1.5 MINUTES

The chair explained that leading on from the discussions at the last community council meeting, from 1 January 2017 onwards, the decision maker for all local traffic management orders including decisions on double yellow lines would be the cabinet member for environment and the public realm. Any legacy issues could be taken back to community council for consultation, before a decision was made by the cabinet member.

1.6 COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENTS AND PRESENTATIONS

Northcross Road market extension consultation

Ambrose Omoma, community involvement project worker, informed the meeting that the consultation about the market stalls in Northcross Road, just off Lordship Lane, was currently taking place. The proposals included:

- Extending the market
- Having a permanent road closure in place every Saturday from Lordship Lane to Archdale Road
- Creating a turning space at the end of Nutfield Road.

The consultation would be running until 31 January 2017. He encouraged residents, visitors and people working in the area to participate. The meeting heard that the new plans involved having market stalls in the road facing inward, so the pavements would not be filled with shoppers. Stalls would be extended from Nutfield Road to Archdale Road, which was why the plans included restricting traffic on these two roads on Saturdays. The reason for the expansion of the market was that it was very popular and the demand for stalls by traders was high, which had led to a long waiting list. Neighbourhoods Fund 2017-18

Fitzroy Lewis, community council development officer, informed the meeting that the application process for the Neighbourhoods Fund 2017-18 was currently open until 19 December 2016. The Neighbourhoods Fund was designed to fund local events or activities. £500 to £5,000 could be awarded to projects starting from April 2017. He

The decisions about the funding would be taken at the community council meeting in spring 2017.

2. THEME: PRIMARY AND SECONDARY EDUCATION PROVISION IN DULWICH

Councillor Victoria Mills, cabinet member for children and schools, addressed the meeting saying that educational achievement in Southwark had risen steadily and that results were now above the national average. 93% of Southwark schools were rated good or outstanding by Ofsted. The council was working in partnership and had a good collaborative relationship with, all schools, including academies. In terms of the 2016 GCSE results, Southwark was provisionally ranked 23rd in the country.

The council had overcome the shortfall in primary school places which the Dulwich area had experienced in 2008 by investing in existing popular, oversubscribed and outstanding schools, especially after the Building Schools for the Future (BSF) programme had ended in 2010. The council was not allowed to open new schools, and so was working with potential academy and free school providers to broker new sites. These included the Belham School and the new secondary school on the Dulwich hospital site, for example. The council's building and investment programme was about £180 million. The money, for this had come from the Department for Education, the free school programme and from council funds.

Councillor Mills welcomed the government's decision not to force all schools to become academies, but flagged up that government had consulted on proposals to make changes to the national funding formula, which risked Southwark schools losing between eight and 20 percent of their budgets.

2.1 ADMISSIONS PROCESS

Glenn Garcia, head of pupil access, presented information on the admissions processes for the different types of schools and the code governing them (see attached presentation). She highlighted that when parents made their six choices for secondary schools, these were not in order of preference and the decisions depended on children meeting the schools' admissions criteria.

Ric Euteneuer, principal strategy officer (school places), explained the places planning process (see attached presentation). He informed the meeting that according to the data received from the Greater London Authority, there was no need for extra school places in the Dulwich area, but that the council was monitoring the need for school places every year.

The meeting heard that Rotherhithe and Bermondsey were parts of the borough were there was pressure on school places, but that in terms of secondary school places, there were enough in the borough.

The meeting then split into workshops discussing school admissions, place provision and other issues.

Responsibilities in relation to the Code:

- Clear, fair and objective admission arrangements.
- Set and publish the admission number for each relevant age group.
- All places are allocated in accordance with those admission arrangements/compliance with the Code



Local authority admission roles

- Ensure every child of statutory school age is offered a school place.
- Coordinate admissions to all schools in the borough
- Produce admission arrangements and arrange admission appeals for community schools.
- In year admissions, compliance checks and publish an admissions brochure with details of all Southwark schools.

Prohibited practice

Examples of prohibited practice - MUST NOT:

Place any conditions on an applicant, not in published criteria.

 Give extra priority to children according to the order of schools named (e.g. first preference).

• Give priority to children according to parents' willingness to support the school.

 Occupation, financial/educational/marital status must not be considered (Pupil premium eligibility an exception).

Consultation on admission arrangements

- "When changes are proposed to admission arrangements, all admission authorities must consult on their admission arrangements (including any supplementary information form) that will apply for admission applications the following school year. Where the admission arrangements have not changed from the previous year there is no requirement to consult, subject to the requirement that admission authorities must consult on their admission arrangements at least once every 7 years, even if there have been no changes during that period."

