

Main Meeting

Draft Minutes of the meeting of Walworth Community Council subject to approval at the next meeting Wednesday February 13 2008 Aylesbury Day Centre, Bradenham Close, Walworth SE17 2QB

Please note all text in italics is an addition to the minutes after the meeting.

Present

Councillors: Abdul Mohamed (Chair), Lorraine Lauder (Vice-Chair), Paul Bates, James Gurling, Jelil Ladipo, Caroline Pidgeon, Martin Seaton and Jane Salmon

The meeting opened at 7.10pm.

- 1. Apologies Apologies for absence were submitted on behalf of Councillor McNeill and Forid Ahmed (CIDU).
- 3. Notification of any items the Chair deems urgent None were notified.
- 4. Disclosure of Members' interests and dispensations None made.

5. Chair's announcements:

- Litem 8: Stead Street redevelopment would be taken after item 15.
- □ There is a display of the 'Streets for People' scheme at Salisbury Row at the back.

6. Confirmation of minutes from the last main meeting

<u>RESOLVED:</u> That the minutes of the Main meeting held on November 7 2007 be approved as an accurate record of the meeting.

7. Deputations

No deputation requests had been lodged.

8. Stead Street redevelopment:

Jon Abbott informed the Community Council that the purpose of the redevelopment is to provide housing for displaced Heygate residents. Partnerships have been formed between the Council, and Guinness and Wandle Housing Associations; efforts are being made to manage the development sensitively and to mitigate the effects on the local area. Plans will be brought to the March meeting of the Community Council for display to residents, and the meeting will be part of the consultation. Part of the difficulty is that the Council does not own all the land needed for the development. Alternative retail space may need to be planned.

- In Mr Dennison, of the Friends of Nursery Road, asked if the planning application for Crown Terrace would be submitted separately from the Stead Street application. Jon said that this was possible, but the whole scheme will be displayed, including Crown Street.
- Councillor Lauder said that market traders' large vehicles needed to be parked in the car park that would disappear under the development plans. Jon said that there was plenty of street parking and there are other alternatives.
- Mr Crawford asked if the Elephant & Castle Trust existed? Jon said he would arrange for details of the Trust to be made available.
 Action: John Abbott
- Mr Beadell said that the exhibition of models of the new buildings for Nursery Road and accompanying questionnaires were not a proper consultation, more a road show. Jon said that he could circulate the outputs of the four years of consultation, which had been funded without any subsidy from the Housing Corporation. Residents should note that the provision of homes for sale would fund the provision of social housing.
- In Mr Beadell said he wanted the times and dates of consultation events etc. Jon said that the Major Projects Team would carry out the 100-metre consultation, and he will bring dates and times to a future meeting of the Community Council.

Action: John Abbott

 Councillor Salmon expressed concern about the retailers directly affected by the development. Jon said that it was hoped to phase the demolition of the shops when their new permanent premises were available.

- In response to a resident's question about the potential for the removal of the southern roundabout at Elephant & Castle, Jon said that negotiations were underway with TfL, who were the responsible highways authority. It was possible that the roundabout could be removed by the end of 2009.
- **9.** Adult Learning Opportunities: residents were invited to join leisure classes or practical classes provided by the Council. The Head of Adult Learning asked residents to let her know if there were activities that people wanted not listed.
 - In Mr Beedell asked if there was a metalwork class. Dolly Naeem responded that this was not currently on offer, but she would look into it.

11. Police, Community Safety and Community Wardens: Sergeant Boneofaith spoke for all the Safer Neighbourhood Teams:

East Walworth

Problems raised at the Ward Panel included anti-social behaviour and drug dealing at Darwin Court, begging and anti-social behaviour in Coburg Road. SNT operations had resulted in the recovery of 2 handguns, and five arrests. Working with the Council, possession has been taken of 25 squatted dwellings, which are now available for letting to homeless families. <u>Faraday</u>

Priorities included drug dealing and anti-social behaviour on the Portland estate, and street robberies and anti-social behaviour in the Walworth Road. Anti-Social Behaviour Orders have been obtained for 2 youths. Community work has taken place with young people. <u>Newington</u>

Problems reported include difficulties on the Draper House, drug dealing on the Pasley estate and anti social behaviour in Mullet Way. Moving patrols have been carried out with CESBO.

Residents were reminded that Ward Panels (which set the priorities for the SNTs) needed more volunteers.

There will be an event "The Big Chat" on Saturday March 1st from 11am – 4pm at Avonmouth House, 6 Avonmouth Street, London SE1 6NX when residents are invited to 'Meet and Mingle'. People from the refugee community, young people and businesspeople are particularly welcome.

Community Wardens

The Community Wardens aim to tackle anti-social behaviour, enhance social behaviour and encourage good environmental practice. Current activities included a CCTV audit of the Brandon estate, joint patrols with police on the Heygate, providing additional youth provision on the Elizabeth estate, holding regular meetings with community groups, setting up a library on the Brandon estate and daily patrols with the police Schools Teams, concentrating on Walworth Academy.

