The chair welcomed residents, councillors and officers to the meeting.

2. APOLOGIES

There were apologies for absence from Councillors David Hubber, Mark Gettleson, Eliza Mann and Lisa Rajan; and for lateness from Councillors Anood Al-Samerai, Paul Kyriacou and Nick Stanton.

3. ITEMS OF BUSINESS THAT THE CHAIR DEEMS URGENT

The chair announced that a late report - Community Council Fund Reallocation, had been

accepted and circulated as part of Supplemental Agenda No. 1.

Community Council Fund 2014/15

This year's community council fund was now accepting applications. Community groups could bid for amounts between £100 and £1,000 for fun days, festivals, outings and activities. The closing date was 13 December 2013.

Millwall for All – The Leadership Project

Marc Elliott, Millwall for All, explained that the leadership project worked with 16 to 24-year-olds not in education, training or employment. The range of activities available included: leadership skills and organisational training, work placements and curriculum vitae building. The project, which had been running for about three years, was about getting young people on the right path. During that time about 150 people had taken part, and many had returned to college or secured jobs. Three young people from the project described how the courses had enhanced their lives with new opportunities. The project was open to men and women and provided general sports training. Transition Network for Bermondsey and Rotherhithe update

The chair read out a statement from the group who had presented at the previous community council meeting in October. The network had met twice and their first goal was to create a map of all the eco-projects taking place in the area. It would cover a wide range of projects, including wildlife conservation, community food banks and recycling. The aim was to build better connections between groups. There would also be some outreach events in the spring. Contact: transition.b.and.r@gmail.com

Bede in the Blue Youth Project

Fokrul Meah, Bede House Association Youth Project, explained that he had helped run youth projects on the Blue Estate since April 2013. The work had started following

complaints from shopkeepers, councillors and residents about anti-social behaviour in the area.

Sinitta, Bede House Association Youth Project, said they had spoken with young people gathering in the area to find out about them and build trust and understanding. Some of the young people hanging around the Blue lived locally, although others travelled in from Dulwich or the Elephant & Castle. The young people taking part in anti-social behaviour activities, often chose this lifestyle, because they did not think they had better options available.

Fokrul added that it was important for the young people to have a positive steer away from the dangerous path in their lives. The project workers had emphasised the need for respect and had helped several of them attend job interviews and secure part-time jobs.

The chair thanked Fokrul and Sinitta for their presentation.

8. POLICE AND COMMUNITY SAFETY UPDATE

Inspector Bernard Hayton, Grange Safer Neighbourhoods Team, explained that under the new police model, 17 extra officers had been brought into the area. The extra officers had additional responsibilities including executing drugs warrants.

Recent police activities included:

- An operation in September 2013 to target robberies around Bermondsey tube station which led to 10 arrests
- On Fridays and Saturdays a police minibus regularly travelled to local crime hotspots where patrols took place
- Plain-clothes officers on unmarked bicycles patrolled certain areas
- A drugs premises had been closed down which had led to the seizure of Class-A drugs and £3,000 of drug money
- A meth drug-lab had been closed down and drugs valued at £20,000 had been removed.

There had been a large amount of non-residential burglaries among small businesses in the Riverside area. Officers were currently following up on a number of suspects.

In response to questions, Inspector Hayton made the following points:

- Motor vehicle crime fluctuated depending on the arrest or release of serial offenders. Residents were encouraged to add a second lock to deter criminals
- Insp. Hayton favoured arresting drug dealers over trying to reach out to them and change their habits, but did recognise there were merits in the outreach work undertaken by the Bede House Association.

