2. That members note and consider the additional information and consultation responses in respect of each item in reaching their decision.

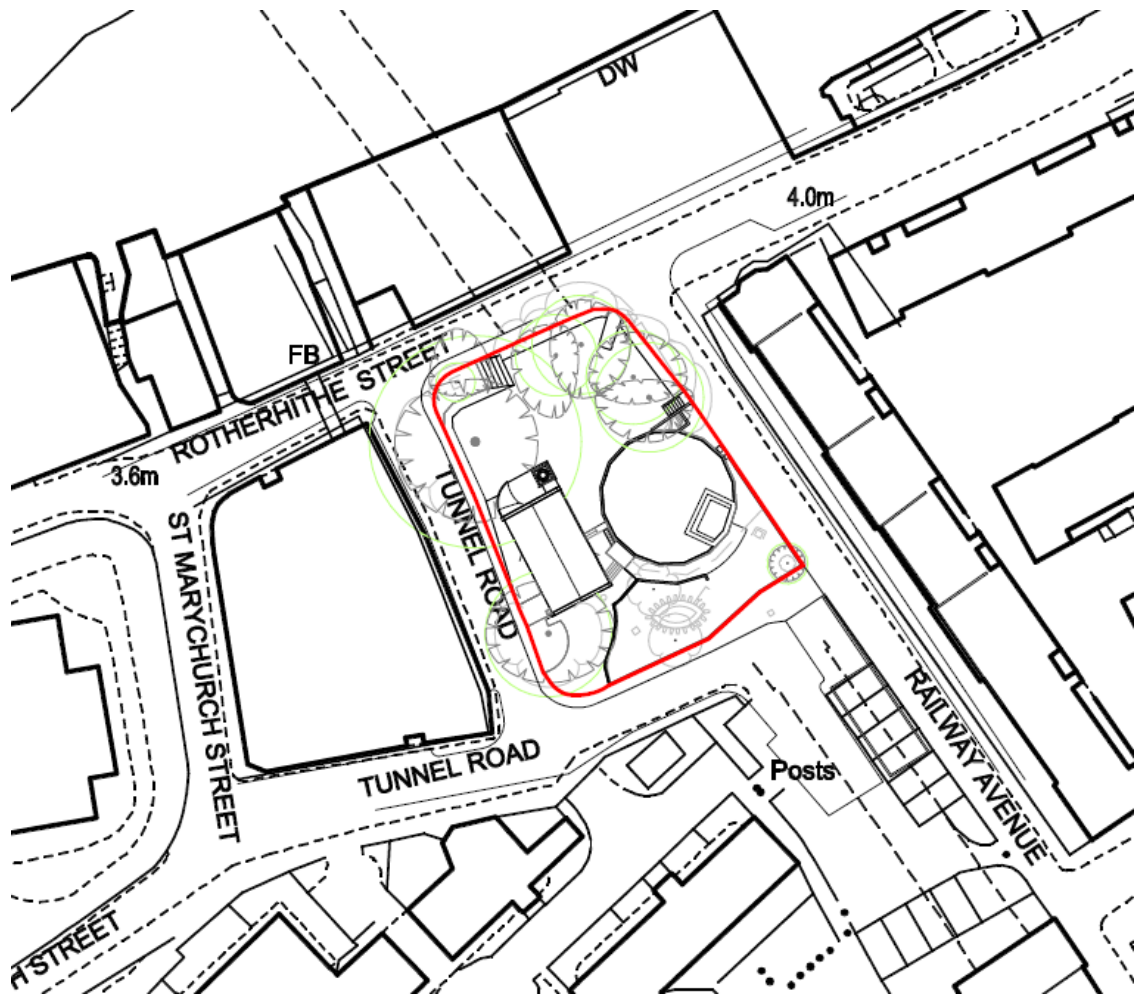
FACTORS FOR CONSIDERATION

3. Late observations, consultation responses, information and revisions have been received in respect of the following planning applications on the main agenda:

Item 7.1: 21AP0628 & 21AP0629 - The Brunel Museum, Railway Avenue, London, SE16 4LF

Revised site map

4. The map attached to the Officers' report identifying the site does not include the full extent of the site. The full extent of the site was shown in the applications' site plans, is illustrated within the body of the Officers' report (see paragraph 9) and is as below:



Further consultation letters

5. Following the committee meeting notification of 26 November, 12 additional consultation letters have been received, which break down as follows:
 - 10 letters of objection
 - 2 letters of support.
6. The letters of objection mainly refer to the loss of trees and ecology impact. References are made to the development being out of character, increased traffic and pollution, loss of light and over-development. Mention is also made to the facility being unwarranted and a waste of money.
7. The letters of support refer to the development being warranted, in keeping with the character, and no overall loss of trees.

Item 7.2: 21/AP/2274 & 21/AP/2275 - East Lodge, Nunhead Cemetery, Linden Grove, London, SE15 3LP

Additional consultation responses received

- 2 further objections received: issues raised
8. All seating should be to the rear. Amenity issues with regards to evening opening.
 9. Officer response: Seating is proposed to lower ground floor external areas to the south immediately outside the café doors. This is at lower ground floor level, shielded in part by the proposed ramp and landscaping. This is an acceptable layout and separation in amenity issues and allows for users including disabled users of the café and community rooms at lower ground floor to have external seating areas at the same level. An amendment to the hours of use condition is proposed to limit the use of all external seating areas to 9pm to protect the amenity of neighbours. See revised condition 8 below.

Evening opening:

10. Officer response: The building would be able to be open in the evenings as per the proposed hours of use condition. See revision condition 8 below.

Awnings are unnecessary and similar buildings do not overheat

11. Officer response: The awnings are part of a whole building energy strategy which includes air source heat pump, insulation and ventilation. The design of awnings is drawn from the traditional awnings found on similar period buildings and are located on the south elevation to help prevent overheating instead of use of fans and air conditioning.

Principle and scale of the café

12. Officer response: The scale of the café is needed to ensure a sustainable economic use for the building. A change of use is part of the application and is assessed as part of the officer report.

A permanent office space is required for cemetery staff.

13. Officer response: An office and reception space is proposed as part of the scheme. The staffing of the cemetery is an issue for the applicant.

Landscaping of the terraces including flower planting

14. Officer response: A landscape condition is proposed to control planting, landscape layout and hardstanding, including any paved route to the gates on Linden Grove for deliveries, flower planting and steps/ramp design.

Modern design

15. The design faithfully copies the original building detailing using traditional materials and techniques and utilising storage salvaged materials from the site. The proposals are in compliance with design and conservation polices as per the assessment in the report.

Recommended revisions to the draft conditions

16. 21/AP/2274 - condition 1 add to plans list

“East Lodge Nunhead Cemetery Delivery and Servicing Management Plan, October 2021, by TPP”

- 21/AP/2274 – condition 8

“HOURS OF USE The use hereby permitted for cafe and community rooms/office including servicing shall be:

1 April to 30 September - 8:30am to 7pm
 1 October to 31 October - 8:30am to 5pm
 1 November to 28 February - 8:30am to 4pm
 1 March to 30 March - 8:30am to 5pm

and for extended hours (without servicing and deliveries) for special events: 1 January - 31 December - 0830am to 10.30pm for no more that 21 days per calendar year and for no more than 1 consecutive days and no more than 1 special event per week. The use of external seating shall cease by 9pm.”

Reason: To safeguard the amenities of neighbouring residential properties in accordance with Chapter 8 (Promoting healthy and safe communities) of the National Planning Policy Framework (2021); Policy D4 (Delivering good design) of the London Plan (2021); Strategic Policy 13 (High Environmental Standards) of the Core Strategy (2011); and Saved Policy 3.2 (Protection of Amenity) of the Southwark Plan (2007).”

Conclusion of the Director of Planning

17. Having taken into account the additional consultation responses, and other additional information, following consideration of the issues raised, the recommendation remains that planning permission should be granted, subject to conditions as amended in this addendum report, completion of a s106 agreement, and referral to the Mayor of London.

REASON FOR URGENCY

18. Applications are required by statute to be considered as speedily as possible. The application has been publicised as being on the agenda for consideration at this meeting of the Planning Committee and applicants and objectors have been invited to attend the meeting to make their views known. Deferral would delay the processing of the applications and would inconvenience all those who attend the meeting.

19. The new information, comments reported and corrections to the main reports and recommendations have been noted and/or received since the committee agenda was printed. They all relate to items on the agenda and members should be aware of the comments made.

