558316	David Idowu Foundation	David Idowu Foundation Youth_Ink	<p>Our pilot Project, YOUTH_INK, aims to engage with young people through peer-led youth participation within the community and the criminal justice system to up-skill and inspire young people to participate in their own learning through peer-led personal and social development linked to our Youth_Ink ETL model.</p> <p>The Foundation and Southwark Youth Offending Services will work together to empower people to tell their own story, in their own way and with their own lived experience. 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558794	Faces in Focus	Counselling and Self-advocacy for Young People 11-25	<p>Face in Focus provides an extremely valuable service for Southwark young people aged 11-25 who would not be eligible to access NHS or other talking therapy services and we receive referrals from every ward in the borough. As well as continuing to provide counselling, we also wish to launch a young people's self-advocacy group or groups, the aim of which will be to provide a welcoming space in which young people can come together and discuss issues such as knife crime, forced marriage, sex, health, sexual health and any other matters on their minds or of concern to them. The groups will explore and attempt to overcome the barriers that inhibit young people across the borough from reaching their full potential. The service and the proposed groups are needed because they offer routes to empowerment and improved self-confidence and also act as a preventative and diversionary measure.</p> <p>Counselling and group sessions will take place weekly. The groups will involve the planning of activities and outings away from the area to provide tasters of activities not normally available to the young people involved. They may also involve art and drama, meetings with officials and even elected Members to facilitate an understanding of the democratic process. They may also plan visits to local community agencies where there may be relevant volunteering or work opportunities. With the groups it is the intention that the content, planning and resulting activities will be decided and led by the young people, facilitated by a sessional employee experienced in working with young people to ensure the groups are focused and have clear outcomes. The results of both the counselling and the groups will be greater engagement of the young people with their local community, a facilitation of understanding between different cultures and generations and less antisocial behaviour.</p>	£25,000
558479	Health Wealth	Health Wealth Community	<p>Health Wealth is a Social Enterprise that has quality of life at the heart of its agenda. The objective is to improve the lifestyles of the infirm, carers, the elderly and lone parents with young children. Health Wealth will liaise with GP Practices in the Southwark area, who have a community gardening scheme in place or can see the value of its patients being involved with one. We will take these referrals and bridge the gap that supports them becoming part of a local community garden and a best life advocate. Isolation and low self-esteem can be the malaise of the long term ill, the elderly and those isolated by an 'at home' existence. This can develop because of on-going illness and seclusion and simply not having an age appropriate peer group to communicate with. Through Health Wealth we will educate and support our members with a series of e short courses, practical and informative cookery demonstrations and food product design and prototyping. We are developing a framework through which to monitor and evaluate the impact of the project on the health and well being of beneficiaries and the ability of services to become economically self-sustaining.</p>	£7,830

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558412	London Bubble Theatre	Rotherhithe Shed: social & creative activities for older people	<p>Rotherhithe Shed addresses the social isolation and loneliness of older people and vulnerable adults, problems that are demonstrated to have a serious, long-term and detrimental impact upon their health and wellbeing. Based on the successful Australian Men's Shed movement, it operates out of a well-equipped workshop space with participants working together on a range of making, mending activities, supported by a trained artist/maker. It offers a chance to make new friends, to experience the camaraderie of working with other people or simply putting practical skills to good use. The Shed has been running successfully for over a year at Bubble HQ, and so far has targeted residents of North Southwark and Rotherhithe. We now want to widen the offer across Bermondsey and Rotherhithe and include other wards (particularly Camberwell Green, Peckham and Livesey which have the highest registered population aged 65+ and rate high on the deprivation index). We will connect with agencies working with isolated people by holding launch events in partnership with organisations such as The Black Elderly group and Age UK in Peckham.</p> <p>Rotherhithe Shed directly addresses the adult priorities of Southwark's (2013) Health and Wellbeing Strategy: Building healthier and more resilient communities and tackling the root causes of ill health. Local housing scheme residents report that they often live lonely socially isolated lives, either through poor health, disability or lack of friends and support networks. The project also fits with central government agenda to maintain independence of older people, and chimes with national campaigns such as the Campaign to End Loneliness (2013) that targets loneliness in older people. Over 40 weekly sessions, Rotherhithe Shed will offer a safe creative and social space for 40-50 isolated Southwark residents. Skilled artists and technical experts will be available to support the participants, and participants' ideas will be strongly encouraged.</p>	£6,135
558430	Millwall Community Trust	Girls & Women's Music to Football Programme	<p>Millwall Community Trust has a proven track record of delivering successful social inclusion activities for young people throughout Southwark and Lewisham. Our current and more recent delivery of the Premier League Kicks programme which provides opportunities for young people aged 12-18 has seen Millwall achieve the highest engagement levels for 14 plus year olds nationally. Millwall Community Trust is proud to also have the most sustained young people at this age group, also on a nationally level. In recent month, the partners involved in Premier League Kicks which includes the Metropolitan Police, local youth services and youth offending services and of course the Premier League, have highlighted the need to provide more opportunities for young females to access. There is also a growing concern for young females being targeted into gang related activities both on a national and local level. The idea for the proposed "Girls and Women's Music to Football programme" is to continue working with our current partners and also develop new partnerships with other local agencies to provide structured fun activities on a weekly basis throughout the year which local</p>	£5,000 (each cc)