9. CRIME AND SAFETY: BUILDING A STRONGER COMMUNITY

Under the theme of the community council meeting, a panel of community members and officers were assembled to take questions. The members of the panel were:

In response to questions the panel made the following points:

- It was important to focus on people with behavioural problems as individuals rather than labelling them as being members of a particular gang. Over many years that had proved to be a more effective approach
- Alcohol often was at the centre of behavioural problems and violence but Southwark's treatment centre at the Elephant Castle had proved effective in carrying out court orders related to alcohol problems
- School exclusions were a big problem. If a child had special educational needs for example they were nine times more likely to be excluded. There were often complex factors that led to the sort of behaviour behind school exclusions
- If someone was concerned about a neighbour or elderly person in the community, over the holidays, there was a contact line they should call – 020 7525 3324. This was a dedicated phone number about social care needs for the vulnerable
- Restorative justice was one method of bringing about closure by bringing together the victim and the offender. The offender would then apologise to the victim for their behaviour. It was often a lengthy process but could be quite powerful and effective when the perpetrator fully appreciated the consequences of their actions
- Disproportional stop and search was still an issue with stop and search actions by the police. This was because the police were responding to calls from witnesses about suspects relating to a particular crime. There were about 1,900 stop and searches per month in Southwark. The public were broadly in favour of stop and search, as it tended to put fear in the mind of criminals in possession of something illegal
- There would be a stop and search workshop for young people with the Bubble Theatre at Millwall F.C. on 1 February 2014. There would be some football sessions on the same day and also a chance to see the Ben Kinsella knife crime exhibition.

RECOMMENDATION

1. To approve the allocation of funds for the 2014-15 Cleaner Greener Safer (CGS) capital programme in the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe Community Council area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The Council's CGS capital programme has been running since 2003.
3. In the first eleven years of the CGS programme, £28,513,000 has been allocated to community councils leading to 1,758 projects being approved.
4. In the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe community council area, £6,907,150 has been allocated to 360 projects, 326 of which have been completed to date.
5. For 2014/15, community councils have also been able to allocate CGS revenue and applications were invited for both capital and revenue ideas. The allocation of revenue is dealt with by a separate report on this meeting's agenda.
6. Examples of the types of projects that have been funded include:
 - Parks, community gardens, landscaping, tree planting and wildlife areas
 - Children's playgrounds, youth facilities, ball courts and cycle tracks
 - Lighting, security measures, pavements, streets, and tackling 'grot spots'
 - Grants to local groups to self-deliver projects.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

7. There is £492,381 available for the 2014/15 CGS capital programme for new projects in the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe community council area.
8. Eligible proposals must bring about a permanent improvement and make an area cleaner, greener or safer.
9. Proposals with revenue costs, including salaries or computer equipment, feasibility studies, costs for events, festivals, workshops or other one-off events are not eligible for capital funding. CCTV proposals, internal improvements to housing property, works on schools where there is no access to the general public are also not eligible. Works on private property are not eligible unless there is a long-term guarantee of public access or a demonstrable public benefit.

10. The application form invited expressions of interest for the applicants to deliver projects themselves. A due diligence exercise to ensure that this is both practical and realistic has been undertaken as part of the feasibility process. In such cases, the council would give the funding allocation to the applicant in the form of a capital grant, with appropriate conditions attached.

Policy implications

11. The Cleaner Green Safer programme is fully aligned with the council's policies around sustainability, regeneration and community engagement.

Community impact statement

12. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement and community safety as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
13. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The Cleaner Greener Safer programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
14. In fulfilling the above objectives that community councils have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decision to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristics and those who do not share it;
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
15. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
16. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
 - b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic;
 - c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under-represented.

17. All ideas for CGS projects come directly from the local community via a simple project nomination form available in electronic and paper format.

Resource implications

18. The funding for the 2014/15 CGS capital programme was approved by the cabinet and is part of the council's overall capital programme as detailed in the Launch of Cleaner Greener Safer capital programme 2014/15 report dated September 2013.
19. All professional fees related to the project are also treated as the capital costs of the project. Where projects are awarded as a grant to organisations, the community council award letter will not include the professional fees which will be charged direct to project costs.
20. CGS projects must be completed within two years of award of funding. Projects that are unlikely to be completed within two years will be reported to community council and available budgets may be reallocated to other projects. Revenue costs not covered by maintenance or the contractual liability period will fall upon the asset owner. The business unit will be notified of the likely costs before the schemes proceeds, in order to secure permission to implement the scheme.
21. After the defects and liability period, or three year maintenance period in the case of planting works, all future maintenance is assumed by the asset owner, for example Housing, Parks, Highways, or in some cases external asset owners. Therefore, there are no revenue implications to the Public Realm projects business unit as a result of approving the proposed allocation.
22. The total expenditure and sources of funding for the scheme will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall Capital Programme.