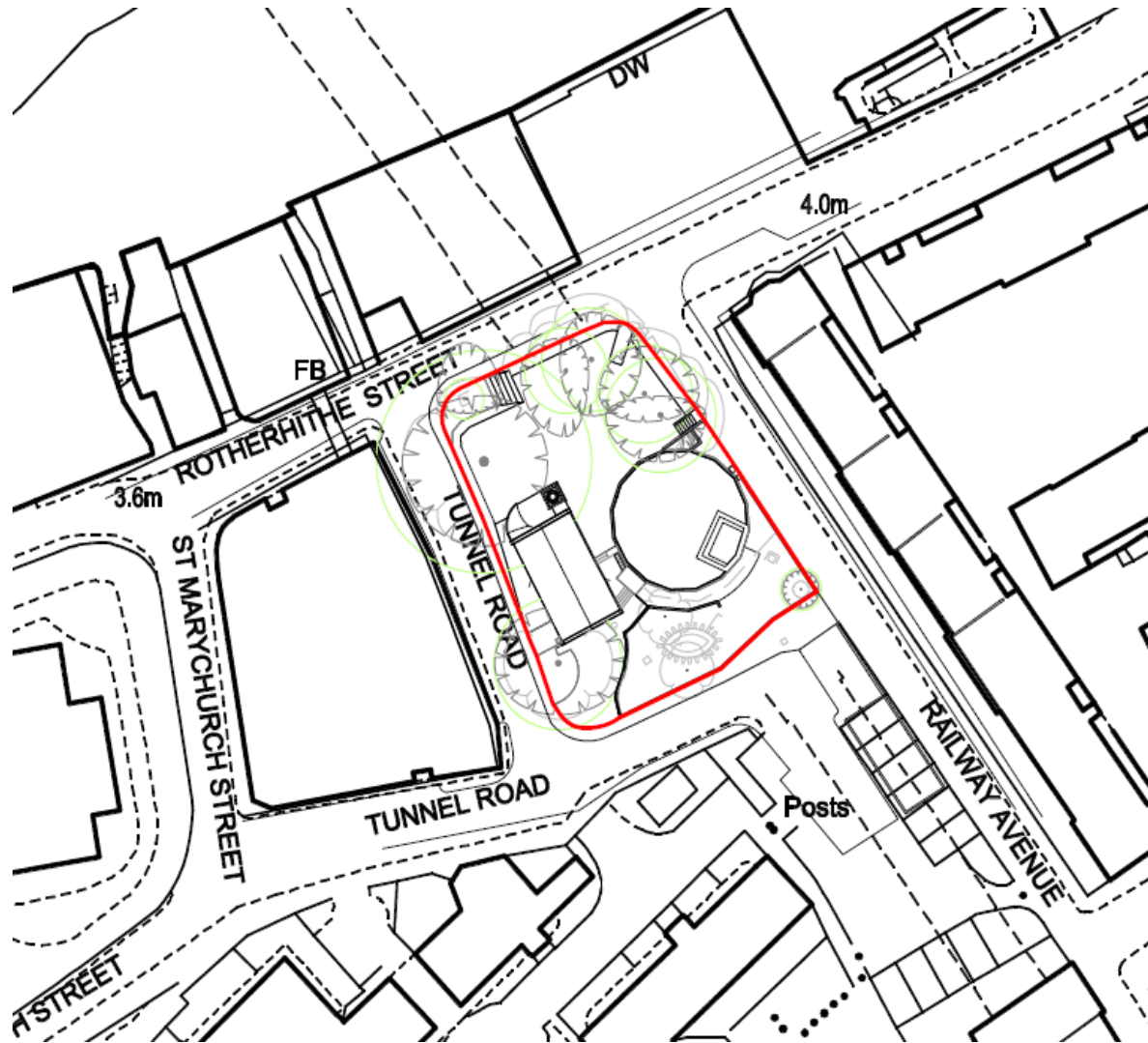

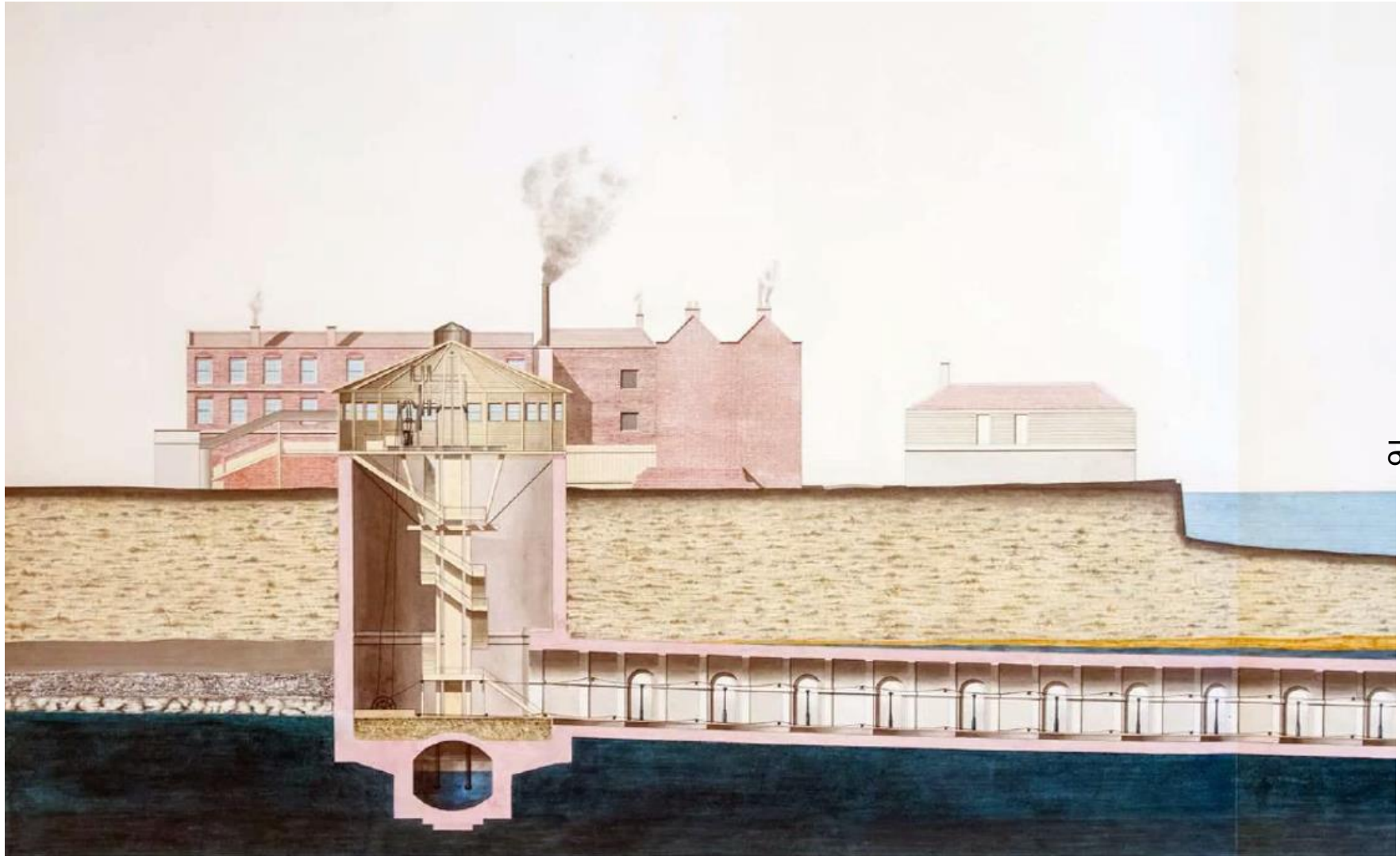

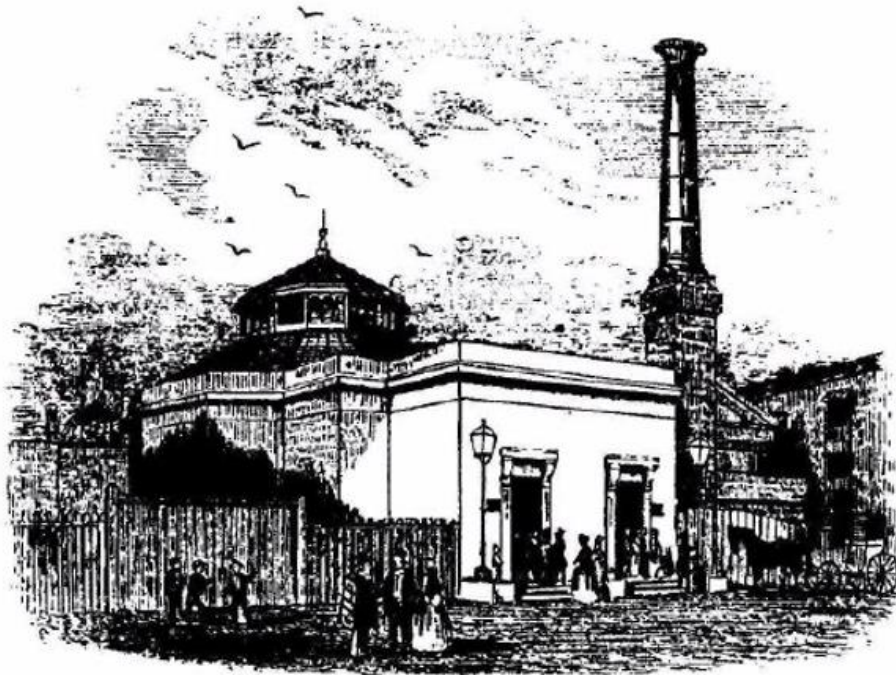

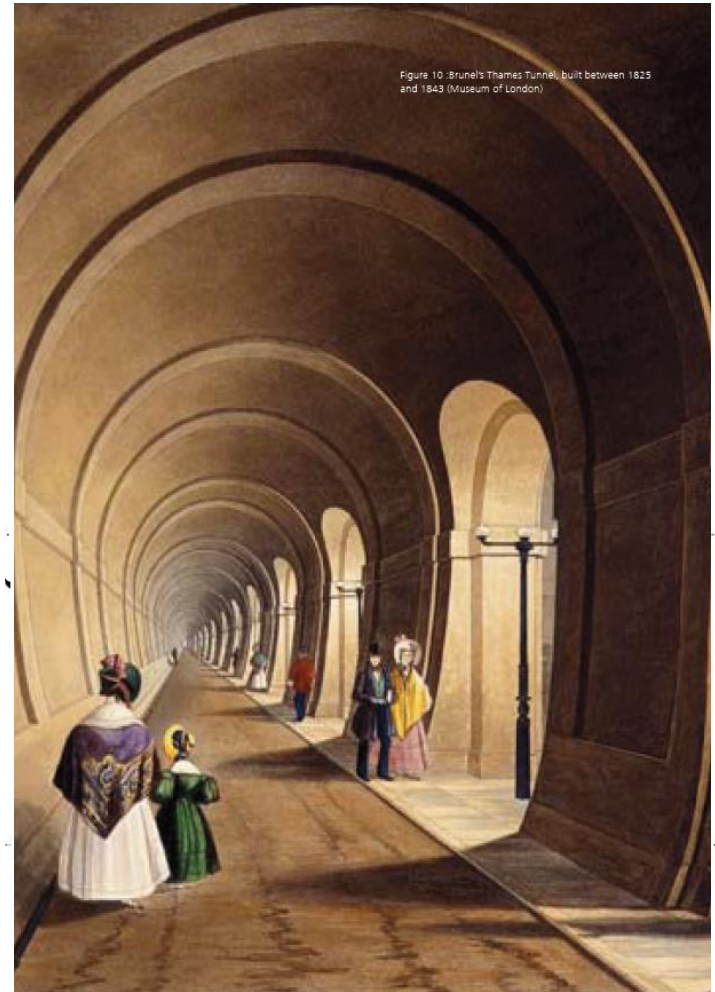
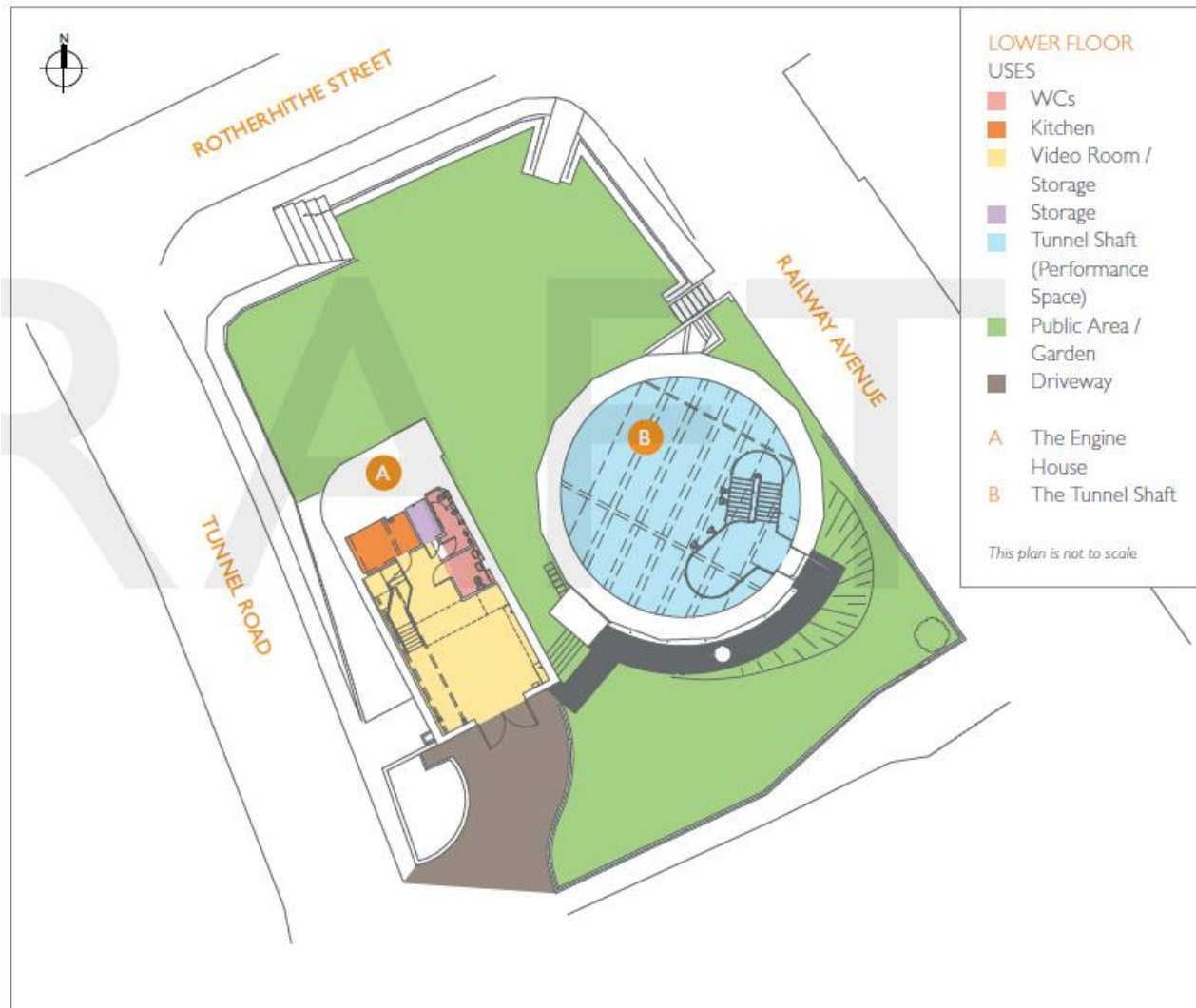


Figure 10 :Brunel's Thames Tunnel, built between 1825 and 1843 (Museum of London)

