Southwark is proposing a CPZ (controlled parking zone) **RESIDENT PERMIT HOLDERS ONLY** and on the remaining roads charging **£2.70 per hour** (max 4 hrs stay) **between 8.30am and 6.30pm** (using pay by phone so you will require a credit/debit card)

Anyone can object to the proposals (not only residents)

The roads which will be effected are:

SHENLEY ROAD, CROFTON ROAD, TALFOURD ROAD, BUSHEY HILL ROAD, AZENBY ROAD, CROSS ROAD, MCNEIL ROAD, LYDNDHURST GROVE.

Roads which would become Permit holders only are:

DENMAN ROAD, GAIRLOCH ROAD, OSWYTH ROAD, TALFOURD PLACE.

The council has a responsibility to manage parking, there needs to be provision made for free parking for the service providers and users of the facilities in the area!

This is particularly important for staff and users of Sunshine house Children's centre, those bereaved or with newborn babies registering births and deaths (statutory requirement) at the Registry Office, unwell visiting St. Giles GP surgery, visitors to UAL, and the South London Art Gallery, to name just some.

This proposal by Southwark has been initiated by a *small group of well organised residents on one road*, a significant number of other residents are unaware of the proposals and the implications for them regarding visitor parking.

Dear Sir/Madam,

Could I please bring to your attention an error relating to a disabled parking bay on the plan which accompanies the public notice re the Peckham Road south parking zone.

At the southernmost extremity of Crofton Road, the part that loops round from Lyndhurst Grove, you have marked two disabled parking bays. The right hand one of these, outside 136 Crofton Road, is no longer in use. The road markings were painted over and the sign removed some years ago. This could very quickly be verified by a council officer visiting the location.

This error was also in the feasibility study published last autumn and we brought it to Southwark's attention at the time (see below) but it seems the mistake has been carried forward to the final version.

Even with permits parking will still be at a premium in the area so the fewer unnecessary restrictions, such as disabled parking bays that are no longer required, the better.

I hope this error will be rectified and that no disabled parking bay is allocated to that particular location.

I am responding to the notice relating to the above that I have noticed on lamp posts near my house. There is a lot of information in the notice and I had some difficulty writing down all the details needed to be able to review and question and comment.

It is at the least unfortunate that you did not send letters to all houses. By using lamp posts you may be sure only those very keen to be involved will be responding now.

I have been provided (by asking specifically – **and it must be wrong that the answers to the original questionnaire are not on line**) with the breakdown of the answers to question 7 which show that “if parking restrictions were introduced” 161 would want all day and 145 would want part day restrictions. My concern is that in spite of all the other questions this is the only one used by Southwark to make its decision. Question 7 is asking a hypothetical. Question 4 asked whether a parking zone was wanted at all. The answer to this should at least be combined with the answers to question 7 to get a fair assessment of the respondents. This would weight the conclusion away from the all day solution and as only 16 more answered question 7 in favour of all day I submit that the right and democratic conclusion that should be reached is that part day restrictions only should be introduced. **If you disagree with me I should be grateful if you would justify your conclusion.** It is unfortunate that the questionnaire did not have a question asking us to choose between 1. All day; 2. Part day; 3. Two hours only; and 4. No restrictions. I have no doubt that asked in this way the All Day would not have a majority.

Accordingly the questionnaire is slanted to the conclusion that I fear Southwark want which is all day restrictions which give it the greatest income as we will not only have to pay to park our own cars but also for every visitor we receive between 8.30 and 6.30.

I am aware that the way indicated above used by Southwark in its questionnaire is also used by other councils (eg Lambeth) but this does make it any more acceptable or fair. And, I would submit it is vulnerable to challenge by way of judicial review as it takes into consideration things that it should not and fails to consider things that it should.

I would also stress, as I did in the earlier consultation, that the yellow lining of dropped curbs is still further reducing parking and is not necessary. If people park at a dropped curb and the house owner does not like it it only has to inform the parking authority and a ticket follows and soon that sort of infringement will stop. My neighbour has off road parking but is very happy for me to park outside their house when I come home with a load in my car and cannot find other parking nearby, so that I can unload and later move my car to a free parking space. Under your yellow line approach this would no longer be possible. More and more the road traffic rules and restrictions curtail our freedoms and this is not what they should be doing save to the extent reasonably necessary.

Please reconsider both the timing of the proposed parking restrictions and the yellow line dropped curb policy.

Our flat overlooks Vanguard Court. We would like to object to the proposed parking restrictions in surrounding roads. Quite rightly Vanguard Court is not part of the proposed changes. However we feel it will suffer severe consequences if the plan goes ahead. It is predictable that motorists excluded from on road parking will seek out Vanguard Court as a location where they are able to park.

The workshops in Vanguard Court have frequent lorry deliveries, some quite substantial and council refuse lorries empty bins for our block of flats as well as the businesses in Vanguard Court. Manoeuvring around the corners and the existing parked cars is difficult enough already and any additional parked vehicles will only make this more difficult if not impossible.

To whom it may concern

I am emailing to object to the CPZ proposal in roads: Shenley, Crofton, Talfourd, Bushey Hill, Azenby, Cross, McNeil, and Lyndhurst Grove.

My objection is made on the grounds that all these thoroughfares are public routes and free parking must be provided by the council to allow people access to public amenities and community services: Lucas Gardens, the Registry Office, Sunshine House (Children and Adults Health Services), Camberwell School of Arts and galleries etc nearby.

If each of these roads becomes a CPZ access will be denied to a large section of the community unfairly and carry a punitive fee for those meeting statutory obligations registering births and deaths. In addition, many parents of children with complex needs and physical disabilities needing to attend appointments at Sunshine House will have to re-think their transport needs. All of the above should be able to access free road parking as they go about their daily business.

