"Could it please be explained when and how TfL and Southwark Council will review the effects of the highway changes at the Elephant & Castle, with a full description of the methodology to be used for any such review, with particular regard to:  o the operations of London buses and the costs and inconvenience to bus passengers arising from additional delays caused by the changes;  o pollution resulting from additional queuing traffic on approach roads to the Elephant & Castle;  additional costs to highway users, and the local economy, arising from the delays;  what aspects of the new highway lay-out could be modified in order to relieve any unacceptable costs arising form the above and other factors?"	From Transport for London (TfL):  "The impact of this scheme on traffic, including buses and bus passengers, the environment, quality of life and economy are assessed in a business case. At TfL, we use a uniform framework to prepare, evaluate and present business cases across the organisation as a whole. Business cases are required throughout the life of a project and the business case for the Elephant and Castle improvement scheme is due to be reviewed once the works are completed.  I can assure you that the design of any aspect of the new highway layout would be subject to a review if any unacceptable impacts are identified, either through the road safety audit, the business case process, or through our on-going site observations as the works continue." "How many deaf and hard-of-hearing people are there in the borough, and in East Walworth ward?"	Southwark's adult services department have a register of 474 people with hearing impairments in the borough, 66 of which are resident in SE17. These figures are not broken down by ward.  There are 238 children/young people with a diagnosed permanent hearing impairment of different degrees who are Southwark residents.
