1. INTRODUCTION AND WELCOME

The chair welcomed councillors, residents and officers to the meeting.

2. APOLOGIES

There were apologies for absence from Councillors Dora Dixon-Fyle and Peter John.

3. ITEMS OF BUSINESS THAT THE CHAIR DEEMS URGENT

There were none.

4. DISCLOSURE OF MEMBERS' INTERESTS AND DISPENSATIONS

Councillor Radha Burgess declared a non-pecuniary interest in item 9, as she is a resident of Grove Lane.

5. MINUTES

RESOLVED:

That the minutes of the meeting held on 21 September 2016 be agreed as a correct record of that meeting.

6. LOCAL POLICE UPDATE

Sergeant Andrew Sellings and PC Mark McKay gave an update on recent activities in the area.

7. HOW CAN WE CREATE MORE QUALITY JOBS IN CAMBERWELL?

Councillor Johnson Situ, cabinet member for business, employment and culture, introduced the item and gave an overview on businesses and the local economy.

He explained that in 2014 a commitment was made to support 5,000 residents into employment. So far more than 3,303 had been supported into jobs across the borough. Many roles had been created out of Section 106 investment.

The council was also focused on apprenticeships and had supported more than 800 apprenticeships. Employers were asked to commit to the London Living Wage and a one year placement as part of the apprentices programme.

Since 2010, there had been a rise in employment in the borough from 66% to 78% in 2016. That meant about 42,000 more jobs in the borough compared to 2010.

The economic wellbeing strategy would be refreshed in the months ahead to set up the borough for the challenges that were ahead for Southwark.

Southwark Apprentices Programme

Frankie, a Southwark apprentice outlined her experience. She had started in the corporate programme's team in 2014, had worked on a range of projects and got interested in project management. Earlier this year, she had completed the Prince 2 qualification and had received a lot of positive support as an apprentice.

Jasdale, a former Southwark apprentice, explained that he had joined as a customer service apprentice in 2013 in the housing repairs section. He explained he used to be shy but following extensive training he had developed his skills and was offered a job with the council. Jasdale said that joining with other apprentices as part of a group gave all that group a network and support base and he still regularly met up with other people who joined the apprentices programme with him in 2013. He now worked in the Chief Executive's office as part of the local economy team.

A Living Wage

Emma Kosmin, programme manager at the Living Wage Foundation gave a presentation.

- The Living Wage Foundation is at the heart of a movement of organisations, businesses and people who believe a fair day's work deserves a fair day's pay
- The living wage is based on what employees need to make ends meet
- Employers voluntarily choose to pay it
- A separate rate for London reflects the higher costs of living in London
- It recognises that under-25s face the same living cost pressures as everyone else.

In Southwark, there were nearly one hundred accredited living wage employers. The plan was to keep adding to the list.

8. COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENTS

Southwark Wellbeing and Mental Health Strategy

The chair explained that the council and the local NHS were working together to develop a new strategy on wellbeing and mental health. A number of public events were planned to look at the issues involved. Contact: sophiegray@nhs.net

The Employment Academy

Chris Deacon of Thames Reach, explained that Thames Reach was an organisation working across London with the aim of ending street homelessness. A key part of the strategy for preventing homelessness was to provide employment support. A lot of Thames Reach employment support services were run out of 29 Peckham Road (tonight's meeting venue). One of the services was the "Step-Up Programme." This was for people in work who wanted to work more hours or who were currently underpaid / experiencing in-work poverty. This was an increasing problem as it could lead to people losing their accommodation through inability to pay rent. Contact: employmentacademy@thamesreach.org.uk

10. DEPUTATIONS/PETITIONS (IF ANY)

Becky Duffy, a local resident, made a deputation regarding the need for traffic control on Grove Lane particularly between Champion Park and Stories Mews. Becky explained that cars speeded in the area and that there had been a number of serious traffic accidents in the last couple of years including one fatality of a person crossing the road. She added that a recent traffic survey may not have been taken at a time of day indicative of the problem. During peak traffic volume hours of the day, the traffic tended to be slow but in

the evenings things were very different. There was a 20mph limit on the road but some vehicles had lost control and ended up on their roof. Becky circulated pictures of a car that had flipped onto its roof in the area.