Accepting that parking in these roads is in constant high demand, during daylight hours it is generally of a transitory nature and I feel that commuter parking which is extremely problematic to residents and others could be managed better by restricting parking between noon and 2pm, for example. This would go a considerable way to alleviating the frustrations of residents during the day.

Having spoken to several residents they confirm that spaces are freely available in the early evening and mornings for their own use. They are rightly fearful of the added expense that a CPZ will create for them, a hidden tax on their social and living environment.

Moreover, a considerable amount of inconvenience and take-up of parking spaces is caused by builders' lorries, vans, skips and builders' materials left outside an increasing number of dwellings. Perhaps a licencing scheme may help with this to ease the situation. Home improvements benefit the few rather than the general community and therefore not persuasive as an argument for restricted parking that impacts far more widely.

My name is [REDACTED] and I am a Vanguard Court commercial occupier who has worked on the yard and built up a good business over the past 22 years.

I object to the proposed residents parking zone for the following reasons.

1. The access roadway from Peckham Road to Vanguard Court is the only route in and out of Vanguard Court. Clear access is critical for deliveries to and collections from the businesses in Vanguard Court. The roadway is on unregistered and unadopted land over which tenants in Vanguard Court right of way. There is currently a minor problem with parked vehicles blocking this access road. Should a residents' parking zone be introduced in the area, this roadway will inevitably be subject to overspill parking and the problems will become much worse. It will be almost impossible to prevent this overspill parking given legal status of the roadway. The introduction of a CPZ without the council simultaneously adopting the roadway and controlling parking in it risks severe damage to businesses operating in Vanguard Court with a resultant loss of employment. Approximately 50 small businesses and around 200 people rely on this roadway being clear.

2. The obvious solution is for the council to adopt the roadway and restrict parking in it before the introduction of the CPZ. Despite repeated requests, the council has failed to discuss this option.

3. The council has not followed the correct process of consultation about this proposal. The council undertook on several occasions to put the results of its informal consultation exercise to the Camberwell and the Peckham & Nunhead Community Councils. The informal consultation result has never appeared on the agenda of either community council.

4. The council's informal consultation document did not mention legitimate concerns raised about overspill parking blocking the access road to Vanguard Court which was raised by a number of parties.

I am a long term tenant at Vanguard where I practice as a sculptor. My Landlord has made me aware of the alarming impact of the proposed residents parking zone at Vanguard court. I am disappointed that this issue has not yet been resolved in our favour, as even a brief look at the. circumstances would reveal the ridiculousness of allowing parked cars to block vital access to our workshops. Introducing permits is just a money making scheme for the council and there are a number of people in our street [Gairloch road], including my family who cannot afford this extra expense. Parking permits do not make it easier for people to park. It will probably make the situation worse for us. At the moment there are people in our street who think they have right to be able to park outside their property and put bins etc in the street to save themselves a space.

What will happen if we have permits and the same situation occurs, as it is likely there will actually be less spaces for parking, once the bays have been marked out. This may well lead to some aggressive behaviour. The introduction of permits makes life harder for the poor in many ways: increased cost to any building works, harder for visiting families and friends and general stress created by the reduction of parking spaces and the potential of being fined. There is still poverty in this area. It seems to me that the people with money quite often shout the loudest, especially when it comes to parking and are very happy to pay. This is not right.

I'm writing in regards to the proposal to charge for parking on the above roads.

I will make a few points arguing against it which apply to me, and some which I'm adamant apply to many others.

Though I understand you may need to raise revenue following cuts to your budget, I do have issue with the proposal.

It is difficult for me to visit people sometimes as they already have CPZ so the person I'm visiting must have visitor permits which cost money. If the person I'm visiting doesn't have a car then oftentimes they don't have permits so then I have to pay 2.70 an hour with the risk of a parking ticket, so I just don't visit them.

I also work nights and weekends, I'm on a low income, so is my friend. I visit my friend as we are a support to each other, share meals etc. If you or your friend have the additionally cost of a permit then you won't be able to visit anymore. You or your friend rely on having the social contact with each other as don't have other friends or family around.

Or you visit an elderly lady and she doesn't know how to use the Internet very well so you imagine trying to arrange visitor parking permits would be difficult.  Vanguard Court, a commercial estate at the rear of 36-38 Peckham Road London SE5. It is occupied by approximately 50 small business and artist tenants and approximately 200 people are employed there. The vast majority of tenants are on very short term tenancies. In contrast, our interest in the site dates from 1934.

We object to the proposed residents parking zone for the following reasons.

1. The access roadway from Peckham Road to Vanguard Court is the only route in and out of Vanguard Court. Clear access is critical for deliveries and collections from the businesses in Vanguard Court. The roadway is on unregistered and unadopted land over which we and our tenants have right of way. There is currently a minor problem with parked vehicles blocking this access road. Should a residents' parking zone be introduced as proposed, this roadway will inevitably be subject to overspill parking and the problems will become much worse. It is and will be almost impossible to prevent this overspill parking and protect our right of way given the legal status of the roadway. The introduction of a CPZ without mitigation to control parking in the access road risks severe damage to these 50 businesses with a resultant loss of employment.
 2. Overspill parking in the roadway will also make it much more difficult for the council to fulfill its duty to collect rubbish from the Piano Factory flats (36 Peckham Road) whose bin stores are also accessed via the roadway. This is likely to result in increased costs for the council and disruption for the residents.
 3. We have suggested an obvious and appropriate mitigation step. We suggest that the council adopts the access roadway and restricts parking in it before the introduction of the CPZ. The roadway also serves the side entrance of the council's registry office at 34 Peckham Road and is bordered entirely on one side by council land. Southwark therefore has a strong interest in the roadway and is responsible for at least 50% of the maintenance costs by virtue of its frontage. Despite repeated requests, the council has failed to engage with us to discuss the option of adoption.
 4. We are aware that council employees regularly park their vehicles in the roadway (as do council contractors – confirmed by FOI requests) which may explain the council's refusal to discuss the option of adoption and parking restrictions. There is an obvious conflict of interest with council employees losing their opportunity to park free of charge at their place of work.
 5. The council has not followed the correct process of consultation about this proposal, agreed inter alia by resolution of the Camberwell Community Council (11 July 2016). The council undertook on several occasions to put the results of its informal consultation exercise to the Camberwell and the Peckham & Nunhead Community

