RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That council assembly consider the following constitutional issues for the coming municipal year 2007/08:
 - Appointment of leader and the executive
 - Proportionality/size and composition of committees
 - Appointment of chairs and vice chairs
 - Appointment of councillor members on standards committee
 - Appointment of councillor members on licensing committee
 - Establishing the voluntary bodies appointment panel
 - Establishing the constitutional steering panel
 - Agreeing dates of council assembly meetings for 2007/08
 - Appointments to local government association general assembly
- 2. That council assembly notes the appointment of political group leaders, deputies and whips, as set out in Appendix A.

Appointment of Leader of the Council and the Executive

- 3. That council assembly elects a leader of the council.
 - Notes: 1. Following the appointment of the leader, council assembly will receive a report by the leader on nominations for appointment to the executive. The leader can nominate between 2 and 9 members to form an executive. The leader can also report on any further delegations as set out in paragraph 26, subject to the approval of council assembly.
 - 2. The leader will report on the establishment of the Major Projects Board as an executive committee for the municipal year 2007/08. The revised matters reserved to the board are attached as an appendix to the constitutional review report.
- 4. That council assembly appoints the executive.

Proportionality/Size and Composition of Council Committees

5. That the corporate parenting panel be reconstituted as an ordinary committee. Its terms of reference to include reviewing and monitoring the council's role as a corporate parent and making recommendations to the executive on action deemed necessary.

Note: The corporate parenting panel is comprised of 7 places, allocated on a politically proportionate basis of 3 Labour, 3 Liberal Democrat and 1 Conservative, including the executive member with responsibility for children's services. As an ordinary committee, allocation of places would be determined by political proportionality relative to other ordinary committees.

6. That the size and composition of the council's regulatory and other committees be established and appointed as follows:

The new figures are shown in bold. The 2006/07 figures are shown in brackets.

Notes: 1. The size and composition of the council's regulatory and other committees known as "ordinary committees" is set out above. This is based on a total number of **35** seats and includes the committees established in the 2006/07 municipal year and the corporate parenting committee. The proportionality is based on the total number of seats compared to the overall allocation of seats each political group has on the council (see Appendix E).

The proposed allocation is based on the assumption that the disciplinary appeals committee contains an additional place for the Labour Group. However members should note that this is only one

option and other variations are possible.

- 2. It is for council assembly to agree the total number of seats and allocate the appointments, planning, disciplinary appeals, audit and corporate parenting committees to committees numbered 1 to 5 in the table above.
- 3. At least one member of the executive shall serve on the appointments committee.
- 4. Only one member of the executive and only one member of the overview and scrutiny committee shall serve on the audit committee.
- 5. It is proposed that the corporate parenting panel to be chaired by the executive member with responsibility for children's services, who would be nominated by his/her political group.
- 6. No more than one member of the executive may be a member of the audit committee and no executive member may chair the committee. No more than one member of the overview and scrutiny committee may be a member of the audit committee and no member of the overview and scrutiny committee may chair the committee.

Community Councils

7. That the size and composition of community councils as set out in Appendix B be noted.

Overview and Scrutiny Committee

8. That the size and composition of the overview and scrutiny committee, as set out below, be approved:

Notes:

- 1. The overview and scrutiny procedure rules provide that the overview and scrutiny committee will consist of the chair, vice chair and the chairs of the scrutiny sub committees provided that the proportionality rules are not compromised. Each political group is permitted to nominate one non-executive member should this be necessary to maintain proportionality, for example, where there are fewer chairs of scrutiny sub committees than places on the overview and scrutiny committee.
- 2. The overview and scrutiny committee and any sub committee which scrutinises the council's education functions will contain in its membership four voting co-opted members comprising one Church of England, one Roman Catholic Church and two

parent governor representatives.

- 3. No member of the executive shall serve on a scrutiny committee.
- 4. In 2006/07 the overview and scrutiny committee comprised 9 members. The political composition of the committee was Liberal Democrats 4; Labour 4; and Conservative 1.

