RECOMMENDATION

1. To approve the allocation of funds for the 2017-18 Cleaner Greener Safer (CGS) capital programme in the Dulwich Community Council area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The council's Cleaner Greener Safer capital programme has been running since 2003.
3. In the first 14 years of the CGS programme, £34,153,000 has been allocated to community councils leading to 2,500 projects being approved.
4. In the Dulwich Community Council area, £3,954,474 has been allocated to 507 projects, 473 of which have been completed to date.
5. Examples of the types of projects that have been funded include:
 - Parks, community gardens, landscaping, tree planting and wildlife areas
 - Children's playgrounds, youth facilities, ball courts and cycle tracks
 - Lighting, security measures, pavements, streets, and tackling 'grot spots'
 - Grants to local groups to self-deliver projects.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

6. There is £268,571 available for the 2017-18 CGS capital programme for new projects in the Dulwich Community Council area.
7. Eligible proposals must bring about a permanent improvement and make an area cleaner, greener or safer.
8. Proposals with revenue costs, including salaries, costs for events, festivals, workshops or other one-off events are not eligible for capital funding. CCTV proposals and internal improvements to housing property and works on schools where there is no access to the general public are also not eligible. Works on private property are not eligible unless there is a long-term guarantee of public access or a demonstrable public benefit.
9. The application form invited expressions of interest for the applicants to deliver

projects themselves. A due diligence exercise to ensure that this is both practical and realistic has been undertaken as part of the feasibility process. In such cases, the council would give the funding allocation to the applicant in the form of a capital grant, with appropriate conditions attached.

Policy implications

10. The CGS programme is fully aligned with the council's policies around sustainability, regeneration and community engagement.

Community impact statement

11. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement, as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
12. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The CGS programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
13. In fulfilling the above objectives of community councils to bring together and involve Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decision to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristics and those who do not share it;
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
14. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
15. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
 - b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic;
 - c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under- represented.
16. Ideas for CGS projects come from the local community, the majority via a simple project nomination form available in electronic and paper format.

Resource implications

17. The funding for the CGS capital programme from 2011 to 2021 was approved by the cabinet and is part of the council's overall capital programme as detailed in the capital programme 2011–2021 report dated 21 June 2011.
18. The funding for the 2017-18 CGS capital programme was approved by the cabinet member for transport environment and recycling as detailed in the Launch of CGS capital programme 2015-16 report dated August 2014.
19. All professional fees related to the project are also treated as the capital costs of the project. Where projects are awarded as a grant to organisations, the award amount announced at community council includes professional fees. The community council award letter to grant recipients details the grant amount only, excluding these fees.
20. CGS projects must be completed within two years of award of funding. Projects that are unlikely to be completed within two years will be reported to community council and available budgets may be reallocated to other projects. Revenue costs not covered by maintenance or the contractual liability period will fall upon the asset owner. The department will be notified of the likely costs before the schemes proceeds, in order to secure permission to implement the scheme.
21. After the defects and liability period, or three year maintenance period in the case of planting works, all future maintenance is assumed by the asset owner, for example housing, parks, highways, or in some cases external asset owners. Therefore, there are no revenue implications to the highways division as a result of approving the proposed allocation.
22. The total expenditure and sources of funding for the scheme will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall capital programme.
23. Value for money will be ensured when the contract is procured by following the council's contract standing orders.

Consultation

24. All CGS projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents, tenants and residents associations and local community groups where appropriate.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Democracy

25. The allocation of the Cleaner, Greener, Safer capital fund ('CGS') is an executive function, delegated by the Leader to community councils.
26. Community councils are 'area committees' within the meaning of the Act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the leader.
27. This report is recommending that the Dulwich Community Council approve the allocation of funds to the individual projects specified at Appendix 1. The power

for this function is detailed in Part 3H paragraph 14 of the constitution which states that Community Councils have the power of “Approval of the allocation of funds to cleaner, greener, safer capital and revenue schemes of a local nature, using the resources and criteria identified by the cabinet”.

28. The cabinet member for transport environment and recycling approved the funding for the 2017/2018 programme in August 2014 by exercising his powers under Part 3D paragraph 2 of the constitution; and the community council approval being sought here is therefore the next constitutional step in the process.
29. Community council members also have powers under paragraph 16 of Part 3H of the constitution to oversee and take responsibility for the development and implementation of the local schemes.
30. In allocating funding under the CGS community councils must have regard to the council’s equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties need to be considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 12 to 17 in the community impact statement.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance

31. The report seeks the approval of the Dulwich Community Council for the allocation of funds (£268,571) for the 2017-18 Cleaner Greener Safer (CGS) programme in the Dulwich Community Council area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.
32. The strategic director of finance and governance notes the resource implications in the report that the proposed allocations will be contained within the council’s capital programme.
33. It is also noted that officers’ time and any other costs connected with this recommendation will be contained within existing departmental revenue budgets.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the Dulwich Community Council allocates a total of £110,156 of the Neighbourhoods Fund 2017-18 from the list of applications outlined in Appendix 1. This amount consists of two elements, namely £90,000 available for 2017-18 and £20,156 of unallocated funding carried forward from previous year's programme.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The Neighbourhoods Fund was introduced in 2015 by merging two former revenue programmes known as Cleaner, Greener, Safer (CGS) Revenue and Community Council Fund (CCF). The cabinet member for communities, employment and business authorised the amalgamation the CGS Revenue fund and CCF, into a single funding programme to create a new Neighbourhoods Fund for the 2015-16 round and onwards. This decision (IDM) was taken on 12 December 2014.
3. The neighbourhoods fund has a borough-wide funding budget of £630,000 with an allocation of £30,000 per ward.
4. The purpose of introducing the neighbourhoods fund was to give community councils decision making powers over significant amounts of revenue funding, that they could allocate to meet locally determined priorities.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

5. Each ward will have £30,000 of revenue grants to allocate. It is proposed that any unallocated funds are to be carried forward from previous rounds (years) and added to the financial year commencing 1 April 2017.
6. The community councils will use the criteria set out below for the allocation of this funding.
 - a. Creating opportunities for people from different backgrounds to get on well together; (e.g. community cohesion)
 - b. Establishing projects which treat each other with respect and consideration (e.g. being a good neighbour, inter-generational contacts)
 - c. Encouraging residents to be responsible for their own neighbourhood (e.g. community clean-ups; volunteering initiatives)

- d. Specific measures to enhance a neighbourhood's environment (e.g. increased cleaning)
7. A community council may choose to allocate some of their neighbourhoods fund resources to their Cleaner Greener Safer capital allocations.
8. Subject to the availability of resources, the neighbourhoods fund may be used to 'buy' services from the council.
9. As with any executive decision taken by community councils this is subject to the council's existing scrutiny arrangements.

Community impact statement

10. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community Councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement and community safety as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
11. An explicit objective within community council is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared mutual interest.
12. The allocation of the 2017-18 Dulwich neighbourhoods fund will, in the main, affect the people living in the Dulwich community council area. However, in making the area a better place to live and improving life chances for local people, Dulwich neighbourhoods fund activities will have an impact on the whole of Southwark.
13. The neighbourhoods fund is an important tool in achieving community participation and cohesion.
14. In fulfilling the above objectives that community councils have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decisions to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and those who do not share it
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
15. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation. In this process there are no issues that contravene the Equality Act 2010.
16. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic.
 - Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic.

- Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under-represented.
- Due consideration was given to equalities impact assessment during the design of this awards process and no adverse impact was evident.

Resource implications

17. No resource implications.

Consultation

18. Neighbourhoods Fund projects may require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents and tenants and residents associations where applicable.

Financial implications

19. The Dulwich neighbourhoods fund has been allocated a total of £90,000 for 2017-18. In addition to this, funds totaling £20,156 remain unallocated from previous years' allocations and thus also available to allocate.
20. It is recommended that community councils set aside some of the unallocated funds from previous years in order to prevent an over allocation of funds, as well as act as a contingency from which urgent or incidental requests can be funded throughout the year. It must also be noted that the unallocated figures reported in the previous paragraph represent current best estimates as the 2016-17 funding round is only finally over on 31 March 2017.
21. Projects that are unlikely to be completed within the year will be reported to the community council and available funding may be allocated to other projects or carried over to the following financial year.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Democracy

22. The Local Government Act 2000 ('the 2000 Act') gives the Leader the power to delegate any executive function to whoever lawfully can undertake the function. The allocation of the Neighbourhoods Fund is an executive function.
23. Community councils are 'area committees' within the meaning of the 2000 Act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the Leader.
24. The Localism Act 2011 gives councils a general power of competence whereby they have power to do anything that individuals generally may do. This power can be used even if legislation already exists that allows a local authority to do the same thing. However the general power of competence does not enable a local authority to do anything which is was restricted or prevented from doing under the previous legislation.
25. The general power of competence includes the power to:
 - (a) incur expenditure

- (b) give financial assistance to any person
 - (c) enter into arrangements or agreements with any person
 - (d) co-operate with or facilitate or co-ordinate the activities of any person
 - (e) exercise on behalf of any person any functions of that person; and
 - (f) provide staff, goods, services or accommodation to any person.
26. The provision of funding under the neighbourhoods fund falls within the scope of the kind of activities the council can undertake under the general power of competence as this includes the power to give financial assistance to any person.
27. In allocating funding under the neighbourhoods fund community councils must have regard to the council's equality duties set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties have been considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 14, 15 and 16 of the report.

Strategic Director of Finance & Governance

28. The 2017-18 budget allocation for the neighbourhoods fund has been agreed by council assembly. It stands at £30,000 per ward and thus £90,000 has been awarded to Dulwich community council. Up to £20,156 can be carried forward to 2017-18 from the 2016-17 allocation as this represents the current remaining balance.