6. Extracts from this council documents are included as an attachment to this document. It can be seen that on 11 July 2016 the Camberwell Community Council resolved to accept the consultation methods detailed in the documents presented to it. The documents state several times that the results of the informal consultation exercise will be presented to the Community Councils for discussion – this has not happened as Ms Redshaw (from Southwark Council’s parking team) has confirmed by email and is confirmed in the agendas for both Community Councils (which show the promised consultation has not happened)..
7. Ms Redshaw emailed on 17 March stating “*The proposal was brought before Peckham and Nunhead community council on 28 January and Camberwell community council on 31 January.*” When it was pointed out that this was untrue, as evidenced by the agendas of both Community Councils, Ms Redshaw stated “*it was decided that it would be presented for comment from the Councillors at an informal consultative meeting and therefore it was not on the formal agenda for the preceding decision-making meeting at either Peckham and Nunhead or Camberwell Community Councils*”. Extracts of this correspondence are included as an attachment to this document.
8. The council’s failure to consult properly with the Community Councils (having undertaken to do so) will leave the council open to legal challenge should it attempt to impose the CPZ without the promised consultation.
9. The council’s informal consultation exercise was improperly carried out. There is no mention in the published consultation document of any concerns about blocking of the access road to Vanguard Court despite our representations and the representations of a number of out tenants. A reasonable consultation document would have mentioned these concerns – especially given that we represent the interests of more than 50 tenants on short leases and around 200 jobs.
10. The consultation questionnaire was botched and clearly biased towards residents and against commercial occupants. I ([REDACTED]) ticked the box to answer as a business and was later asked how many cars my household parks on the street. The number of cars my household parks on the street is not a relevant question (I do not live in Southwark let alone inside the proposed CPZ area) and the results of the survey are therefore highly questionable. I pointed this out in an email to the council’s parking team but never received a satisfactory explanation. The lack of discussion and consultation at the Community Councils has prevented public scrutiny of this informal consultation.





I am assuming that the reason why people want these new restrictions is because they feel that there are not enough spaces.

I am objecting to these new parking restrictions because I do not believe that the parking restrictions will free up any parking spaces. On my road I find that the majority of cars belong to the residents. And seeing as this is the case all parking permits and parking bays will do is force people who live on these streets to pay to park on their own roads. I understand that residents who live on these streets will get a free permit but that is for only 1 car. Many of the people on my road, like myself, have more than 1 car in their home which means that they will have to pay for a parking permit.

I also feel that these restrictions are of no benefit as when they are enforced I will be at work as I, like the majority of residents on my road, work and parking during the day is not a issue. The fact is that when these parking restrictions come into effect I will be in exactly the same position I am in now - with the added bonus that I will be paying for the privilege of parking on my road. As the [REDACTED] and a long-time resident within Southwark, I object to the proposed residents parking zone for the following reasons:

1. There is a direct spur road from Peckham Road to Vanguard Court which is just wide enough for a single lorry or delivery van, with a fairly tight turn into and out of Vanguard Court. This spur road is unadopted. When cars are parked on it (as has been the case by Council Staff at the Registry Office, Council Contractors as well as visitors to the Registry Office), the inward and outward flow of delivery vehicles becomes extremely difficult and, at times impossible. This includes Southwark's Refuse Collection vehicles.
2. This problem will only be exacerbated by the introduction of a RPZ or CPZ in the surrounding area with residents who wish to avoid the annual cost and their visitors finding this road an easy place to park without paying.
3. We currently have 52 units ranging from one-person start-up units to 400 sqm (4,500 sq ft) workshops providing affordable work space to something in the region of 200 people. The vast majority of these are local Southwark residents. Over many years, including through the last recession, we have been 100% occupied (with some of our tenants being there over 21 years and a vacancy of approx. only two or three weeks any time someone has moved away).
4. To jeopardise that level of employment and job security by local artisans by introducing a RPZ or CPZ in the surrounding streets without taking appropriate action on the spur road is:
 - a) against the best interests of all those Southwark residents who work in Vanguard Court;
 - b) against the best interests of all those surrounding local businesses in which those working within Vanguard Court spend their money; and
 - c) counter-productive to the very concept of the RPZ/CPZ, as individuals will avoid the restrictions and charges by parking in the spur road.
5. The 'appropriate action' on the spur road is:
 - a) to adopt it; and
 - b) to double-yellow line it on both sides at least from Peckham Road to just beyond the entrance into Vanguard Court.

******* Comment on Proposed Peckham Road South (PR) CPZ *******

1) Background

There was an informal meeting of councillors at which it was decided to proceed with the CPZ. This substituted for the original program of a public discussion at full community council. A public discussion would have been useful to discuss the stakeholder interests and purpose of the cpz, including:

- whether the purpose is mainly to protect local car storage, or another purpose such as to protect the local economy or improve sustainable transport options
- what the revenue implications are in terms of resident income vs operating costs
- what the ratio of dedicated visitor parking to local businesses and amenities should be
- whether this was an opportunity to switch to shared car ownership in the wider area by including an additional 30-50 spaces reserved for Zipcars or other shared-car options
- where the commuter parking was/is coming from (for example, inside or outside the Borough)
- what investigations were made to determine the type of commuter parking, for example whether or not these were commuters to the local Camberwell economy such as The South London Gallery, Vanguard Court or central Camberwell. In that case, whether the local economic benefit from such commuters might outweigh any perceived harm from non-locals using side streets for visitor parking.

