RECOMMENDATION

1. That the licensing sub-committee considers whether an application made by Fawad Karimi for a premises licence be granted under the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of the premises known as Peckham News, 133 Peckham High Street, London SE15 5SL.
2. Notes:
 - a) This application forms a new application for a premises licence, submitted under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. The application is subject to representations from responsible authorities and is therefore referred to the sub-committee for determination.
 - b) Paragraphs 8 to 11 of this report provide a summary of the application under consideration by the sub-committee. A copy of the full application is attached as Appendix A.
 - c) Paragraphs 13 to 18 of this report deal with the representations submitted in respect of the application. Copies of the representations are attached to this report as Appendix B. A map showing the location of the premises is attached to this report as Appendix C.
 - d) A copy of the council's approved procedure for hearings of the sub-committee in relation to an application made under the Licensing Act 2003, along with a copy of the hearing regulations, has been circulated to all parties to the meeting.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Licensing Act 2003

3. The Licensing Act 2003 provides a licensing regime for:
 - The sale of and supply of alcohol
 - The provision of regulated entertainment
 - The provision of late night refreshment.
4. Within Southwark, the licensing responsibility is wholly administered by this council.
5. The Act requires the licensing authority to carry out its functions under the Act with a view to promoting the four stated licensing objectives. These are:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
 - The promotion of public safety
 - The prevention of nuisance
 - The protection of children from harm.
6. In carrying out its licensing functions, a licensing authority must also have regard to
- The Act itself
 - The guidance to the act issued under Section 182 of the Act
 - Secondary regulations issued under the Act
 - The licensing authority's own statement of licensing policy
 - The application, including the operating schedule submitted as part of the application
 - Relevant representations.
7. The premises licence application process involves the provision of all relevant information required under the Act to the licensing authority with copies provided by the applicant to the relevant responsible bodies under the Act. The application must also be advertised at the premises and in the local press. The responsible authorities and other persons within the local community may make representations on any part of the application where relevant to the four licensing objectives.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

The premises licence application

8. On 16 November 2017 Fawad Karimi applied to this council for the grant of a premises licence in respect of Peckham News, 133 Peckham High Street, London SE15 5SL.
9. The application and is summarised as follows:
- **The sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises**
 - Monday to Sunday from 08:00 to 23:00
 - **Proposed opening hours of the premises**
 - Monday to Sunday from 06:00 to 23:00.
10. The premises licence application form provides the applicant's operating schedule. Parts J, K, L, and M of the operating schedule set out the proposed licensable activities, operating hours and operational control measures in full, with reference to the four licensing objectives as stated in the Licensing Act 2003. Should a premises licence be issued in respect of the application the information provided in part M of the operating schedule will form the basis of conditions that will be attached to any licence granted subsequent to the application. A copy of the application is attached to this report as Appendix A.
11. The premises are described as a convenience store, newsagents and grocery.

Designated premises supervisor

12. The proposed designated premises supervisor (DPS) is Fawad Karimi.

Representations from responsible authorities

13. Representations have been submitted by this council's trading standards service, Director of Public Health and licensing responsible authority. The Metropolitan Police Service has also submitted a representation.
14. The trading standards' representation suggests conditions, in regards to the implementation of a 'challenge 25' policy and limiting the alcohol by volume (ABV) of certain products to be sold at the premises, which trading standards contend should be included in any premises licence issued subsequent to the application.
15. The Director of Public Health's representation has been submitted in respect of the prevention of crime and disorder, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of public safety licensing objectives. The representation states concerns regarding the hours requested in respect of alcohol sales. The representation notes that the premises are situated in the Peckham cumulative impact policy (CIP) area, that there is a high density of off licences in the locale, that there is an entrenched street drinking problem in the locale, that early morning purchasers of alcohol are more likely to be alcohol misusers and that the premises are in close proximity to two alcohol recovery hostels. The representation recommends that the start time for alcohol sales be amended to 11:00 and that a condition limiting the alcohol by volume (ABV) of certain products to be sold at the premises be imposed on any licence issued subsequent to the application.
16. The licensing responsible authority's representation has been submitted in respect of the prevention of crime and disorder and the prevention of public nuisance licensing objectives. The representation notes that the premises are situated in the Peckham CIP area. The representation contends that the application has not addressed the presumption to refuse the application and recommends that the application be refused unless the applicant can demonstrate that the operation of the premises will not contribute to crime and disorder and public nuisance in the locale. The representation requests that the applicant consider amending the operating schedule of the application to include two additional conditions regarding the containers that alcohol may be sold in and signage to be displayed at the premises.
17. The Metropolitan Police Service's representation notes that the premises are situated within the Peckham (CIP) area. The Metropolitan Police Service object to the granting of the application noting that the area that the premises are located in has a considerable amount of off licences and that the area suffers from problems related to alcohol abuse and street drinking. Should the licensing sub-committee be minded to grant the application the Metropolitan Police Service have recommended various conditions, relating to the prevention of crime and disorder, that should be imposed on the licence.
18. The representations submitted by responsible authorities are attached as Appendix B.