Consultation

23. All Cleaner Greener Safer projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents, tenants and residents associations and local community groups where appropriate.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of legal services

24. The Local Government Act 2000 [as amended] ('the Act') gives the Leader the power to delegate any executive function to whoever lawfully can undertake the function. The allocation of the Cleaner, Greener, Safer capital fund ('CGS') is an executive function.
25. Community councils are 'area committees' within the meaning of the act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the Leader.
26. This report is recommending that the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe Community Council approve the allocation of funds to the individual projects specified at Appendix 1. The power for this function is derived from Part 3H paragraph 11 of the Constitution which states that Community Councils have the power of

“Approval of the allocation of funds to cleaner, greener, safer capital and revenue schemes of a local nature, using the resources and criteria identified by the cabinet”.

27. The Cabinet Member for Transport Environment and Recycling approved the funding for the 2014/2015 programme in October 2013 by exercising his powers under Part 3D paragraph 2 of the constitution; and the community council approval being sought here is therefore the next constitutional step in the process.
28. Community council members also have powers under paragraph 12 of Part 3H of the Constitution to oversee and take responsibility for the development and implementation of the local schemes.
29. In allocating funding under the CGS community councils must have regard to the council’s equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties need to be considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 14 to 17 in the Community Impact Statement.

Strategic director of finance and corporate resources

30. This report recommends approval of the allocation of funds for the 2014/15 Cleaner Greener Safer programme in the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe Community Council area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.
31. The strategic director of finance and corporate resources notes the resource implications contained within the report, and confirms that the capital funding for the CGS programme has been approved as part of the overall council capital programme.
32. Officer time and any other costs connected with this recommendation will be contained within existing budgeted revenue resources.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe community council allocates the £110,000 of the Cleaner, Greener, Safer (CGS) Revenue Fund 2014-15. In addition, there is an unallocated £1,300 from 2013-14 round for Grange ward to be considered. The projects to be considered for allocation are set out in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. A CGS revenue fund consisting of £210,000 across the borough, with an allocation of £10,000 per ward, was introduced as part of the budget strategy agreed at the council assembly meeting on the 29 February 2012. At the council assembly meeting which took place on the 27 February 2013, it was agreed to allocate an additional £10,000 per ward making a total of £420,000 revenue fund available across the borough allocated at £20,000 per ward.
3. The aim of this fund is to give community councils decision making powers over significant amounts of revenue funding that they can allocate to meet locally determined priorities. It is anticipated that the availability of the revenue fund will enhance and complement the effectiveness of the capital fund.
4. On 1 March 2012 the leader of the council delegated the executive function to each community council to take the CGS revenue funding decisions in their areas.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

5. The community councils will use the criteria set out below for the allocation of this funding.
 - a. Proposals that make an improvement to an area on the basis of making it cleaner, greener or safer or a combination.
 - b. CGS applications from the capital round which were ruled out because they were revenue applications.
 - c. The revenue fund could be used to meet the revenue costs associated with a CGS capital award.
 - d. A community council may choose to allocate some or all of their revenue resources to their CGS capital allocations.

- e. Subject to the availability of resources, the revenue fund may be used to buy services from the council.
6. While the allocation is based on £20,000 per ward, a community council can, if it chooses, decide to aggregate all or part of the funding and spend more than £20,000 per ward.
 7. Community councils will be free to indicate whether they would like expenditure to be an ongoing commitment over more than one financial year or spending over a fixed timescale for a one-off project. Commitments will be subject to final agreement of the council budget and a decision by each community council on an annual basis.
 8. As with any executive decision taken by community councils this is subject to the council's existing scrutiny arrangements.