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558650	Peckham Pride Basketball Club	Basketball For Everyone	<p>young females can access for free. The Music to Football activities which is also known as Soccer Size, has recently been developed by the Football League's Female Football Development team where a number of FA qualified female coaches from Millwall Community Trust have been trained. In addition to these activities, a number of educational awareness workshops will be provided to the young females engaged in the programme which include; gender related violence, personal safety, gang related awareness, child exploitation and sexual health.</p> <p>Southwark has a high level of childhood obesity, with 44% of children in year six being classed as overweight or obese. It has also been argued that Southwark has an increasing level of obesity and excess weight in adults, with the Evening Standard recently highlighting Southwark as having the 'worst obesity levels in London'. Unfortunately, the number of people in Southwark being physically active is also decreasing with only 36.0% of adults aged 16+ participating 1 x 30 minutes of physical activity a week. In addition Southwark has a high level of deprivation, with several Lower Super Output Areas fitting into the top 10% most deprived wards in the country. We are looking to run programmes for young people aged 5-21. We run a programme for everyone, with boys sessions, girl's sessions and disability sessions – catering for all abilities, backgrounds and ages.</p> <p>We use Basketball as the vehicle to engage young people into a positive activity. They learn discipline, leadership skills and team work skills, while getting active and healthy. Our programme aims to impact on key local issues, whether it's reducing the levels of childhood obesity by giving young people an accessible and affordable activity, or reducing anti-social behaviour by giving young people a diversionary activity that appeals to marginalised and hard to reach young people, or giving disabled children a chance to play, compete and be involved in an inclusive activity. We believe that basketball can significantly impact on local issues, providing young people with much needed training and development opportunities.</p>	£5,000

We aim to share a wide variety of interesting activities with older people in Southwark. We have no paid staff so that the planning, coordination and delivery of our activities is entirely done by unpaid members. Our members come from a wide range of social, cultural, religious and ethnic backgrounds.</p> <p>Our project is valued by older people who live alone and particularly by those who have been recently bereaved. Our members make friends with each other and visit places in a group which they would never think of visiting on their own.</p>	£4,500

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558392	Southwark Neighbourhood Watch Association	Finding Solutions: Anti Social Behaviour	<p>A member of the Committee leads each outing to provide support and make sure members get to the right place. Some people have mobility problems and are very elderly so it is important to pace ourselves accordingly. There is little doubt that our activities contribute to improved emotional and physical health for our members. Most of our visits take us outside Southwark but I have marked the wards above within Southwark which we have visited in the last year.</p> <p>Antisocial Behaviour and especially noise nuisance is a high volume crime and one of the most issues reported to SNHW, the police, Southwark anti-social behaviour Unit, Ward Panels, Councillors, Southwark Safer Neighbourhood Board affecting very estate and neighbourhood in Southwark. It affects cohesion, seriously damages the social fabric of communities in Southwark and degrades quality of life. How to tackle it and encourage the community to report it remains an important issue. This conference will focus purely on Anti-Social Behaviour and will explore how it can be addressed with "low tech" community solutions in light of radical budgetary cuts to the Council, Police and Social Services. It will bring together all sections of the community - residents from estates and neighbourhoods in Southwark, community organisations, TRAs, TMOs, Councillors, Police and Ward Panel representatives from Livesey Ward and North Southwark Wards Southwark Safer Neighbour Board and seek and offer solutions to this problem.</p>	<p>£2,150 (each cc event)</p>
539876	Southwark Playhouse	Elders Company	<p>Weekly drama workshops at Southwark Playhouse, led by a professional facilitator, these will develop participants' skills, confidence and abilities, and provide them with an opportunity to meet others with similar interests. Across the year, we would hope to engage 40 – 60 people, recruiting on a rolling basis. We will predominantly advertise in Southwark, and will also seek referrals from local organisations such as the Blackfriars Settlement and Pembroke House.</p> <p>In 2016, performances will include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Devised pieces, taking a theme and utilising stories and memories. ▪ A piece by Shakespeare, or inspired by him. ▪ A collaboration with our Young Company. <p>We would also look at performing in local schools, as part of a project looking at perceptions of age. The members will be 65 and over, but the focus will very much be on creating theatre and taking part in fun, enjoyable workshops. 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558468	Walworth Amateur Sport Programme	Supporting Community Sport Clubs	<p>Walworth Amateur Sport Programme's (Walworth ASP) purpose is to help local sport clubs, from across the central wards of Southwark, in developing their capacity to provide strong, sustainable and cohesive community programmes which will improve the life chances of children and young people through sport. Walworth ASP's objective is to assist more clubs to make sporting opportunities more accessible to children and young people across the central wards of Southwark.</p> <p>It is common knowledge that most community programmes are delivered by local volunteers who are passionate and want to make a difference in their communities and the lives of the young people. However, through lack of information, not having relevant training and qualifications, and limited resources – time, people, financial –, these community champions find it very challenging to continue providing their much needed services in their local communities and eventually stop providing the opportunities for children and young people to participate in organised sport.</p> <p>To be awarded funding by the Community Councils will enable Walworth ASP to continue offering its expert services of establishing and sustaining community clubs, both newly created and/or fledgling organisation which are in need of support and operational guidance. The organisation is currently working with two local clubs, one based in the Newington Ward (Mighty Royals Football Club formed in 2015) and the other in Faraday Ward (Walworth Knights Football Club formed in 2013). Walworth ASP has helped Walworth Knights become a registered club with the London Football Association (FA), have policies and operating procedures installed, and helped create a football development plan which is monitored using the FA's activity management system named UPSHOT.</p> <p>Walworth ASP provides its services free of charge to clubs and all funds received will be used to help community clubs make sport more accessible to more local residents in Southwark.</p>	£5,018