Representations from other persons

19. No representations were submitted by other persons.

Conciliation

20. The applicant has been provided with copies of all of the representations and has been advised to liaise directly with those responsible authorities who have submitted representations to facilitate any possible conciliation. At the time of the writing of this

report all of the representations submitted remain outstanding and must therefore be considered by the licensing sub-committee.

Premises history

21. No licensing authorisation has been issued in respect of the premises under the Licensing Act 2003 or any previous legislation.
22. No Temporary Event Notices have been submitted in regards to the premises.
23. On 16 November 2017 Fawad Karimi applied to this council for the grant of a premises licence in respect of Peckham News, 133 Peckham High Street, London SE15 5SL.

Map

24. A map showing the location of the premises is attached to this report as appendix D. The following licensed premises are also shown on the map and provide licensable activities as stated:

- The provision of late night refreshment:
 - Sunday to Thursday from 23:00 to 00:30 the following day
 - Friday and Saturday from 23:00 to 01:00 the following day.
- The sale of alcohol to be consumed on and off the premises:
 - Sunday to Thursday from 09:00 to 00:30 the following day
 - Friday and Saturday from 09:00 to 01:00 the following day.

Peckham Town Square, Peckham High Street, London SE15 5RS licensed for:

- Films, live music, recorded music, anything similar to live or recorded music, performances of dance and plays:
 - Sunday to Thursday from 10:00 to 20:00
 - Friday and Saturday from 10:00 to 21:00.

Peckham Space, 89 Peckham High Street, London SE15 5RS licensed for:

- Films, boxing / wrestling, indoor sporting events, live music, recorded music, anything similar to live or recorded music, performances of dance and plays:
 - Monday to Sunday from 10:00 to 23:00

Yesil Irmak, 107 Peckham High Street, London SE15 5RS licensed for:

- The sale of alcohol to be consumed off the premises:
 - Monday to Sunday - 24 hours.

The Greyhound, 109 Peckham High Street, London SE15 5SE licensed for:

- The sale of alcohol to be consumed on the premises, live music and recorded music:
 - Monday to Sunday from 09:00 to 01:00 the following day.
- The provision of late night refreshment:
 - Monday to Saturday from 23:00 to 23:30.

Chick Chicken, 117 Peckham High Street, London SE15 5SE licensed for:

- The provision of late night refreshment:
 - Sunday from 23:00 to 00:00 (midnight)
 - Monday to Thursday from 23:00 to 01:00 the following day
 - Friday and Saturday from 23:00 to 02:00 the following day

Payless, 121 – 125 Peckham High Street, London SE15 5SF licensed for:

- The sale of alcohol to be consumed off the premises:
 - Sunday to Thursday from 06:00 to 01:00 the following day
 - Friday and Saturday from 06:00 to 02:00 the following day.

Peckham Food and Wine, 176 Peckham High Street, London SE15 5EG licensed for:

- The sale of alcohol to be consumed off the premises:
 - Monday to Sunday – 24 hours.

The Prince of Peckham, 1 Clayton Road, London SE15 5JA licensed for:

- The provision of late night refreshment:
 - Sunday to Thursday from 23:00 to 00:00
 - Friday and Saturday from 23:00 to 02:00 the following day.
- The sale of alcohol to be consumed on and off the premises, indoor sporting events, films and recorded music:
 - Sunday to Thursday from 09:00 to 00:00
 - Friday and Saturday from 09:00 to 01:00 the following day

The Copper Tap at the Red Cow, 190 - 192 Red Cow Peckham High Street SE15 5EG licensed for:

- Sale of alcohol to be consumed on and off the premises & performances of dance:
 - Monday to Thursday from 12:00 to 23:00
 - Friday and Saturday from 12:00 to 01:00 the following day
 - Sunday from 12:00 to 22:30.

Southwark council saturation policy for Peckham

25. Council assembly approved the introduction of a special policy for Peckham on the cumulative impact of a concentration of licensed premises (saturation policy) on 12 October 2011. This was renewed in November 2015 when full council assembly approved the 2016-2020 statement of licensing policy.
26. The decision to introduce saturation policy was taken with regard to the committee's concern over rising trends of late night alcohol related violence against the person and late night disorder and rowdiness associated with late night licensed premises in the area.
27. The effect of this special policy is that is to create a presumption that applications for new premises licences or variations that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, following relevant representations, unless the applicant can demonstrate in their operating schedule that there will be no negative cumulative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives.
28. The applicant has been advised to address the committees concerns around cumulative impact at the meeting.

Southwark council statement of licensing policy

29. Council assembly approved Southwark's statement of licensing policy 2016 - 2020 on 25 November 2015. The policy came into effect on 1 January 2016. Sections of the statement that are considered to be of particular relevance to the sub-committee's consideration are:
 - Section 3 - Purpose and scope of the policy. This reinforces the four licensing objectives and the fundamental principles upon which this authority relies in determining licence applications.
 - Section 5 - Determining applications for premises licences and club premises certificates. This explains how the policy works and considers issues such as location; high standards of management; and the principles behind condition setting.
 - Section 6 - Local cumulative impact policies. This sets out this authority's approach to cumulative impact and defines the boundaries of the current special policy areas and the classifications of premises to which they apply. To be read in conjunction with Appendix B to the policy.
 - Section 7 - Hours of operation. This provides a guide to the hours of licensed operation that this authority might consider appropriate by type of premises and (planning) area classification.
 - Section 8 - The prevention of crime and disorder. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the first licensing objective.
 - Section 9 - Public safety. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the second licensing objective.