Background

- The council has a duty to secure school places for its residents (Education Act 1996 (as amended by the Education and Inspections Act 2006)
- This can be done through (temporary ('bulge') or permanent) expansions of existing schools or the opening of new schools, depending on the projected nature of the demand
- New schools MUST be academies or free schools (Academies Act 2010, Education Act 2011)

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
Southwark School place planning(

- LA plans school places for primary and secondary pupils
- GLA provide the LA with projections, which we amend and recalculate
- Southwark is split into <u>5</u> planning areas for primary school planning, which are broadly coterminous with the Community Council areas
- Dulwich one of the five planning areas
- Secondary place planning are performed boroughwide

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School place planning(

- Pupil projections based on
 - Births
 - Deaths
 - Housing developments ("Child yield")
 - Migration into/out of Southwark and internally
 - Recruitment to existing schools
 - New planned schools and expansions
- Need to be careful that we are enabling schools for "local growth" within Dulwich (i.e. are <u>not</u> abstracting pupils from existing provision)

Schools in Dulwich Council

- Southwark presently only directly controls admissions to <u>3</u> community primary schools in Dulwich
- The other 7 VA schools, free schools and academies all control their own admissions
- Community schools and VA schools need council approval to expand; academies and free schools do not
- Academies and free schools can expand at will, and need only publish a revised (higher) admissions number to do so

National context



- The volume and location of provision is not controlled entirely by the council due to academy expansions (and the free schools initiative)
- Education Act 2011 allows Academies (and free schools) to expand at will
- New provision proposed and agreed by EFA may not necessarily be in areas of need or demand
- New provision may also potentially abstract pupils from existing schools rather than provide new places
- Cross border flow patterns may change

Dulwich area



- Dulwich Community Council area coterminous with Dulwich school place planning areas
- 9 primary phase schools in Dulwich
 - 7 primary schools, 1 infant school, 1 junior school
 - 3 community schools, 2 academies, 2 free schools, 2 VA schools
- 1 secondary school an academy
- Children do not necessarily attend schools in Dulwich, nor do they necessarily come from Dulwich

- 3,410 state-funded mainstream primary <u>places</u> in Dulwich (in November 2016)
- 1,380 state-funded mainstream secondary <u>places</u> in Dulwich (in November 2016)
- 3,150 <u>pupils</u> in state-funded mainstream primary places in Dulwich (in November 2016)
- 1,702 <u>pupils</u> in state-funded mainstream secondary places in Dulwich (in November 2016)
- 530 reception <u>places</u> (483 <u>pupils</u> in November 2016)
- 360 Y7 places (402 pupils in Y7 November 2016)

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- Recent school expansions in Dulwich include
 - Expansion of Dulwich Wood (Langbourne) from 1FE to 2FE
 - Opening of Harris Primary Free East Dulwich (2FE)
 - Opening of Judith Kerr Free Primary School (1.8FE)
 - Previous Bulge classes at Dulwich Infants/Juniors, Heber, Goose Green, Goodrich (1FE each)
 - 2-4FE expansions by Kingsdale Secondary (2015-17)
- There will be 3,710 state-funded mainstream primary places in Dulwich by September 2020
- Around 3,300 primary pupils projected in Dulwich by this time, leaving an excess of around 400 places


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- 3.7 applications per primary place in Dulwich
- Southwark average is 2.7 applications per place
- Range in Dulwich Schools from 1.5 applications per place to 5.8 applications per place
- KS2 L4 average (2015) for Dulwich schools is 81%
- KS2 L4 Southwark schools average (2015) is 82%
- 2000 plus applications for Kingsdale 6 applications per place or more
- 44% of Kingsdale's pupils from Southwark





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- "There aren't enough primary places in Dulwich"
 - This is not presently correct there are 47 spare reception places (1.5FE) – 9% – at reception and this is projected to increase (2FE) by 2018/19. There are around 250 spare places (7%) in Dulwich primaries overall and this is also set into increase to around 360 places by 2019/20. There are <u>155</u> more reception and <u>860</u> more primary places in Dulwich than in 2007 – an increase of 41% and 33% overall respectively over the last 10 years
- "We don't have a choice where we live all the local schools are full"
 - 5 of the 9 primaries have spaces in reception
 - <u>All</u> primaries "Good" or "Outstanding" OFSTED-graded