Delivery

9. Once the community council has made their selections by the method of their choice they will be designed and delivered as soon as possible in 2014/15. Any under spends or projected overspends will be reported back to community council for resolution or reallocation.

Community impact statement

10. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement and community safety as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
11. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The CGS programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
12. In fulfilling the above objectives that community councils have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decisions to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and those who do not share it;
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
13. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
14. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in Section 149 as having due regard to the need of:

- a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
- b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic;
- c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under- represented.

Resource implications

15. The total cost of the CGS revenue fund is part of the budget process for 2014/15 agreed by council assembly. Any costs incurred in implementing this fund will be met within existing resources.

Policy implications

16. The CGS revenue fund is fully aligned with the council's policies toward sustainability, regeneration and community engagement.

Consultation

17. Decisions will reflect longstanding ward priorities and may be complementary to the decisions made in the CGS capital fund allocation. In this first year of the scheme consultation took place at the community council meetings and is therefore now an integral part of the decision making process.

Legal Implications

18. The Local Government Act 2000 [as amended] ('the act') gives the leader the power to delegate any executive function to whoever lawfully can undertake the function. The allocation of the CGS is an executive function.
19. Community councils are 'area committees' within the meaning of the act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the leader.
20. In allocating funding under the CGS community councils must have regard to the council's equality duties set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties have been considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 12, 13 and 14 in the community impact statement.

RECOMMENDATION

1. For the community council to approve the allocation of £31,975 community council funding from applications listed in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The community council fund provides revenue grants of between £100 and £1,000 for community projects. Applications are considered by the borough's five community councils, which have a total of £122,000, for projects that will benefit the community.
3. The community council fund was first launched in 2004. It is intended to encourage small and 'hard to reach' groups to organise activities and events which would benefit their community. It is designed to promote the work of community councils and provide opportunities to engage with some marginalised communities. The fund is targeted to build and improve community cohesion by creating opportunities for bringing different communities together in local activities.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

Community impact statement

4. The allocation of the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe community council fund will, in the main, affect the people living in the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe community council area. However, in making the area a better place to live and improving life chances for local people, the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe community council fund activities will have an impact on the whole of Southwark.
5. The Bermondsey and Rotherhithe community council fund aims to increase community participation and activity within the area and provide such groups with the support that they would have not been able to access otherwise (Appendix 2).
6. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement and community safety as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.

7. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The community council fund is an important tool in achieving community participation.
8. In fulfilling the above objectives that community councils have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decisions to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and those who do not share it;
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
9. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation. In this process there are no issues that contravene the Equality Act 2010.
10. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic
 - Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic
 - Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under-represented.

Due consideration was given to equalities impact assessment during the design of this awards process and no adverse impact was evident.

Resource implications

11. The total budget for the Bermondsey and Rotherhithe community council fund is £31,975 to be spent by 31 March 2015.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of legal services

12. The Localism Act 2011 gives councils a general power of competence whereby they have power to do anything that individuals generally may do. This power can be used even if legislation already exists that allows a local authority to do the same thing. However the general power of competence does not enable a local authority to do anything which it was restricted or prevented from doing under that previous legislation.

13. This general power of competence would include the power to:
- a. incur expenditure;
 - b. give financial assistance to any person;
 - c. enter into arrangements or agreements with any person;
 - d. co-operate with, or facilitate or co-ordinate the activities of any person;
 - e. exercise on behalf of any person any functions of that person; and
 - f. provide staff, goods, services or accommodation to any person.
14. The provision of funding under the CCF falls within the scope of the kind of activities the council can undertake under the general power of competence as this includes a power to give financial assistance to any person.
15. The provision of funding under the CCF falls within the scope of the kind of activities the council can undertake under the general power of competence as this includes a power to give financial assistance to any person.
16. In allocating funding under the CCF community councils must have regard to the council's equality duties set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties have been considered in the body of the report at paragraphs [8, 9, 10].

