

The meeting opened at 7.05pm.

1. Apologies: Councillor Ladipo(lateness).

- 2. Notification of any items the Chair deems urgent: None were notified.
- **3. Disclosure of Members' interests and dispensations:** Councillor Seaton declared that he was a resident of the Aylesbury estate.
- 4, Housing and Regeneration on the Heygate and Aylesbury estates

Councillor Humphreys, the Executive Member for Housing and Councillor Noblet, the Executive Member for Regeneration informed the meeting of the latest statistices for the number of Heygate tenants who have moved.

<u>Phase 1 (Kingshill, Swanbourne, Wansey Street):</u> - 188 secure tenants have either moved or have identified housing and are waiting to move. 5 tenants remain (2 pending court action following unreasonable refusal of direct offer, 3 residents remain without direct offers: *2 in Swanbourne who can continue to bid whilst a suitable offer is identified for them (which support their <u>specific</u> medical needs), 1 Kingshill (immigration case which has now been resolved (resident recently granted indefinite leave to remain)).

<u>Phase 2 (Ashenden, Cuddington):</u> - 153 secure tenants have either moved or have identified housing and are waiting to move. 26 tenants remaining (4 issued with direct offer - 2 waiting to view, 2 refused pending legal action).

<u>Phase 3 (Claydon, Chearsley, Marston, Risborough)</u>: - 132 secure tenants have either moved or have identified housing and are waiting to move. 137 tenants remaining (2 issued with direct offers, 4 with outstanding offers from Homesearch).

<u>Phase 4 (Wingrave, Rodney Road):</u> - 31 secure tenants have either moved or have identified housing and are waiting to move. 40 tenants remaining (4 issued with direct offers, 1 with outstanding offer from Homesearch).

<u>Temporary Accommodation</u> – There are 77 remaining TA households across the entire estate.

<u>Wansey Street</u> – Almost vacant: No secure tenants remaining, 1 leaseholder with legal instructed and 1 TA resident who is awaiting direct offer.

Leaseholders:

The present position is that 132 residential leases acquired, and 48 residential leases to acquire. Of these terms are agreed and lawyers instructed in 10 cases, and discussions are taking place in 33 cases. 2 leaseholders have not yet engaged at all with the Council.

The case management team are working with 21 leaseholders who are seeking re-housing assistance from the council.

27 of the original 33 financial assessments being undertaken have now been completed, 11 of which have now been bought back.

- 4 leaseholders who are currently engaged in negotiations are therefore waiting for the outcome of their financial assessments.
- 11 Leaseholders who have completed their financial assessments have been registered to bid on Homesearch; 4 of which have bid successfully and are awaiting HIPs, 1 who has been recommended for a Council tenancy and has viewed a property which they are happy to accept, and 1 who has now found a property in the open market.

Timetable for Clearing Blocks:

Phase 1-5 secure tenants remaining: -2 pending court action following unreasonable refusal of direct offers, 3 waiting for suitable direct offer encompassing their housing needs (please see above*).

Phase 2 - Vacant possession scheduled for the end of March 2009.

Phases 3 and 4 – Vacant possession scheduled for September 2009.

Currently working on demolition phasing and contract procurement – plans for parts of phase 1 to be demolished by the end of this year (Dec 2009) and for demolition to be completed in the financial year 2009-2010.

Right to Return:

Legal undertaking was issued to all original 712 secure households on the estate – 250 households (35%) have returned the Legal undertaking which gives them the right to return to the new housing in the Elephant and Castle area.

Where have tenants moved to?:

Reports compiled last year show that 72.7% of households who moved between June 2007 and December 2008 signed up to LBS tenancies, and 27.3% of households signed up to RSL tenancies. This could act as a projection of the number of residents who want to move to RSL or LBS properties.

No recording of how many people want RSL/LBS as bidding via Homesearch enables residents to choose according to what is advertised.

The report also showed that 35.9% of households who moved between June 2007 and December 2008 moved into properties in the SE17 area, and 23.7% moved to the SE1 area.