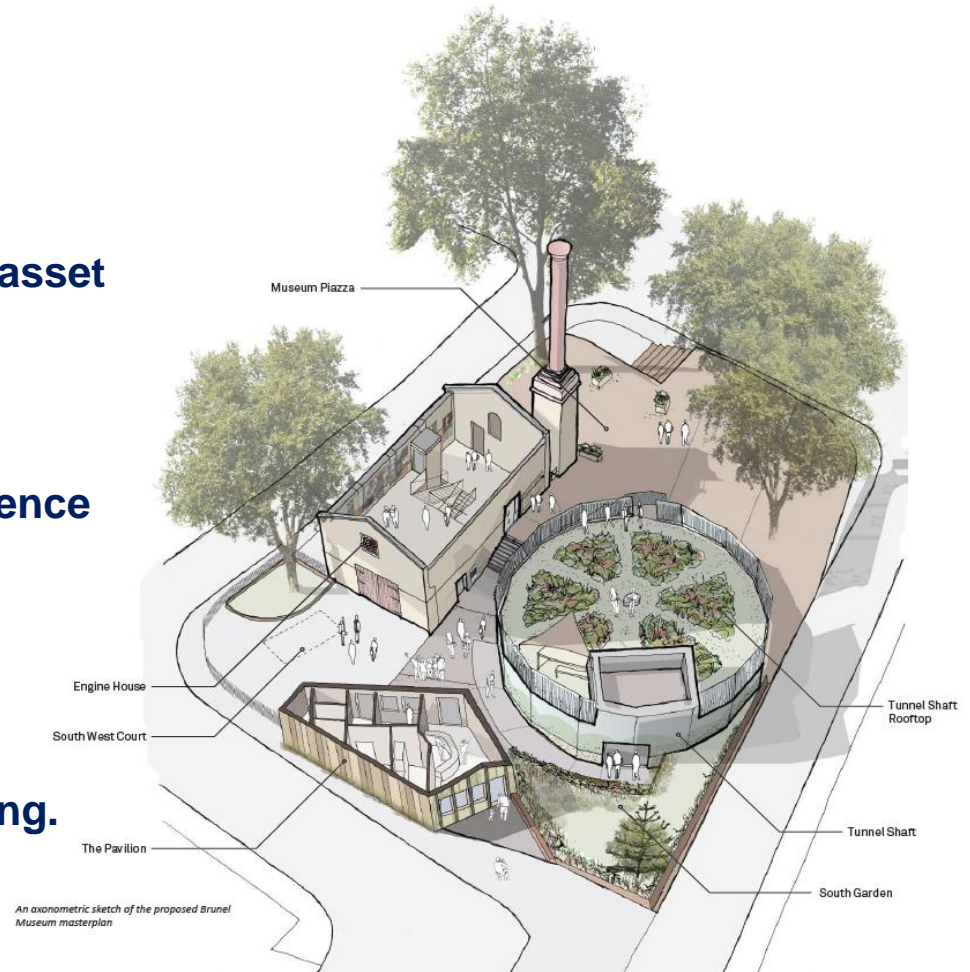

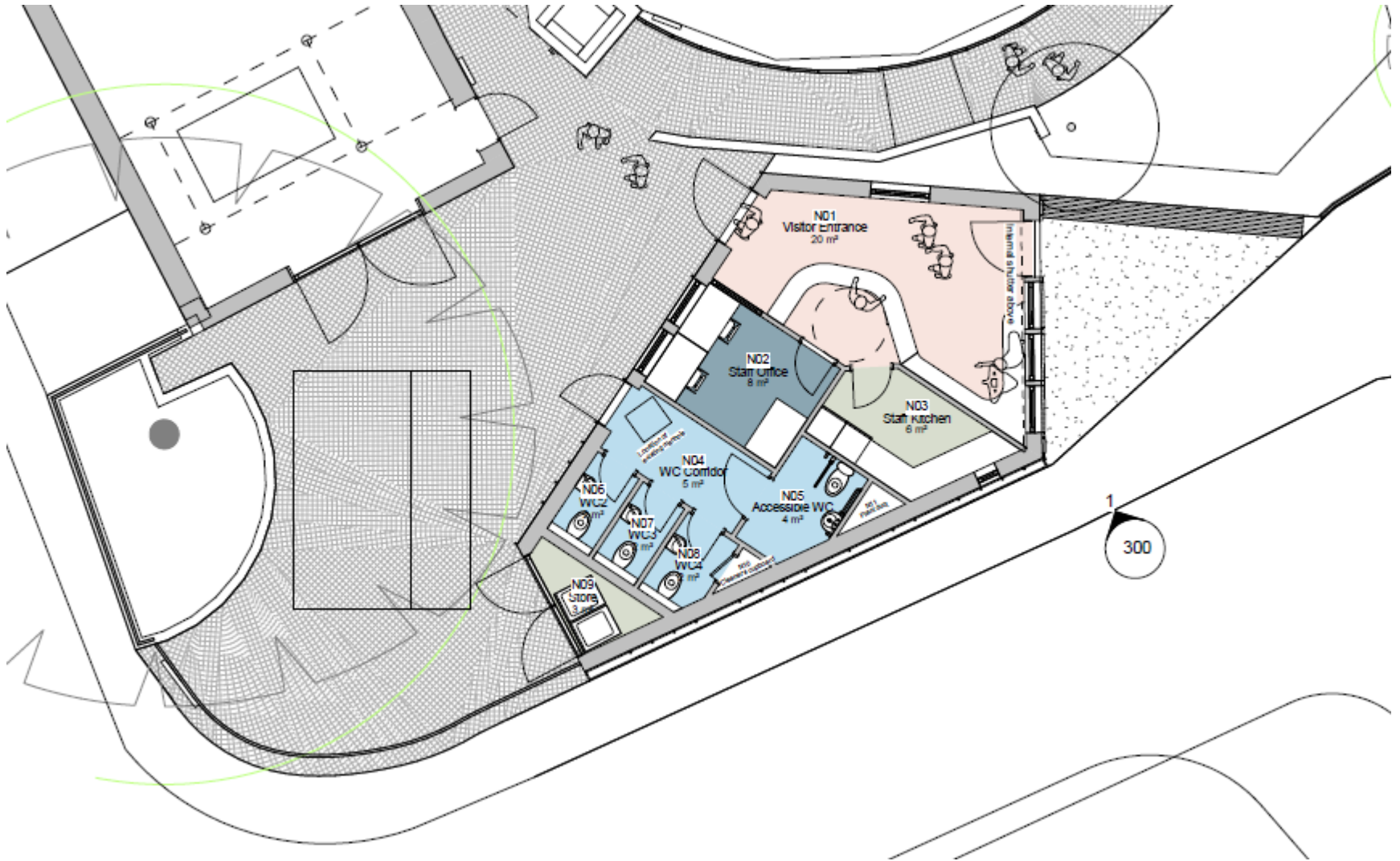

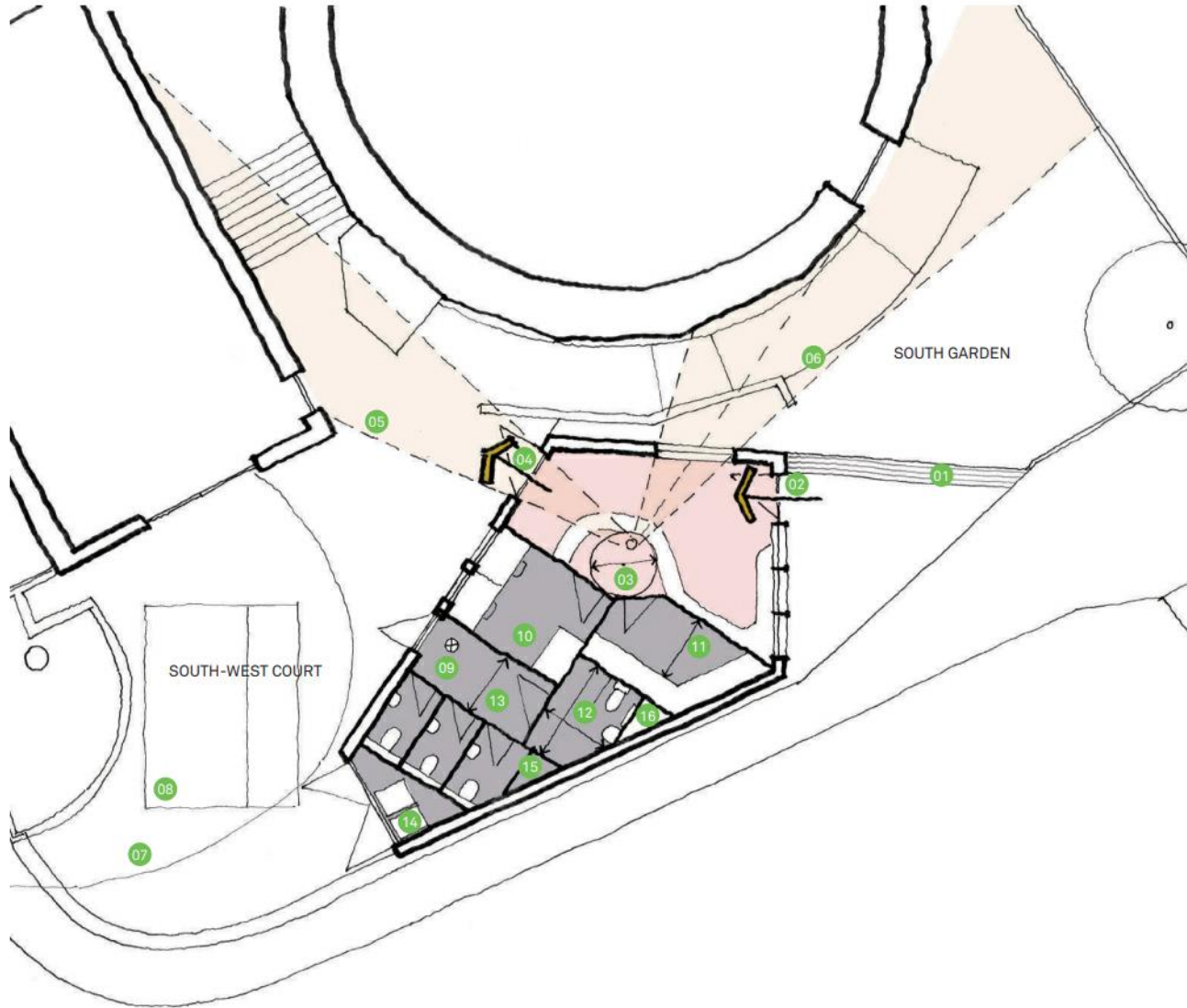


PROPOSED LAYOUT - PAVILION

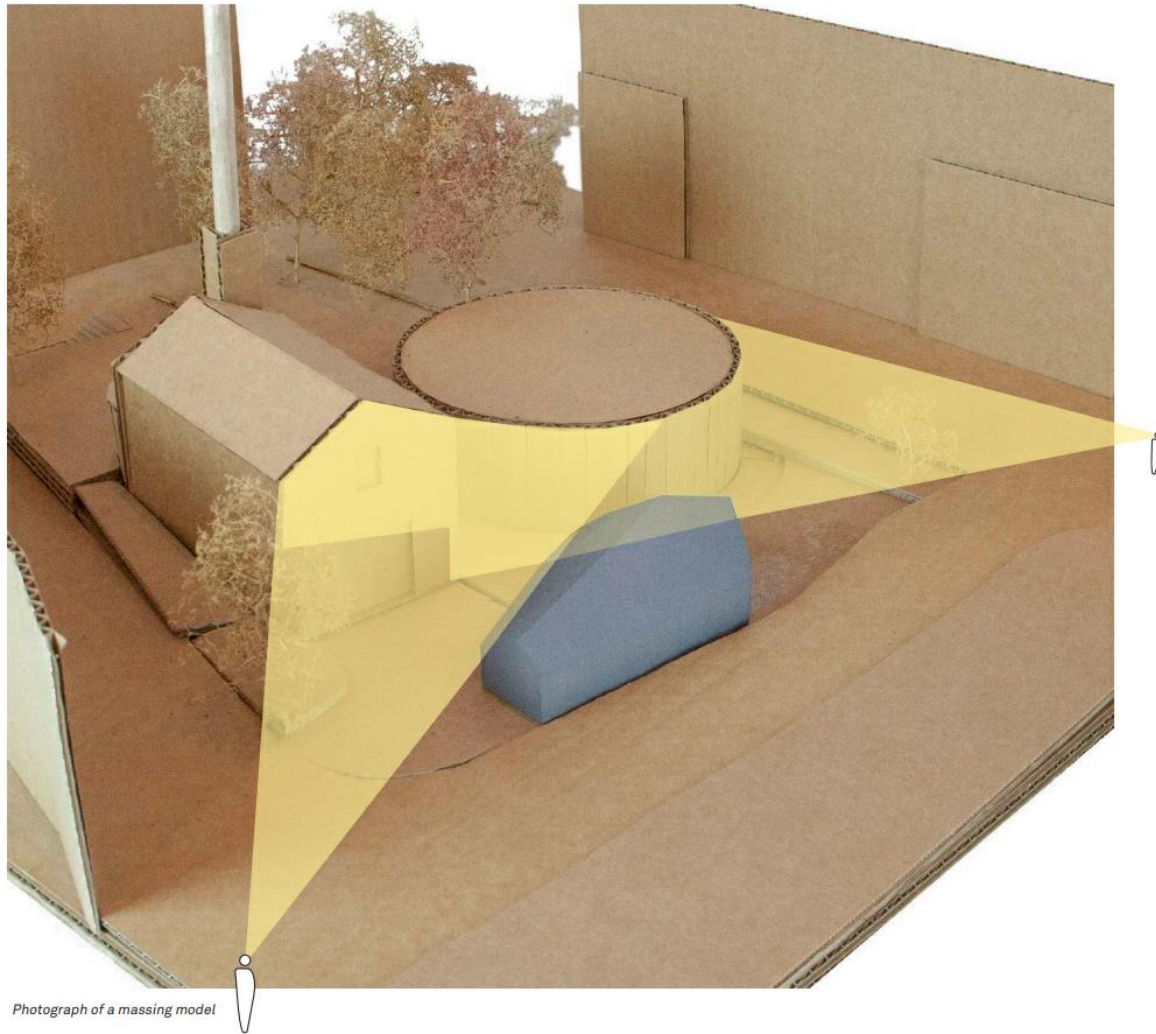


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PROPOSED