558316	David Idowu Foundation	David Idowu Foundation Youth_Ink	<p>Our pilot Project, YOUTH_INK, aims to engage with young people through peer-led youth participation within the community and the criminal justice system to up-skill and inspire young people to participate in their own learning through peer-led personal and social development linked to our Youth_Ink ETL model. The Foundation and Southwark Youth Offending Services will work together to empower people to tell their own story, in their own way and with their own lived experience. 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558794	Faces in Focus	Counselling and Self-advocacy for Young People 11-25	<p>Face in Focus provides an extremely valuable service for Southwark young people aged 11-25 who would not be eligible to access NHS or other talking therapy services and we receive referrals from every ward in the borough.</p> <p>As well as continuing to provide counselling, we also wish to launch a young people's self-advocacy group or groups, the aim of which will be to provide a welcoming space in which young people can come together and discuss issues such as knife crime, forced marriage, sex, health, sexual health and any other matters on their minds or of concern to them. The groups will explore and attempt to overcome the barriers that inhibit young people across the borough from reaching their full potential. The service and the proposed groups are needed because they offer routes to empowerment and improved self-confidence and also act as a preventative and diversionary measure.</p> <p>Counselling and group sessions will take place weekly. The groups will involve the planning of activities and outings away from the area to provide tasters of activities not normally available to the young people involved. They may also involve art and drama, meetings with officials and even elected Members to facilitate an understanding of the democratic process. They may also plan visits to local community agencies where there may be relevant volunteering or work opportunities.</p> <p>With the groups it is the intention that the content, planning and resulting activities will be decided and led by the young people, facilitated by a sessional employee experienced in working with young people to ensure the groups are focused and have clear outcomes. The results of both the counselling and the groups will be greater engagement of the young people with their local community, a facilitation of understanding between different cultures and generations and less antisocial behaviour.</p>	£25,000

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558479	Health Wealth	Health Wealth Community	<p>Health Wealth is a Social Enterprise that has quality of life at the heart of its agenda. The objective is to improve the lifestyles of the infirm, carers, the elderly and lone parents with young children. Health Wealth will liaise with GP Practices in the Southwark area, who have a community gardening scheme in place or can see the value of its patients being involved with one. We will take these referrals and bridge the gap that supports them becoming part of a local community garden and a best life advocate. Isolation and low self-esteem can be the malaise of the long term ill, the elderly and those isolated by an 'at home' existence. This can develop because of ongoing illness and seclusion and simply not having an age appropriate peer group to communicate with. Through Health Wealth we will educate and support our members with a series of e short courses, practical and informative cookery demonstrations and food product design and prototyping. We are developing a framework through which to monitor and evaluate the impact of the project on the health and well being of beneficiaries and the ability of services to become economically self-sustaining.</p>	£7,830
557986	Link Age Southwark	Communities Reducing Social Isolation for Older People	<p>We are seeking funds to support and retain 5 volunteers from the local area to provide transport and deliver two activity groups to benefit 20 older, isolated people in the Camberwell CC Area. Services are co-ordinated by paid staff and delivered by local volunteers. Our co-ordinator recruits volunteers and matches their skills and availability to the location, needs and interests of our service users. Volunteers make it possible for older people from across the CC area to engage in two groups which meet at the Fox on the Hill pub, an accessible location in the community. One group is specifically for men – activities include dominos, reminiscence and social interaction. The second is a lunch group, where attendees enjoy eating a meal together – something they otherwise have no opportunity to do.</p> <p>Our volunteers facilitate the groups and provide transport for those who can't travel alone, ensuring that older people can remain active and engaged in their community and can participate when they would otherwise not be able to.</p> <p>Older people, particularly men, are vulnerable to social isolation and loneliness as mobility reduces, health deteriorates and family and peers move away or die. Over half of all older people consider television as their main form of company and 10% have contact with friends, family and neighbours less than once a month. Loneliness brings risks of serious physical and mental health problems.</p> <p>Our groups and volunteers reduce loneliness and isolation, improving quality of life and health and wellbeing. Our groups promote mental stimulation, friendship and social interaction.</p> <p>Our groups are the only social interactions that many of our users have outside the home. The average age of our users is 82 and over 20% are over 90 years old. Our work promotes a stronger, richer and age-friendly local community.</p>	£1,611