Councillor Noblet gave the following statistics:

The information in the tables below compares the unit mix as of December 2008 with the position following recent negotiations with the HCA. Please note however that the Newington south scheme which is being developed by Wandle is still being finalised by the HCA and therefore the final scheme mix may be subject to some further variation.

A number of questions were raised:

- In response to the Chair, Councillor Humphreys agreed to provide Members with monthly updates on these statistics
- In response to Councillor Gurling, Councillor Humphreys said that the 72% of tenants who signed up for Southwark tenancies was equivalent to approximately 350 tenancies
- Councillor McNeill, said that some leaseholders felt the valuations of their properties was unfair as
 legally the valuations had to match other valuations in the area. Some leaseholders had not taken
 the offers made, as they could have taken earlier offers that were higher. Councillor Humphreys
 said that all purchases were made on a voluntary basis, and could not be backdated, as the
 Council would be liable to legal challenge by the District Auditor
- In response to Councillor Gurling, Councillor Humphreys said that all offers were time limited.
- Councillor Seaton asked if the Council would contribute to the 2% stamp duty. Councillor
 Humphreys said that the Council can pay up to 1%, so leaseholders whose offer fell in the 2%
 bracket would have to pay duty over 1%
- Councillor Seaton said that 250 households have signed the Right of Return legal agreement.
 Councillor Humphreys said that those tenants who wished to remain Council tenants would not be returning to the Heygate area as there will be no Council properties
- Councillor Bates said that there were broken lifts, missing lights and feacal matter in corridors in
 existing Heygate blocks. Councillor Humphreys said that the Council was doing as much as it can
 to ensure safety of the remaining tenants; there were some problems with lifts as tenants moving
 out were putting additional strains with furniture and packing cases in the lifts
- Helen O'Brien asked if tenants were not rehoused in the Heygate within 7 years, then the Right to Return agreement would lapse. Councillor Humphreys said that the Council was able to vary the agreement; no delays would prevent tenants returning to the Heygate
- A resident said that the Right to Return agreement had to be returned by 31 August, it was
 unrealistic to expect to return after 10-15 years. Councillor Humphreys said that the Council is still
 accepting Right to Return letters, and will accept signed letters
- Peter Wright of 'East Walworth Green Links', said that there were 13 early housing sites, some to be built on green sites and he asked for Councillor Noblet's assurances that Nursery Row Park was not going to be built on
- Mr Beedle said that most people will go into Housing Association property, with higher rents, and fewer facilities. People should be able to return to the Heygate with the same rents and facilities. Councillor Humphreys explained that Council rents are set on a National Assessment related to inflation with a rent increase of 5.9%. The Council has successfully lobbied the Government for a reduction, as the rate of inflation has decreased: the rent increase has been reduced to 2.1%. Affordable housing can be Council housing, or Housing Association housing. It is true that Housing

Association rents are higher, but the Government is trying to make the rents the same. It is made explicit from the start that those choosing the Right to Return are choosing Housing Association properties

