Walworth young people speak out

"We want a place where we can get together for things like dancing and music," was a main message from the young people who came to this Walworth community council meeting to discuss issues that concern them the most and to tell Councillors what they want from their community council meetings.



Ideas were discussed as to what the community council can do to get young people more involved in council issues and the decision making process. Councillors agreed to have a special community council meeting at a time more convenient for young people and in a different format so young people feel comfortable enough to be involved and have their say.

Young people from the Newington Estate told their community council that they would like regular access to their tenants' association (TA) hall. One of their problems is that they don't have anywhere to go and the TA hall is a space close to home they can use for activities such as art, dancing and music. Councillors agreed to look into this.

Youth workers from the Brandon and Aylesbury Youth Centres were also at the meeting. They described some of the activities available for young people. If you want to find out more about what's available then contact **Michelle on 020 7525 1525 or Roger on 020 7252 6244**.

What the young people said...

- The police on our estate take our names and addresses, give us warnings and move us on because we're a group, sitting on benches. We then get told because of the noise (which is not caused by us) they will take the benches away so we have nowhere to sit.
- We are always blamed for things we haven't done just because we live on the estate – we are not doing anything wrong!
- Pushing young people away and telling them to move just moves them on to other estates – you are not dealing with the problem.

- TRAs in the area need to open their halls to the whole community.
- We want a place where we can get together for things like dancing and music – we have nowhere to go.
- Young people used to have church and scout halls to go to – these days they have nothing. They can organise committees and manage themselves and be responsible. We need to support todays youth and give them access to venues they are the hall users and TA members of the future.





Step Forward Project

This Project is designed to help local residents feel more confident in speaking out at public meeting – just like community councils. The five-week training course can help you get your point across clearly and give you the confidence to have your say on issues which concern you. Courses run on Thursday nights, starting March 2. Southwark Community Games

Southwark Community Games is a year round programme of sports coaching in schools, parks, estates and kick about areas, run throughout the eight community councils. The games also offer young adults 16 years and above, sports training, leading to qualifications in coaching and part time employment.

The competition for 2006 will start soon. Every school in the borough will be involved and there will be 300 training places for young adults. Ten community sport coaches will also be involved. Karrot project helps tackle youth crime

The Karrot Project is open to all of the 8,500 young people aged 11 to 15 years, who live or are educated in the borough. It was set up to increase school attendance and reduce youth crime. The project began in winter 2001 as a pilot initiative. It has now been adopted as an important element of the borough's youth strategy. 800 Southwark teenagers were surveyed in 2001. They were asked why they or their friends might not go to school, or why they might get involved in criminal activity or antisocial behaviour. They gave three answers: a shortage of information on local activities, boredom, and a complete lack of recognition. In response, the Karrot scheme supports a rewards scheme for young people, a mobile internet bus and many activities. For more information email info@karrot.org.uk or phone 020 7232 6004.

Residents choose Project Centre design for Walworth Road

The transformation of the Walworth Road moved a step closer, with the announcement at this meeting, that Project Centre's design has been chosen by local people as the preferred option for the South London throughfare.

Two design proposals were shortlisted by Southwark Council, and local people invited to vote for the one they liked best at the community council meeting in January.

The Project Centre's design won the backing of 76 per cent of residents who cast a vote. The Walworth Community Council will again meet on March 20 2006 and people will get the chance to discuss the detailed designs, which are planned to be presented at this meeting. Others – such as emergency services – will be consulted to make sure the plans suit everyone.

\$106 planning agreements report

Section 106 planning contributions are used to address the negative impacts caused by a development. A special amount of money is negotiated to help provide facilities which will lessen the impact of the development on the surrounding community. This is delivered through a legal agreement between the council and a developer and is negotiated by planning officers as part of the planning application process. A report was presented to the Walworth CC which explained the amount of money negotiated for the Walworth area and how it was being spent.

Questions were asked about the project bank which stores ideas for projects that \$106 planning contributions can pay for in Walworth. Councillors and members of the community asked for further details and a Southwark Council officer will come back to explain the project bank, how it relates to \$106 and what it means to the Walworth community.