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558412	London Bubble Theatre	Rotherhithe Shed: social & creative activities for older ppl	<p>Rotherhithe Shed addresses the social isolation and loneliness of older people and vulnerable adults, problems that are demonstrated to have a serious, long-term and detrimental impact upon their health and wellbeing. Based on the successful Australian Men's Shed movement, it operates out of a well-equipped workshop space with participants working together on a range of making, mending activities, supported by a trained artist/maker. It offers a chance to make new friends, to experience the camaraderie of working with other people or simply putting practical skills to good use. The Shed has been running successfully for over a year at Bubble HQ, and so far has targeted residents of North Southwark and Rotherhithe. We now want to widen the offer across Bermondsey and Rotherhithe and include other wards (particularly Camberwell Green, Peckham and Livesey which have the highest registered population aged 65+ and rate high on the deprivation index). We will connect with agencies working with isolated people by holding launch events in partnership with organisations such as The Black Elderly group and Age UK in Peckham.</p> <p>Rotherhithe Shed directly addresses the adult priorities of Southwark's (2013) Health and Wellbeing Strategy: Building healthier and more resilient communities and tackling the root causes of ill health. Local housing scheme residents report that they often live lonely socially isolated lives, either through poor health, disability or lack of friends and support networks. The project also fits with central government agenda to maintain independence of older people, and chimes with national campaigns such as the Campaign to End Loneliness (2013) that targets loneliness in older people. Over 40 weekly sessions, Rotherhithe Shed will offer a safe creative and social space for 40-50 isolated Southwark residents. Skilled artists and technical experts will be available to support the participants, and participants' ideas will be strongly encouraged.</p>	£6,135

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558430	Millwall Community Trust	Girls & Women's Music to Football Programme	<p>Millwall Community Trust has a proven track record of delivering successful social inclusion activities for young people throughout Southwark and Lewisham. Our current and more recent delivery of the Premier League Kicks programme which provides opportunities for young people aged 12-18 has seen Millwall achieve the highest engagement levels for 14 plus year olds nationally.</p> <p>Millwall Community Trust is proud to also have the most sustained young people at this age group, also on a nationally level. In recent month, the partners involved in Premier League Kicks which includes the Metropolitan Police, local youth services and youth offending services and of course the Premier League, have highlighted the need to provide more opportunities for young females to access.</p> <p>There is also a growing concern for young females being targeted into gang related activities both on a national and local level. The idea for the proposed "Girls and Women's Music to Football programme" is to continue working with our current partners and also develop new partnerships with other local agencies to provide structured fun activities on a weekly basis throughout the year which local young females can access for free. The Music to Football activities which is also known as Soccer Size, has recently been developed by the Football League's Female Football Development team where a number of FA qualified female coaches from Millwall Community Trust have been trained. In addition to these activities, a number of educational awareness workshops will be provided to the young females engaged in the programme which include; gender related violence, personal safety, gang related awareness, child exploitation and sexual health.</p>	£5,000