- Councillor Gurling asked that Councillor Humphreys clarify that the 7 year limit on the Right to Return will mean no Council Housing on the Heygate estate
- A resident expressed concern that parts of the Nursery Row Park were going to be built on.
 Councillor Noblet said that the Council is trying to work with the Housing Associations to build on
 the Stead Street car park, rather than the orchard in the park. However, this might mean fewer
 units, or higher buildings which could have an unacceptable impact on the Peabody Trust estate to
 the north of the site. It was important to maintain the broad links with the park, and Section 106
 money is being used to link Burgess Park with the Old Kent Road.
- Councillor Bates asked about the remaining early housing sites. Councillor Noblet said that calling
 the sites 'early' has become offensive to residents. The finances are ready for an April start for the
 Newington South site, the Royal Road is in the final design stage, and going to the planning unit in
 May, with planning permission gained hopefully by August recess. The timeline for the Pocock
 Street site will be circulated to Members via the Chair
- Councillor Bates asked about the 'Viability Test'. Councillor Humphreys explained that this meant schemes were viable to the Homes & Community Agency, and that the model used by the Agency had changed, with more social rented units in each scheme
- In response to Councillor Mohamed, Councillor Humphreys said that 'viability' was changing on a
 weekly basis as the Homes & Community Agency is giving more funding so that Housing
 Associations can now commit to more schemes
- Councillor Pidgeon said that everyone is pleased that there are not going to be buildings on the park
- Councillor Pidgeon said that Boris Johnson's office was blocking the plans for priority for cyclists and pedestrians on the southern roundabout. Councillor Noblet said that the Council should get the go-ahead for the demolition of the roundabout, and the smaller sized installation of a T-junction. Work is underway with shop owners and businesses to create a nicer streetscape. TfL have said that the price of the northern roundabout is higher than they originally thought. The Chief Executive Officer of Lend Lease plc is committed to achieving a final agreement. It is hoped that the agreement will be reached by May/June 2009. The Phase 1 will be vacant for as short a period of time as possible whilst any plans await planning permission
- Richard Lee asked if Members understood residents' feelings of loss for garages, green spaces etc.
 Would the Council carry out an Equalities Impact Assessment, and make the finding available to
 residents? (See Public Questions) There will still be some loss of amenity; can Section 106 funds
 be used to replace amenity close by? Councillor Noblet said there was a balance between
 amenity and enough housing for all. In Stage 2, once development begins there will be a rolling
 programme of Impact Assessment. The loss of amenity for each planning application forms part of
 the Planning Officers' reports. Residents need to talk to their Ward Councillors, as Section 106 and
 Cleaner Greener Safer projects can be used for green links etc
- Councillor Gurling said there was a proposal to use Section 106 monies for funding the Crossrail
 projects. Councillor Noblet said that Members from both Walworth and Borough & Bankside
 Community Council areas had raised pressing needs for Section 106 money, together with
 Supplementary Business Levies; these should go to projects in Southwark Council
- A resident asked about the development in Crown Terrace, and requested a public meeting with
 developers in Nursery Row Park. Councillor Noblet said that the drafts of the masterplan would
 require community input, and the Council will come to meet residents with developers in May/June.
 The scheme will preserve the northern entrance to the park. There is a need for larger units as
 people want private homes with gardens and social housing tenants want gardens. It is really
 desireable that local people see the masterplan before it goes through the planning process.
- Jerry Flynn said that there are only plans for 89 social rented homes out of 1600 in the Elephant & Castle redevelopment and in the plans for Eileen House, there will not be any social housing.
 Councillor Humphreys said there will be 204 socially rented units on 6 sites. Whilst he did not know about Eileen House, a similar property has 76 units of social housing.
- Jerry Flynn said he was talking about 39P, the 6 sites on the Elephant & Castle. Councillor
 Humphreys said that there will be 420 affordable housing units, and he will give details through the
 Chair. There will be section 106 agreements needed for the redevelopment of 8 Main Plaza
- Councillor Lauder asked if there were any plans to enhance the heating and hot water systems on the Aylesbury estate, as the systems keep breaking down. Councillor Humphreys said that the Council is working with the TRA, as there is a need to maintain the buildings to 'Decent Homes' standards. The Aylesbury Steering Group has a planned maintenance programme of works to improve maintenance of the blocks. Councillor Humphreys said he would take up the problems of

the break downs with Margaret O'Brien. He also commented that the Prime Minister had said that Councils which reached certain undisclosed standards would be able to build new Council housing.

A resident complained that the heating in Council-run blocks was turned off in May.

5. Deputations: There were none,

Burgess Park.(the Chair took this as a late item)

There is a £6 million scheme to improve Burgess Park, £2 million from the Mayor of London's parks scheme and £4 million from the Aylesbury NDC. The parks team thank the Community Council for their support and residents for voting for Burgess Park. The park will form an integral part of the regeneration of the area. Improvements include: better access to nature, the removal of the redundant roads in the park, a better path network, the unification of different elements and features and the improvement of entrances and boundaries. Officers will be meeting with local stakeholders and enable community involvement in the plans.