- Section 10 - The prevention of nuisance. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the third licensing objective.
 - Section 11 - The protection of children from harm. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the fourth licensing objective.
30. The purpose of Southwark's statement of licensing policy is to make clear to applicants what considerations will be taken into account when determining applications and should act as a guide to the sub-committee when considering the applications. However, the sub-committee must always consider each application on its own merits and allow exceptions to the normal policy where these are justified by the circumstances of the application.
31. The premises are located in Peckham major town centre area. Below are closing times suggested in the statement of licensing policy, in respect of Peckham major town centre area, for off licences and grocers / supermarkets where sales of alcohol are permitted:
- Monday to Sunday: 00:00.

Resource implications

32. A fee of £190.00 has been paid by the applicant company in respect of this application being the statutory fee payable for premises within non-domestic rateable value band B.

Consultation

33. Consultation has been carried out on this application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. A public notice was published in a local newspaper and similar notices were exhibited outside of the premises for a period of 28 consecutive days.

Community impact statement

34. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Democracy

35. The sub-committee is asked to determine the application for a premises licence under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.
36. The principles which sub-committee members must apply are set out below.

Principles for making the determination

37. The general principle is that applications for premises licence applications must be granted unless relevant representations are received. This is subject to the proviso that the applicant has complied with regulations in advertising and submitting the application.

38. Relevant representations are those which:
- Are about the likely effect of the granting of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives
 - Are made by an interested party or responsible authority
 - Have not been withdrawn
 - Are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority, frivolous or vexatious.
39. If relevant representations are received then the sub-committee must have regard to them, in determining whether it is necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives to:
- To grant the licence subject to:
 - The conditions mentioned in section 18 (2)(a) modified to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives
 - Any condition which must under section 19, 20 or 21 be included in the licence
 - To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates
 - To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor
 - To reject the application.

Conditions

40. The sub-committee's discretion is thus limited. It can only modify the conditions put forward by the applicant, or refuse the application, if it is necessary to do so. Conditions must be necessary and proportionate for the promotion of one of the four licensing objectives, and not for any other reason. Conditions must also be within the control of the licensee, and should be worded in a way which is clear, certain, consistent and enforceable.
41. The four licensing objectives are:
- The prevention of crime and disorder
 - Public safety
 - The prevention of nuisance
 - The protection of children from harm.
42. Members should note that each objective is of equal importance. There are no other licensing objectives, and the four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.
43. Conditions will not be necessary if they duplicate a statutory position. Conditions relating to night café and take away aspect of the license must relate to the night time operation of the premises and must not be used to impose conditions which could not be imposed on day time operators.
44. Members are also referred to the Home Office revised guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 on conditions, specifically section 10.

Reasons

45. If the sub-committee determines that it is necessary to modify the conditions, or to refuse the application for a premises licence application, it must give reasons for its decision.

Hearing procedures

46. Subject to the licensing hearing regulations, the licensing committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that:
- The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Cross examination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations.
 - Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing.
 - The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to:
 - Address the authority
 - If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
 - In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
 - The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant to the particular application before the committee and the licensing objectives.
 - The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
 - In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.
47. This matter relates to the determination of an application for a premises licence under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regulation 26(1) (a) requires the sub-committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

Council's multiple roles and the role of the licensing sub-committee

48. Sub-committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the council as authority responsible respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health and safety and as the planning authority.
49. Members should note that the licensing sub-committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The sub-committee sits in quasi-judicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing

of the application. In this case, members should disregard the council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the licensing law, guidance and the council's statement of licensing policy.

50. As a quasi-judicial body, the licensing sub-committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The sub-committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The licensing sub-committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.
51. The licensing sub-committee is entitled to consider events outside of the premises if they are relevant, i.e. are properly attributable to the premises being open. The proprietors do not have to be personally responsible for the incidents for the same to be relevant. However, if such events are not properly attributable to the premises being open, then the evidence is not relevant and should be excluded. Guidance is that the licensing authority will primarily focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, working or engaged in normal activity in the area concerned.
52. Members will be aware of the council's code of conduct which requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The code applies to members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.

The sub-committee can only consider matters within the application that have been raised through representations from other persons and responsible authorities. Other persons must live in the vicinity of the premises. This will be decided on a case to case basis.

53. Under the Human Rights Act 1998, the sub-committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The sub-committee has a duty under section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent crime and disorder in the borough.
54. Other persons, responsible authorities and the applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the sub-committee to the magistrates' court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against.

Guidance

55. Members are required to have regard to the Home Office revised guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood, members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance

56. The head of community safety and enforcement has confirmed that the costs of this process are borne by the service.