- "Our primary schools are full of non-Southwark pupils"
 - Study of enrolment at Dulwich planning area schools
 - <u>92%</u> of pupils attending primary schools in Dulwich live in Southwark
 - Southwark pupils also attend schools outside the borough
 - Biggest exchange is with Lewisham and Lambeth, less so with Bromley and Croydon
 - Highest non-Southwark percentage is Judith Kerr 44% but still filling up, and Southwark quotient increases annually
 - Paxton Primary in Lambeth has 23% Southwark children
 - Overall between 7%-9% exchange with neighbours broadly neutral, boroughwide at primary level

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

 - All state-funded schools in England <u>must</u> comply with the entirety of the English School Admissions Code. If an English school's admissions criteria breaks the law or any area of the Code, then you can complain about it
 - Appeals or complaints against admissions handled in the first instance by the schools themselves if they are academies, free schools, or VA schools
 - LAs and Schools also need to consult when changing admissions procedures or every 7 years if no change
 - Free schools and academies do <u>NOT</u> need to consult when increasing admissions numbers
 - Southwark <u>not</u> the admissions authority for any secondary school in Southwark, nor for 6 of the 9 primary schools in Dulwich
 - Complaints against school admissions, after the school have responded, are dealt with by the Office of the Schools' Adjudicator (OSA)

RECOMMENDATION

1. That Dulwich Community Council approve the re-allocation of a total of £11,545 as part of the 2017-18 CGS programme.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. Cleaner Greener Safer (CGS) is part of the London Borough of Southwark's capital programme. Between 2003 and 2016, £3.95mm has been been made available to local residents in Dulwich Community Council area, to apply for awards to make their local area a better place to live. The programme attracts hundreds of proposals ranging from a few hundred pounds for bulb planting to brighten up open spaces to tens of thousands of pounds to create community gardens. These projects often introduce new ideas such as outdoor gyms in public spaces, community gardens, public art and energy saving projects which not only make the borough cleaner, greener and safer but greatly contribute to a sustainable public realm by involving residents in the funding process and in the delivery of projects.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

- 3. Appendix 1 lists projects which have a total underspend of £11,545.
- 4. It is noted that 106981 Pynners Fields facelift project was cancelled as the Club had moved from the grounds and the funding was not required. This releases £4,300 to award to new projects.
- It is noted that 106963 College 20mph signs project was cancelled as LB Southwark no longer installs reactive speed signs. This releases £2,000 funding to award to new projects
- It is noted that 106989 Dulwich Park slide was cancelled as the scheme was completed with alternative funding. This releases £1,905 funding to award to new projects.
- It is noted that 106548 Ardbeg Road HM Lane dropped kerbs project was completed with an underspend. This releases £3,340 funding to award to new projects.
- 8. It is recommended that the total unallocated funding of £11,545 be reallocated as part of the 2017-18 CGS programme.

Community impact statement

- 10. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local environmental improvements, as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
- 11. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The Cleaner Greener Safer programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
- 12. In fulfilling the above objectives that community councils have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been give to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decision to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristics and those who do not share it;
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
- 13. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
- 14. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
 - b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic;
 - c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic to participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under-represented.

Resource implications

- 15. This is the funding reallocation recommendation of existing CGS funding of £11,545 that was originally awarded in 2015-16 and 2016-17 (see attached Appendix 1 for details of the existing projects). CGS funding is devolved to community councils to spend on suitable projects.
- 16. The profiling of the budgets will be amended once the recommendations have been approved and the schemes will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall capital programme.

- 17. Management of the reallocation of the funding will be contained within existing budgets.
- 18. The total expenditure and sources of funding for the scheme will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall capital programme.

Consultation

19. All CGS projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents and tenants and residents associations where appropriate.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Democracy

- 20. The allocation of the Cleaner Greener Safer capital fund ('CGS') is an executive function, delegated by the Leader to community councils.
- 21. Community councils are 'area committees' within the meaning of the Act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the Leader.
- 22. This report is recommending that the Dulwich Community Council approve the reallocation of available funds from the 2015-16 and 2016-17 programmes as specified at Appendix 1 to the 2017-18 capital funding allocation. The power for this function is derived from Part 3H paragraph 14 of the Constitution which states that community councils have the power of "approval of the allocation of funds to cleaner, greener, safer capital and revenue schemes of a local nature, using the resources and criteria identified by the cabinet".
- 23. The cabinet member for transport environment and recycling approved the funding for the 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 programmes in September 2014 by exercising his powers under Part 3D paragraph 2 of the Constitution. Where funding needs to be reallocated the community council approval being sought here is therefore the appropriate constitutional step in the process.
- 24. Community council members also have powers under paragraph 16 of Part 3H of the Constitution to oversee and take responsibility for the development and implementation of the local schemes.
- 25. In allocating funding under the CGS community councils must have regard to the council's equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties need to be considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 10 to 14 in the community impact statement.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance

- 26. This report requests the approval of the Dulwich Community Council for the reallocation of a total of £11,545, originally allocated to projects under the Cleaner Greener Safer (CGS) programme, to other projects in the 2017/2018 Cleaner Greener Safer programme, as set out in Appendix 1.
- 27. The strategic director of finance and governance notes that the re-allocation of the funding will be contained within the existing departmental capital budgets for

CGS allocated as part the council's capital programme.

28. Staffing and any other costs connected with this recommendation to be contained within existing departmental revenue budgets.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. To approve the allocation of funds for the 2017-18 Cleaner Greener Safer (CGS) capital programme in the Dulwich Community Council area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2. The council's Cleaner Greener Safer capital programme has been running since 2003.
- 3. In the first 14 years of the CGS programme, £34,153,000 has been allocated to community councils leading to 2,500 projects being approved.
- 4. In the Dulwich Community Council area, £3,954,474 has been allocated to 507 projects, 469 of which have been completed to date.
- 5. Examples of the types of projects that have been funded include:
 - Parks, community gardens, landscaping, tree planting and wildlife areas
 - Children's playgrounds, youth facilities, ball courts and cycle tracks
 - Lighting, security measures, pavements, streets, and tackling 'grot spots'
 - Grants to local groups to self-deliver projects.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

- 6. There is £268,571 available for the 2017/18 CGS capital programme for new projects in the Dulwich Community Council area.
- 7. Unallocated funding from previous years' programmes will also be reallocated subject to approval in a separate report.
- 8. Eligible proposals must bring about a permanent improvement and make an area cleaner, greener or safer.
- 9. Proposals with revenue costs, including salaries, costs for events, festivals, workshops or other one-off events are not eligible for capital funding. CCTV proposals and internal improvements to housing property and works on schools where there is no access to the general public are also not eligible. Works on private property are not eligible unless there is a long-term guarantee of public access or a demonstrable public benefit.

10. The application form invited expressions of interest for the applicants to deliver projects themselves. A due diligence exercise to ensure that this is both practical and realistic has been undertaken as part of the feasibility process. In such cases, the council would give the funding allocation to the applicant in the form of a capital grant, with appropriate conditions attached.

Policy implications

11. The CGS programme is fully aligned with the council's policies around sustainability, regeneration and community engagement.

Community impact statement

- 12. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement, as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
- 13. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The CGS programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
- 14. In fulfilling the above objectives of community councils to bring together and involve Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decision to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristics and those who do not share it;
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
- 15. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
- 16. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
 - b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic;
 - c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under-represented.
- 17. Ideas for CGS projects come from the local community, the majority via a simple project nomination form available in electronic and paper format.

Resource implications

- 18. The funding for the CGS capital programme from 2011 to 2021 was approved by the cabinet and is part of the council's overall capital programme as detailed in the capital programme 2011–2021 report dated 21 June 2011.
- 19. The funding for the 2017/18 CGS capital programme was approved by the cabinet member for transport environment and recycling as detailed in the Launch of CGS capital programme 2015-16 report dated August 2014.
- 20. All professional fees related to the project are also treated as the capital costs of the project. Where projects are awarded as a grant to organisations, the award amount announced at community council includes professional fees. The community council award letter to grant recipients details the grant amount only, excluding these fees.
- 21. CGS projects must be completed within two years of award of funding. Projects that are unlikely to be completed within two years will be reported to community council and available budgets may be reallocated to other projects. Revenue costs not covered by maintenance or the contractual liability period will fall upon the asset owner. The department will be notified of the likely costs before the schemes proceeds, in order to secure permission to implement the scheme.
- 22. After the defects and liability period, or three year maintenance period in the case of planting works, all future maintenance is assumed by the asset owner, for example housing, parks, highways, or in some cases external asset owners. Therefore, there are no revenue implications to the highways division as a result of approving the proposed allocation.
- 23. The total expenditure and sources of funding for the scheme will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall capital programme.
- 24. Value for money will be ensured when the contract is procured by following the council's contract standing orders.

25. All CGS projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents, Tenants and Residents Associations and local community groups where appropriate.