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557134	OBAC - (Organisation of Blind Africans & Caribbeans)	Promoting wellbeing and independence for the disabled	<p>The project will target 75 BAME disabled people in particular sensory impaired and their families living in Camberwell. It will focus on providing a forum whereby beneficiaries can meet together and be informed of health and general well being strategies through coffee mornings and workshops once a month. We will focus on the following health topics;</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) CHD/Stroke – This will cover stress management and Coronary Heart Disease and Stroke. Health professionals will provide information and advice on symptoms and causes of stroke and appropriate diet. 2) Diabetes – health promotion workshop on Diabetes. Speakers from Diabetes Clinic, Diabetes UK and Dietician to inform the clients what services are available and what they need to do to manage and control diabetes. 3) Glaucoma - raising the awareness of glaucoma and going form eye tests 4) Listening to the radio - the benefits of listening to the radio to reduce isolation. 5) Healthy Eating and coping skills - coping with health issues and how to cope in different situations 6) Renal Failure - 7) Managing family finance - (overcoming anxiety and stress) 8) Sexual Health – We will focus on HIV/AIDS. We held a workshop in this area last year and beneficiaries have indicated through feedback that they would like another workshop on this subject. <p>Research has confirmed that there is a high incidence of CHD/Stroke and Diabetes amongst African and Caribbean people; this situation will be more profound amongst visually impaired people, partly due to conditions such as Diabetes, Glaucoma and Sickle Cell anemia. As a result of these conditions they often times experience poor health issues and feel isolated; this is reinforced by feelings of cultural alienation leading to the client group not accessing services. The project will impact on the local community by raising awareness and improve access to health services.</p>	£4,681

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558650	Peckham Pride Basketball Club	Basketball for everyone	<p>Southwark has a high level of childhood obesity, with 44% of children in year six being classed as overweight or obese. It has also been argued that Southwark has an increasing level of obesity and excess weight in adults, with the Evening Standard recently highlighting Southwark as having the 'worst obesity levels in London'. Unfortunately, the number of people in Southwark being physically active is also decreasing with only 36.0% of adults aged 16+ participating 1 x 30 minutes of physical activity a week. In addition Southwark has a high level of deprivation, with several Lower Super Output Areas fitting into the top 10% most deprived wards in the country.</p> <p>We are looking to run programmes for young people aged 5-21. We run a programme for everyone, with boys sessions, girl's sessions and disability sessions – catering for all abilities, backgrounds and ages.</p> <p>We use Basketball as the vehicle to engage young people into a positive activity. They learn discipline, leadership skills and team work skills, while getting active and healthy. Our programme aims to impact on key local issues, whether it's reducing the levels of childhood obesity by giving young people an accessible and affordable activity, or reducing anti-social behaviour by giving young people a diversionary activity that appeals to marginalised and hard to reach young people, or giving disabled children a chance to play, compete and be involved in an inclusive activity.</p> <p>We believe that basketball can significantly impact on local issues, providing young people with much needed training and development opportunities.</p>	£5,000

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558361	SE5 Forum for Camberwell	SE5 Forum for Camberwell Community Outreach Project	<p>SE5 Forum is a grassroots, non-political, umbrella organisation that exists to work for the improvement of Camberwell to benefit all members of our diverse community. SE5 Forum would like to increase their public presence in Camberwell to build trust, liaise with and better understand the needs of the community and strengthen the local voice. Objectives: Sustain our presence at the weekly Farmers market. Our presence at the weekly Farmers market allows us to directly speak with local people giving them an opportunity to air any concerns or compliments they have about Camberwell. This directly benefits them as the SE5 team member can point them to the right organisation to take an issue of concern to. We would like to invest in a better gazebo to support SE5 Forum's mission at the market and enhance our future presence at the market. -Reach out to more diverse members of the community We would also like to offer more opportunities for our diverse community and public service providers to discuss ideas on how to make Camberwell a better place to live.</p> <p>SE5 Forum would like to run and facilitate a regular series of open forums until March 2017 for local people to attend, share ideas and information, raise concerns and I seek shared consensus on solutions. -Commission local artists and designers to design new materials and merchandise promoting Camberwell. To date we have commissioned Camberwell and SE5 Forum themed merchandise designed by local designers and artists. We have partnered with Camberwell Arts Festival, the Camberwell Society and PACT by selling supporting merchandise. These have proven very popular and we would like to ensure we continue to respond to the appetite for Camberwell badged material. Selling merchandise also generates income for SE5 Forum enabling us to be more self-sustaining in the future.</p>	£4,000
556868	Southwark Explorers Club	Southwark Explorers' Club	<p>We organise weekly visits by Southwark Pensioners to places of cultural, artistic and historic interest at affordable cost. We aim to share a wide variety of interesting activities with older people in Southwark. We have no paid staff so that the planning, coordination and delivery of our activities is entirely done by unpaid members. Our members come from a wide range of social, cultural, religious and ethnic backgrounds.</p> <p>Our project is valued by older people who live alone and particularly by those who have been recently bereaved. Our members make friends with each other and visit places in a group which they would never think of visiting on their own. A member of the Committee leads each outing to provide support and make sure members get to the right place. Some people have mobility problems and are very elderly so it is important to pace ourselves accordingly. There is little doubt that our activities contribute to improved emotional and physical health for our members. Most of our visits take us outside Southwark but I have marked the wards above within Southwark which we have visited in the last year.</p>	£4,500

