## RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That council assembly consider the following constitutional issues for the coming municipal year 2006/07:

- Election of leader and appointment of executive
- Proportionality/size and composition of committees
- Appointment of chairs and vice-chairs
- Appointment of councillor members on standards committee
- Appointment of councillor members on licensing committee
- Agreeing dates of council assembly meetings for 2006/07
- Appointments to Local Government Association General Assembly
- Establishing the Voluntary Bodies Appointment Panel


## Political Group Leaders, Deputies and Whips

2. That council assembly notes the appointment of political group leaders, deputies and whips, as set out in appendix $A$.

## Election of Leader of the Council and Appointment of Executive

3. That council assembly elects a leader of the council.

Note: $\quad$ Following the election of the leader, council assembly will receive a report from the leader on nominations for appointment to the executive. The leader can nominate between 2 and 9 members to form an executive. The leader can also report on any further delegations as set out in paragraph 26, subject to the approval of council assembly.
4. That council assembly appoints the executive.

## Proportionality/Size and Composition of Council Committees

5. That the size and composition of the council's regulatory and other committees be established and appointed as follows:

The new figures are shown in bold. The 2005/06 figures are shown in brackets.

Notes: 1. The size and composition of the council's regulatory and other committees known as the "ordinary committees" is set out above based on the total number of 22 seats and the committees established in the 2005/06 municipal year. The proportionality is based on the total of seats compared to the overall allocation of seats each political group has on the council.
2. It is for council assembly to agree the total number of seats and allocate appointments, planning and disciplinary appeals committees to committees 1,2 and 3 .
3. At least one member of the executive shall serve on the appointments Committee.

## Community Councils

6. That the size and composition of community councils as set out in appendix B be noted.

## Overview \& Scrutiny Committee

7. That the size and composition of overview and scrutiny committee, as set out below, be appointed:

Notes: 1. The overview and scrutiny procedure rules provide that the overview and scrutiny committee will consist of the chair, vicechair and the chairs of the scrutiny sub-committees provided that the proportionality rules are not compromised. Each political group is permitted to nominate one non-executive member should this be necessary to maintain proportionality, for example, where there are fewer chairs of scrutiny sub committees than places on the overview and scrutiny committee.
2. The overview and scrutiny committee and also any subcommittee which scrutinises the council's education functions will contain in its membership four voting co-opted members comprising of one Church of England, one Roman Catholic Church and two parent governor representatives.
3. No member of the executive shall serve on a scrutiny committee.
4. In 2005/06 the overview and scrutiny committee comprised 8 members. The political composition of the committee was Liberal Democrats 4, Labour 3 and Conservative 1.

## Scrutiny Sub-Committees

8. That in accordance with overview and scrutiny procedure rules, the themed scrutiny sub-committees be appointed by overview and scrutiny committee.

Note: $\quad$ The overview and scrutiny committee shall meet at the rise of council assembly.

## Appointment of Chairs and Vice-Chairs

9. That council assembly appoints the chair and vice-chair of the overview and scrutiny committee.
10. That council assembly considers whether it wishes to appoint chairs and vicechairs for the following meetings:

- Planning committee
- Licensing committee
- Appointments committee
- Disciplinary appeal committee
- 8 Community councils
> Borough and Bankside
> Bermondsey
> Rotherhithe
> Walworth
> Peckham
> Camberwell
> Nunhead and Peckham
> Dulwich
Note: $\quad$ All outstanding appointments will be referred to the first meeting of the respective committee or community council in the 2006/07 municipal year.


## Standards Committee

11. That the council assembly appoints five councillors (including at least one member of each political group as defined by Local Government and Housing Act 1989 Regulation 8 Local Government (Committees and Political Groups) Regulations 1990) to serve on the standards committee.

