1. INTRODUCTION AND WELCOME

The chair introduced himself, and welcomed councillors, members of the public and officers to the meeting.

2. APOLOGIES

There were apologies for absence from Councillors Gavin Edwards, Sunil Chopra and

Fiona Colley. An apology for lateness was received from Councillor Michael Situ.

3. DISCLOSURE OF MEMBERS' INTERESTS AND DISPENSATIONS

None were disclosed.

4. ITEMS OF BUSINESS THAT THE CHAIR DEEMS URGENT

There were no urgent items.

5. MINUTES FROM THE PREVIOUS MEETING

RESOLVED:

That the minutes of the meeting held on the 10 November 2015 be agreed as an accurate record of the meeting and signed by the chair.

6. DEPUTATION REQUEST

The community council received a deputation request from local residents of the Lane ward.

The deputation referred to the council's proposal to remove the Bellenden gyratory system as part of the Bellenden, Lyndhurst Way, Highshore Road walking and cycling scheme.

The main points that were addressed at the meeting were:

- That the removal of the gyratory system would have adverse effects on the health both physically and mentally.
- The proposal would have a drastic impact on traffic volumes, air/noise pollution and congestion which would spread to surrounding areas.

The deputation responded to questions from councillors and a decision in light of the deputation has been noted under item 11, Bellenden Road, Holly Grove, Lyndhurst way – walking and cycling improvements.

7. COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENTS AND PRESENTATIONS

Introducing CANs at community council meetings

Ian Redding from CANs spoke about the community action network and the role it plays to improve resident's representation so they have a voice about the decisions that are made in regard to local services. The network assists community groups to have a better understanding, improved services and easy access to information.

Volunteering

The chair announced that if anyone was interested in volunteering or help officers with the live streaming of community council meetings. They were encouraged to contact Gill Kelly, community councils development officer.

Christmas lights certificates

The chair thanked Cynthia and Maureen and the choir and soloists of Goldsmiths Primary School for their excellent contribution to the Christmas tree lighting event in 2015.

New Southwark Plan

Tom Buttrick, planning policy officer, spoke about the council reviewing the Southwark plan and core strategy in order to prepare a new plan - referred to as the new Southwark Plan. The new plan would set out a regeneration strategy from 2017 to 2033. It would help determine planning applications.

The new plan would consist of a set of policies on new homes, and protecting the borough's existing schools and community facilities. In addition, protecting local businesses and increasing job opportunities, providing more green spaces and improving walking and cycling routes in the borough.

Regeneration in the Peckham and Nunhead area

Local resident, Michelle Mare, made a brief announcement about community and regeneration issues in the Peckham and Nunhead area. She said if anyone was interested they should attend the cabinet meeting on the 9 February 2016 at 4.00 pm at the Tooley Street offices to support a deputation from local residents.

Police update

Inspector Lloyd provided the meeting with a brief update on policing issues.

The main issues addressed at the meeting were tackling petty crime such as the theft of mobile phones with many thieves using bikes or mopeds. People were encouraged to speak to the police during the break and to also join their local neighbourhood watch scheme.

8. YOUTH COMMUNITY SLOT

There were young people in attendance who were from a local community project which stood for "the young people that would grow into understanding society through their community and education."

The representatives spoke about other initiatives like community champions, "the always create project" and SGTO (Southwark group of tenants organisations).

Sophia spoke about Saturday classes that were held on the Brayards estate. The classes involve arts and crafts, painting, bird watching and other fun activities.

9. THEME - CARING FOR ALL OUR COMMUNITIES

The chair introduced the theme.

Councillor Charlie Smith on behalf of the Southwark Pensioners centre spoke about the centre. It offers activities and classes in art and computer classes, local history, jewellery making sessions and trips away to the seaside. Information leaflets were available at the meeting.

Councillor Stephanie Cryan, cabinet member for adult care and financial inclusion was present to talk about community conversations concerning the Age friendly borough.

The meeting then went into workshops which related to the following issues:

- Women's safety and domestic abuse
- Children's safety/child exploitation
- Age Friendly and dementia friendly borough
- Mental health issues – headed by Solace

There was also a presentation from Link Age Southwark.