In 2016 BOST wants to build on this work to keep the momentum and also start to target the wider community such as local businesses and their employees. We will deliver a series of workshops run at a variety of times (including evenings, lunchtimes and weekends to be accessible to the broader community) to engage more people in their local green space, connect with nature and learn about how to be greener in their community. The workshops will consist of topics such as growing plants from seeds, wildlife talks, composting and recycling. It will also promote a new event in September, the Food Show, which will serve as a successor to the BOST Flower & Vegetable Show. The Food Show will have the same competition element of the F&V Show (with entries encouraged through the workshops and Green Fair) but use talks, activities and entertainment to bring people together and celebrate urban growing and gardening during the harvest time of year.</p> <p>The proposed project supplements an existing after-school programme piloted at Marlborough Sports Garden during 2015. The aim of the programme is to facilitate after-school sport and physical activity for children and young people, promoting wellbeing and a healthy lifestyle. Relunched in 2016, the programme builds on successful delivery of coached after-school sport, including tennis, hockey, football and multi-sport and free play facilitated by sessional staff providing play equipment such as pole tennis, hoola hoops, skipping ropes, table tennis, bats and balls, etc.</p> <p>Based on feedback from parents, the new programme includes a project to sustain our sport and physical activity offering through the school holidays, including half terms and summer. A holiday programme provides the opportunity to deliver taster sessions and run local tournaments and it aids the community in maintaining a high level of engagement with the Sports Garden throughout the year. We believe this is important to address the problem of high levels of childhood obesity in our borough by facilitating access to sport and physical activity.</p> <p>The updated programme puts in place measures to reach out to children and young adults from BAME groups and those facing socio-economic deprivation. This outreach is facilitated by a member of staff responsible for developing existing relationships and forging new ones with local schools, community groups, resident associations, and businesses. The brief includes targeting low participation among girls, which we set out to address through a dedicated netball programme linked to the 'Back to Netball' campaign.</p> <p>The proposed project is supported by the installation in 2016 of a state of the art netball court as well as extensive upgrades that include improvements to the sand court and facilities for a number of street games such as Four Square and hopscotch to supplement existing patball, ping pong and Ultimate Frisbee.</p>	£5,000

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558368	Coin Street Centre Trust	Celebrating Oxo Tower Wharf	<p>An intergenerational creative project in partnership with the local community to celebrate 20 years since the regeneration of Oxo Tower Wharf, an award-winning mixed use development of co-operative homes, retail design studios, specialist shops, galleries, cafes and bars.</p> <p>Delivering creative workshops for different community groups, including Oxo Tower residents, other local residents, children and young people and older people. The workshops would explore a range of media including; art, dance, music, creative writing and performance. The project would work towards a performance/exhibition in September 2016 where the groups would share their work and celebrate the local community. Themes would include of history of the local area, co-ops and social housing, urban regeneration and community and, where possible, will provide opportunities for interaction between different age groups. Coin Street has a track record of delivering similar projects, including heritage projects in the local area which resulted in high quality multi-media exhibitions (see www.waterloosightsandsounds.org)</p> <p>The project has been identified as the Southbank is a very busy tourist area which is undergoing lots of development and it can leave local residents feeling shut out, disenfranchised and isolated. Initial discussions with the Oxo Co-op residents have been positive and they are keen to shape and develop the project. The initiative will benefit the local community through offering free opportunities to learn and develop creative skills, share their ideas and work, explore a range of issues and celebrate their community. Bringing people together will promote better understanding between the age groups and creating more local networks. The project will employ experienced local workshop leaders to deliver elements of the project which will help the local economy and will be led by a steering group of local stakeholders.</p>	£4,950