LAYOUT - SIGHTLINES

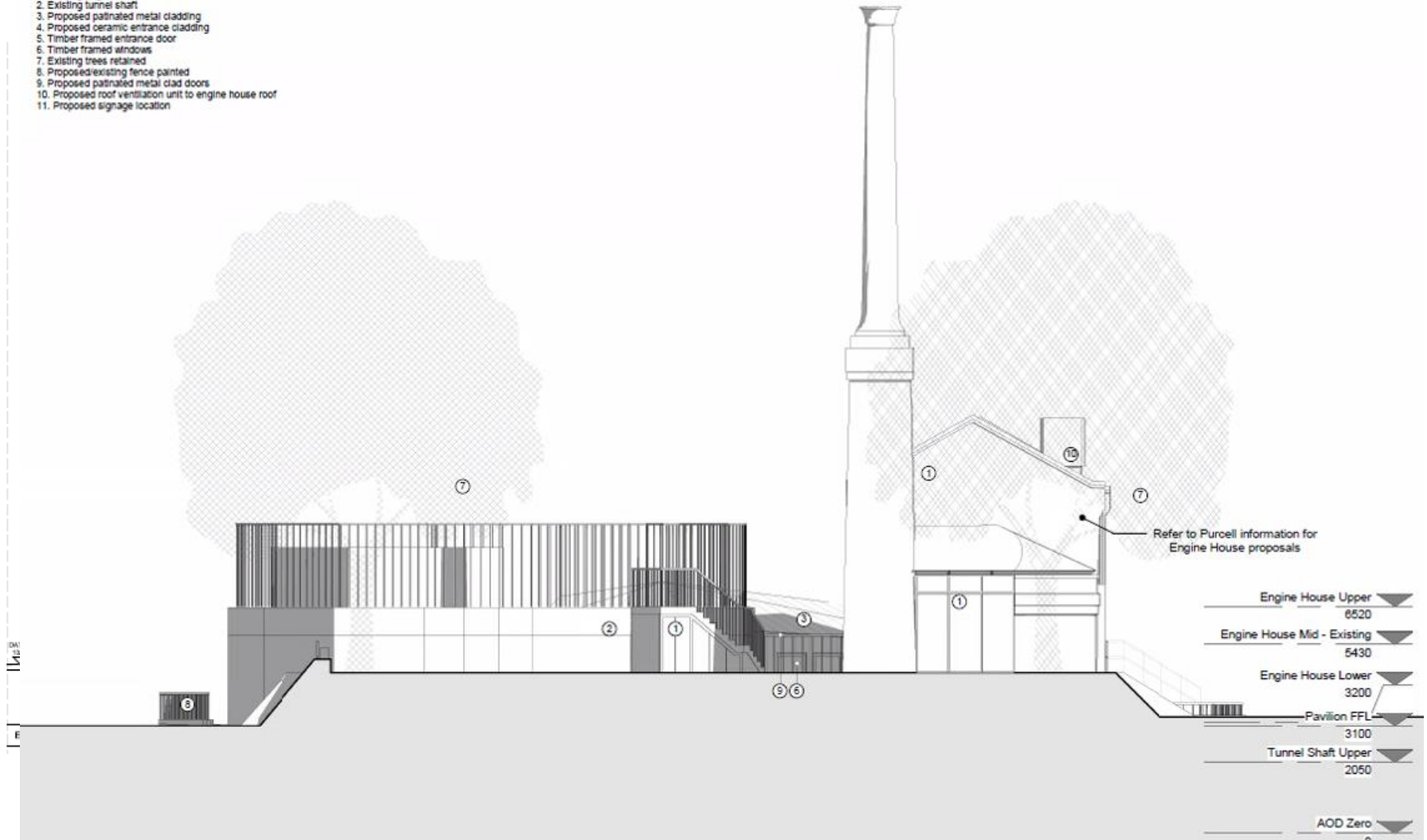

2.20 Pavilion Material studies

The chosen material palette will imbue the building into its surroundings and provide a fitting entrance to the Brunel Museum.