- It was noted that officers and the 3 local ward councillors meet with residents and those who presented the deputation to agree a way forward.
- The Peckham and Nunhead Community Council would be given an update at the March meeting on the outcome of these meetings with the local ward councillors and residents.
- Once an agreement has been reached officers could make recommendations to the cabinet member.

RECOMMENDATION

1. To approve the allocation of funds for the 2016/17 cleaner greener safer capital programme in the Peckham and Nunhead Community Council area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The council's cleaner greener safer capital programme has been running since 2003.
3. In the first thirteen years of the CGS programme, £32,273,000 has been allocated to community councils leading to 2,242 projects being approved.
4. In the Peckham and Nunhead Community Council area, £8,256,241 has been allocated to 515 projects, 467 of which have been completed to date.
5. Examples of the types of projects that have been funded include:
 - Parks, community gardens, landscaping, tree planting and wildlife areas
 - Children's playgrounds, youth facilities, ball courts and cycle tracks
 - Lighting, security measures, pavements, streets, and tackling 'grot spots'
 - Grants to local groups to self-deliver projects

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

6. There is £402,857 available for the 2016/17 CGS capital programme for new projects in the Peckham and Nunhead Community Council area.
7. Unallocated funding from previous years' programmes was reallocated following approval of a report submitted to Peckham and Nunhead Community Council meeting on 6 February 2016.
8. Eligible proposals must bring about a permanent improvement and make an area cleaner, greener or safer.
9. Proposals with revenue costs, including salaries, costs for events, festivals, workshops or other one-off events are not eligible for capital funding. Internal improvements to housing property and works on schools where there is no access to the general public are also not eligible. CCTV proposals are eligible only where ongoing revenue costs have been secured. Works on private property are not eligible unless there is a long-term guarantee of public access

or a demonstrable public benefit.

10. The application form invited expressions of interest for the applicants to deliver projects themselves. A due diligence exercise to ensure that this is both practical and realistic has been undertaken as part of the feasibility process. In such cases, the council would give the funding allocation to the applicant in the form of a capital grant, with appropriate conditions attached.

Policy implications

11. The cleaner green safer programme is fully aligned with the council's policies around sustainability, regeneration and community engagement.

Community impact statement

12. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement and community safety as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
13. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The cleaner greener safer programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
14. In fulfilling the above objectives of community councils to bring together and involve Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decision to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct.
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristics and those who do not share it.
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
15. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
16. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic.
 - b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic.
 - c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under-represented.

17. All ideas for CGS projects come directly from the local community via a simple project nomination form available in electronic and paper format.

Resource implications

18. The funding for the 2016/17 cleaner greener safer capital programme was approved by the cabinet and is part of the council's overall capital programme as detailed in the Launch of cleaner greener safer capital programme 2015/16 report dated August 2014.
19. All professional fees related to the project are also treated as the capital costs of the project. Where projects are awarded as a grant to organisations, the community council award letter will not include the professional fees which will be charged direct to project costs.
20. The cleaner greener safer projects must be completed within two years of award of funding. Projects that are unlikely to be completed within two years will be reported to community council and available budgets may be reallocated to other projects. Revenue costs not covered by maintenance or the contractual liability period will fall upon the asset owner. The business unit will be notified of the likely costs before the schemes proceeds, in order to secure permission to implement the scheme.
21. After the defects and liability period, or three year maintenance period in the case of planting works, all future maintenance is assumed by the asset owner, for example housing, parks, highways, or in some cases external asset owners. Therefore, there are no revenue implications to the public realm projects business unit as a result of approving the proposed allocation.
22. The total expenditure and sources of funding for the scheme will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall capital programme.
23. Value for money will be ensured when the contract is procured by following the council's contract standing orders.

Consultation

24. All cleaner greener safer projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents, tenants and residents associations and local community groups where appropriate.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Democracy

25. The allocation of the cleaner, greener, safer capital fund (CGS) is an executive function, delegated by the leader of the council.
26. Community councils are 'area committees' within the meaning of the Act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the leader.
27. This report is recommending that the Peckham and Nunhead Community Council approve the allocation of funds to the individual projects specified at appendix 1. The power for this function is detailed in Part 3H paragraph 11 of

the constitution which states that community councils have the power of approval of the allocation of funds to cleaner, greener, safer capital and revenue schemes of a local nature, using the resources and criteria identified by the cabinet.