Current assumptions made relating to the above points are so entrenched that it is unlikely anything less than a public discussion could impact the decision whether or not to go ahead. Please could the attendees of the informal councillor meeting, the date and a brief summary of the rationale be published for future reference to inform the wider debate on the effect and purpose of cpzs in Camberwell and Peckham.

2) Metrics

No metrics have been collected or analysis done to investigate the visitor parking needs of the local economy, including the central Camberwell economy (with its professional and Financial Services sectors), and how restricting on-street parking to local residents will impact on this.

No metrics have been collected or analysis done on the amount which visitors to the local economy are prepared to pay, given the availability of free parking at nearby supermarkets. No analysis has been done on differential pricing - whether visitors are prepared to pay more for some streets than others.

No metrics have been collected or analysis done on unregulated non-local-resident parking (collectively termed "commuter parking"). For example, no number plate-address matching was done to determine whether these cars are local to the ward or Borough. The sole source of information was:

- (i) a visit by transport planners which agreed that some cars did not belong to residents, and

(ii) reports by local motorists lobbying for the cpz that they had followed visiting motorists to Denmark Hill Station and knew them to be regular rail commuters.

A walkabout with Living Streets, Tim Walker, Councillor Barrie Hargrove took place several years ago, when Councillor Hargrove held the Transport Portfolio. The walkabout ranged from Camberwell New Road to Walworth Road, and noted that where spaces had been allocated as 'shared' between visitors and residents, these spaces were exclusively occupied by residents during trading hours. Unfortunately this data has not been incorporated into planning policy, and some people are still advocating 'shared' spaces next to main roads.

Next Steps

Given the lack of a data-led approach as outlined above, the cpz should not go ahead as its potential destructive local economic effect would not be possible to undo. If the cpz does go ahead, parking provision should **err on the side of caution** in providing for the local economy. The reason for this is that once a business use is lost to residential, there are no examples of a conversion in the other direction due to the significant discrepancy between land values between C3 (residential) and the A and B commercial classes.

The following is a suggestion, subject to correction by a data-led approach:

A) 1 dedicated visitor parking space per local street-front business or service (i.e, not for use by residents except as visitors). Each space should be located nearer to the businesses than the nearest resident space, i.e. form an inner circle of access to the local economy. Free parking for the first 30 minutes. Including the Registry Office, this should be a minimum of 20 dedicated visitor parking spaces.

B) 20 dedicated visitor parking spaces for South London Gallery and Cafe (or such number as agreed by SLG to be sufficient).

C) 1 dedicated visitor parking space per local business off-street (such as Vanguard Court). It is important to understand that rear access roads are not car storage roads, therefore these local businesses are impacted by loss of unregulated side-street visitor parking in the same way as shops. Once more, it would have been useful to address assumptions on visitor parking needs of these areas at a full community council meeting, as the assumption in the past has been that if a specialist business does not have a high throughput of customers, it has no need for visitor parking at all. This would equate to 50 additional dedicated spaces for Vanguard Court.

D) 30 dedicated paid visitor spaces to address the commuter parking needs of the central Camberwell economy.

E) 10 dedicated paid visitor spaces to address commuter parking overflow needs for local hospitals and the Magistrate's Court.

F) 40 dedicated shared car spaces, with the objective of this area being a "shared car interchange hub", meaning that shared cars could either be left or collected from here, independent of the other side of journey origin/destination.

G) Double-yellow lines for any local trader access road where this is requested by the local traders who need essential delivery access preserved on that road.

This equates to a total of **170 dedicated spaces** for which resident permits would not grant additional rights over other visitors.

3) Who is the CPZ for?

The majority of local residents do not own cars (approximately 75-80%). On-street car storage is only required by approximately 9% of residents (those without their own private space). Therefore, the main constituency for the needs to be addressed by the cpz are pedestrians, cyclists, and those residents interested in preserving the health of the local economy to improve their own access to goods and services.

Local cycle storage and segregated cycle lanes should be offered as options within the cpz consultation. If any street has more votes for cycle storage or cycle lanes than for car storage, the former option should be preferred. As cycle storage generates a higher revenue than resident permit storage, and requires less operational cost in terms of monitoring, this option would improve Council revenues.

Given the lack of data-led analysis in this proposal, the CPZ should not be implemented as the economic damage cannot be quantified or undone. However, if it is implemented, then the above recommendations should be carried out in order to minimise damage to the local economy.

Thanks for your email.

As shown in the report no single respondent has any more influence than any other. The road by road analysis is there to show how opinion differed from road to road and is not averaged out as you suggested.

We sent out 2148 consultation documents to all postal addresses in the area, we received 380 responses. In response to the headline question "do you want a parking zone?" 216 (57%) responded 'yes' v 141 (37%) 'no'. 23 (6%) of respondents were undecided. Therefore a majority of respondents to the consultation were in favour of a parking zone.

As I pointed out in my email : There was in fact a clear majority of residents within the area consulted opposed to the proposed restrictions. The authors of the report have distorted the figures by taking an average percentage across the entire area.

To explain in simple terms :

A cul de sac with 10 households where only one person votes (and that in favour) is counted as 100% pro. A road with 100 households where 100 vote but where 75 residents vote against is counted as 75 % anti. When these are averaged out, the single person in the cul de sac has more influence than the 75.

Thank you for your email.

We are receiving many representations to the statutory consultation; both for and against parking controls, any representations passed on from Councillors will be detailed in our objection report to the Cabinet Member for Environment and Public Realm for determination.

Overall at the informal consultation stage, there was a majority of respondents in favour of a parking zone. We recognise that there were some roads against, including Denman Road. If we were to exclude Denman Road from the proposed parking zone, it is inevitable that we would have to revisit the road to consider parking controls in the near future due to possible displacement.

Statutory consultation

Statutory consultation is carried out in accordance with regulations 6 and 7 of the Local Authorities' Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996.

The proposals were advertised in the London Gazette, Southwark News and by street notice on 30 March 2017.