The proposed patinated metal cladding integrates with its setting, drawing on the colour and patina of the Engine House brickwork.

The glazed ceramic tiles to the entrance front reference typical Victorian decorative finishes, whilst also allowing the site's history to be described through their pattern.

The introduction of panelled glazing at the entrance will give glimpses into the new building, establishing a welcoming and active dialogue with the street front.

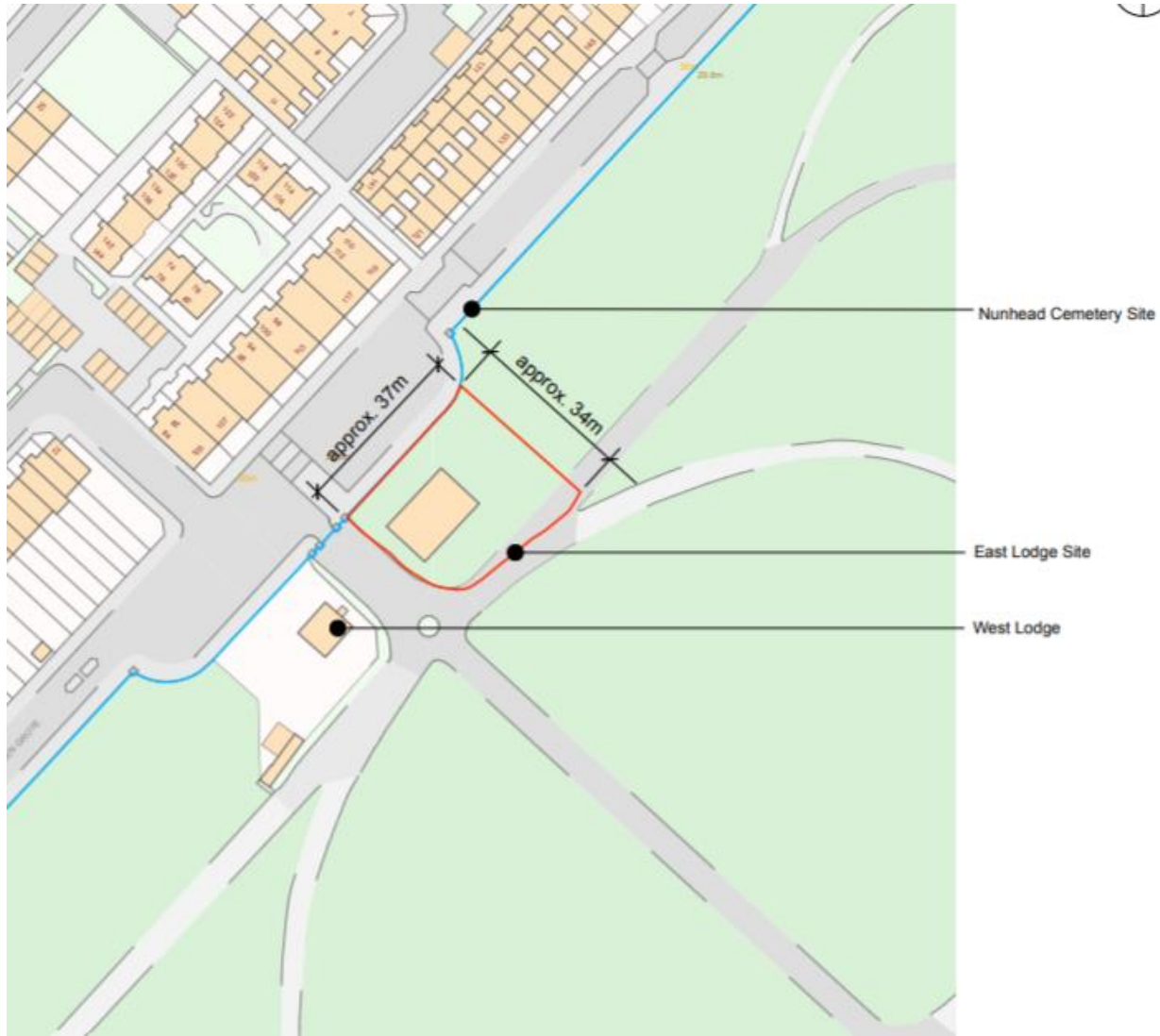

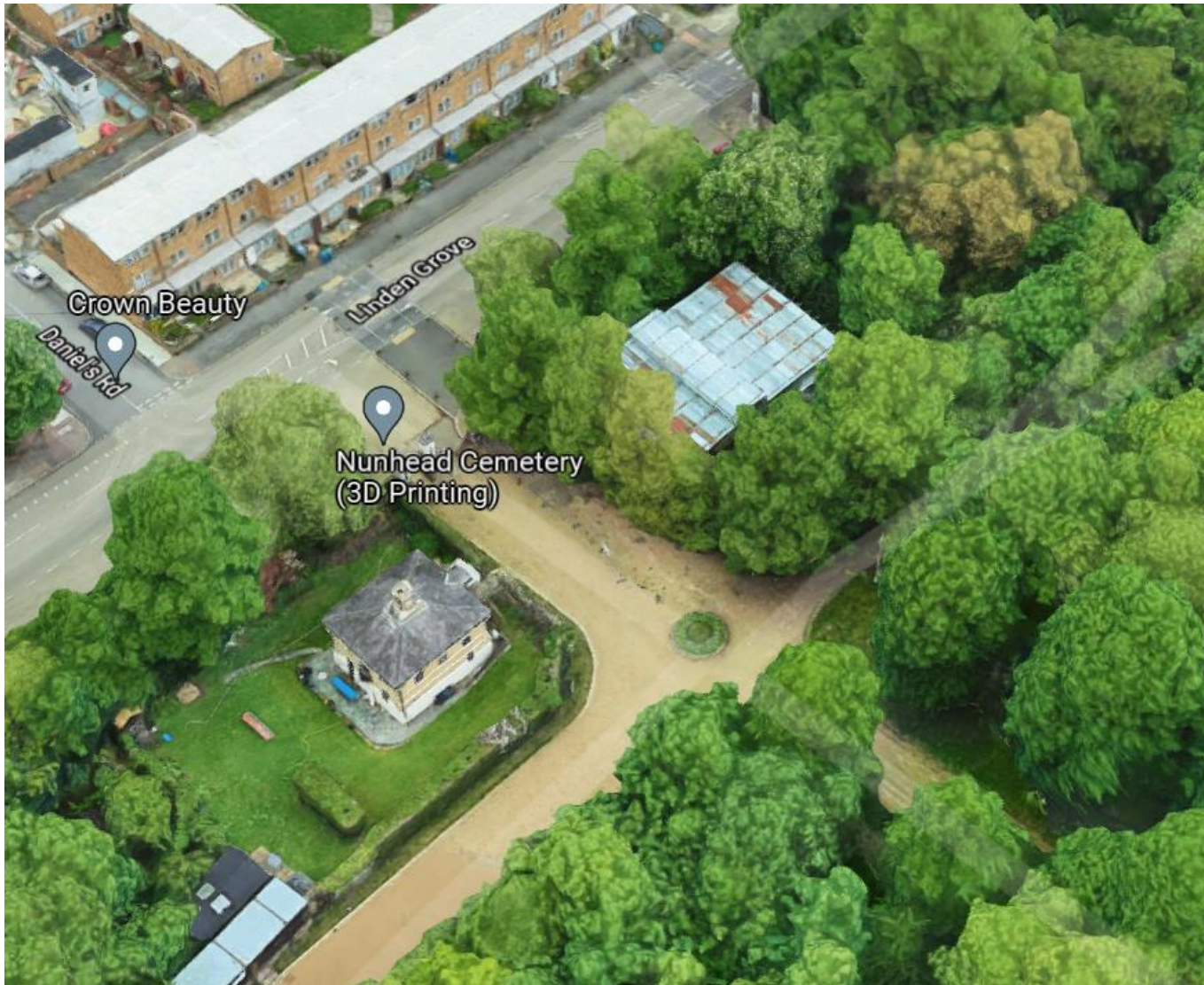

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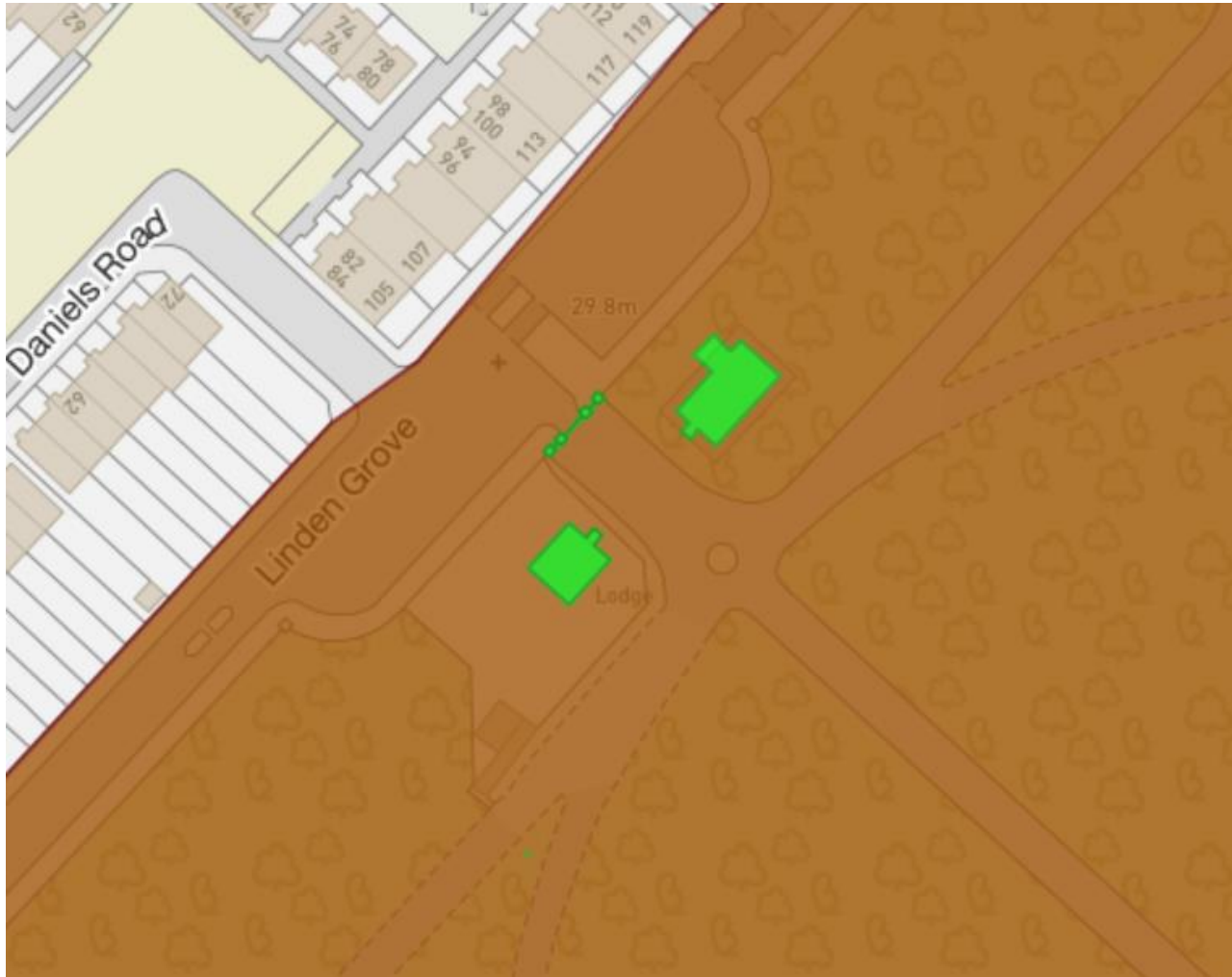
Site location plan

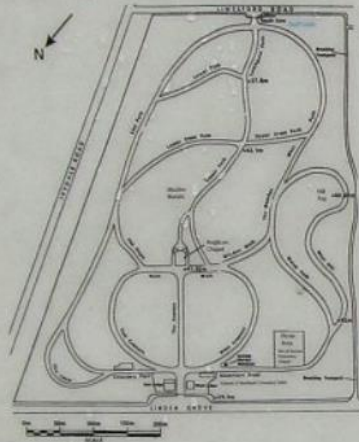

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History

Buildings

Nunhead Cemetery has three buildings of architectural importance. The two gate lodges and the Anglican Chapel - all listed Grade II. Designed by Thomas Little in 1843, the chapel fell victim to an act of arson in the late 1970s. The structure including the crypt below was made safe and accessible thanks to a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund in the year 2000.



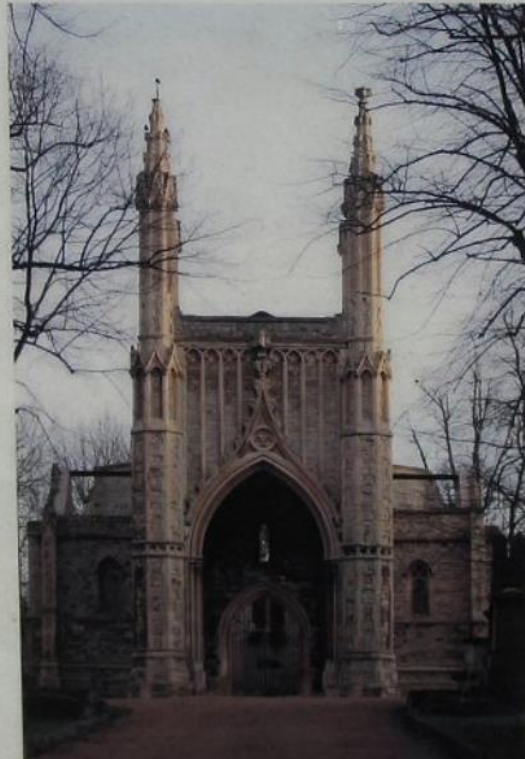
Decorations on Stearns mausoleum: example of the Romanesque style - an architectural fashion in 1900.

The Anglican chapel has an octagonal chapel at the rear. This design is found in Greek, Muslim and Early Christian architecture. A narrow spiral staircase leads from the antechamber near the entrance to a gallery overlooking The Avenue.

The two gate lodges were designed by James Bunstone Bunning, who also designed the layout of the cemetery, the cast iron gates and portland stone classical pillars.

History