28. The cabinet member for transport environment and recycling approved the funding for the 2016/2017 programme in August 2014 by exercising his powers under Part 3D paragraph 2 of the constitution; and the community council approval being sought here is therefore the next constitutional step in the process.
29. Community council members also have powers under paragraph 12 of Part 3H of the constitution to oversee and take responsibility for the development and implementation of the local schemes.
30. In allocating funding under the cleaner greener safer, community councils must have regard to the council's equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties need to be considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 14 to 16 in the community impact statement.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance

31. This report seeks the approval of Peckham and Nunhead Community Council for the allocation of funds for the 2016/17 cleaner greener safer programme in the Peckham and Nunhead Community Council area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.
32. The strategic director of finance and governance notes the resource implications contained within the report that the proposed allocation will be contained within the council's capital programme.
33. It is also noted that officers' time and any other costs connected with this recommendation will be contained within existing departmental revenue budgets.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the Peckham and Nunhead Community Council allocates a total of £142,000 of the Neighbourhoods Fund 2016/17 from the list of applications outlined in Appendix 1. This amount consists of two elements, namely £135,000 available for 2016/17 and £7,000 of unallocated funding carried forward from previous year's programme.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The neighbourhoods fund was introduced in 2015 by merging two former revenue programmes known as cleaner, greener, safer revenue and community council fund. The cabinet member for communities, employment and business authorised the amalgamation the cleaner greener safer revenue fund and community council fund, into a single funding programme to create a new neighbourhoods fund for the 2015/16 round and onwards. This decision (IDM) was taken on 12 December 2014.
3. The neighbourhoods fund has a borough-wide funding budget of £630,000 with an allocation of £30,000 per ward.
4. The purpose of introducing the neighbourhoods fund was to give community councils decision making powers over significant amounts of revenue funding, that they could allocate to meet locally determined priorities.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

5. Each ward will have £30,000 of revenue grants to allocate. It is proposed that any unallocated funds are to be carried forward from previous rounds (years) and added to the financial year commencing 1 April 2016.
6. The community councils will use the criteria set out below for the allocation of this funding.
 - a. Creating opportunities for people from different backgrounds to get on well together; (e.g. community cohesion).
 - b. Establishing projects which treat each other with respect and consideration (e.g. being a good neighbour, inter-generational contacts).
 - c. Encouraging residents to be responsible for their own neighbourhood (e.g. community clean-ups; volunteering initiatives).
 - d. Specific measures to enhance a neighbourhood's environment (e.g. increased cleaning)

7. A community council may choose to allocate some of their neighbourhoods fund resources to their cleaner greener safer capital allocations.
8. Subject to the availability of resources, the neighbourhoods fund may be used to 'buy' services from the council.
9. As with any executive decision taken by community councils this is subject to the council's existing scrutiny arrangements.

Community impact statement

10. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement and community safety as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
11. An explicit objective within community council is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared mutual interest.
12. The allocation of the 2016/17 Peckham and Nunhead neighbourhoods fund will, in the main, affect the people living in the Peckham and Nunhead community council area. However, in making the area a better place to live and improving life chances for local people, Peckham and Nunhead neighbourhoods fund activities will have an impact on the whole of Southwark.
13. The neighbourhoods fund is an important tool in achieving community participation and cohesion.
14. In fulfilling the above objectives that community councils have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decisions to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and those who do not share it
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
15. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation. In this process there are no issues that contravene the Equality Act 2010.
16. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic.
 - Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic.
 - Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under- represented.
 - Due consideration was given to equalities impact assessment during the design of this awards process and no adverse impact was evident.

Resource implications

17. There are none.

Consultation

18. Neighbourhoods fund projects may require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents and tenants and residents associations where applicable.