Notes: 1. In 2005/06 the allocation of seats was 3 Liberal Democrat, 2 Labour and 1 Conservative. This was broadly proportionate and ensured all political groups were represented. Independent members must make up $25 \%$ of the membership.
2. Following the elections, officers would recommend allocating members places on the basis of 2 Liberal Democrat, 2 Labour and 1 Conservative as the lowest number of councillors at which the committee would be proportionate and all political groups represented.
12. That council assembly notes the two serving independent members (appointed in accordance with the Relevant Authorities (Standards Committee) Regulations 2001) and their date of retirement from office:
a. Wendy Golding - (until constitutional council May 2007)
b. Jean Sackur (until constitutional council May 2008)
13. That council assembly confirms the recommendation of the independent member selection panel for the appointment of the third and fourth independent members on the standards committee. The date of retirement from office shall be constitutional council assembly in May 2009 (see closed report).
14. That in accordance with article $9(\mathrm{f})$ of the constitution, the election of chair and vice-chair takes place at the first meeting of the standards committee in the 2006/07 municipal year.

## Licensing Committee

15. That council assembly appoints 15 councillors to serve on the licensing committee.

Notes: 1. In 2005/06 council assembly agreed to establish the committee on a proportionate basis. The allocation of seats was 7 Liberal Democrat, 7 Labour and 1 Conservative.
2. For 2006/07 the proportionate allocation would remain the same. The allocation is a matter for council assembly to decide and does not need to be proportionate.

## Urgency Committee

16. That council assembly agree to reconstitute the urgency committee to function during the interim period between a municipal election and council assembly with the following terms of reference and membership:

- Terms of Reference - Delegated power to exercise all the functions of the council, that are not reserved to council for decision in cases where, in the opinion of the chief executive it is necessary to act urgently in order to secure the efficient and expeditious conduct of the council's business.
- Membership - The membership of the committee to comprise the leaders (or nominee) of the two largest political groups of the council (1 reserve member each - deputy leaders (or nominee)).


## Calendar

17. That council assembly agree to and fix dates for the following council assembly meetings:

- June 282006 (Statement of accounts)
- September 132006
- October 182006
- December 62006
- January 242007 (Council tax base)
- February 222007 (Budget and council tax setting)
- March 282007
- May 162007 (Mayor-making)
- May 232007 (Constitutional meeting)

Note: The draft calendar of meetings, based on a six-week cycle, is attached as Appendix C

## Appointments to Local Government Association General Assembly

18. That council assembly makes appointments to the LGA General Assembly (see appendix D).

## Other Appointments to Joint Committees/Outside Bodies

19. That council assembly notes the executive and standards committee will make appointments to all other outside committees and bodies for the municipal year 2006/07, as required by part 3 N of the constitution.

## Establishment of Voluntary Bodies Appointment Panel

20. That council assembly establishes and determines the composition of the voluntary bodies appointment panel which will be responsible for making recommendations on appointments to Southwark charities and making appointments to school governing bodies.

Note: It is proposed that there be six members of the panel, including one independent member. In 2005/06 the panel, which was appointed by the standards committee, comprised 2 Liberal Democrat, 2 Labour and 1 Conservative member.

## BACKGROUND INFORMATION

21. The constitution is updated annually and the recommendations in this report are based on the current constitution.

## KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

## Election of Leader and appointment of Executive

22. The council is required to elect a leader of the council. The leader will present a report on how the executive functions of the council will be exercised, subject to the approval of council assembly. The elected leader must then proceed to nominate his/her executive for appointment by council assembly. In accordance with the constitution this can consist of a minimum of 2 and up to a maximum of 9 nominated members, whose portfolios are determined and allocated by the leader. In 2005/06 the leader appointed nine executive members and allocated the following portfolios:

- Leader (including responsibility for the corporate plan, anti-poverty strategy, community councils and community safety)
- Deputy leader (including responsibility for children's services and management of the Elephant \& Castle regeneration project and any other special projects as deemed necessary)
- Community safety, regeneration and economic development
- Housing management
- Health and adult care
- Environment and transport
- Education
- Equalities, culture and sport
- Resources
- Communication and performance improvement

23. The leader can report on any further delegations including: -

- The extent of any authority delegated to executive members individually, including details of the limitation on their authority;
- The terms of reference and constitution of executive committees;
- The nature and extent of any delegation of executive functions to community councils, any other authority or joint arrangement;
- The nature and extent of any delegation to officers with details of any limitation on that delegation; and
- Any such delegations are then put to council assembly for approval.