Scrutiny Sub committees

9. That in accordance with overview and scrutiny procedure rules, the themed scrutiny sub committees be appointed by overview and scrutiny committee.

Note: The overview and scrutiny committee shall meet at the rise of council assembly.

Appointment of Chairs and Vice chairs

- 10. That council assembly appoints the chair and vice chair of the overview and scrutiny committee.
- 11. That council assembly considers whether it wishes to appoint chairs and vice chairs for the following committees:
 - (i) Planning committee
 - (ii) Licensing committee
 - (iii) Appointments committee
 - (iv) Disciplinary appeal committee
 - (v) Audit committee
 - (vi) Corporate parenting panel

Note: The executive member for children's services and education will chair this committee. Council assembly is asked to formally approve this appointment.

- (vii) Community councils
 - Borough and Bankside
 - Bermondsey
 - Rotherhithe
 - Walworth
 - Peckham
 - Camberwell
 - Nunhead and Peckham
 - Dulwich

Note: All outstanding appointments will be referred to the first meeting of the respective committee or community council in the 2007/08 municipal year.

Standards Committee

12. That council assembly appoints five councillors to serve on the standards committee. Officers recommend allocating members places on the basis of 2 Liberal Democrat, 2 Labour, and 1 Conservative as the lowest number of councillors at which the committee would be proportionate and on which all political groups are represented (as defined by the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 and Regulation 8 of the Local Government (Committees and Political Groups) Regulations 1990)

Note:

In 2006/07 the allocation of seats was 2 Liberal Democrat, 2 Labour and 1 Conservative. This was proportionate and ensured all political groups were represented. Independent members must make up 25% of the membership.

- 13. That council assembly notes the serving independent members (appointed in accordance with the Relevant Authorities (Standards Committee) Regulations 2001) and their date of retirement from office:
 - (i) Wendy Golding (until constitutional council May 2007)
 - (ii) Jean Sackur (until constitutional council May 2008)
 - (iii) Bola Ogun (until constitutional council May 2009)
 - (iv) Mark Roelofsen (until constitutional council May 2009)
- 14. That in accordance with article 9(f) of the constitution, the election of chair and vice chair takes place at the first meeting of the standards committee in the 2007/08 municipal year.

Licensing Committee

15. That council assembly appoints 15 councillors to serve on the licensing committee with the following allocation of seats: 7 Liberal Democrat, 7 Labour and 1 Conservative.

Notes:

- 1. In 2006/07 council assembly agreed to establish the committee on a proportionate basis.
- 2. For 2007/08 the proportionate allocation would remain the same. The allocation is a matter for council assembly to decide and need not be proportionate.

Licensing Sub Committee

16. That council assembly appoints a licensing sub committee with delegated authority to hear all license applications including personal and premises licenses, reviews of licenses and temporary event notices. The sub committee to include all members of the licensing committee with a quorum of three members.

Urgency Committee

17. That council assembly agree to reconstitute the urgency committee to function during an interim period between a municipal election and council assembly with the following terms of reference and membership:

- Terms of Reference delegated power to exercise all the functions of the council, that are not reserved to council for decision in cases where, in the opinion of the chief executive it is necessary to act urgently in order to secure the efficient and expeditious conduct of the council's business.
- Membership the membership of the committee to comprise the leaders (or nominee) of the two largest political groups of the council (1 reserve member each – deputy leaders (or nominee)).

Establishment of Voluntary Bodies Appointment Panel

18. That council assembly establishes and determines the composition of the voluntary bodies appointment panel which will be responsible for making recommendations on appointments to Southwark charities and making appointments to school governing bodies.

Note:

It is proposed that there be six members of the panel, including one independent member. In 2006/07 the panel, which was appointed by the standards committee, comprised 2 Liberal Democrat, 2 Labour and 1 Conservative member.

Constitutional Steering Panel

19. That council assembly agrees to establish a constitutional steering panel comprised of the whips of each political group represented on the council and in accordance with the terms of reference set out in paragraphs 52 and 53.