Councillor Sarah King thanked Ms Duffy for raising the issues in the deputation and said it was important to involve the police and get information from them on the accidents that had occurred.

Councillor Ian Wingfield, cabinet member for environment and the public realm, responded that the traffic survey had narrow hours and officers had been asked to do a further traffic survey with extended hours. The council had a safer routes to school programme and the two local schools nearby should be consulted and this area should be incorporated into that programme. Transport for London (TfL) would also be consulted as the road was a bus route. TfL's input would be needed prior to any traffic intervention being made. Any options would be consulted on with local residents.

Councillors noted the deputation report and added that the issue of speeding buses in the area would be raised with Val Shawcross at the Greater London Assembly.

11. PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

The following public questions were raised at the meeting:

Q1 "What is the time-frame and actions currently [being] taken by Southwark Council and Transport for London to reopen Camberwell, Walworth and Borough Road stations and is this part of a wider regeneration strategy?"

Councillor Mark Williams, cabinet member for regeneration and new homes, responded that the council had lobbied Transport for London (TfL) to reopen Camberwell Station. Good progress had been made and recently Mike Brown (TfL commissioner) visited the site to see the potential. Southwark and Lambeth councils were working on a business case jointly with TfL to reopen the station and ensure the Thameslink and other rail services stop there. Walworth Station was unlikely to be reopened due to its close proximity to residential properties. Reopening of Camberwell Station was key to wider regeneration plans including redevelopment of the bus station site and the opening up of walking and cycling routes.

Q2 The following written question had been submitted and was read out by the chair: "Since HSBC closed in Denmark Hill, there's a permanent collection of old mattresses, blankets, garments all along the front of the former bank. What steps are being taken to ensure that the local authority and HSBC take some responsibility for providing accommodation for the homeless people who are sleeping here and for clearing up the eyesore?"

The chair asked for an officer response to the public question and for that to be forwarded to the author of the question.

12. SECURE CYCLE PARKING (BIKE HANGAR)

- Kerfield Place – to install new single yellow lines outside Nos. 8 and 9 and adjacent to the existing private parking areas to maintain access to off street parking and to improve inter-visibility with vehicles on Kerfield Place.
- Pelham Close – to install double yellow lines and a 10-metre parking bay to maintain access and to prevent obstructive and dangerous parking for all road users.
- Tower Mill Road – to install double yellow lines on junctions and adjacent to footway build-outs to maintain access and to prevent obstructive and dangerous parking, and to improve inter-visibility at junctions for all road users.

Regarding the Pelham Close decision, Councillor Sarah King commented that there was resident support for the scheme but asked that the concerns of two families with disabled members be considered by officers as they go forward.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That Camberwell Community Council approve the re-allocation of a total of £28,300, as set out in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. Cleaner Greener Safer (CGS) is part of the London Borough of Southwark's capital programme. Between 2003 and 2016 £4.64m has been made available local residents in Camberwell to apply for awards to make their local area a better place to live. The programme attracts hundreds of proposals ranging from a few hundred pounds for bulb planting to brighten up open spaces to tens of thousands of pounds to create community gardens. These projects often introduce new ideas such as outdoor gyms in public spaces, community gardens, public art and energy saving projects which not only make the borough cleaner, greener and safer but greatly contribute to a sustainable public realm by involving residents in the funding process and in the delivery of projects.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

3. Appendix 1 highlights seven projects which have a total under spend of £28,300.
4. It is recommended that the under spend of £7,700 from Glebe Estate playground (north), project reference [106436], is reallocated as part of the 2017-18 CGS programme.
5. It is recommended that the under spend of £2,400 from Kevan House sunken garden, project reference [106417], is reallocated as part of the 2017-18 programme.
6. It is recommended that the under spend of £1,000 from Champion Hill meadow verges, project reference [106445], is reallocated as part of the 2017-18 programme.
7. It is recommended that the under spend of £2,700 from Champion Park raised beds, project reference [106587], is reallocated as part of the 2017-18 programme.
8. It is recommended that the under spend of £10,000 from Glebe Estate

playground (south), project reference [107132], is reallocated as part of the 2017-18 programme.