Any person wishing to comment or object to the proposal was invited to do so by 20 April 2017.

The council will now consider your representations before deciding how to proceed.

Today is the last day for representations on this matter. I draw your attention to the following and request a response :

The council report which recommends Resident Permit Parking for our streets has misrepresented the wishes of residents. Rather than calculating the percentage of residents supporting the scheme from the total number of votes, they have taken an average of the percentage from each street. Thus, a street that delivers only one vote produces a percentage of 100% in favour. A street that delivers 75 votes against out of a hundred produces a percentage of only 75%. The overall figure should have shown a clear majority across the affected streets but this bizarre manipulation of the results shows the opposite. *This is a form of gerrymandering.*

Myself and Denman Rd neighbours have written to our ward councillors with photographs of numerous empty parking spaces during the hours of the proposed restrictions. The only problems occur after 6.30pm when residents arrive home with more than one car per household. Before I make my objection to the parking restrictions I would like to say that I am somewhat surprised by the lack of information that has been provided in regards to the parking restrictions as well as the lack of consultation. Last year all residents were given the opportunity look at possible restrictions and we were given the opportunity to give our thoughts. I objected to the restrictions then because, just like now, I could not see the point to them. As far as I could see it was just another method of extracting money from residents with little or no benefits for them. I believe that before an official decision can be made that just like when the idea was first thought about all residents should be informed and allowed to make an informed decision. Having walked up and down my road on more than one occasion I cannot remember once seeing a leaflet informing residents of the proposal of restrictions. All I have seen are leaflets from 2016 asking residents their opinions.

I find it somewhat difficult to find grounds to object to as I have looked through the online literature and have been unable to find why the restrictions are being put in place. My assumption is that residents have complained about the amount of cars that are on their roads. If that is the case I am objecting because I do not see how it is that imposing parking restrictions will free up spaces. The majority of cars on my road belong to the residents and therefore imposing parking restrictions will only impact the residents on these roads and not anybody else. Parking restrictions are not an answer to anything because they will not limit the amount of cars on my road when I, or the majority of my neighbours, will not be at home as we work during the day. The only thing that these restrictions will do is ensure that I am paying for the privilege to park on my street at night when the restrictions will not be enforced. So I will basically be paying to park on my road - something that I can do now for free. In fact I may end up parking on another street as if there are too many cars on my road I will have to park elsewhere. So once again the parking restrictions will have no benefit to me of this is the case.

I am hoping that both my views and that of other neighbours will be taken into account and Southwark does not just impose these restrictions. I am also hoping that there will be an official consultation now that Southwark has decided to impose the restrictions and that everyone will be given the opportunity to voice their opinion.

I am objecting to this proposal as I do not believe that it fits the purpose that is being stated. Having looked at the documents online I have been unable to ascertain why exactly parking meters and permits are being introduced. The only thing I can find, in the way of justification, is that a number of residents have supported the proposal. My assumption is that the reason why this proposal has come about is that some residents have complained about lack of parking spaces. If that is the case I am objecting on the grounds that I fail to see how putting in parking meters and permits will suddenly free up spaces for residents who live on these roads.

These permits and parking bays make no sense as I, like a number of my neighbours, do not have any trouble parking on my road either during the day, evening or weekend. It is true that there are some days or nights when I find it hard to find a space - but this is not a regular occurrence. And I fail to see how it is that parking meters or permits are suddenly going to change the parking situation. Especially as I work full time and by the time I get home the parking restrictions will not be in force. This means that when I do get home I will be in exactly the same position I am in now but I will be paying for the privilege of parking on my road.

The fact is that parking bays and permits do not guarantee me a space outside my house. All they guarantee is that I will be paying additional revenue to Southwark for the possibility of parking outside my house - which as I stated before is exactly the same position I am in now but for free. I fail to see any pros to these parking meters and permits but I do see a number of cons. The only

things that these permits and parking meters will do will increase the amount of revenue that Southwark Council receive and stop relatives from coming to visit as they will not be able to park on our roads for free anymore.

I understand that my objection will more than likely fall on deaf ears and that parking meters and permits are more than likely to be on my road within the next few months - however I feel that if I do not object or show my displeasure at what I see as nothing more than a money making scheme I have no right to complain when these changes do come to pass.

I also believe that the amount of money that Southwark will be charging for an hours stay on these roads is paramount to extortion. How can it be justifiable to charge almost £3 per hour?

We live at [REDACTED] Crofton Road.

I wish to object in the strongest terms to the proposal to introduce a parking zone in this area.

Consultation did not identify or consult on the detail of the order the Council seeks to confirm:

First, the Consultation has been entirely misleading, and the basis upon which the order is proposed to be made is opaque.

The Consultation proceeded on the basis that it would introduce resident only parking due to overuse of local roads by local businesses, workers, commuters and others - preventing residents access to parking in the streets in which they live. At the time the Consultation proceeded, the position was exacerbated by high levels of construction traffic and workers on the UAL campus parking in those streets during works to the buildings. Those works are now predominantly completed and that issue alleviated.

The Council now seeks to confirm it on an entirely different basis to which the proposal was promoted.

It plans to introduce:

- a) the potential for businesses to apply for permits to park in these areas;
- b) charging for places in the roads with general public access.

Neither of these matters were proposed or identified as possibilities in the Consultation.

Consultation was supported by local residents to reduce use of local domestic roads by third party businesses, workers, commuters who do not live in the area. The order the Council seeks to confirm introduces exactly those parking uses to the roads exacerbating difficulties and availability of parking for local residents:

Both of these proposals would further restrict local residents' potential to park in the streets.