- Workshops or activities involving members of the local community
- Publicity or merchandise to advertise an event you are doing

Who can apply?

- New and emerging local groups
- Small local organisations
- Any constituted local group
- Any group or individual that has a constituted local organisation to administer the funds on their behalf
- Groups that are based within the community council area

Who cannot apply?

- Organisations not established in the UK
- Organisations which do not have any local links
- Political groups or organisations

What kind of things will not be funded?

- Loans or interest payments
- Political groups or activities promoting political beliefs
- Activities which have happened or started before the grant decision date
- Activities that finish after 31 March 2014

- Activities that do not benefit people living in the community council area
- Anything which is capital funding, for instance building works or large playground equipment

How much can groups apply for?

- From £100 up to £1,000. Groups can only submit one application per community council area. In exceptional circumstances awards in excess of £1,000 may be considered.

 - Melior Place – install double yellow lines across dropped kerb and entrance to 17 Snowfields
 - Devonshire Grove – reposition bollards and amend associated prohibition of vehicular traffic.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. Part 3H of the Southwark Constitution delegates decision making for non-strategic traffic management matters to the Community Council.
3. Paragraph 16 of Part 3H of the Southwark Constitution sets out that the Community Council will take decisions on the following local non-strategic matters:
 - the introduction of single traffic signs
 - the introduction of short lengths of waiting and loading restrictions
 - the introduction of road markings
 - the setting of consultation boundaries for consultation on traffic schemes
 - the introduction of destination disabled parking bays
 - statutory objections to origin disabled parking bays.

4. This report gives recommendations for six local traffic and parking amendments, involving traffic signs, waiting restrictions and road markings.
5. The origins and reasons for the recommendations are discussed within the key issues section of this report.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

Hawkstone Road

6. The parking design team was contacted by the Practice Secretary of Park Medical Centre, 57 Hawkstone Rd. The surgery has a patient participation group that meets to discuss issues affecting patients registered with the surgery.
7. The group identified a need for disabled parking in the vicinity of the surgery.
8. An officer met with the group, explained where blue badge holders could currently park, summarised as:
 - 12 x pay and display bays (free of charge) adjacent to Southwark Park
 - 5 x 30 minute free parking bay outside the surgery.
9. The group explained that, whilst helpful for picking up and setting down, the existing 30 minute free parking does not allow sufficient time for patients to park, wait for their appointment and complete their consultation with the doctor.
10. The group requested a destination disabled parking bay outside the surgery for patients with disabilities, particularly those with disabled children. They requested that the destination disabled bay allow blue badge holders to park for 3 hours.
11. The officer explained that the council's standard is to provide destination bays with a 4 hour maximum stay. This is to encourage blue holders to use the bay instead of parking on yellow lines (which allow up to 3 hours with a blue badge). This is also good merit in the council being consistent in this approach and it is one that is used by many other boroughs.
12. It is therefore recommended that, as detailed in Appendix 1, that a 4 hour destination disabled bay is installed outside the Park Medical Centre to provide a disabled parking facility to assist patients with disabilities when visiting the surgery.

Rollins Road

13. The council was contacted by SGBD Property who are developing a new yard for Jewson's Building Merchants in Rollins Road. SGBD request that new double yellow lines are installed at the entrance to the yard to improve access for large vehicles.
14. Southwark council is the highway authority in Rollins Street from its junction with Ilderton Road to the western edge of the railway bridge. This street is mainly commercial with the new Jewson's yard on the north side and Leathams Food Factory on the south side.

15. Large vehicles will be delivering to the yard and they do not want to load/unload on the highway as there is a provision within the yard.
16. Officers contacted Leathams and asked if they have had access issues into their factory. They stated support for new double yellow lines on either side of the entrance to their factory yard as, at times, vehicles parked too close to the entrance and large vehicles have had their access blocked.
17. It is therefore recommended that, as detailed in Appendix 2, that double yellow lines are installed either side Jewson's entrance and Leathams entrance to provide access.