- Councillor Lauder asked how many Wardens were on patrol at any time. The response was that there were two daily shifts of four people. Resources are concentrated at the end of the school day, when the majority of anti-social behaviour occurs.
- □ Mr Yuruten asked when the Wardens patrol. The hours are:

12 noon – 8pm
9am – 10.30pm
10am – 6pm

The Wardens do not patrol outside these hours except at community events etc.

 Norma asked why the Wardens wear a red jacket; this makes it hard to see them. The response was that the jackets were coloured red as part of the response to terrorism. Currently the jackets are being redesigned.

12. Cleaner Greener Safer scheme for 2008-09:

Application forms have been circulated to community groups. Members requested some information about the successful projects from past years.

13. The Aylesbury Area Action Plan (AAAP):

The regeneration of the Aylesbury estate has been preserved, despite the shortfall in the Direct Support Grant from central Government. A partnership has been formed between Southwark Council and the Aylesbury New Deal for Communities (NDC) board. Progress towards the regeneration of the estate will continue without delay; agreed funding has been arranged. The NDC funding has preserved the work of the project delivery team, and the partnership between the Council and residents has been strengthened.

The preferred options for the AAAP will be reported to Council Assembly; and the consultation period will begin on February 19 when the report is published for Planning Committee, which takes place on February 26 2008. A big exhibition of the options will be arranged. When the options are finalised, a report will be brought to the Community Council.

Councillor Gurling said that the plans for the estate were now becoming more real, and people should get involved, as the plans will guide the future development of the area.

A number of questions were asked and/or comments made:

- Councillor Seaton said that residents in East Walworth were part of the footprint of the AAAP, although not part of the Aylesbury estate, will those residents get information on the AAAP? Mr Corbyn said that people had not received leaflets, particularly those on the Alvey estate. *Tim Cutts provided a full response: A letter was sent to Alvey T&RA on 2 October advising that the council were consulting on the issues and options report and providing notification of the public exhibition held on October 19 and 20. Following that, a newsletter outlining the AAP process and promoting the Issues and Options consultation was dispatched to every property in the AAP boundary on the 13/14th October 2007. Most of the East Walworth ward is not included in the AAP boundary, so not all residents of the ward would have received them. The Alvey T&RA has been included however, and leaflets were dispatched to Innis and Dunnico Houses which are part of the Alvey estate and fall within the AAP boundary.*
- Councillor Seaton expressed concern as to the fate of those residents living on the periphery when the Aylesbury estate was demolished. These residents should be informed personally.
- Councillor Salmon said that the officers involved in past consultations on the Aylesbury had apologised. The Leader had given assurances and a meeting was called very swiftly. She hoped officers would use the opportunity to conduct interesting consultation events with residents.
- □ A resident said that there have been two big exhibitions and advertising.
- A resident said that Alvey, Kinglake and Surrey Square are affected by the Preferred Options. There are 24,000 residents in the footfall of the AAAP. The *Creation* organisation is only part of the scheme; how will residents relate to the process? Tim Cutts said that *Creation* was set up to conduct regeneration on the estate, but the AAAP covered a wider area, including Burg Place.
- Councillor Seaton suggested that periphery estate TRAs could be asked to appoint representatives to the *Creation* board.
- Councillor Gurling said that officers have argued that the effects of regeneration will not just affect the Aylesbury estate. Officers should ensure there are wider benefits to those on the outskirts of the Aylesbury estate
- Councillor Bates asked how the regeneration process was going to be overseen.
- In Mr Beadell said he lived close to the Aylesbury estate; he asked how much of the new housing would be social housing and how much owner occupied. He was told that of the current 2,700 dwellings, 2,200 are social housing. After the regeneration process, there will be 5,000 new homes, of which 45% will be 'affordable'.
- Mr Clark said that people occupying 2 or 3 bed flats do not want to move to more expensive 1-bed flats.

- Councillor Bates said that the new housing would be for both people who have been rehoused from elsewhere on the estate and people who want to move into the area. No one yet knows the final details of the scheme.
- A resident said there would be 400 fewer social housing units. Tim Cutts said that officers had tried to maximise the number of social housing dwellings, but a mix was needed as the privately owned housing will fund the building of social housing.

RESOLVED: That the AAAP be brought to a future meeting of the Community Council, with reports from the planning policy & regeneration team, the Aylesbury NDC and from *Creation.* Action: Annabel Sidney

14. The Walworth Road improvements update:

Todd Strehlow said that most of the works on the Walworth Road had been completed. Outstanding projects included street lighting, benches, signage, some anti-skid treatments, thirty-eight bins needed to be installed together with racks for 57 bicycles. There are loose fittings at crossing points; these will be replaced as part of the 'snagging' process. £3.7 million has been spent on road improvements to Walworth Road.