## Proportionality - The Legal Position

24. The Local Government and Housing Act 1989 covers the allocation of seats to political groups, it makes no provision for single independent members so they do not form part of the proportionality considerations.
25. Seats on committees and sub-committees must be allocated in accordance with the four principles of proportionality contained in sections 15,16 and 17 or the Local Government and Housing Act 1989. There is a duty to give effect to the following principles, as far as is reasonably practicable:
26. That not all the seats on a committee or sub-committee are allocated to the same political group;
27. That the majority group must have the majority of seats on each committee or sub-committee;

Note: As no one group has an overall majority on the council, this principle is not relevant.
3. Subject to (1) and (2) above, it must be ensured that the proportion of each political group's seats of the total number of seats on "ordinary committees" reflects as closely as possible their proportion of seats on full council; and

Notes: 1. The ordinary committees are appointments, planning and disciplinary appeals. The total number of seats on these 3 committees must be allocated as proportionately as is reasonably practicable.
2. The licensing committee is appointed under the Licensing Act 2003 and the overview and scrutiny committee is appointed under section 21 of the Local Government Act 2000. Neither committee is an ordinary committee.
4. Subject to (1) to (3) above, the proportion of each political group's seats on each committee and sub-committee reflects as closely as possible their proportion of seats on full council.

Note: $\quad$ This rule applies to all committees, sub-committees and joint committees, except for licensing committee, standards committee and community councils.

## Regulatory and Other Committees.

26. The regulatory and other committees are the "ordinary committees" of the council which in 2005/06 were:

- Appointments committee
- Planning committee
- Disciplinary appeals committee

27. The licensing committee is now constituted under the Licensing Act 2003 and is dealt with separately.
28. The total number of seats on the three ordinary committees is allocated and then divided between the three committees to give each committee as proportionate an allocation as is possible within the overall limit.

## Overview and Scrutiny Committee

29. The overview and scrutiny committee and its sub committees are not "ordinary" committees and each is considered for the purposes of proportionality.

## Overview and Scrutiny Sub-Committees

30. In accordance with the overview and scrutiny procedure rules, themed scrutiny sub-committees are appointed by the overview and scrutiny committee. The constitution specifies that the appointment and composition of themed scrutiny committees/sub-committees be considered at the first meeting of the overview and scrutiny committee.
31. In previous years the overview and scrutiny committee has agreed to vary the size and numbers on each sub-committee to provide for greater cross-party representation (otherwise there would have been no Conservative members on any scrutiny sub-committees). Overall this produced a disproportionate result.
32. In addition, consideration should be given to individual members who do not form a political group on the council. There is one such member now sitting on council. Although not included in proportionality rules, the overview and scrutiny committee may wish to consider allocating a place on a scrutiny sub committee to enable the member concerned to play a part in the scrutiny functions in their capacity as non-executive members.
33. The allocation of seats in 2005/06 on scrutiny sub-committees was as follows:

34. Sub committees are not "ordinary" committees and are each considered individually for the purposes of proportionality. So far as it is reasonably practicable to do so, the seats on each committee should bear the same proportion to the number of the seats on the committee, as is borne by the number of members of that group to the council as a whole. The allocation of seats in 2005/06 would be proportionate if adopted by the overview and scrutiny committee in 2006/07.
35. The most proportionate allocation of seats will depend on the size of the committee. The table below shows the most proportionate arrangements for individual committees.

36. Members can agree an allocation that is disproportionate, provided no member votes against this.
37. Section 16(1) of the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 provides that it is the duty of the authority or committee so to exercise their power to make appointments to a body as to give effect "to such wishes about who is to be appointed to the seats on that body which are allocated to a particular political group as are expressed by that group".
38. There is no requirement that a seat allocated to a particular group can only be filled by a member of that group. Therefore groups have the discretion to allocate seats as they wish, including to a member of another group or an individual councillor or councillors sitting on the council.

