Access to council planning information

There have been requests at the community council to increase people's access to planning information. Currently, planning applications, plans, maps and drawings can be viewed between 9am and 5pm at the council's planning office at Chiltern House, Portland Street. Planning Duty Officers are available between 9am and 4pm.

Planning information can also be obtained from the planning register on the council website. This includes descriptions of planning applications, dates, contact details, consultations and outcomes.

The planning department is currently looking into making all planning information available online.

Residents at this meeting were aggrieved that they didn't know details of two planning applications which they felt could have a significant impact on their local environment. These applications had been dealt with at the main planning committee, which is in line with the current rules. So as to try and avoid this happening again, it was decided that the council's chief planning officer be invited to a future meeting.


Star academy: young talent shines in Nunhead and Peckham Rye

Over 2,300 young people came along to the Star Academy talent show in Peckham Rye in February and the community council was shown a film highlighting some of the fantastic results of the project.

Working with Peckham Youth Forum and youth group 2AW, event organisers Peckham Programme showcased local talent, encouraged young people to get more involved in their local community and helped youngsters into jobs and training. The associated media careers fair helped creative types find out more about jobs and training in media related industries.

As a result, Goldsmiths College handed out 200 application forms on the day. Pro2Jay from the junior singing category has sung at the Ministry of Sound nightclub and TNL from the dance category have a regular dance slot there. Prize winners also get their songs professionally recorded, a disc cut and professional photographs taken.

While there is no guarantee of a future Star Academy - the Peckham Programme are currently looking for funding - it is hoped that another Star Academy will be held February 2006. So watch this space for new stars.







Southwark on the move: the five-year transport plan

The council is currently producing its five-year transport plan for Southwark also known as the 'Local Implementation Plan'. The plan will set out a package of transport improvements from 2005 until 2010 and will incorporate both council priorities and the Mayor of London's plans for transport. The plan will include road safety, walking, cycling, parking, school travel, environmental concerns and an assessment of equality issues.

The plan aims to improve access throughout the borough, travel safety, the quality, reliability and efficiency of transport and energy use.

A strategy and questionnaire will be produced in July 2005 to be used for public consultation throughout the summer. The council and the Mayor will approve the final plan in the autumn - influenced by your views and contributions.

Tackling anti-social behaviour in Nunhead & Peckham Rye

People suffering from local disputes, such as problem neighbours, race and homophobic harassment or conflict at school or work, can call on the services of the Southwark Mediation Centre (SMC). SMC provides a safe environment and experienced, trained mediators to help people solve conflicts and together come up solutions to make life better for everyone. SMC successfully deals with over 300 neighbourhood disputes a year.

The Peckham Liveability Group is helping to make Nunhead and Peckham Rye safer and better for local people by bringing together agencies to deliver services, which meet local expectations and needs. The Group meets four times a year to share information and one of its key priorities is to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour. It works directly with the community wardens, police and the Peckham Town Centre Management Group.

Following concerns about the service offered by Southwark's anti-social behaviour unit (SASBU) the community council heard that Southwark is among the top London boroughs obtaining anti-social behaviour orders. Due to the number of referrals to SASBU, more money and staff have been given to the unit to ease the pressure on this service. More initiatives to combat anti-social behaviour in the Nunhead and Peckham Rye area should follow.

The urban countryside: a 'green walk' proposal

For those who dream of a countryside lifestyle but with city-living benefits, the proposal for a 'green walk' between Brenchely Gardens and Homestall Road could bring this fantasy a bit closer to reality. If the idea gets the go ahead, it would mean an unbroken walk of green open space, stretching from One Tree Hill to Peckham Rye. With the journey time between these two spots reduced, this should be just the incentive needed for people to get out their cars and walk or jump on their bike.

People living close to the proposed site will be consulted further and an open day for people to experience the walk is planned for autumn.