Canada Street

18. A local resident contacted the parking design team regarding problems gaining access from Wolf Crescent on to Canada Street. They inform us that the existing double yellow lines on the north side of the junction of Canada Street and Wolf Crescent were not long enough and the junction is dangerous with cars parked on it.
19. An officer visited this location and found vehicles parked on the junction adjacent to the double yellow lines causing an obstruction to the sight lines.
20. The resident believes the vehicles belong to residents and commuters and are parking all day.
21. Ensuring adequate visibility between road users is important to safety. Visibility should generally be sufficient to allow road users to see potential conflicts or dangers in advance of the distance in which they will be able to break and come to a stop.
22. Vehicles that are parked at a junction have the effect of substantially reducing visibility between road users and reducing stopping sight distance (SSD) which is the viewable distance required for a driver to see so that they can make a complete stop before colliding with something in the street, eg pedestrian, cyclist or a stopped vehicle.
23. It is noted that almost two thirds of cyclists killed or seriously injured in 2012 were involved in collisions at, or near, a road junction, with T junctions being the most commonly involved.
24. Children and those in wheelchairs (whose eyelevel is below the height of a parked car) are disproportionately affected by vehicles parked too close to a junction. The Guide Dogs for the Blind Association (Guide Dogs) strongly recommend that yellow lines are implemented at junctions as these areas are potentially more dangerous.
25. At this junction dropped kerbs have been installed to assist pedestrians wanting to cross the road. Before stepping off the kerb it is important that pedestrians have a clear line of sight of any oncoming vehicles.
26. The Highway Code makes clear that motorists must not park within 10 metres of a junction, unless in a designated bay. However the council has no power to enforce this without the introduction of a traffic order and subsequent

implementation of waiting restrictions (yellow lines).

27. The proposal to extend the yellow lines at this junction is proposed in accordance with the council's adopted [Southwark Streetscape Design Manual \(SSDM\)](#) standard on Highway Visibility ([DS114 - Highway Visibility](#)).
28. It is therefore recommended that as detailed in Appendix 3 that double yellow lines are extended by 7.5 metres on the north side the junction of Wolf Crescent and Canada Street to improve sight lines and junction safety for all road users.

Redriff Road

29. A member of the public contacted the council requesting that the existing single yellow lines on Redriff Road be converted to double yellow lines as there is obstructive parking at night and over the weekend.
30. This section of Redriff Road has two lanes in both directions and carries a large volume of traffic visiting Surrey Quays shopping centre. The single yellow line operates Monday to Saturday 8am-6.30pm and vehicles are parking on both sides when the yellow lines are not operational reducing the road the single carriageway in both directions.
31. An officer visited this site on 9 December 2013. This was done during the day to confirm the existing restrictions and street furniture. The existing single yellow lines were clear at the time of the visit and the traffic was following freely. However officers have observed the reported weekend parking which reduces the capacity of the road network and disruption to traffic, particularly buses.
32. It is recommended that double yellow lines are installed between Lower Road and Worgan Street and Deal Porter Way as detailed on Appendix 4 to prevent obstructive parking and improve traffic flow.

Melior Place

33. Councillor Al-Samerai contacted the council to report concerns raised by a constituent regarding obstructed access to the car park entrance to the flats at 17 Snowfields.
34. Melior Place is a small cul-de-sac off Snowfields which connects (pedestrians only) to Melior Street. It is close to Guys Hospital and London Bridge underground and railway stations.
35. The resident states that the access to the carpark is regularly obstructed when the single yellow line is not in operation. They have sent photographic evidence to show the ongoing obstruction, see Appendix 5.
36. An officer visited this location and it was noted that two vehicles (both blue disabled badge holders) were parked on the single yellow lines adjacent to the permit holders (F) parking bay.
37. Whilst blue badge holders are permitted to park on any yellow line (single or double) for up to 3 hours, our experience shows that they will generally avoid double yellow lines recognizing that they are in place to deter dangerous or obstructive parking, rather than single yellow lines that imply that parking is safe

but is undesirable at certain (usually peak) times.