Calendar

- 20. That council assembly agrees to the following dates for meetings of council assembly and that these dates be fixed in the council calendar for the municipal year 2007/08:
 - (i) May 16 2007 (Mayor making)
 - (ii) May 23 2007 (Constitutional)
 - (iii) June 27 2007 (Ordinary and Statement of Accounts)
 - (iv) September 12 2007
 - (v) November 21 2007
 - (vi) January 23 2008
 - (vii) February 20 2008 (Budget setting)
 - (viii) April 16 2008
 - (ix) May 14 2008 (Mayor making)
 - (x) May 21 2008 (Constitutional)

Note: The draft calendar of meetings, based on a six-week cycle, is attached as Appendix C

Appointments to Local Government Association General Assembly

21. That council assembly makes appointments to the LGA General Assembly (see Appendix D).

Other Appointments to Joint Committees/Outside Bodies

22. That council assembly notes the executive and standards committee will make appointments to all other outside committees and bodies for the municipal year 2007/08, as required by part 3N of the constitution.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 23. The constitution is updated annually and the recommendations in this report are based on the current constitution.
- 24. The proposal to reconstitute the corporate parenting committee as an ordinary committee of the council received cross party support at the meeting of the constitutional steering panel held on Tuesday May 1 2007.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

Appointment of Leader of the Council and Appointment to the Executive

- 25. The council is required to appoint a leader of the council. The leader will present a report on how the executive functions of the council will be exercised, subject to the approval of council assembly. The elected leader must then proceed to nominate his/her executive for appointment by council assembly. In accordance with the constitution this can consist of a minimum of 2 and up to a maximum of 9 nominated members, whose portfolios are determined and allocated by the leader. In 2006/07 the leader appointed nine executive members and allocated the following portfolios:
 - Leader (including responsibility for setting strategic direction and key priorities, overseeing the development of financial strategies, customer relationships policy, and representing the council in the community)
 - Deputy Leader (responsible for housing policy and the executive's relationship with the scrutiny committee)
 - Community Safety
 - Health And Adult Care
 - Environment
 - Children's Services and Education
 - Citizenship, Equalities and Communities
 - Resources
 - Culture, Leisure and Sport
 - Regeneration
- 26. The leader can report on any further delegations including:
 - The extent of any authority delegated to executive members individually, including details of the limitation on their authority;
 - The terms of reference and constitution of executive committees, such as the major projects board;
 - The nature and extent of any delegation of executive functions to community councils, any other authority or joint arrangement; and
 - The nature and extent of any delegation to officers with details of any limitation on that delegation.
- 27. Any such delegations are then put to council assembly for approval.

Proportionality – The Legal Position

- 28. The Local Government and Housing Act 1989 covers the allocation of seats to political groups, it makes no provision for single independent members so they do not form part of the proportionality considerations.
- 29. Seats on committees and sub committees must be allocated in accordance with the four principles of proportionality contained in sections 15, 16 and 17 or the Local Government and Housing Act 1989. There is a duty to give effect to the following principles, as far as is reasonably practicable:
 - (i) That not all the seats on a committee or sub committee are allocated to the same political group;
 - (ii) That the majority group must have the majority of seats on each committee or sub committee:

Note: As no one group has an overall majority on the council, this principle is not relevant.

- (iii) Subject to (1) and (2) above, it must be ensured that the proportion of each political group's seats of the <u>total</u> number of seats on "ordinary committees" reflects, as closely as possible, their proportion of seats on full council; and,
 - Notes: 1. The ordinary committees are appointments, planning and disciplinary appeals. The total number of seats on these 3 committees must be allocated as proportionately as is reasonably practicable.
 - 2. The licensing committee is appointed under the Licensing Act 2003 and the overview and scrutiny committee is appointed under section 21 of the Local Government Act 2000. Neither committee is an ordinary committee.
- (iv) Subject to (i) to (iii) above, the proportion of each political group's seats on each committee and sub committee reflects as closely as possible their proportion of seats on full council.

Note: This rule applies to all committees, sub committees and joint committees, except for licensing committee, standards committee and community councils.