The Consultation has not identified:

- a) how many spaces would be offered to businesses, nor their locations;
- b) which businesses would be eligible to apply (unless this was restricted to businesses situate on the road to which the order applied, and only to a restricted space directly in

front of that business, it would take up a local resident's parking space, compounding parking difficulties);

c) it should absolutely not be the case that businesses not situate on the roads being closed off can apply for permits to park in roads - that would be counterintuitive to the purposes of alleviating use of local domestic roads;

d) how many spaces would be offered for paid parking, their locations, and the locations proposed for parking meters. It is entirely unacceptable to introduce a paid parking space directly in front of peoples' residences. All persons wishing to pay for parking would use that space, preventing access for the residents in question.

None of this detail is visible or has been made available or consulting on. It is unreasonable for the Council to confirm the order without consulting on the above missing detail of the proposal prior to confirmation. It is not apparent from the notice provided in relation to the order.

The Council's website does not provide the detail which the notice of the Order suggests is available (the reasons for making the order, and the detail are not clearly available on the parts of the website the notice identifies).

It is unreasonable of the Council to publish the notice during a school holiday and over the Easter period when a great number of local residents will be away from their homes and unaware of the notice. Businesses/schools affected by the order may be shut in this period (for example, the Villa School and Nursery).

The Notice should be withdrawn, full detail of the proposals should be provided by letter to all local residents affected and businesses. A further consultation should run that identifies the full detail of the proposals and allows local residents a full opportunity to consider and respond to the consultation.

Only once those representations on the detail of the proposal have been sought and properly taken into account can the Council identify that it has had proper regard to material considerations in making the order.

At present, the Council's decision making is deficient in terms of irrationality and unreasonableness.

In response to the statutory notice posted re a proposed CPZ I am writing to register my formal objection to this proposal.

I strongly believe the LA needs to revise and revisit this proposal.

I do not believe the earlier consultation results were a genuine representation of the views of the majority of residents.

Many were not aware of the implications or simply didn't understand what the consultation was, or didn't even recognise the consultation form as anything more than junk mail.

Many were not aware that multiple occupants could each respond to the consultation.

Indeed I myself was not aware of this until I read it on a Facebook page set up by the small group of residents, albeit well organised, and primarily on one road, who pushed for the consultation to be undertaken. I truly believe this fact alone will have skewed the result giving a false a misleading picture which isn't a genuine representation of the views of the majority of residents.

There is also the issue that a number of the statutory notices were ripped down. I suspect by the Unknown resident who posed as a southwark employee to aggressively destroy petitions which were being done in a number of local shops, informing shop owners the council had already decided. As a result the local residents have not had the opportunity to respond fully as the notices were not displayed adequately and for the legally appropriate duration.

Having walked the area I am also of the opinion that 4 notices on each of the longer roads, only 2 at the beginning and end, and two notices on the shorter roads is not sufficient. Car users are unlikely to traverse the full length of the road in order to encounter these notices and so on the instance of a notice being pertinent to such a large area I would question that the statutory duty has been fulfilled.

I believe there are larger issues to be weighed against the perception of inconvenience due to on occasion being unable to park directly outside ones residence.

This is not only a densely populated are but also one which had significant valuable community services being provided by nearby organisation.

There is the Employment centre, the Sunshine children centre, the PACT centres (Prison advice and care centre), the Registry office, the South London gallery, to name some.

These are all necessary, sometimes essential, and community enhancing organisations which need staff to deliver the value they offer. These people are not residents yet their daily presence does much to make this area a better place to live. These people are coming to work, for us, for our community, and in some instances for Southwark council. Many of these people, these staff, require a place to park, for free. Oftentimes the nature of their work dictates they are unable to ascertain how long they will be parking for making parking meters exorbitant and riddled with the added concern of pvn's. None of

this is covered by their employers/organisation. Many of these organisation are operating within the restriction of cuts in funding and are unable to provide expensive staff permits purchased from southwark council without it detrimentally impacting the services they provide.

So whilst I appreciate the perception of inconvenience by some residents are believe Southwark council has a duty to look at the bigger picture, the wider implications, and take an approach which 'manages' parking instead of resorting to the unimaginative, yet undoubtedly profitable (to the parking devices department), outdated and ineffective approach of introducing CPZ's to appease a small minority's of residents. The potential negative impact on the community far outweighs the requirement for convenience.

As Southwark council are aware this is the last remaining enclave of free parking, meaning the staff of these organisation are unable to park elsewhere.

For instance the nurses from kings college who park in the early hours to attend shifts before public transport is available and then walk nearly a mile into work, because they are unable to park at work or near work, without exorbitant fees, risked of pcn's, and having to move cars every 4 hours. Where are they meant to park? This is my point about Southwark looking at the issue of parking from a 'management of parking' rather than restriction of parking. The wider needs of the community go beyond the demands of a minority of residents.

Another example, the people recently bereaved and registering deaths, those with newborn babies who have to visit the registry office to register births. Who wants to take a newborn baby on a bus. Who knows how long it will take in the registry office. The local pay and display parking is £2.70 an hour, so to avoid anxiety of a PCN would require £5.40. For some people that is a significant amount of money so of course they will drive around looking for a free parking space. I strongly believe were the existing pay and display rates were nominal then it would be an easier more viable option to simply pay £1ph for two hours. This is just one suggestion I would suggest Southwark explore and trial first before introducing a CPZ.

With such a nominal fee scheme I would not believe exiting revenue levels would be impacted adversely in fact I suspect they would increase due to more people using those spaces.

Of course a cynic would say the council are biased and intent on profiteering. I would rather take a view that is more likely it is simply a case whereby things have stagnated with things just being done 'as they always have' and upper management have not encouraged and fostered a culture of innovative solution led thinking. I would love to see this turned around.

I also have concerns around a CPZ unfairly impacting and penalising the poor, and those vulnerable to social isolation.

Digital inclusion is also an important element. As Southwark will be aware the borough has a lower than average percentage of residents able to access digital service. I know efforts are being made around this however in the mean time those unable to engage digitally will effectively be excluded. These are traditionally the elderly, the poor, and those suffering mental health issues. For all these group face to face social interaction is vital to their well being. A CPZ with the costs and requirements to acquiring of permits makes the risks and consequences of social isolation significantly exacerbated.