Financial implications

19. The Peckham and Nunhead neighbourhoods fund has been allocated a total of £135,000 for 2016/17. In addition to this, funds totaling £7,000 remain unallocated from previous years' allocations and thus also available to allocate.
20. It is recommended that community councils set aside some of the unallocated funds from previous years in order to prevent an over allocation of funds, as well as act as a contingency from which urgent or incidental requests can be funded throughout the year. It must also be noted that the unallocated figures reported in the previous paragraph represent current best estimates as the 2015/16 funding round is only finally over on 31 March 2016.
21. Projects that are unlikely to be completed within the year will be reported to the community council and available funding may be allocated to other projects or carried over to the following financial year.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Democracy

22. The allocation of the neighbourhoods fund is an executive function. The Local Government Act 2000 ('the 2000 Act') gives the Leader the power to delegate any executive function to whoever lawfully can undertake the function, including "area committees". Community councils are "area committees" within the meaning of the 2000 Act. The council's constitution (Part 3H) provides that community councils have delegated authority to take decisions in relation to the neighbourhoods fund.
23. The Localism Act 2011 gives councils a general power of competence to do anything that individuals generally may do. This power can be used even if legislation already exists that allows a local authority to do the same thing. However the general power of competence does not enable a local authority to do anything which is restricted or prevented from doing under previous legislation.
24. The general power of competence includes the power to:
- (a) incur expenditure
 - (b) give financial assistance to any person
 - (c) enter into arrangements or agreements with any person
 - (d) co-operate with or facilitate or co-ordinate the activities of any person
 - (e) exercise on behalf of any person any functions of that person; and
 - (f) provide staff, goods, services or accommodation to any person.

25. The provision of funding under the neighbourhoods fund falls within the scope of the kind of activities the council can undertake under the general power of competence .
26. In allocating funding under the Neighbourhoods Fund community councils must have regard to the council's equality duties set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties have been considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 14, 15 and 16 of the report.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance

27. The 2016/17 budget allocation for the new Neighbourhoods fund has been agreed by council assembly. It stands at £30,000 per ward and thus £135,000 has been awarded to Peckham and Nunhead community council. A further £7,000 has been carried forward from previous years and is thus also available for allocation.

RECOMMENDATION

1. It is recommended that the following local traffic and parking amendments, detailed in the appendix to this report, is approved for implementation, subject to the outcome of any necessary statutory consultation and procedures:
 - 1.1 The introduction of a four hour maximum stay in Southwark's six leisure centre car parking areas to prevent all day commuter parking congestion and ensure there is turnover in parking spaces for genuine visitors to the leisure centres as well as measures to permit enforcement of obstructive parking or abuse of disabled parking bays. This recommendation relates to Peckham Pulse Leisure Centre.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. Paragraph 15 of Part 3H of the Southwark Constitution sets out that the community council will take decisions on the following local non-strategic matters:
 - the introduction of single traffic signs
 - the introduction of short lengths of waiting and loading restrictions
 - the introduction of road markings
 - the setting of consultation boundaries for consultation on traffic schemes
 - the introduction of destination disabled parking bays
 - statutory objections to origin disabled parking bays.
3. This report gives recommendation for off-street local traffic and parking restrictions, involving traffic signs and road surface markings within the leisure centre car parking areas.
4. The origins and reasons for the recommendation are discussed within the key issues section of this report.
 - details of the background to the submission of the report
 - any previous decisions taken in relation to the subject matter.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

5. The aim of proposal is to improve the parking facilities for members of the public who are visiting the leisure centres to use the facilities.

6. The council propose the introduction of a four hour maximum stay period in Southwark's six leisure centre car parking areas to prevent commuter parking and ensure there is turnover in parking space for genuine visitors to the leisure centres. The location and proposal is summarised in Figure 1. A plan of the car park layout can be found in the appendix.
7. At present, the car parking areas are unregulated and therefore no enforcement is possible, even for parking in dangerous locations or in a disabled bay (without a blue badge). Surveys have also confirmed many people are parking at the centres for a period of time, potentially related to commuting, which takes up space for genuine leisure centre users.

	Parking will remain free. It is not proposed to introduce charges for parking in the leisure centre car parks.

8. The general principles proposed for Peckham Pulse Leisure car park are:
- To introduce a four hour time limit for parking. This will reduce parking congestion and give visitors to the leisure centre greater opportunity to find a parking space. Time limiting will ensure turn-over of space and prevent all-day parking by motorists not using the leisure facilities.
 - Designate parking and non-parking areas including formal provision for the existing disabled bays.
 - Enable enforcement against vehicles that contravene the traffic management order that is proposed to be implemented (e.g. overstay the time limit or park in obstructive locations or in disabled bay when not permitted).
9. This project does not propose the introduction of charges for parking in the leisure centre car parks.

