AMENDMENT A

Insert new paragraphs 1-5:

- Southwark Council recognises that the economic mess left by the last Labour government means there are difficult decisions to be made. This document sets out the alternative choices that the council should make to ensure it protects the most vulnerable people in our community and preserves effective delivery of basic council services.
- 2. Savings should be made by ending the unnecessary free lunches programme for those who don't qualify or live outside of Southwark; bringing the customer service centre back in-house; putting only the necessary amount into a contingency pot rather than stashing our cash and cutting five posts from the cabinet and deputy cabinet. These simple savings would allow the council to get the basics right and protect the most vital services and vulnerable people in Southwark.
- 3. Funding should not be cut to projects that keep Southwark's streets clean or for the anti-social behaviour unit and noise teams. The council should protect funding for school crossing patrols; for day centres and lunch clubs; for housing services and for voluntary sector projects. Schemes to tackle worklessness and support local businesses should be invested in to help reignite growth in our economy and get people back to work. Local residents should benefit from the legacy of the London Olympics by building on the successful Community Games to deliver outreach sports projects in our estates and community centres.
- 4. The council should stop hoarding power and recognise the value that local people can play in taking decisions about their communities. The budget for community councils should be safeguarded with individual areas identifying savings and the council should protect funding for scrutiny to ensure that council blunders can be halted and reversed. Residents should have a real influence in council spending in their area through a 'Community Chest' of £50,000 per ward.
- 5. These alternative choices protect the basic services that make a real difference to local people; ends the scandal of Southwark Council squandering its cash on unnecessary give-away policies; and devolves power into the hands of the local communities who know their area the best.

We do not believe that Labour's £10,000 per ward "CGS Revenue" fund is sufficiently ambitious in devolving expenditure to local communities, particularly after Labour cut £1.6 million from the main Cleaner Greener Safer fund when compared to levels of funding under the Liberal Democrats. Scrutiny Retain funding for Scrutiny at the current level as (£65)Scrutiny is the effective check-and-balance for the executive function of the Council. Scrutiny is now more important than ever as Southwark's decision making is being centralised further and further.

This council notes that the number one traffic safety priority in Dulwich Village is the retention of school crossing patrols. It further notes that the main demand of the campaigners for the retention of the threatened school crossing patrols is secure long term funding for the patrols and that the Dulwich community council unanimously supported them in that demand. This council concurs with the view that the best way of securing long term funding is to include the budgeted cost within the mainstream core funding of the council, and to that end it supports the following amendment to the budget motion:

In paragraph 1 after "£308.2m" **insert** "except that £18,000 be vired from the cleaner greener safer revenue fund reserved for the Dulwich community council, to the environment and leisure public realm budget for the purpose of retaining school crossing patrol services in the Dulwich village area".