Nunhead Cemetery is one of seven great commercial Victorian cemeteries established in a ring around the outskirts of London when the City churchyards became unhealthily full. At the time the cemetery opened in 1840 Nunhead was a small hamlet surrounded by market gardens and open fields. Nunhead Hill, the site chosen for the cemetery, rises to two hundred feet above sea level at its highest point and affords extensive views over the City of London and St Paul's in one direction and towards the North Downs in the other.



Trees and Wildlife

When the United Cemetery Company was no longer making money because the cemetery was becoming full they left and during a period of neglect in the 1960s and 70s the cemetery changed from lawn cemetery to meadow, scrub and then woodland.

Now it is a Local Nature Reserve and a Site of Metropolitan Importance for wildlife. The woodland fauna includes songbirds, green and great spotted woodpeckers, titmice and tawny owls. Recently, ring-necked parakeets have arrived. This introduced bird is spreading across London.

The original design of Nunhead Cemetery used specimen trees, some of them exotic, to enhance the landscape. These included Italian alder, horse chestnut, holm oak and ginkgo. Native trees include oak, holly and the stately limes along The Avenue.

Monuments and Symbolism

Many early graves at Nunhead follow simple classical styles, most commonly the simple rounded headstone. The larger monuments were the column topped by a figure or ball. The association of classical styles with Protestantism accounts for the choice of an obelisk to commemorate the Scottish Martyrs in a monument dated 1850.

Decorative devices emphasised mortality: inverted flaming torches to suggest life being snuffed out, cut flowers, weeping figures.

The Figgins tomb, 1844, with its four columns indicates a return to more austere Greek styles. Opposite, on the hill, the Allan tomb of 1867 was modelled on the Payava tomb at Xanthos which was discovered in the 1830s.

In more modern times the dead from 2 World and other wars were commemorated with simple headstones. There are four war memorial areas in Nunhead Cemetery. Recent burials include people of Muslim faith.