Policy Implications

10. The recommendation contained within this report is consistent with the policies of the Transport Plan 2011,
- Policy 1.1 – Pursue overall traffic reduction

- Policy 2.3 – Promote and encourage sustainable travel choices in the Borough.
- Policy 4.2 – Create places that people can enjoy.
- Policy 6.3 – Support independent travel for the whole community.
- Policy 7.5 – Enforce parking regulations firmly but fairly.
- Policy 8.1 – seek to reduce overall levels of private motor vehicle traffic on our streets

Community impact statement

11. The policies within the transport plan are upheld within this report have been subject to an Equality Impact Assessment
12. The recommendations are area based and therefore will have greatest affect upon those people living working or travelling in the vicinity of the areas where the proposals are made.
13. There is a risk that new restrictions may cause parking to be displaced and, indirectly, have an adverse impact upon road users and neighbouring properties at that location. However this cannot be entirely pre-empted until the recommendations have been implemented and observed.
14. With the exception of those benefits and risks identified above, the recommendation is not considered to have a disproportionate effect on any other community or group.
15. The recommendations support the council's equalities and human rights policies and promote social inclusion by ensuring the space is used by genuine users of the facilities.

Resource Implications

16. All costs arising from implementing the recommendations will be fully contained within the existing public realm budgets.

Legal implications

17. Traffic Management Orders would be made under powers contained within the Road Traffic Regulation Act (RTRA) 1984.
18. Should the recommendations be approved the council will give notice of its intention to make a traffic order in accordance with the Local Authorities Traffic Order Procedure) (England and Wales Regulations 1996.
19. These regulations also require the council to consider any representations received as a result of publishing the draft order for a period of 21 days following publication of the draft order.
20. Should any objections be received they must be properly considered in light of administrative law principles, Human Rights law and relevant statutory powers.
21. By virtue of section 122, the council must exercise its powers under the RTRA 1984 so as to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of

vehicular and other traffic including pedestrians, and provision of suitable and adequate parking facilities on and off the highway.

22. These powers must be exercised so far as practicable having regard to the following matters.
 - a. The desirability of securing and maintaining reasonable access to premises.
 - b. The effect on the amenities of any locality affected including the regulation and restriction of heavy commercial traffic so as to preserve or improve amenity.
 - c. The national air quality strategy
 - d. Facilitating the passage of public service vehicles and securing the safety and convenience of their passengers
 - e. any other matters appearing to the council to be relevant.

Consultation

23. Informal public consultation has been carried out at the Leisure Centres, with notices displayed within the Leisure Centre from the middle of November 2015, until 18 December 2015. During the period, no representations were made against the proposals.
24. The implementation of changes to parking requires the making of a traffic order. The procedures for making a traffic order are defined by national Regulations which include statutory consultation and the consideration of any arising objections.
25. Should the recommendations be approved the council must follow the procedures contained with Part II and III of the Regulation which are supplemented by the Council's own processes. This process is summarised as:
 - a. Publication of a proposal notice in a local newspaper (Southwark news).
 - b. Publication of a proposal notice in the London Gazette.
 - c. Display of notices in Leisure Centre car parks affected by the orders.
 - d. Consultation with statutory authorities.
 - e. Making available for public inspection any associated documents e.g. plans, draft orders, statement of reasons) via the council's website or by appointment at 160 Tooley Street, SE1.
 - f. A 21 day consultation period during which time any person may comment upon or object to the proposed order.
26. Following publication of the proposal notice, any person wanting to object must make their objection in writing, state the grounds on which it is made and send to the address specified on the notice.
27. Should an objection be made that officers are unable to resolve so that it is withdrawn, it will be reported to the community council for determination. The community council will then consider whether to modify the proposal, accede to or reject the objection. The council will subsequently notify all objectors of the final decision.