9. It is recommended that the under spend of £1,600 from Brandon 3 lighting 2016, project reference [107134], is reallocated as part of the 2017-18 programme.
10. It is recommended that the under spend of £2,900 from Sunray Avenue planters, project reference [107138], is reallocated as part of the 2017-18 programme.

Policy implications

11. N/A

Community impact statement

12. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement and community safety as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
13. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The CGS programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
14. In fulfilling the above objectives that community councils have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decision to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristics and those who do not share it;
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
15. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
16. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
 - b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic;
 - c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic to participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under-represented.

Resource implications

17. This is the reallocation of existing CGS funding that was originally awarded in 2014-2015, 2015-2016 and 2016-2017. CGS funding is devolved to community councils to spend on suitable projects.
18. All professional fees related to the project are also treated as the capital costs of the project. Where projects are awarded as a grant to organisations, the community council award letter will not include the professional fees which will be charged direct to project costs.
19. CGS projects must be completed within two years of award of funding. Projects that are unlikely to be completed within two years will be reported to community council and available budgets may be reallocated to other projects. Revenue costs not covered by maintenance or the contractual liability period will fall upon the asset owner. The business unit will be notified of the likely costs before the schemes proceeds, in order to secure permission to implement the scheme.
20. After the defects and liability period, or three year maintenance period in the case of planting works, all future maintenance is assumed by the asset owner, for example housing, parks, highways, or in some cases external asset owners. Therefore, there are no revenue implications to the public realm projects business unit as a result of approving the proposed allocation.
21. The total expenditure and sources of funding for the scheme will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall capital programme.

Consultation

22. All CGS projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents and tenants and residents associations where appropriate.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Democracy

23. The allocation of the CGS capital fund is an executive function, delegated by the Leader to community councils.
24. Community councils are 'area committees' within the meaning of the Act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the Leader.
25. This report is recommending that the Camberwell Community Council approve the reallocation of available funds from the 2014-2015, 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 programme as specified in Appendix 1 to the 2017-2018 capital funding allocation. The power for this function is detailed in Part 3H paragraph 14 of the constitution which states that community councils have the power of "approval of the allocation of funds to cleaner, greener, safer capital and revenue schemes of a local nature, using the resources and criteria identified by the cabinet".
26. The appropriate cabinet member approved the funding for the 2014-2015, 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 programme by virtue of his powers under Part 3D paragraph 2 of the constitution. Where funding needs to be reallocated the

community council approval being sought here is therefore the appropriate constitutional step in the process.

27. Community council members also have powers under paragraph 16 of Part 3H of the constitution to oversee and take responsibility for the development and implementation of the local schemes.
28. In allocating funding under the CGS community councils must have regard to the council's equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties need to be considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 12 to 16 in the community impact statement.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance

29. The report requests the approval of Camberwell Community Council for the re-allocation of a total of £28,300, originally allocated to projects under the CGS programme, as set out in Appendix 1.
30. The strategic director of finance and governance notes that the re-allocation of the CGS funding will be contained within the existing departmental capital budgets for the CGS programme allocated as part of the council's capital programme.
31. Staffing and any other costs connected with this recommendation to be contained within existing departmental revenue budgets.

RECOMMENDATION

1. To approve the allocation of funds for the 2017-18 cleaner greener safer (CGS) capital programme in the Camberwell Community Council area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The council's CGS capital programme has been running since 2003.
3. In the first fourteen years of the CGS programme, £34,153,000 has been allocated to community councils leading to 2,500 projects being approved.
4. In the Camberwell Community Council area, £4,635,612 has been allocated to 339 projects, 304 of which have been completed to date.
5. Examples of the types of projects that have been funded include:
 - Parks, community gardens, landscaping, tree planting and wildlife areas
 - Children's playgrounds, youth facilities, ball courts and cycle tracks
 - Lighting, security measures, pavements, streets, and tackling 'grot spots'
 - Grants to local groups to self-deliver projects.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

6. There is £268,571 available for the 2017-18 CGS capital programme for new projects in the Camberwell Community Council area.
7. Unallocated funding from previous years' programmes will also be reallocated subject to approval in a separate report.
8. Eligible proposals must bring about a permanent improvement and make an area cleaner, greener or safer.
9. Proposals with revenue costs, including salaries, costs for events, festivals, workshops or other one-off events are not eligible for capital funding. CCTV proposals and internal improvements to housing property and works on schools where there is no access to the general public are also not eligible. Works on private property are not eligible unless there is a long-term guarantee of public access or a demonstrable public benefit.

