OSC briefing paper - Street Cleaning Performance

September 2016

Street cleanliness in Southwark is measured by utilising the LEQs (Local Environmental Quality Surveys) methodology to ensure consistency and comparison with previous years.

Three surveys take place each year, each survey concentrates on a number of geographical areas known as target wards, seven target wards are surveyed per tranche to ensure that all 21 wards are surveyed at least once during the 12 month period and in every survey a 50 metre stretch of each road called a transect is graded for levels of litter, detritus, graffiti and fly posting.

Street cleaning assessors measure the presence of each of the four elements within a specific transect using the following grades:

Litter

GRADE A - no litter or refuse

GRADE B - predominantly free of litter and refuse except for some small items

GRADE C - widespread distribution of litter and refuse, with minor accumulations

GRADE D - heavily littered, with significant accumulations

Detritus

GRADE A - no detritus present on the transect;

GRADE B - predominantly free of detritus except for some light scattering

GRADE C - widespread distribution of detritus, with minor accumulations

GRADE D - extensively covered with detritus with significant accumulations

An identical grading system is also used for graffiti and fly posting.

Three Intermediate Grades are also used. These are:

- B+, between Grade A and Grade B
- B-, between Grade B and Grade C
- C-, between Grade C and Grade D

Grades A, B+ and B are deemed to be an acceptable standard and all other grades unacceptable.

The target wards for each tranche in 15/16 are shown in the table blow. 50 roads were surveyed in each ward giving a total of 1050 roads for the year.

To ensure impartiality, street cleansing officers from LB Lambeth participated in all three 15/16 surveys carrying out 75 assessments per survey making a total of 225 for the year or approximately 20% of the total assessed. Southwark Cleaning staff were used in a reciprocal arrangement for the LB Lambeth street cleaning surveys.

15/16 Year End Results - Litter (4.8 %)

Of the 1050 roads surveyed 50 were judged to be below an acceptable standard for litter which represents a failure rate of just under 5%, the litter target for 15/16 was no more than 7% of roads failing to meet an acceptable standard for litter.

15/16 Year End Results – Detritus (6.2 %)

Of the 1050 roads surveyed 65 were judged to be below an acceptable standard for detritus which represents a failure rate of just over 6%, the detritus target for 15/16 was no more than 10% of roads failing to meet an acceptable standard for detritus.

15/16 Year End Results – Graffiti (4.3%)

Of the 1050 roads surveyed 45 were judged to be below an acceptable standard for graffiti which represents a failure rate of just over 4%, the graffiti target for 15/16 was no more than 5% of roads failing to meet an acceptable standard for graffiti.

15/16 Year End Results – Fly posting (2.5%)

Of the 1050 roads surveyed 26 were judged to be below an acceptable standard for fly posting which represents a failure rate of 2.5%, the fly posting target for 15/16 was no more than 3% of roads failing to meet an acceptable standard for fly posting

15/16 – Dog Fouling (6%)

As part of each survey incidents of dog fouling were also recorded, dog fouling is graded differently to the other elements insofar as any single incident of dog fouling found means that that the road is deemed to have failed, results for dog fouling were as follows:


OSC Briefing Paper – Bulky Waste Service September 2016

The table below provides a summary of the number of bulk waste collections, income received, service complaints and reported fly-tips since the bulky waste collection charge was introduced compared to the same period one year earlier.

The main conclusions that can be drawn from this information are as follows:

- The number of bulky waste bookings since the charged service commenced has reduced to just under 40% of the number over the same period one year earlier. A fall in the number of bulky waste collection bookings was anticipated when the charged service was introduced.
- The income generated by bulky waste bookings to date is £93k this would equate to around £127k for a full financial year.
- The number of complaints has remained at very low levels since the changes were introduced in December 2015 apart from the two most recent months. This is as a result of changes in the way the requests are handled in the back office. These changes have now settled and the number of complaints received is expected to fall again as a result.
- Fly tipping appears to be holding at similar levels to last year overall with some month by month variations as has always ben the case. Please see the graph below for a longer term trend analysis

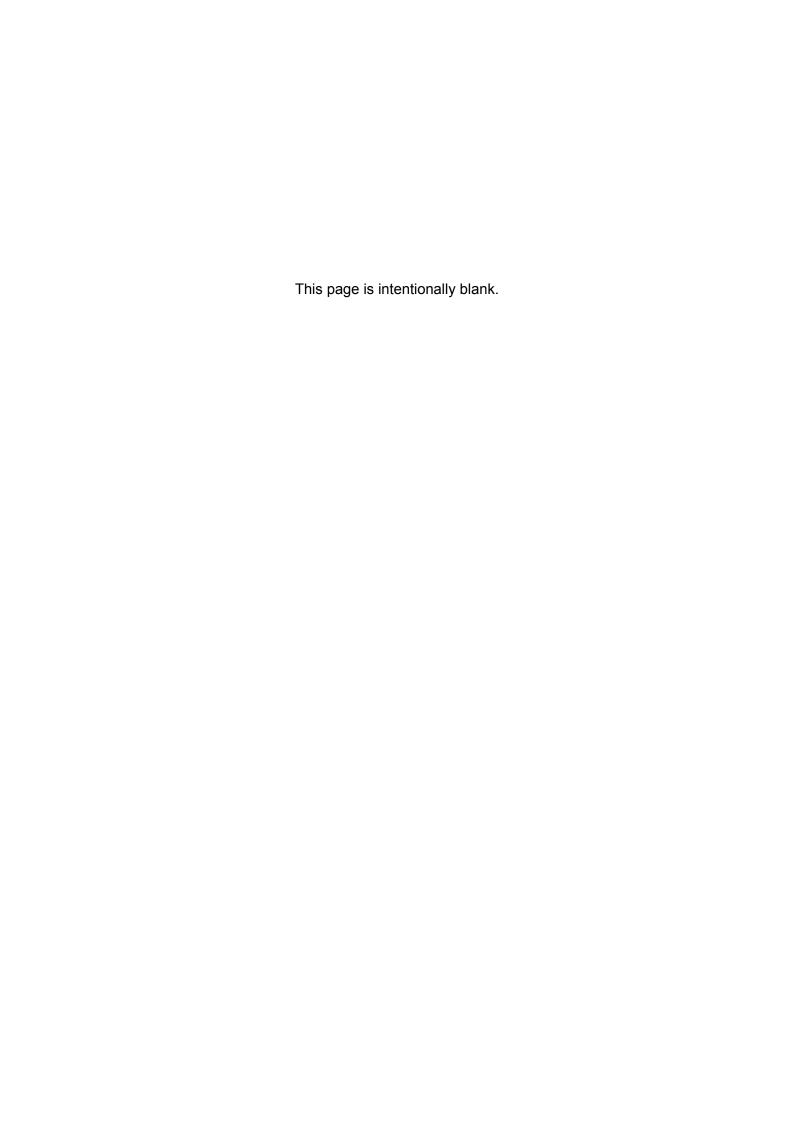


Conclusion

The introduction of charges for bulky waste collections has been successful in terms of creating an income stream from the council. It has also been successful in terms on migrating a significant number of service requests from the telephone booking to on-line booking.

Work continues to improve the service still further with improvements to the on-line booking process underway to ensure that it is clear what items can and can't be collected and to proceed to fully automated transaction handling.

The year on year reduction in reported fly tips appears to have slowed but there is no evidence to suggest the introduction of a charge for this service has had a negative impact.