Programme Timeline

28. If these items are approved by the community council they will be progressed in line with the below, approximate timeline:

- Traffic orders (statutory consultation) – February to March 2016
- Implementation – Spring 2016 (subject to outcome of consultation)

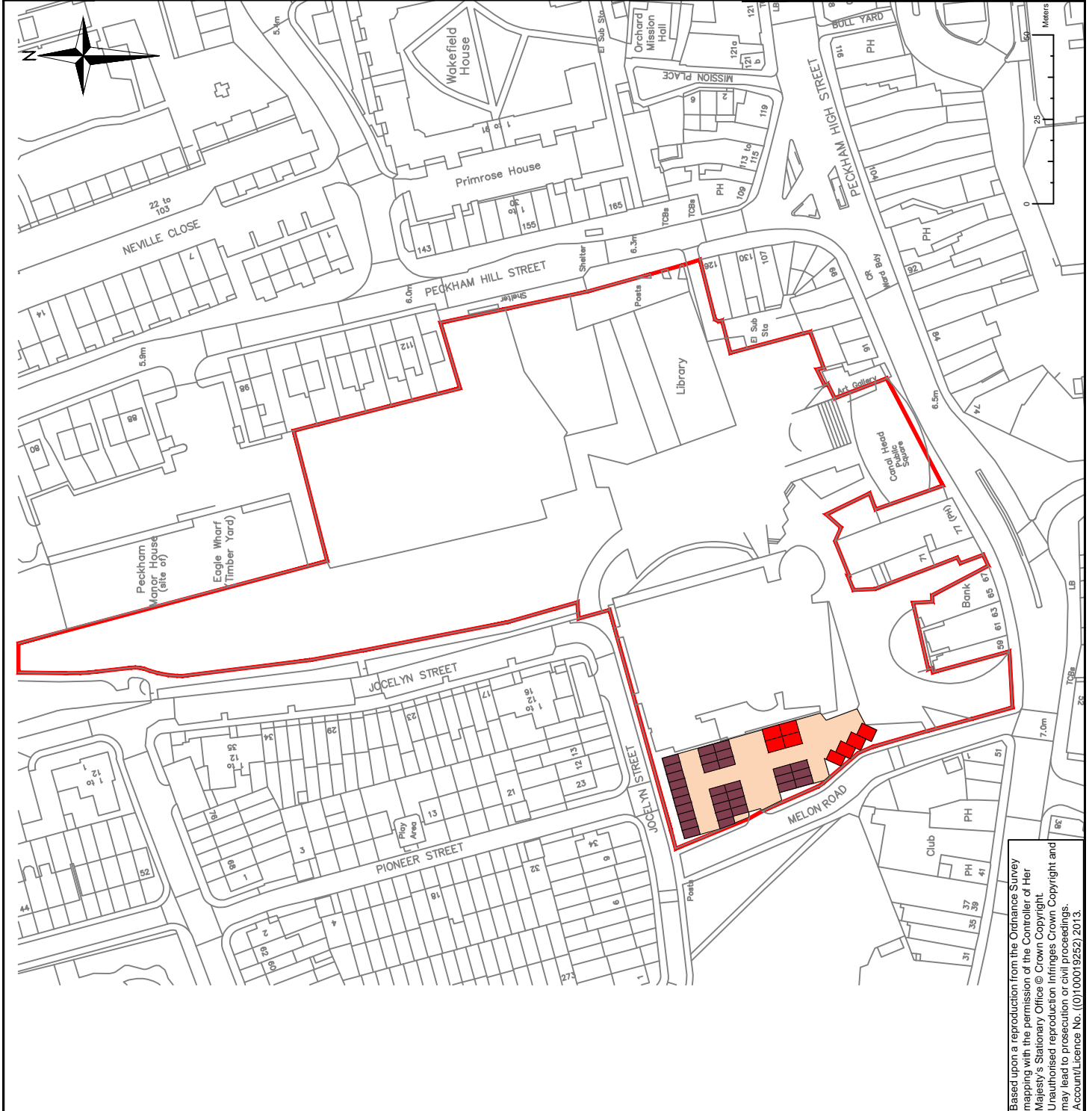
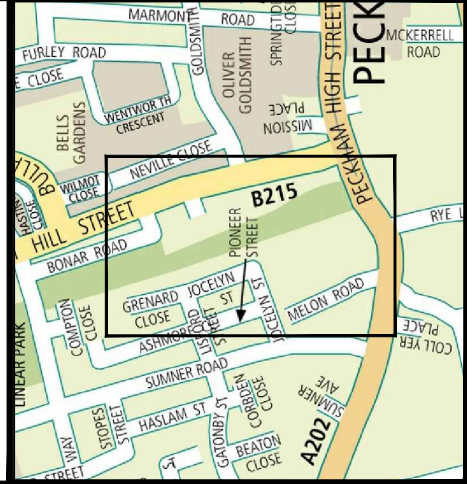