10. The application form invited expressions of interest for the applicants to deliver projects themselves. A due diligence exercise to ensure that this is both practical and realistic has been undertaken as part of the feasibility process. In such cases, the council would give the funding allocation to the applicant in the form of a capital grant, with appropriate conditions attached.

Policy implications

11. The CGS programme is fully aligned with the council's policies around sustainability, regeneration and community engagement.

Community impact statement

12. The roles and functions of community councils include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process. Community councils take decisions on local matters including environmental improvement and community safety as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
13. An explicit objective within community councils is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The CGS programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
14. In fulfilling the above objectives of community councils to bring together and involve Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decision to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristics and those who do not share it;
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
15. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
16. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
 - b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic;
 - c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are under-represented.
17. Ideas for CGS projects come from the local community, the majority via a simple project nomination form available in electronic and paper format.

Resource implications

18. The funding for the CGS capital programme from 2011 to 2021 was approved by the cabinet and is part of the council's overall capital programme as detailed in the Capital Programme 2011–2021 report dated 21 June 2011.
19. The funding for the 2017-18 CGS capital programme was approved by the cabinet member for transport environment and recycling as detailed in the launch of Cleaner Greener Safer Capital Programme 2015-16 report dated August 2014.
20. All professional fees related to the project are also treated as the capital costs of the project. Where projects are awarded as a grant to organisations, the award amount announced at community council includes professional fees. The community council award letter to grant recipients details the grant amount only, excluding these fees.
21. CGS projects must be completed within two years of award of funding. Projects that are unlikely to be completed within two years will be reported to community council and available budgets may be reallocated to other projects. Revenue costs not covered by maintenance or the contractual liability period will fall upon the asset owner. The department will be notified of the likely costs before the schemes proceeds, in order to secure permission to implement the scheme.
22. After the defects and liability period, or three year maintenance period in the case of planting works, all future maintenance is assumed by the asset owner, for example housing, parks, highways, or in some cases external asset owners. Therefore, there are no revenue implications to the highways division as a result of approving the proposed allocation.
23. The total expenditure and sources of funding for the scheme will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall capital programme.
24. Value for money will be ensured when the contract is procured by following the council's contract standing orders.

Consultation

25. All CGS projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents, tenants and residents associations and local community groups where appropriate.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Democracy

26. The allocation of the CGS capital fund is an executive function, delegated by the Leader to community councils.
27. Community councils are 'area committees' within the meaning of the Act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the Leader.
28. This report is recommending that the Camberwell Community Council approve

the allocation of funds to the individual projects specified at Appendix 1. The power for this function is detailed in Part 3H paragraph 14 of the constitution which states that community councils have the power of “approval of the allocation of funds to cleaner, greener, safer capital and revenue schemes of a local nature, using the resources and criteria identified by the cabinet”.

29. The cabinet member for transport environment and recycling approved the funding for the 2017-2018 programme in August 2014 by exercising his powers under Part 3D paragraph 2 of the constitution; and the community council approval being sought here is therefore the next constitutional step in the process.
30. Community council members also have powers under paragraph 16 of Part 3H of the constitution to oversee and take responsibility for the development and implementation of the local schemes.
31. In allocating funding under the CGS community councils must have regard to the council’s equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties need to be considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 12 to 17 in the community impact statement.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance

32. This report seeks the approval of the Camberwell Community Council for the allocation of funds (£268,571) for the 2017-18 CGS programme in the Camberwell Community Council area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.
33. The strategic director of finance and governance notes the resource implications in the report that the proposed allocations will be contained within the council’s capital programme.
34. It is also noted that officers’ time and any other costs connected with this recommendation will be contained within existing departmental revenue budgets.