One mitigation to this might be an option of a stand alone annual visitor permit transferable to a sequence of vehicles, requiring just one digital application process, and a one time fee.

Some residents will be faced with being unable to have a well needed visitor because they simply haven't the money at the time. The poor often live one pay day to the next and availability of excess funds mid pay date is an unrealistic expectation. Additionally there would be the temptation to use high interest credit cards to pay.

I'm also concern of the impact of pcn's which will inevitably be issued to residents and

genuine resident visitors due to losing track of time, or as one resident expressed to me, when her sister visited she would just keep looking out the window for parking wardens and move the car! Obviously this is destined to fail eventually. What then if they are unable to source £65 within two weeks, or £130 after that. Then behind a snowball of spiralling debt which can be devastating to someone living on a low income.

There are also the less well off for whom shared car use is the only viable way for them to have access to door to door transportation. Whilst this is better for the environment, these people would effectively be unable to obtain a permit. Again this impacts primarily the poor.

These are unfortunately also the people liable to be less 'engaged' and as such those least likely to have responded to (or even been aware of) the consultation in the first place. Yet they do have an opinion and they do deserve compassionate consideration.

As I have touched on already there is the issues of the efficacy of a CPZ.

Lastly I also object to the proposed timings of 8.30-18.30. I would like to suggest a small time frame covering when children are brought home from nursery etc would be best to reduce inconvenience for the residents who have young children and travel by car to collect them as I understand this is a crux of the request for a CPZ. I would then expect like other borough such as Bromley etc that permit charges would be drastically reduced as I could see no justifiable reason for this not to be the case. Southwark would not be employeeding additional parking enforcement officers purely to cover these roads.

As it is the existing proposal of £100 plus annually (with higher rates for those unable to pay in bulk) is already way to high, particularly considering the volume of car owners in this area then £20-30 annual would more than suffice to cover the minimal administrative expenses for the existing department.

I feel reversal of the CPZ in the surrounding areas is the solution to dispersing the spread of the demand for free parking.

Please accept this letter as a response on behalf of [REDACTED] [REDACTED] to the Council's consultation on parking in the Peckham Road south area. The School is situated in the proposed new Controlled Parking Zone ('CPZ'), and as such has an interest in the proposed scheme. I am writing in my capacity as [REDACTED]. The School objects to the proposed CPZ on the basis that it will have a significant detrimental impact on the School that far outweighs any benefit that may be derived from the scheme.

The School is sympathetic to the concerns of many local residents about parking. However, there is not a serious problem with parking in the area and, even if there were such a problem, there is no objective evidence that the proposed CPZ will improve the situation. It has been suggested by residents that School staff parking on the street make parking more difficult during term time. However, the nursery is open all year round, and has many more staff than the pre-preparatory school. Any difference in the school holidays is far more likely to be due to a reduced number of commuters parking because parents take time off work during the school holidays. A more detailed and prolonged traffic survey than the survey already undertaken is required to establish the true nature and extent of any parking problem in the area, and whether the proposed scheme would improve the situation.

If the CPZ were to be introduced, it would cause significant operational problems for the School, which far outweigh any benefits there may be from the Scheme (which are yet to be objectively assessed). It is likely to result in a significant loss of staff, meaning that the School may be unable to continue to provide the level of child care it currently provides. It is also likely to affect the ability of parents to drop off and collect their children from the School safely, and is likely to add to any parking problems that may exist in the local area.

By way of background, the School provides 124 full time nursery places for 2 to 4 year old children, many of which are funded by the Council. It is one of the largest nurseries in the

area. We also have 36 places in the pre-preparatory school for 5 to 7 year old children. The nursery is open all year round, not just during term time, and has extended opening hours of 8am to 6pm. Our staff work from 7.30am to 6.30pm. The nursery requires a very high staff to child ratio of 1:4, compared to a primary school which requires only 1:30. We therefore have a much larger number of staff than similar sized primary schools. Many of these staff members travel from a significant distance away, as shown on the map below.

While we encourage our staff to use public transport and the majority do so, there is a small but significant number for whom driving to work is the only option. If the School was unable to offer these staff members a business parking permit, I believe that many of them would seek alternative employment. If the scheme was implemented in the summer of 2017, the School would find itself understaffed and unable to recruit replacements at short notice, and would have to turn children away. This would put pressure on families in the area as they would have to find alternative places for their children.

The implementation of a CPZ will also cause problems for the parents of the children who attend the School. The size of the School does mean that it has a relatively large catchment area, as shown on the maps below. The School has a number of measures in place to minimise any pressure it contributes to parking in the area. We encourage all our pupils and families to walk, cycle, car share and use public transport to travel to and from the School. However as you will appreciate, the very young age of our pupils makes options such as these less viable than for older children. We have highly staggered drop off and pick up times in place, from 8.00 to 9.30am and from 3.15 to 6.00pm, which minimises congestion in the mornings and afternoons. The implementation of a CPZ will interfere with this arrangement and result in parents being unable to park.

The School is, therefore, strongly opposed to the implementation of the CPZ. However, if the CPZ is implemented, I would like to make a number of suggestions to the Council about how the impact on the School, which is potentially very serious, could be mitigated. Given the School's position in the middle of a residential area, we believe that the Council has a duty to consider implementing measures to ensure it is not adversely affected by any CPZ.

We have been informed that the School is likely to receive only 10 business parking permits if the CPZ is put in place. The particular nature of the School means that a higher number of permits should be allocated to it and I would suggest a figure of at least 20. The justifications for this are the large size of the School, the high staff to child ratio of the nursery, and the long hours that the staff work. It is essential that the School is allocated at least 20 business permits in order to ensure the continued success of the School both as a business and as an important local provider of nursery and pre-preparatory school places.

