant protected characteristic
- Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are underrepresented

#### **Resource implications**

14. The total cost of the CGS Revenue Fund is part of the Budget process for 2012/13 agreed by Council Assembly. Any costs incurred in implementing this fund will be met within existing resources.

#### **Policy implications**

15. The CGS Revenue Fund is fully aligned with the Council's policies toward sustainability, regeneration and community engagement.

#### Consultation

16. Decisions will reflect longstanding ward priorities and may be complementary to the decisions made in the CGS Capital fund allocation. In this first year of the scheme consultation will take place at the community council meetings and will therefore be an integral part of the decision making process. In future years consultation will be a key part of developing and identifying projects for funding and considering whether to proceed with indicative expenditure.

#### **Legal Implications**

- 17. The Local Government Act 2000 [as amended] ('the Act') gives the leader the power to delegate any executive function to whoever lawfully can undertake the function. The allocation of the Cleaner, Greener, Safer revenue fund ('CGS) is an executive function.
- 18. Community councils are 'area committees' within the meaning of the Act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the leader.
- 19. In allocating funding under the CGS Revenue Fund community councils must have regard to the council's equality duties set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties have been

considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 12 in the Community Impact Statement.

The Cleaner Greener Safer programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
- 7. In fulfilling the above objectives that community councils have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to

have due regard when taking decisions that need to: Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need to

- a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic
- b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic
- c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic to participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under-represented. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.

#### **Resource implications**

8. The total cost of the CGS Revenue Fund is part of the Budget process for 2012/13 agreed by Council Assembly. Any costs incurred in implementing this fund will be met within existing resources.

#### **Policy implications**

9. The CGS Revenue Fund is fully aligned with the Council's policies toward sustainability, regeneration and community engagement.

#### Consultation

10. Decisions will reflect longstanding ward priorities and may be complementary to the decisions made in the CGS Capital fund allocation. In this first year of the scheme consultation will take place at the Community Council meetings and will therefore be an integral part of the decision making process. In future years consultation will be a key part of developing and identifying projects for funding and considering whether to proceed with indicative expenditure.

#### **Legal Implications**

- 11. The council's rules for the operation of local bank accounts state among other things that the Finance Director's approval is required of arrangements for making deposits and withdrawals from local bank accounts. There must be at least two signatories for all transactions and the conditions applying must be fully documented. Bank mandates must be signed by the authorised officers and a copy passed to the finance director, details of which should be kept on file for audit purposes.
- 12. Once the community council has agreed its nominations these details will be passed to the Finance Director for validation and action.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- 1. That, subject to the completion of the statutory notification procedures, the community council agrees to the installation of disabled persons parking (blue badge) bays in Dawes Street, Webber Street and Brook Drive at the locations set out in Appendices 1-3.
- 2. That, subject to the completion of the statutory notification procedures, the community council agrees to the installation of any time waiting restrictions (double yellow lines) on Joan Street at the location set out in appendix 4.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

- 3. This report presents proposals for a number of local parking amendments, which are reserved to the community council for decision under Part 3H of the constitution.
- 4. The origins and reasons for the proposals are discussed in the main body of the report.

#### **KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION**

#### Origin disabled bays - Dawes Street, Webber Street and Brook Drive

- 5. Three applications have been received by the network operations team for the installation of a disabled persons (blue badge) parking bay. In each case, the applicant met the necessary criteria for an origin, disabled persons parking bay.
- 6. The parking design team has subsequently carried out a site visit to evaluate the road network and carried out consultation with each applicant to ascertain the appropriate location for each disabled bay.
- 7. It is therefore recommended that disabled bays be installed at the following locations, see appendices for detailed design:

- 8. A local resident contacted the public realm projects (parking design) team requesting double yellow lines be installed opposite the C1 permit holder parking bay.
- 9. At present if the permit holders bay is empty and a vehicle stops opposite on the existing single yellow line outside of zone hours (Monday to Friday 8am-6.30pm and Saturday 9.30am-12.30pm) this prevents any permit holders from parking in the bay, as they would otherwise obstruct the street.
- 10. An officer visited the site and noted that the highway is wide enough to support parking on one side only. At the time of visit, there was 1 vehicle parked in the permit bay and another vehicle parked on the single yellow line opposite the permit bay leaving the last space of the permit bay unusable.
- 11. It is recommended that double yellow lines are installed to protect the entire length of permit bay, see appendix 4 for detailed design.

#### **POLICY IMPLICATIONS**

- 12. The recommendations contained within this report are consistent with the polices of the Parking and Enforcement Plan and the Transport Plan 2011, particularly:
  - Policy 1.1 pursue overall traffic reduction
  - Policy 4.2 create places that people can enjoy
  - Policy 8.1 seek to reduce overall levels of private motor vehicle traffic on our streets
- 13. The proposal(s) will support the council's equalities and human rights policies and will promote social inclusion by:
  - Providing improved access for emergency vehicles, refuge vehicles, residents and visitors
  - Improving sight lines for all road users
  - Improving junction and pedestrian safety, especially those with limited mobility or visual impairment; and

#### **COMMUNITY IMPACT STATEMENT**

14. The policies within the Parking and Enforcement Plan are upheld within this report have been subject to an Equality Impact Assessment (EqIA).