Regulatory and Other Committees.

- 30. The regulatory and other committees are the "ordinary committees" of the council which in 2006/07 were:
 - Appointments committee
 - Planning committee
 - Disciplinary appeals committee
 - Audit committee
- 31. As noted in paragraphs 5 and 6, it was recommended by the constitutional steering panel that the corporate parenting panel be reconstituted as an ordinary

- committee of the council. If council assembly approves the recommendation, this will bring the number of ordinary committees of the council up to five.
- 32. The licensing committee and the standards committee are constituted under the Licensing Act 2003 and Local Government Act 2000 respectively and are dealt with separately.
- 33. The total number of seats on the four ordinary committees is allocated and then divided between the four committees to give each committee as proportionate an allocation as is possible within the overall limit.

Overview and Scrutiny Committee

34. The overview and scrutiny committee and its sub committees are not "ordinary" committees and each is considered for the purposes of proportionality.

Overview and Scrutiny Sub committees

- 35. In accordance with the overview and scrutiny procedure rules, the overview and scrutiny committee appoints themed scrutiny sub committees. The constitution specifies that the appointment and composition of themed scrutiny committees/sub committees be considered at the first meeting of the overview and scrutiny committee.
- 36. In previous years the overview and scrutiny committee has agreed to vary the size and numbers on each sub committee to provide for greater cross-party representation (otherwise there would have been no Conservative members on any scrutiny sub committees). Overall this produced a disproportionate result.
- 37. In addition, consideration should be given to individual members who do not form a political group on the council. There is one such member now sitting on council. Although not included in proportionality rules, the overview and scrutiny committee may wish to consider allocating a place on a scrutiny sub committee to enable the member concerned to play a part in the scrutiny functions in their capacity as non-executive members.
- 38. The allocation of seats in 2006/07 on scrutiny sub committees was as follows:

- 39. Sub committees are not "ordinary" committees and, as such, are considered individually for the purposes of proportionality. So far as it is reasonably practicable, the allocation of seats on each sub committee should accord with the proportional allocation of seats on the parent committee.
- 40. The most proportionate allocation of seats will depend on the size of the committee. The table below shows the most proportionate arrangements for individual committees.

41. Members can agree an allocation that is disproportionate, provided no member votes against this.

Appointments to Seats

- 42. Section 16(1) of the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 provides that it is the duty of an authority or committee to exercise its power to make appointments in such a way as to give effect "to such wishes about who is to be appointed to the seats on that body which are allocated to a particular political group as are expressed by that group".
- 43. There is no requirement that a seat allocated to a particular group can only be filled by a member of that group. Therefore, groups have a discretion to allocate seats as they wish, including to a member of another group, or an individual councillor or councillors sitting on the council.

Appointment of Chairs and Vice chairs

- 44. With the exception of the standards committee, chairs and vice chairs may be appointed directly by council assembly, or the appointments may be delegated to the first meeting of the relevant committee.
- 45. In the case of the corporate parenting committee, it is proposed that the executive member with responsibility for children's services be appointed chair.

Standards Committee

46. It is recommended that the standards committee comprise five councillors, including at least one member from each political group as defined by the Local Government and Housing Act 1989. Section 53(10) of the Local Government Act 2000 provides that the duty to allocate seats to political groups does not apply to a standards committee. The power to appoint members of the committee vests in council assembly and, in practice, council assembly has appointed members on the basis of the number of seats allocated to each

- political group. Not more than one executive member may serve on the standards committee.
- 47. At least 25% of the committee's membership must be independent. Council assembly has previously agreed that the term of office for independent members be three years, with one independent member retiring each year. Independent members serve a maximum of two terms.
- 48. The following independent members will continue to serve on the standards committee after constitutional council:
 - Jean Sackur until Constitutional council May 2008
 - Bola Ogun (until constitutional council May 2009)
 - Mark Roelofsen (until constitutional council May 2009)
- 49. There is one vacancy for an independent member and the independent selection panel will be asked to make a recommendation to council assembly on the appointment of an independent member.
- 50. The chair and vice chair are appointed at the first meeting of the committee in the new municipal year. The chair is elected from the independent members of the committee.