6. Chair's Announcements: Car Clubs stall, Primary Care Trust stall and 'Cleaner Greener Safer' stall.

7. The Community Fund – Donald Forde

This year's scheme will be launched on April 1 2009, with £15,000 for community events. Donald Forde asked Members and residents for input into how the fund should be distributed.

Councillor Bates said that no one knew about the scheme, and no one was told except people attending Community Council meetings and through leaflets in the Area Housing Office; outreach to the community is needed, there is not sufficient publicity. Donald Forde responded that the scheme is always and increasingly oversubscribed, and there is no shortage of groups aware of the fund. Councillor Bates reiterated that there should be more outreach work.

Councillor Pidgeon said that the scheme is very successful, and Forid Ahmed works very hard with local groups. Events such as the Brandon Festival are very popular with residents, perhaps the upper limit for funding could be raised to £1,500 per event, but there should be tight conditions for awards, requiring photos.

Residents felt that no one should be discouraged from applying, that if the individual awards were capped at £1,000 more groups would benefit.

Councillor Seaton said that people did not understand the difference between the 'Cleaner Greener Safer' scheme and the Community Fund. There could be a theme, perhaps involving schools, based on youth environment and socialisation.

Councillor Pidgeon said there could be a theme of youth and families, not connected directly to schools. Schools are already involved in events like the Brandon Festival.

The Chair said that concentrating on schools leaves out the community.

Councillor Bates said that a wide spectrum of bids is more desireable.

The Latin American Disabled Group

This group received £1,000 to take users on trips to the beach, and involved youths as well. The Hampton Court trip benefited 100 people.

The Southwark Pensioners Centre

The £1,000 awarded to the centre was combined with money from Trusts to provide computer training for older people. The largest group availing themselves of the training came from Camberwell, but the next largest group was from Walworth. Courses were provided for beginners through to advanced users. The award made it possible to target users at different standards.

DECISION: That awards by Walworth Community Council be capped at £1,000. **Action: Donald Forde ACTION:** That the Chair be provided with a schedule of outreach for the Community Fund.

Action: Donald Forde

8. 'Pride of Place': the Chief Executive will come to Walworth CC for the April meeting

Donald Forde explained that the Chief Executive will be visiting all the Community Council areas including Walworth. She will visit the area, touring sites selected by Members and residents, and then attend the April 27 Community Council meeting in the evening.

The Rev. Shaw asked if Members could move away from problems, some community facilities might disappear, such as the Walworth Road library, but there will be opportunities for Walworth.

Councillor Bates said that when the Chief Executive visited Walworth before there it was positive, but the follow up was left behind.

Mr Crawford asked who would be accompanying the Chief Executive on her tour, as there is a problem with traffic in East Walworth, and Donald told him that everyone was welcome.

Mr Yuretan said that there were very few libraries in Southwark, and people were not able to study.

9. Police & Community Wardens

Inspector Peter Romilly introduced himself as the police officer in charge of the Safer Neighbourhood Teams (SNT) in Southwark; he said that he was passionate about community policing, and was pleased that many people had told him how good the SNTs were.

Sergeant Julia Croft reported for the three Walworth SNTs:

Faraday Ward

The Ward priorities were youth engagement/diversion, anti-social behaviour in the four towers and robberies in the Walworth Road. There is a new Police Constable in the SNT, Steve Brown.

East Walworth

Ward priorities are anti-social behaviour in Barlow and Congreve estates, anti-social behaviour and safe routes in Burgess Park and anti-social behaviour & prostitution in the Kinglake estate near the Old Kent Road.

The next Ward panel will be on Wednesday June 3 at the Heygate TRA Hall

A crime prevention day was held at the Elephant & Castle, a Crime Survey was carried out in Burgess Park; there will be a Crime Prevention day in the park from 10am with partner agencies.