## Standards Committee

39. It is recommended that standards committee should comprise five councillors, including at least one member from each political group as defined by the Local Government and Housing Act 1989. Section 53(10) of the Local Government Act 2000 provides that the duty to allocate seats to political groups does not apply to a standards committee. The power to appoint to the committee vests in council assembly. Not more than one executive member may serve on the standards committee.
40. At least $25 \%$ of the committee's membership must be independent. Council assembly has previously agreed that the term of office for independent members be three years, with one independent member retiring each year and that independent members serve a maximum of two terms.
41. The following independent members will continue to serve on the standards committee after constitutional council: -

- Wendy Golding - until Constitutional council May 2007
- Jean Sackur - until Constitutional council May 2008

42. Council assembly is asked to confirm the appointment of the third and fourth independent members proposed by the independent selection panel (see closed agenda for information on the proposed independent members). Because independent members serve on the committee, the appointment of chair and vice-chair is reserved to the first meeting of the committee.

## Licensing Committee

43. Section 6 of the Licensing Act 2003 requires a licensing committee of 10 to 15 members. Council agreed in December 2004 that the licensing committee should comprise 15 members in order to achieve maximum flexibility. The power to appoint the committee vests in council assembly.
44. There is no requirement in the Licensing Act 2003 that the licensing committee should be proportionate, council assembly agreed in December 2004 to establish the current committee on a proportionate basis. The 2005/06 allocation of seats was 7 Liberal Democrat, 7 Labour and 1 Conservative. Following the election, this remains the most proportionate allocation.
45. There is no explicit provision to appoint reserves in the Licensing Act 2003 and the implicit expectation is that licensing functions be exercised by committee members.

## Reserve Members

46. Council procedure rule 2.6(2) applies to reserve members for the councillor members of a committee:

- Each political group is entitled to have a number of reserves, being one fewer reserve than they have seats on the committee, subject to a minimum of one.


## Appointment of Chairs and Vice-Chairs

47. With the exception of standards committee, chairs and vice-chairs may be appointed directly by council assembly or the appointments may be delegated to the first meeting of the relevant committee. (See recommendations 9 and 10).

## Council Calendar

48. A calendar of council meetings for 2006/07 municipal year has been prepared and is shown at appendix C.
49. The calendar is based on a 6 weekly cycle. The allocation of dates includes some variations to take account of school holidays, party conference and other committed dates. There are two scheduled executive meetings in each cycle. Scrutiny sub-committees are indicated by a number in the draft calendar, pending their establishment by the overview and scrutiny committee.
50. In respect of all meetings apart from council assembly this calendar is subject to amendments, additions and cancellations. Revised details of meetings will be sent to members regularly. The dates proposed for council assembly meetings are included in the calendar and council assembly is asked formally to agree these, in accordance with the relevant statutory provision.

## Appointments to Local Government Association General Assembly

51. Council assembly is asked to appoint 4 representatives to the Local Government Association (LGA) General Assembly and allocate 5 votes amongst the representatives. The LGA encourages local authorities with 3 or 4 representatives to allocate at least one position and vote to a minority group leader.

## Appointments to Outside Bodies \& Joint Committees

52. Government guidance states that appointments to outside bodies and joint committees are local choice functions and the executive should make such appointments as they relate to functions which are the responsibility of the executive (e.g. housing, education, social services, regeneration, etc.). Council assembly agreed in 2003 that appointments to outside bodies, where they are not a function of the executive, should be the responsibility of standards committee.

## Establishment and Appointment of Working Parties, Panels and Boards

53. The executive will consider the establishment and appointment of working parties, panels and boards where the function falls within the responsibility of the executive (e.g. housing, education, social services, regeneration, etc.).

## Establishment of Voluntary Bodies Appointment Panel

54. That council assembly will consider the establishment and determine the composition of the voluntary bodies appointment panel which will be responsible for making recommendations on appointments to Southwark charities and making appointments to school governing bodies.
