Of the statistics quoted in the background paper, the most significant is the clear upward trend in calls to the police about disturbance and rowdiness in the early hours. This means that people feel increasingly unsafe in and around night-time establishment venues. A vibrant night-life is an important part of living in an urban area like Peckham, especially for young people. But those people need to feel safe. We should be addressing the problem, not adding to it. So there is a clear case for a saturation policy in Peckham. I also have a specific observation about the south-west corner of the policy area boundary, at Bellenden Road. I would invite the Committee to include in the adopted policy area the short additional stretch of Bellenden Road south-west down to Danby Street and including the short retail frontage to Danby Street at its corner with Bellenden Road. That stretch of road includes several licensed premises. The policy proposal is clearly right to include Bellenden Road in the area boundary. The portion of the road in the current draft boundary includes the Wishing Well pub and several other licensed premises. It is right to include these, but illogical to exclude the frontages