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558392	Southwark Neighbourhood Watch Association	Finding Solutions: Anti Social Behaviour	<p>Antisocial Behaviour and especially noise nuisance is a high volume crime and one of the most issues reported to SNHW, the police, Southwark anti-social behaviour Unit, Ward Panels, Councillors, Southwark Safer Neighbourhood Board affecting very estate and neighbourhood in Southwark. It affects cohesion, seriously damages the social fabric of communities in Southwark and degrades quality of life. How to tackle it and encourage the community to report it remains an important issue.</p> <p>This conference will focus purely on Anti -Social Behaviour and will explore how it can be addressed with "low tech" community solutions in light of radical budgetary cuts to the Council, Police and Social Services. It will bring together all sections of the community - residents from estates and neighborhoods in Southwark, community organisations, TRAs, TMOs, Councillors, Police and Ward Panel representatives from Livesey Ward and North Southwark Wards Southwark Safer Neighbour Board and seek and offer solutions to this problem.</p>	£2150
539876	Southwark Playhouse	Elders Company	<p>Weekly drama workshops at Southwark Playhouse, led by a professional facilitator, these will develop participants' skills, confidence and abilities, and provide them with an opportunity to meet others with similar interests.</p> <p>Across the year, we would hope to engage 40 – 60 people, recruiting on a rolling basis. We will predominantly advertise in Southwark, and will also seek referrals from local organisations such as the Blackfriars Settlement and Pembroke House.</p> <p>In 2016, performances will include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Devised pieces, taking a theme and utilising stories and memories. - A piece by Shakespeare, or inspired by him. - A collaboration with our Young Company. <p>We would also look at performing in local schools, as part of a project looking at perceptions of age.</p> <p>The work we create will all be developed out of ideas from group members. The project will not be focused on age. The members will be 65 and over, but the focus will very much be on creating theatre and taking part in fun, enjoyable workshops. As well as all of the activity, we hope to continue to build upon the strong group friendships forged thus far.</p>	£2,700

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558468	Walworth Amateur Sport Programme	Supporting Community Sport Clubs	<p>Walworth Amateur Sport Programme's (Walworth ASP) purpose is to help local sport clubs, from across the central wards of Southwark, in developing their capacity to provide strong, sustainable and cohesive community programmes which will improve the life chances of children and young people through sport. Walworth ASP's objective is to assist more clubs to make sporting opportunities more accessible to children and young people across the central wards of Southwark. It is common knowledge that most community programmes are delivered by local volunteers who are passionate and want to make a difference in their communities and the lives of the young people. However, through lack of information, not having relevant training and qualifications, and limited resources – time, people, financial –, these community champions find it very challenging to continue providing their much needed services in their local communities and eventually stop providing the opportunities for children and young people to participate in organised sport. To be awarded funding by the Community Councils will enable Walworth ASP to continue offering its expert services of establishing and sustaining community clubs, both newly created and/or fledgling organisation which are in need of support and operational guidance. The organisation is currently working with two local clubs, one based in the Newington Ward (Mighty Royals Football Club formed in 2015) and the other in Faraday Ward (Walworth Knights Football Club formed in 2013). Walworth ASP has helped Walworth Knights become a registered club with the London Football Association (FA), have policies and operating procedures installed, and helped create a football development plan which is monitored using the FA's activity management system named UPSHOT. Walworth ASP provides its services free of charge to clubs and all funds received will be used to help community clubs make sport more accessible to more local residents in Southwark.</p>	£5,018