A 2014 report from the London School of Economics states that: "Pornography tops children's online concerns" and "33% of 13-14 year olds saw sexual images on or off line in 2014 and 44% of 15-16 year olds saw sexual images on or off line in 2014". 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			<p>We are organising a community music festival, to take place on 16th July 2016, featuring a variety of genres to bring the community together and to showcase emerging talent and participatory musical activities. Whilst there are other local festivals, our unique focus on music provides a platform for performers to break into the festival circuit. By paying musicians expenses we can extend the opportunity to musicians from diverse backgrounds and ensure an exciting mix of experienced and new performers. 2016 will be the 3rd year for the festival. Attendance was around 400 people in 2014 rising to around 1300 in 2015. We hope for an even larger audience this year, boosted by the fact that the 2016 date will not clash with Eid. In our 2015 audience survey, nineteen out of twenty-one people agreed 'This kind of event makes me feel more connected to the local community'. We aim to build on our good relationship with other local organisations and businesses, in particular Better Bankside, Blackfriars Settlement, Blackfriars Scenery, Borough Studios, Community Action Southwark, Mint Street Adventure Playground, Mint Street Playgroup and Volunteer Centre Southwark. We also have support from Peabody community investment team, with a good chance of receiving their funding as we did last year. Working with these groups has helped us gain a diverse audience, in terms of age and ethnicity. Our volunteers gain valuable skills and we have provided a number of references. 10 out of 11 volunteers surveyed agreed 'I would volunteer again at next year's festival'. We plan to provide further opportunities for volunteers in the run-up on the festival day, including organisational and PR activities and creative workshops. We will seek additional funding to pay project management costs, enhance the children's area and to make additional volunteer activities possible.</p>	
558387	Mint Street Music Festival Team / Plane Tree Arts	Great Suffolk Street Mardi Gras	<p>We're planning a community celebration and parade for Pancake Day/Carnival/Mardi Gras (the same day) on Tuesday 28th of February 2017, bringing together English, Latin American and other global traditions for the day. Starting in the pedestrianised area of Price's Street, a carnival parade will move down Great Suffolk Street, culminating in a celebration at Great Suffolk Street Parade, between Sudrey Street and Toulmin Street.</p> <p>The event is at a time of year which is cold, dark and when people may feel particularly isolated from friends and neighbours as people tend to stay indoors. Fresh pancakes from local café's will be given as prizes for competitions.</p> <p>To extend the event to a parade starting from Price's Street, we will draw on the experience and contacts from programming Open Streets on Great Suffolk Street in 2015. We will also seek the support of the City of London, who are funding the 2016 event, and Better Bankside. If targets for further funding cannot be reached, the event can be scaled down to take place in a smaller section of Great Suffolk Street – but with contacts from Open Streets 2015 and Mardi Gras 2016, we're confident people will be keen to get involved in Mardi Gras 2017.</p>	£10,000
558473	Southwark Cathedral Education Centre	Southwark Cathedral Education Centre – 80 trails for Southwark	<p>Mint St Adventure Playground has been running for over 30 years. Two years ago the Council agreed to allocate money for a much needed new building, which is still at the design stages. Meanwhile, the Council has just announced that the hours of all the play workers are going to be cut, and that includes Mint St. The new building will not be ready for another 18months/2 years and we feel that it is important to retain the current staffing levels until the new building is finished, as it is vital to maintain continuity of staff/service during the upheaval of the build programme. We are applying for the funding to make up for the shortfall in wages/hours for the staff.</p> <p>“Wow! Wow! WOW!” This is how one seven year old, visiting with her school, described walking into Southwark Cathedral for the first time. But without the work of SCEC, many of Southwark’s children would never have this experience. Our unique project is needed because it ensures both that local schools can access one of the most historic buildings in Southwark and that they access Learning Outside the Classroom (LOTC) – curriculum-focused activities that support children’s learning in the classroom.</p> <p>OFSTED views LOTC as an essential element of the curriculum – but many Southwark schools find it challenging to provide high-quality, open-to-all, accessibly-priced LOTC in the inner city. This is where SCEC comes in.