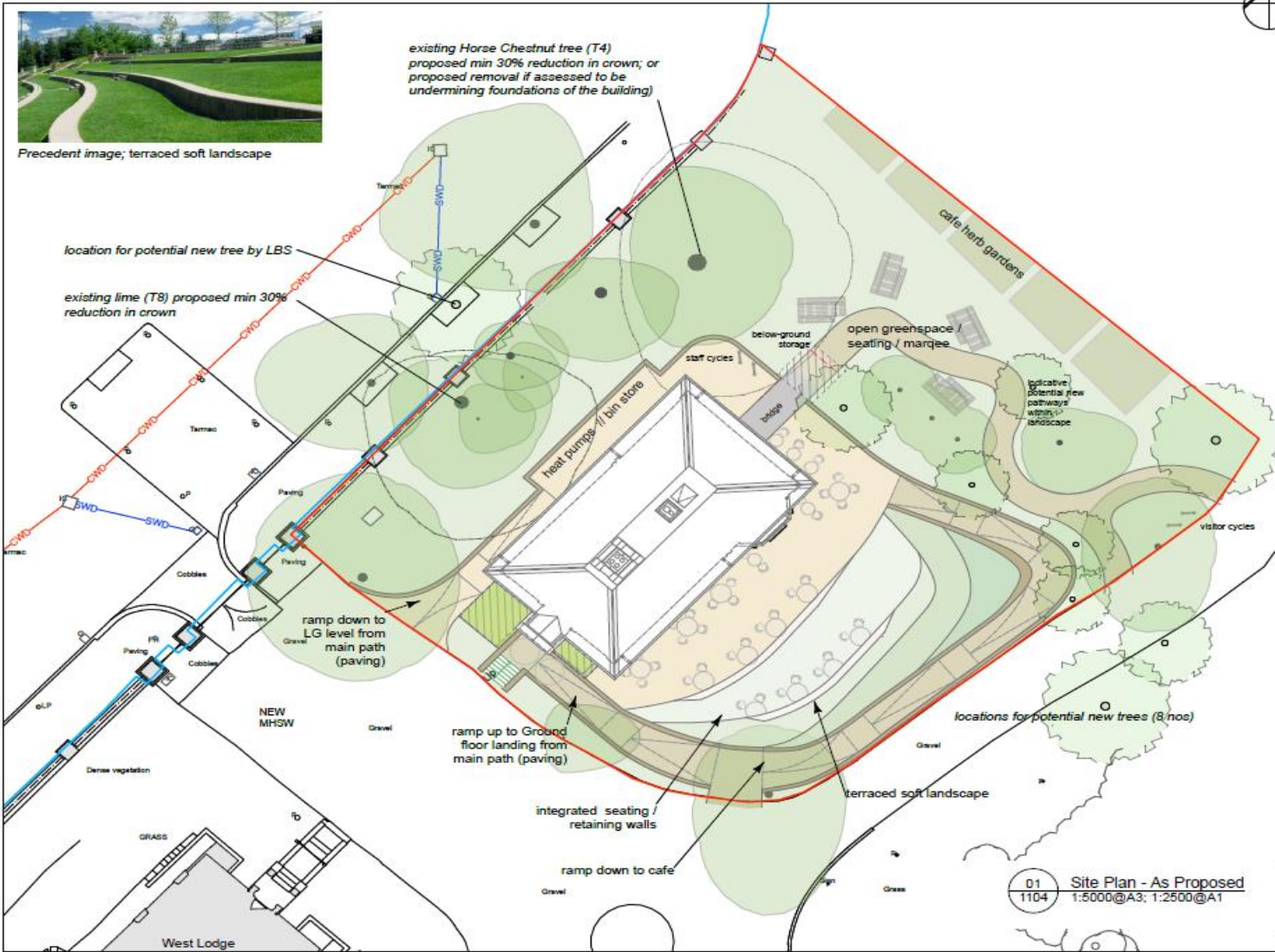

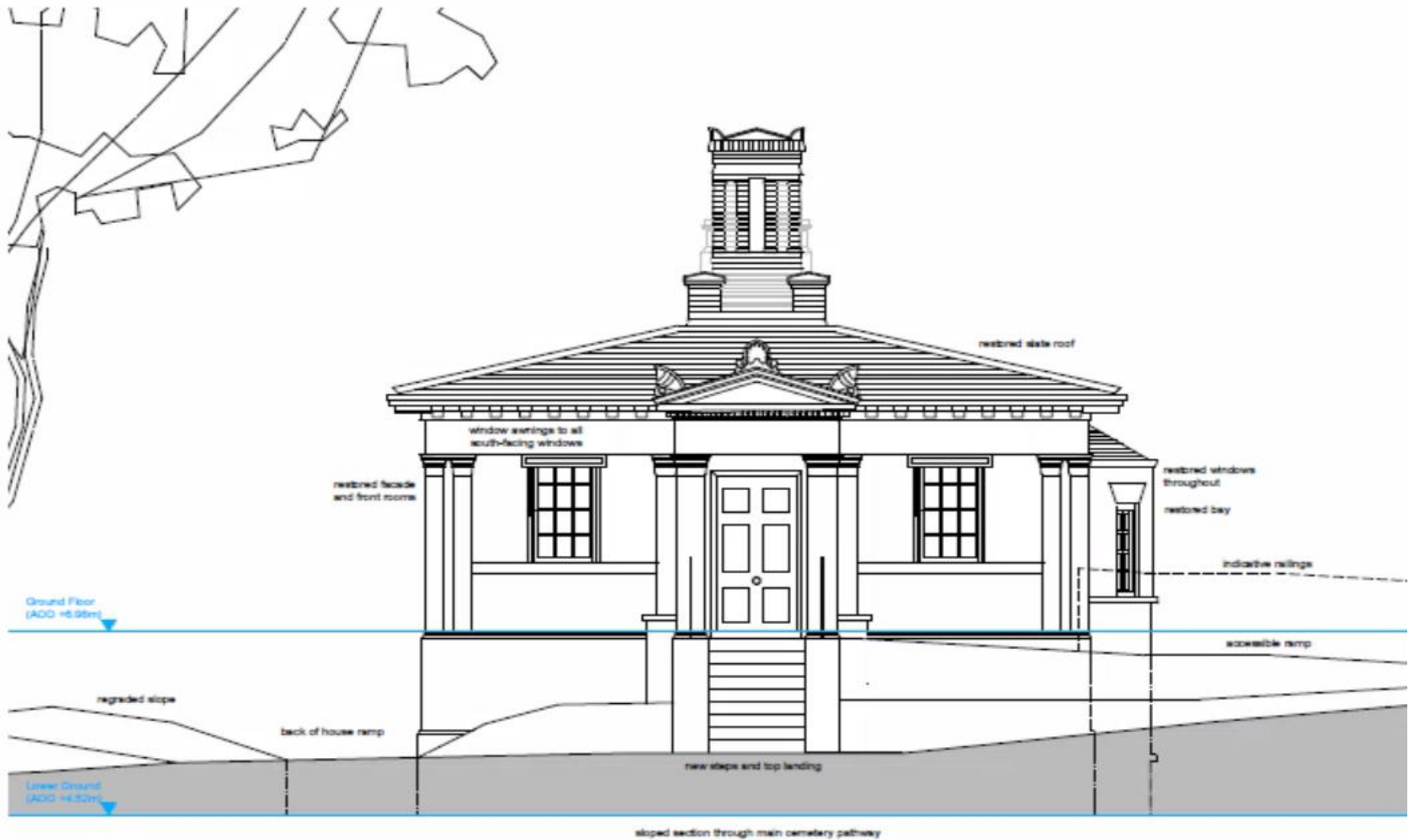

Proposed Site Layout

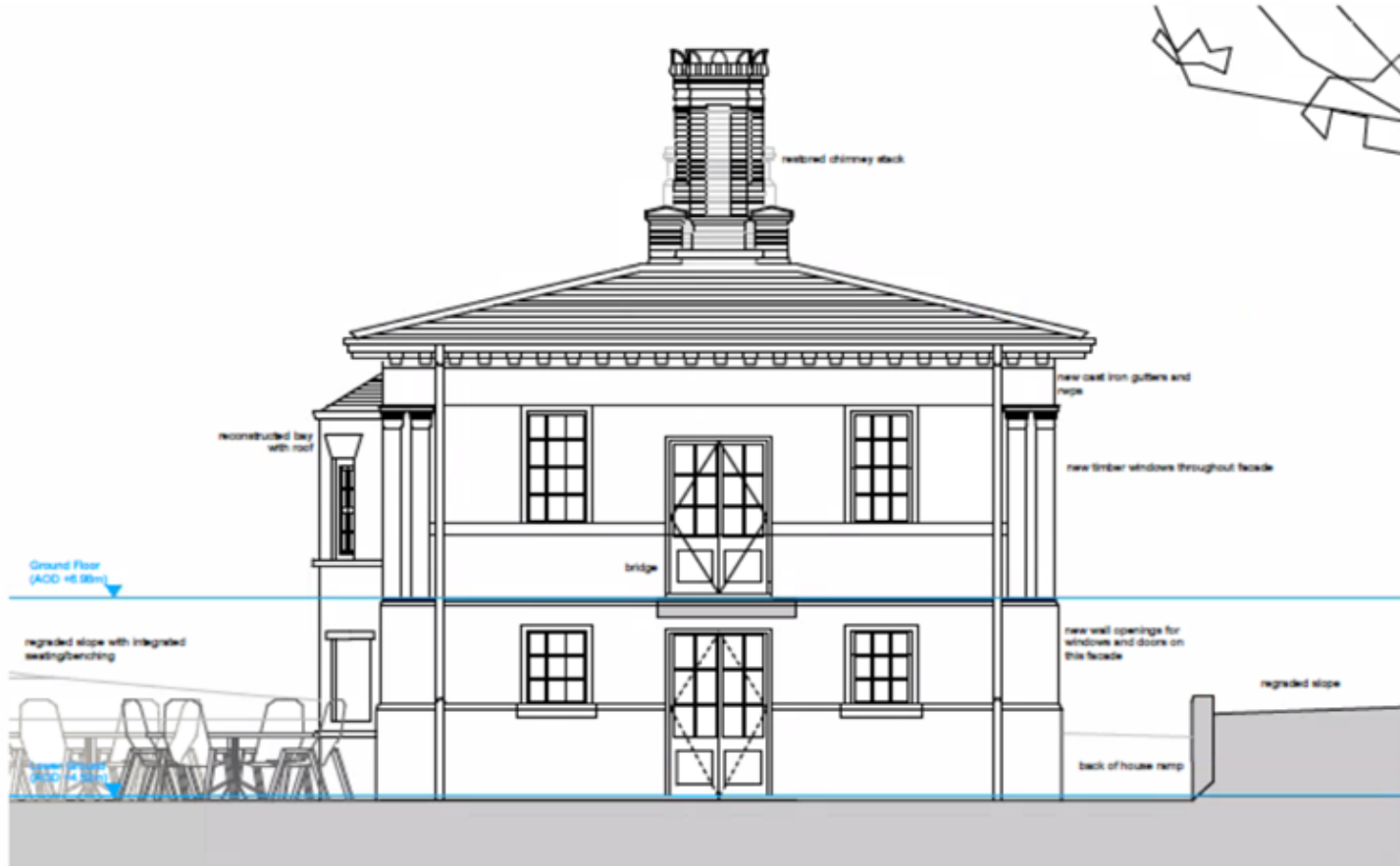

Proposal – Front Elevation



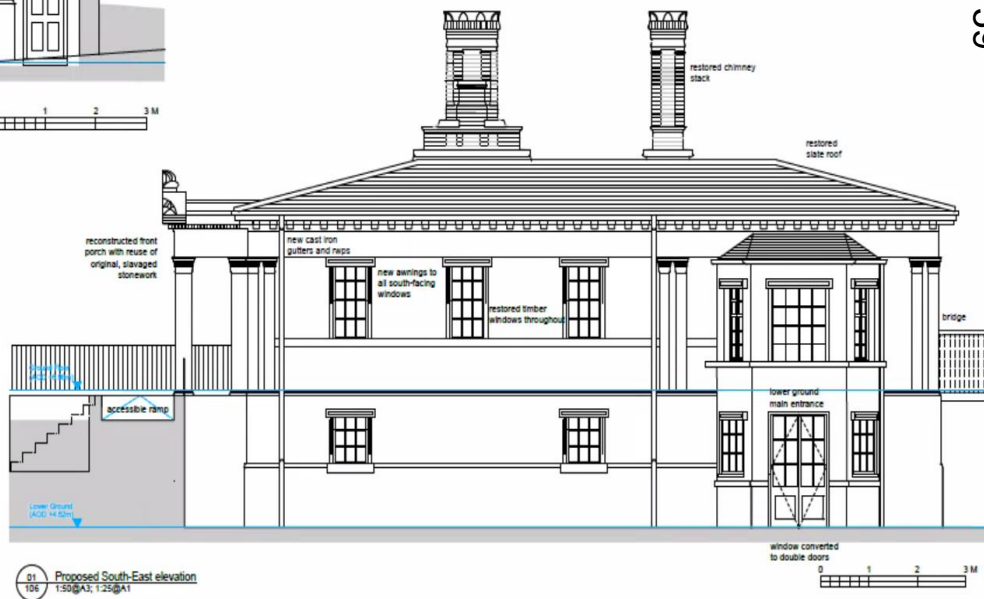
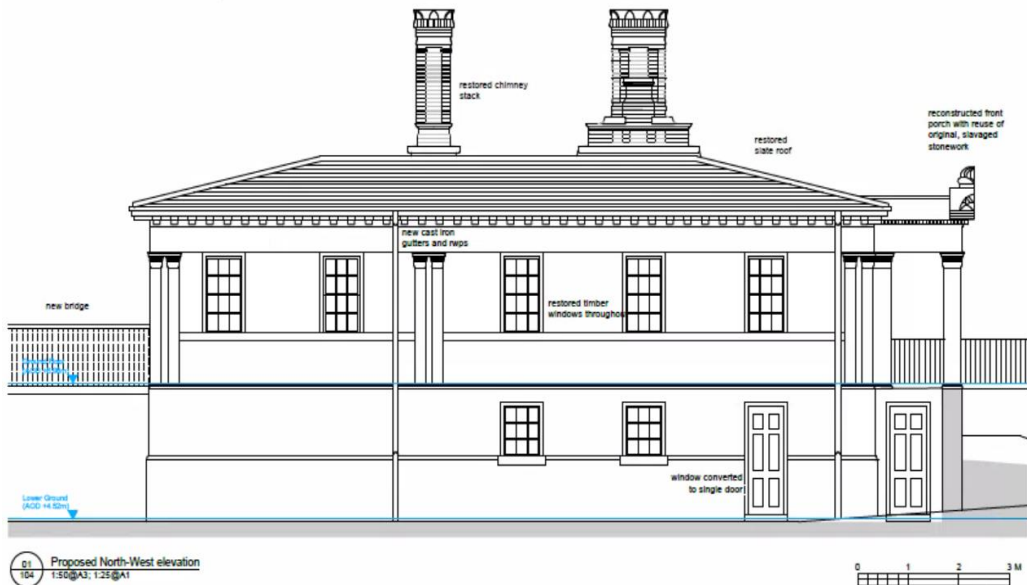
Proposal – Rear Elevation