The School has a very large frontage along Lyndhurst Grove, occupying the equivalent of several average residential properties. Each residential property is entitled to up to 3 resident permits, and I suggest that allocating 20 permits to the School would be entirely proportionate with the number of permits that would be allocated to the same frontage if it was residential. 20 permits is also not a large number considering that the total number of permits allocated in the proposed CPZ would be nearly 800, and there would be nearly 950 parking spaces.

In terms of the plan of proposed bays, I note that the bays around the School have been provisionally earmarked as dual permit and paid bays. Lyndhurst Grove has the highest number of proposed dual use bays (25) of any road in the proposed CPZ. It is vital that, if the School is to be able to use the business permits it is allocated, these bays are not used by commuters who can pay remotely. It would, therefore, be important for the Council to ensure that paid parking is strictly limited to 2 hours for any vehicle so that commuters cannot use the bays, but short term visitors to the School are able to. Alternatively, the bays immediately surrounding the School should be permit only bays so that commuters do not have the option of using them at all.


I would also like to comment on the times that the CPZ would operate. As explained above, it is vital that those parents who do have to drive their children to the School can park safely to drop them off and pick them up. If there is an issue with parking locally, it is in the middle of the day and is caused by commuters using the local tube stations, and staff at the local hospital parking in the area. I would therefore like to request that any controlled parking starts after 9 am, when all the children are in school, and finishes at 3pm so that the staggered pick up times can operate smoothly. It is my belief that the School does not contribute to any parking issues in the area, and staff and parents should not be penalised as a result of improved parking for residents.

Finally, I would encourage the Council to consider some of the schemes used by other London Boroughs to ensure that teachers and schools are not adversely affected by the implementation of any CPZ. A survey of some other boroughs has revealed solutions such as special school and teacher permits, often at subsidized prices. Other boroughs have 15 minute school parking permits, or free parking in resident bays near schools for 10 minutes, to allow parents to drop children off and pick them up safely.

In conclusion, the proposed CPZ will have a significant detrimental impact on the School which far outweighs any benefit to be derived from the scheme. Accordingly, the CPZ should not be implemented. However, to the extent that it is determined that such a scheme should be introduced, I ask that the Council implements the measures outlined above in order to mitigate the impact on the School.



My reasons are as follows,

1, I have two autistic children for which I need transport and I need to be able to park near my property. My eldest son has phobias around noise, flies and insects and it is difficult to get him to go out, let alone to have to walk some distance to get into the car. It would be extremely dangerous as he runs off. HE HAS NO SENSE OF DANGER. We have many appointments to attend. I am NOT entitled to a blue badge as they are both able bodied children. If the parking permits are introduced and I am not eligible the nearest free parking for me is half a mile away.

2, As a **Housing Association tenant** I have been informed that I would not be eligible to apply for a resident permit, **even if I was willing to pay**. Which I must add is the most ridiculous thing I have ever heard of. If Business owners are entitled to permits why not Housing Association Tenants. I agreed to become a Housing Association Tenant through Southwark Housing scheme. I feel as I have been misled as I was informed that we would have equal access to parking as everyone else. We are treated like 2nd class citizens. This is a common problem amongst Housing Association tenants across the borough and it needs to be addressed.

Introducing parking permits in this area would be detrimental to my family and many people in similar circumstances.

As a long-term resident of Crofton Road, I am writing to address some issues surrounding the proposed new Car Parking Zone (CPZ) for Crofton Road and the surrounding roads.

1. I certainly welcome this proposed CPZ. We have lived in Crofton Road for over 20 years and the parking in the last 3 years especially has become decidedly worse and worse. It is nigh on impossible to park our [REDACTED] in Crofton Road until after 6.00- 7.00pm.

2. We know that people come and park their cars around 7.00 -8.00am and then go into Central London either from Peckham Rye or Demark Hill Station. The same is true of the parents who use the Villa Nursery up in Lyndhust Way. We know of individuals who drive in and park their car on a Monday morning and then return on Friday evening.

3. If this scheme is not to go ahead, then it must be the case that you remove all Parking Restrictions from all the surrounding roads - including Camberwell Grove, Shenley Road, Holly Grove etc. to make it a fair and level playing field for all residents. It cannot be right that the residents of Crofton, Bushey Hill and Talford Road bear the brunt of all this excessive parking.

4. My only real concern is for the gentleman who runs the car business in Crofton Road from the block of flats opposite Cross Road. He sells and repairs cars and has run this business for as long as we have been residents here. At any one time he must have 10-12 cars parked in and around Croton and Cross Road. My concern is how will he be able to run his business if the CPZ is put into place? It does seem a little unfair that he may have to pay excessive car parking charges for his cars so I hope he can be accommodated if it all goes ahead.

We are delighted at the prospect of a CPZ as it will make life for the residents in this area of Southwark so much more pleasant.

1. The access roadway from Peckham Road to Vanguard Court is the only route in and out of Vanguard Court. Clear access is critical for deliveries and collections for the businesses in Vanguard Court. The roadway is on unregistered and unadopted land over which tenants in Vanguard Court have right of way. Presently there is a minor problem with parked vehicles blocking this access road.

Should a residents' parking zone be introduced in the area, this roadway will inevitably be subject to overspill parking and thus exacerbating the problem. It will be then be impossible to prevent or restrict this overspill parking given legal status of the roadway. The introduction of a CPZ without the council simultaneously adopting the roadway and controlling parking in it risks severe damage to businesses operating in Vanguard Court with a resultant loss of employment. Approximately 50 small businesses and around 200 people rely on this roadway being clear.

2. Overspill parking in the roadway could also obstruct council collections of domestic rubbish from the Piano Factory flats (36 Peckham Road) whose bin stores are also accessed via this roadway.

Therefore an obvious solution to this concern is for the council to adopt the roadway and restrict parking in it PRIOR TO the introduction of the CPZ in the surrounding residential streets.