38. If obstructive parking continues after the installation of double yellow lines then the council will consider introducing a loading ban but this is usually not necessary.
39. It is recommended that double yellow lines are installed on Melior Place as detailed on Appendix 6 to prevent obstructive parking and improve access.

Devonshire Grove

40. An application has been made by the council's Waste and Transport Manager, to move the bollards as shown in Appendix 7 to allow vehicular access to and from the land the Council owns on Devonshire Grove via the Devon Street one way system.
41. The bollards are proposed to be repositioned but retained so as to continue preventing through access from Old Kent Road onto Devon Street. By relocating the bollards southward the Council's fleet will be able to use Devon Street to access the land on Devonshire Grove. This will mean that they can access the site to and from the north and south bound lanes on the Old Kent Road where the current access and egress from Devonshire Grove is one direction only.
42. It is recommended that bollards and associated prohibition of vehicular traffic are amended as detailed in Appendix 7.

Policy implications

43. The recommendations contained within this report are consistent with the policies of the Transport Plan 2011, particularly:
 - Policy 1.1 – pursue overall traffic reduction
 - Policy 4.2 – create places that people can enjoy.
 - Policy 8.1 – seek to reduce overall levels of private motor vehicle traffic on our streets

Community impact statement

44. The policies within the Transport Plan are upheld within this report have been subject to an Equality Impact Assessment.
45. The recommendations are area based and therefore will have greatest affect upon those people living, working or traveling in the vicinity of the areas where the proposals are made.
46. The introduction of yellow lines at junctions gives benefit to all road users through the improvement of inter-visibility and therefore road safety.
47. There is a risk that new restrictions may cause parking to be displaced and, indirectly, have an adverse impact upon road users and neighboring properties at that location. However this cannot be entirely preempted until the recommendations have been implemented and observed.
48. With the exception of those benefits and risks identified above, the

recommendations are not considered to have a disproportionate affect on any other community or group.

49. The recommendations support the council's equalities and human rights policies and promote social inclusion by:
- Providing improved access for key services such as emergency and refuge vehicles
 - Improving road safety, in particular for vulnerable road users, on the public highway.

Resource implications

50. All costs arising from implementing the recommendations will be fully contained within the existing public realm budgets.

Legal implications

51. Traffic Management Orders would be made under powers contained within the Road Traffic Regulation Act (RTRA) 1984.
52. Should the recommendations be approved the council will give notice of its intention to make a traffic order in accordance with the Local Authorities Traffic Order (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996.
53. These regulations also require the Council to consider any representations received as a result of publishing the draft order for a period of 21 days following publication of the draft order.
54. Should any objections be received they must be properly considered in the light of administrative law principles, Human Rights law and the relevant statutory powers.
55. By virtue of section 122, the Council must exercise its powers under the RTRA 1984 so as to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular and other traffic including pedestrians, and the provision of suitable and adequate parking facilities on and off the highway.
56. These powers must be exercised so far as practicable having regard to the following matters:
- a) the desirability of securing and maintaining reasonable access to premises
 - b) the effect on the amenities of any locality affected including the regulation and restriction of heavy commercial traffic so as to preserve or improve amenity
 - c) the national air quality strategy
 - d) facilitating the passage of public service vehicles and securing the safety and convenience of their passengers
 - e) any other matters appearing to the Council to be relevant.

Consultation

57. No informal (public) consultation has been carried out.

58. Where consultation with stakeholders has been completed, this is described within the key issues section of the report.
59. Should the community council approve the items, statutory consultation will take place as part of the making of the traffic management order. The process for statutory consultation is defined by national regulations.
60. The council will place a proposal notice in proximity to the site location and also publish the notice in the Southwark News and the London Gazette.
61. The notice and any associated documents and plans will also be made available for inspection on the council's website or by appointment at its Tooley Street office.
62. Any person wishing to comment upon or object to the proposed order will have 21 days in which do so.
63. Should an objection be made that officers are unable to informally resolve, this objection will be reported to the community council for determination, in accordance with the southwark constitution.