- Norma and another resident raised concerns about vehicles cutting the corner from Manor Place into Walworth Road. Todd said that consideration was being given to installing a bell shaped bollard on the corner
- In response to residents' concerns about safety, Todd said that officers were required to carry out monitoring of usage, speeds, journey time, incidents of crime etc
- As part of the Street Management Plan, the Council will be working with retailers and businesses to ensure a quality refuse collection, street cleansing and recycling service.
- In response to a question by Donna, Todd explained that the bus lane was blocked off because the signalling was not yet operational.
- Councillor Lauder said that there were potholes in the crossings from East Street to Barclays Bank and from Somerfields to East Street; the wooden benches were already stained and cyclists were using the pavements as roadways. Todd said these problems would be dealt with during the 'snagging' process.
- Councillor Lauder said that retailers had lost takings due to the works. Todd said that an environmental scheme of this size would necessarily cause disruption; efforts had been made to manage the scheme so that sections of road were finished off, rather than have the whole road up at once.
- A resident said that cyclists were using the pavement because it was too dangerous to use the road. Todd said that Southwark Cyclists were very supportive of the scheme.
- □ A resident complimented the scheme; especially the white street lighting. Would this sort of street lighting be expanded? Todd said there was a borough-wide lighting plan.
- Councillor Seaton commented that cars were drifting on to the pavement, as there is no differentiation between the road and the pavement. Todd said that a risk assessment would be done on part of the pavements to see if street features could be used to block off the road. Todd said that a blind person had done a walkabout on the pavements, and was very pleased with the design.

- Norma said that anyone standing on the traffic island opposite the library could be run over if a car passed a parked bus. Todd said that he did not agree; the road was wide at this point, so there was enough room to allow cars to pass parked buses.
- In Mr Beadell said there was something like a panic button outside Somerfields; what is it for? Tracy Dickinson said that the button was one of 13 talking CCTV points, which will be monitored 24 hours a day. She will find out more and report back.
- Mr Clark said that it was hard for pedestrians to see the lights at the junction of Penrose St, East St and Walworth Road. Todd said changes to the cycle of light changes.

15. Annual bid to Transport for London (TfL) for road improvements:

David Moffat, from Southwark's Transport Planning Unit, outlined the details of the annual funding application to Transport for London, which provides Southwark with its funding for transport improvements. He referred to the May deadline for submitting the application to the Council's Executive and invited residents and councillors to provide ideas for improving transport in Walworth. He also identified some of the categories and criteria that must be met for successfully bidding for funding.

- Mr Yuruten asked if cyclists would be required to license their bicycles. David said he unaware of any plans for this to be put into place by Transport for London.
- Councillor Gurling said that the bid needed to be sent to TfL by the end of April, which would limit the time available for a return to the Community Council for further consultation.
- Councillor Seaton said there were problems with the roads by Manchester House.
- Mr Crawford asked if ideas from previous years were carried forward. David said that issues could be carried forward and would be considered as part of the funding submission.
- A resident suggested that a bus route travel the full length of Albany Road. David said that this would be passed onto London buses that determine the any changes to bus routes.

- Mr Glue attempted to repeat the question he had asked at the previous meeting. The Chair stated that his question was already asked and answered. Awaiting response.
- Mr Clark said that the plans to make Mason Street one-way would mean there is more traffic in nearby streets. Awaiting response.

- A resident asked why gas inspections were still taking place on the Aylesbury estate when there are no gas cookers. The Chair said that he thought there were possibly still live redundant pipes. Awaiting response.
- A resident said that the red route along the Walworth Road towards Brixton should stop at Sullivan Square. Awaiting response.

RECOMMENDATION(S)

1. It is recommended that the disabled parking bays set out in the Appendix B to this report are approved for implementation subject to the outcome of any necessary statutory procedures.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2. This report presents proposals for a number of local traffic management schemes, which are matters reserved to Community councils for decision.
- 3. The origins of the proposals are indicated in the annexed schedule.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

- 4. The reasons for the proposed traffic schemes are set out in the Appendix B.
- 5. The proposals are consistent with the policies set out in the draft Parking and Enforcement Plan, which in turn reflects the Council's policy priorities as set out in the Community Strategy and the emerging Transport Plan.
- 6. The proposals will support the Council's Equal Opportunities Policy and will promote social inclusion:
 - by providing improved access for emergency vehicles and residents
 - for disabled drivers
 - increasing parking provision

RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

7. Implementation of the proposals can be undertaken within existing budgets.

CONSULTATION

- 8. Preliminary consultation of the occupants of properties directly affected has been undertaken where appropriate.
- 9. Should the Community Council approve the item, statutory consultation will take place as part of the making of the Traffic Management Order. A proposal notice will be erected in proximity to the site location and a press notice will be published in the Southwark News and London Gazette. If there are objections the proposal, or a modified proposal will be re-submitted to the Community Council.
- 10. The Head of Transport Planning (Regeneration Department) and the Head of Parking Services (Environment and Leisure Department) have been consulted on the proposals and have no objections.
- 11. No Consultation or comment has been sought from the Borough Solicitor & Secretary or the Chief Finance Officer.