Millwall FC has taken the lead on Friday night football on the Burgess Park astroturf.

Newington

Priorities are anti-social behaviour on the Pullen estate and De Laune Street and speeding in the 20mph zone.

The next Ward Panel is on March 25 at Walworth Police Station.

There will be a Crime Prevention Day at 1 Crampton Street at noon on March 28, when mobile phones and bicycles can be marked.

The Community Payback scheme will be working on Newington garages and hall.

A youth club will be opening on the Newington estate.

10. Minutes of the meeting held on February 11 2009

Decision: That the minutes of the meeting held on February 11 2009 be confirmed, with an amendment to Public Question number 2 which should read: 'Why were Walworth residents not informed that the planned 'beacon' in Walworth Road would not now be installed?'

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Appendix 1 - PUBLIC QUESTIONS

No.	Question	Action by:		
1.	There are problems accessing the lavatories in Council owned buildings: there is a need for a sign in the Walworth Road directing the public to the lavatories. The manager at the Cuming Museum will not permit anyone to use the lavatories provided for Museum visitors, including actual visitors. Your community council has £15000 to support activities run by local groups. Bids for grants of between £100 and £1000 can be made to Walworth community council via a very simple application form.

Who can apply?

The Community Council Fund was set-up for new and emerging groups and small organisations to hold one-off events and activities. Groups are encouraged to work in partnership with other groups. Who can apply:

- Any constituted local group (i.e. that has a business bank account and letter-headed paper) or any group/individual that has a sponsor organisation (with bank account & letter-headed paper) who can administer the funds on their behalf
- Any community group that is based in the community council area they wish to bid to, and plan to hold their project in that area. (Please see the enclosed community council postcode list and map to find out which is your community council)

What kind of things can be funded?

The Community Council Fund can fund a variety of projects. Examples include:

- a one off event such as a fun-day or a football tournament
- a series of workshops/activities involving members of the local community
- publicity/merchandise to advertise the event you are doing

What kind of things we will not be funded?

Anything which is capital funding. Examples include:

- building works
- large playground equipment

How much can groups bid for?

Local groups can make bids up to £1000 and in some cases a higher bid may be considered. Help can be requested with completing application forms and advice sought about the types of applications that are likely to get approval (please see overleaf for who to contact).





How and when can you bid?

You can put in a bid by completing an application form and returning it to the contact address below. You are advised to return your application form by **Friday May 15 2009**.

Who makes the decisions on what gets funded?

Council officers will assess and make recommendations but locally elected councillors will ultimately be responsible for making decisions on which groups get funding.

Decisions for applications received by **Friday May 15 2009** will be made by councillors no later than July and you will be notified of decisions by letter.

It is possible that the decisions will be given out at a special meeting before you are notified by letter, but you will be informed of this once you have submitted your application.

What type of criteria will be used to judge applications?

- The project is a revenue project: i.e. it involves the money being spent on an activity/event (e.g. fun-day, education day, work-shops) or on certain materials/goods that will contribute to a group activity/or revenue project (e.g. play equipment for a nursery, publicity or merchandise for an event)
- The project is seen to benefit the local community (e.g. a number of local people involved/a number of people will benefit from the project in some way)
- The money must be spent before the end of March 2010
- The group bidding for the project is based in the community council area it is bidding to, and will be carrying-out the project in that area (unless it is a project for an outing e.g. to theatre/other place of interest outside of area)
- The project involves mostly local residents
- The group agrees to complete a feedback/monitoring form about the project and provide evidence of spend, once the project is completed

Please note:

That groups that are not constituted who would like to apply or individuals with project ideas are advised to get in touch with the community council involvement coordinator for their area for advice (contact details below).

Please note that priority will be given to:

- Applications that show a high level of community involvement
- Projects that demonstrate groups working together
- New and emerging groups who have not previously received funding from this small grants scheme

Groups can submit more than one application form but will only be awarded for one of their project ideas (with a maximum award of £1000) from the small grants' scheme.