#### **RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS**

15. All costs arising from implementing the proposals, as set out in the report, will be fully contained within the existing local parking amendment budget.

#### **CONSULTATION**

16. No informal (public) consultation has been carried out. Where consultation with stakeholders has been completed, this is described within the main body of the report.

17. Should the community council approve the item(s), statutory consultation will take place as part of the making of the traffic management order. A proposal notice will be erected in proximity to the site location and a press notice will be published in the Southwark News and London Gazette. If there are objections a further report will be re-submitted to the community council for determination.







ACTION: Officers to provide a list of criteria which they had used to determine the viability of the proposed devolved highways budget schemes	Schemes would be considered viable if they met the following criteria:  1. Within public highway  2. Exclude works that would normally be mandatory in accordance with LBS highway maintenance policy  3. Excluding requests for traffic calming, traffic management or highway safety schemes  Typical examples of viable works include upgraded finishes to footway maintenance schemes, highway or footway surfacing or patching works, dealing with trees with upgraded finishes, additional potholing works for potholes below defect level for which works would be mandatory.

# Feedback on queries raised at previous Walworth Community Council meetings

Question	Response
Update on the Southwark "After Dark" badges / TfL	TfL provide a number of disabled parking concessions on the TLRN (Transport for London Road Network), including 'at any time' bays, primarily on the residential parts of the red route. These are intended to allow Blue Badge holders to park outside or close to their homes. Currently, the rules that govern when a Blue Badge holder can use the red route bays require that the badge is displayed.
	However, TfL have recently been made aware that a number of London boroughs issue "alternative" badges which can be used by Blue Badge holders in situations where there are concerns about theft of the Blue Badge (if for example a vehicle is parked overnight) but, these are not currently valid on the TLRN.
	The issue was also raised by the Assembly Member for Enfield and Haringey, Joanne McCartney, at the last Questions to the Mayor session on 14 March. <a href="http://mqt.london.gov.uk/mqt/public/question.do?id=40517">http://mqt.london.gov.uk/mqt/public/question.do?id=40517</a> .
	In light of this, TfL undertook to speak to the boroughs in an effort to understand how their schemes work, and whether these badges could be used on the red route. TfL's Stakeholders team is managing this, but are still in the very early stages of collating the information, including any terms of use. It is also important that, if TfL could recognise the various badges, there is a way they can clearly identify that the vehicle in question is being used by a Blue Badge holder.  It is early days but TfL are looking at the issue of alternative badges with a view to how TfL might accommodate their use.
"The signs on the hoardings enclosing the Heygate Estate state clearly: 'THIS REGENERATION SITE HAS 24 HOUR LIVE SECURITY PATROLS'. The police approached residents of Garland Court on the evening of 31 December 2011, looking for witnesses to an incident by the estate. Has the Community Council been informed about this event?"	The community council were not formally informed about these incidents, but ward councillors became aware of them as part of their duties.

"Are the Community Council also aware of the case of serious assault that occurred on Wansey Street at around 11.00pm on 18 August 2011?"	The community council were not formally informed about these incidents, but ward councillors became aware of them as part of their duties.
"Why are there one-way systems operating on parts of East Street and King and Queen Street, when they are massively ignored? Half the cars parked in these zones are facing the wrong direction."	Awaiting response from officers.
<b>ACTION:</b> Officers to produce a list of establishments which allow people to use their toilets, even if they are not customers.	Awaiting response from officers.
<b>Update on</b> Cleaner, Greener, Safer budget.	In 2012-13, there was £257,346 available to fund new CGS schemes in Walworth. Successful schemes were announced at the Walworth Community Council meeting on 10 March 2012, and £4,255 remains unallocated. This sum is available to allocate to works in East Walworth ward.
	A question was raised whether the £4,255 could be awarded to the proposal "Robert Browning Out and Away Scheme" - "A way of educating the children about the outdoor life and the qualities they can benefit from the outdoor activities away from the city. The location would be - Residential/countryside retreat and allotments"
	Unfortunately this idea was ineligible for funding from the Cleaner Greener Safer capital programme as it would not create permanent physical improvements in the environment.
	Past CGS-funded improvements that have been carried out to benefit children include works to playgrounds e.g. building raised beds so the children can grow vegetables, more play equipment in the playground, "outdoor" classrooms etc.
	Applicants to the 2012-13 CGS programme will be contacted later this year when the 2013-14 programme is open for applications for new projects to begin in April 2013.
The small park on the Morecambe Street is not being cleaned. Why is it not being managed by Quadrant?	This area is cleaned by Southwark Cleaning not Quadrant, and is scheduled to be litter picked daily and the grass cut on a fortnightly basis. Checks are being made to ensure this is being carried out.
The pavement in East Street is constantly being redone. Does the council's contract with the company not include an agreement to fix the pavement	Officers are aware of issues with the condition of the footway in East Street. Officers are currently working on a longer term solution to this problem and will consult with local councillors on this in the near future.
