Southwark Refugee Communities Forum (SRCF)

SRCF brings together community leaders representing people from over 30 countries and over 30 different refugee community organisations. It works to raise the profile of refugee community organisations (RCOs), so the voices of refugees can be better heard.

SRCF has four key aims: promoting awareness of the role and skills that RCOs have to offer; facilitating collaboration between RCOs, statutory and voluntary sectors; integration of RCOs into mainstream structures and the promotion of refugee participation at all levels; identification of resources and development of capacity.

Tackling anti-social behaviour in Bermondsey Four Squares

The police and council housing and environment departments have joined up to tackle problems on the Four Squares Estate. Called Bermondsey Together Action Zone (TAZ), the group's action plan emphasises enforcement, prevention and better communication for residents. Its work includes:

- Gathering, sharing and responding to intelligence
- Targeting young offenders and those at risk of offending and warning letters sent to arson suspects
- Issuing anti-social behaviour orders and Acceptable Behaviour Contracts where necessary

- Mobile CCTV on estate
- Exploring funding for Neighbourhood Watch
- Public reassurance on community safety
- Drugs education for young people

The refurbishment of Spa Park is on target, and due for completion on January 1 2006 – a great way to bring in the new year! The light columns have been erected and the landscaping finished. The construction of the new health centre is well under way and on target to be finished by the end of 2006.

Southwark Multi Faith Forum (SMFF)

SMFF is for faith-based organisations such as churches, mosques, temples and other community organisations, which define themselves in some way by their religion/faith.

The main objectives of the Forum are:

- To promote good relations between different religious and ethnic groups.
- To support religious organisations in Southwark to get more involved in projects to improve the quality of life for Southwark residents, particularly the socially excluded.
- To support religious organisations in the borough to access further funds to help them develop projects to improve the quality of life of Southwark residents.
- To lobby the council and other government and voluntary agencies to ensure that the views and needs of faith communities are recognised in their policies and their actions.
- To elect the faith representatives to Southwark Alliance, the local strategic partnership.

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New Academy at Aylwin

Cathy Loxton, headteacher of Aylwin Girls School, attended the meeting to talk about her hopes for the future transition of Aylwin Girls School from a community school to an academy. If successful, Aylwin will become the first girls' school to do so.

An academy is a new type of school, which is independent from the state but still funded and supported by it. Lord Harris - who was born and bred in Peckham - is the sponsor of the school. He also sponsors the Peckham Academy and others. Lord Harris's schools follow the 'Harris Vision', which offers a different way to look at education and all schools have access to one another's facilities. So far the Harris family of schools has benefited 10,000 students.

Mrs Loxton confirmed that no buildings will be knocked down in the process of turning the school into an academy. There will be large-scale refurbishment and a possibility of new buildings for sixth-form students and/ or science classes. Temporary classrooms will be erected while refurbishment takes place for minimal disruption for pupils.

Aylwin excels in vocational courses and the head feels that their transition to an academy will allow this to flourish. They hope to specialise in 'enterprise', acknowledging that most youngsters have more than one job in their lifetime and need to be multi-skilled and ready for the workplace when they leave school.

Aylwin intends to extend their pastoral care, mentoring capacity and open up facilities – including a large, new, fully equipped hall – to the local community.

Secondary school access and improvement

Jane Bailey and Terry Reynolds from the council's education department described the application process for secondary school access.

They explained that last year they were unable to check children who had no places due to IT problems, but that these issues had been resolved and their current priority is to ensure that every child receives an offer letter on March 1 2006 for at least one school.

They clarified that the Local Education Authority (LEA) is the clearing process and that schools themselves apply their own criteria to each application. Parents were concerned that schools saw where they were placed on the applicant's list of preferences and may have turned them down on this basis. Both of the council's representatives stressed that this does not happen and parents need not be concerned about this. However they also said that since the LEA only clears the applications,

appeals must be made *directly* to the school rather than the LEA. Since parents have 15 days to appeal after an application rejection it is important they know what to do.

They gave the following advice:

- If you get a school place, accept it. Securing a place is the most important thing. Possible changes can be looked at later.
- Look at schools don't always listen to gossip or opinion
- Consider schools in your own communities –
 this way children do not have to travel far and
 are not exhausted before they have started
 their school day, so can concentrate on their
 work; can make friends in their own areas; and
 can engage with their community as a whole.
 Councillor Stanton added that there are
 currently enough secondary school places for
 those leaving primary school and that studies
 are being done to project the future need.