Licensing Committee

- 51. Section 6 of the Licensing Act 2003 requires a licensing committee of 10 to 15 members. Council agreed in December 2004 that the licensing committee should comprise 15 members in order to achieve maximum flexibility. The power to appoint the committee vests in council assembly.
- 52. There is no requirement in the Licensing Act 2003 that the licensing committee should be proportionate. Council assembly agreed in December 2004 to establish the current committee on a proportionate basis. Council assembly, in 2006/07, agreed the following allocation of seats: 7 Liberal Democrat, 7 Labour and 1 Conservative. This remains the most proportionate allocation.
- 53. The Licensing Act 2003 makes no provision to appoint reserve members.

Reserve Members

- 54. Council procedure rule 2.6(2) and overview and scrutiny procedure rule 1(1.3) make provision, respectively, for the appointment of reserve members to council committees and to overview and scrutiny sub committees. There is no provision for reserves on the licensing committee.
- 55. Each political group can appoint reserve members. The number of reserve members a group can appoint is, with the exception of the overview and scrutiny committee, one less than the number of seats the group holds on the committee or sub committee.
- 56. If a political group holds only one seat on a committee or sub committee, that group may appoint a reserve member.

57. The number of reserve member seats on the overview and scrutiny committee that each political group can nominate is equal to the number of seats each group holds on the committee.

Establishment of Voluntary Bodies Appointment Panel

58. Council assembly will consider the establishment and composition of the voluntary bodies appointment panel, which will be responsible for making recommendations on appointments to Southwark charities and for making appointments to school governing bodies.

Constitutional Steering Panel

- 59. The constitutional steering panel is responsible for reviewing and recommending amendments to the constitution. It is also responsible for making recommendations to council assembly for the award of the Honorary Freedom of the Borough and Honorary Aldermen.
- 60. Membership of the panel comprises the group whips of each political party represented on the council.

Council Calendar

- 61. A calendar of council meetings for the 2007/08 municipal year has been prepared and is shown at appendix C.
- 62. The calendar is based on a 6-week cycle. The allocation of dates necessarily includes a number of deviations from the 6-week cycle to allow for school holidays, party conference and other committed dates. There are two executive meetings scheduled in each cycle and scrutiny sub committees are indicated by a number in the draft calendar, pending their establishment by the overview and scrutiny committee.
- 63. Dates of meetings of the audit committee, the corporate parenting committee and the major projects board are still to be added to the council calendar and this will be done when the dates are confirmed.
- 64. In respect of meetings other than council assembly, this calendar is subject to amendments, additions and cancellations. Revised details of meetings will be sent to members regularly. The dates proposed for council assembly meetings are included in the calendar and council assembly is asked formally to agree these, in accordance with the relevant statutory provision.

Appointments to Local Government Association General Assembly

65. Council assembly is asked to appoint four representatives to the Local Government Association (LGA) General Assembly and allocate 5 votes amongst the representatives. The LGA encourages local authorities with 3 or 4 representatives to allocate at least one position and vote to a minority group leader.

Appointments to Outside Bodies & Joint Committees

66. Government guidance states that appointments to outside bodies and joint committees are "local choice" functions. As such, the executive should make

appointments that correspond to functions for which the executive has responsibility (e.g. housing, education, social services, regeneration, etc.). Council assembly agreed in 2003 that appointments to outside bodies, where they are not a function of the executive, should be the responsibility of standards committee.

67. The nomination of representatives to serve on the various London Councils committees and fora is normally the responsibility of the executive, as a local choice function. However, as the deadline for nominations is June 1 2007, council assembly is asked to agree the nominations for the year 2007/08 (see separate report).

Establishment and Appointment of Working Parties, Panels and Boards

68. The executive will consider the establishment and appointment of working parties, panels and boards where the function falls within the responsibility of the executive (e.g. housing, education, social services, regeneration, etc.).