555000	CAMBERWELL ARTS	MADE IN CAMBERWELL ARTS MARKET	<p>Made In Camberwell Arts Market is an exciting opportunity for local artists, makers and creators to present their work for sale to the public: giving them a platform from which to launch their own small creative businesses. Our USP is focusing on stallholders with a connection to Camberwell: Whether they are residents, alumni, or work in the area. We propose to create a quarterly arts Market on Datchelor Place SE5 7AP 4 times a year. (Early April / Mid June / Mid September / Early December) We will host a mix of curated stallholders plus a number of free stalls to local first-time makers (whom we be select by liaising with local stakeholders to find suitable candidates) and offer them support from logistics to marketing. At the event itself, we propose to offer the taster sessions of creative workshops to the general public – with an emphasis on those creative businesses who offer subsidised or free courses (e.g. Flux Jewellery School), Southwark Adult learning service, as well as promoting local cultural events (Blue Elephant Theatre, Theatre Peckham, Southwark, Camberwell Library etc.) In the last 18 months, we've held 3 markets on a smaller scale, and seen visitor numbers increase each time, and an increase of footfall into local businesses. We are a free un-ticketed event and are unable to gauge exact visitor numbers, however in December 2015 we clicked in over 1000 people across the day. We intend to build on this successful start to make Datchelor Place a regular destination for local creative shopping, and promote the importance of a creative Camberwell for both the makers themselves, but just as importantly, to reach out to the residents of Camberwell, and encourage them to expand their own creative skills through the wealth of creative services the area has to offer.</p>	£5,000

558143	Permaculture Pioneers	Visuals aids for people with special needs.	<p>This is a new project which aims to provide training, give voluntary opportunities and/or employ people with special needs on the London Living Wage to produce visual aids for use in schools, businesses and the public, social and voluntary sectors.</p> <p>It is needed because in special needs educational settings students are taught how to communicate using visual communication strategies. However, in the wider community there is a lack of this type of communication. The consequences of this are discriminatory.</p> <p>As well as this there is a lack of continuity which means the students with special needs who have been educated are likely to lose the incentive to communicate. This is counterproductive and wasteful. Talented neglected special needs students will eventually revert back to isolation and exclusion which will reduce their ability to thrive and deprive our community of the talent, diversity, skills, abilities and joy of having a fully inclusive community.</p>	£4,110

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558121	Safe'N'Sound Youth Project	Unity in our Community	<p>Much of our support has been around young people but we have identified the need to support community members. Our proposal is to set up a community support hub led by the community that would provide a place where community members can come for advice and support enabling them to develop tactical solutions to our youth problems. This project will encourage communities from all backgrounds to come together in a safe space where they are able to express themselves, interact with families that have been directly affected through youth violence and develop real tangible and effective opportunities and platforms for sustained changes within their communities. This will be achieved by holding social meetings in discussing solutions to youth issues, support groups for those affected and the setting up of a confidential information line for third party reporting. Our main focus is to develop a community that is united rather than divided when incidence such as knife/gun crime affects our community</p> <p>Our targeted areas will be communities that we have identified as being hot spot areas such as the Cossall Estate, Yellow Brick and Letsom Estate.