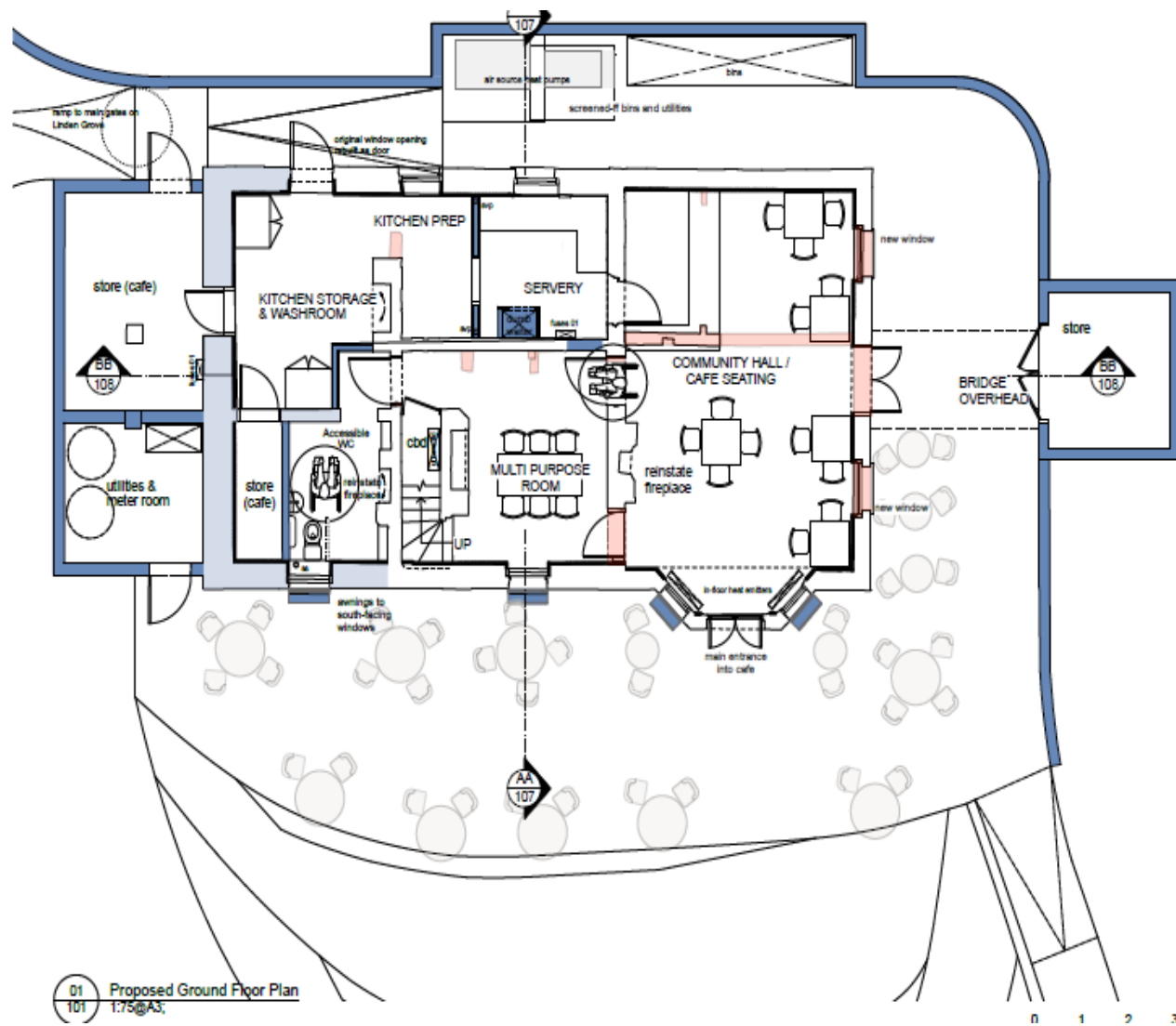


Proposal – North and South Elevation

Proposed Internal Layout – Lower Ground Floor

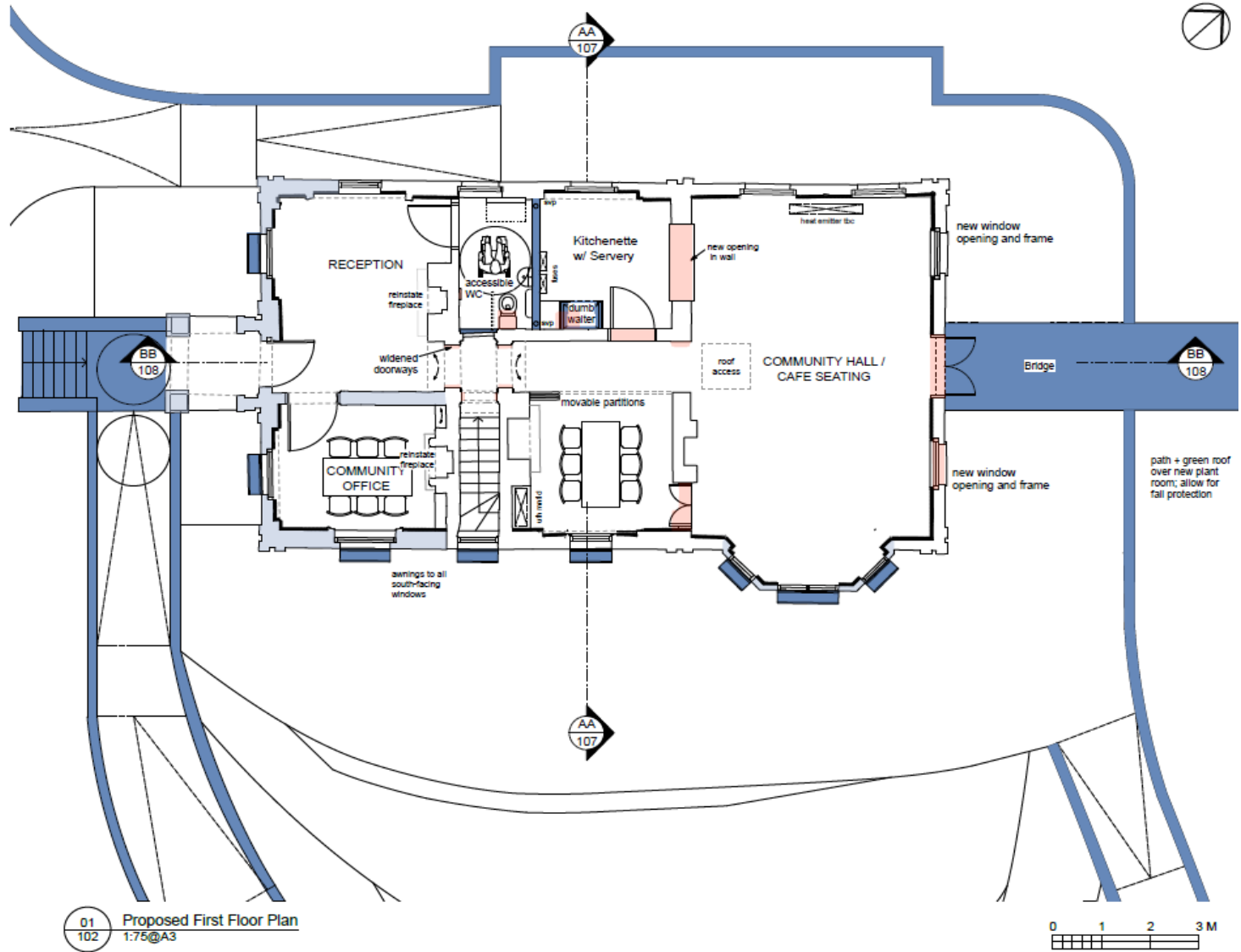

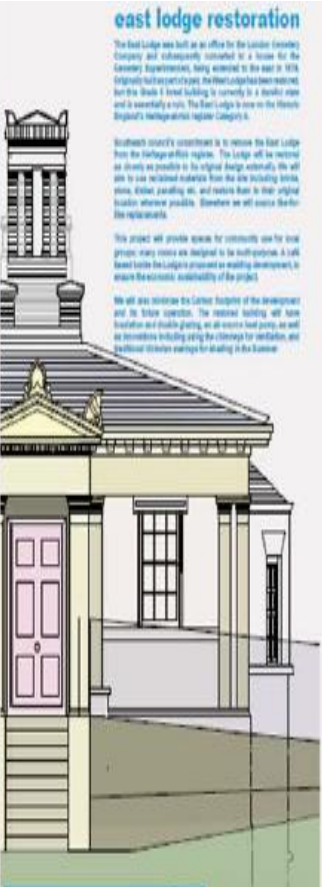

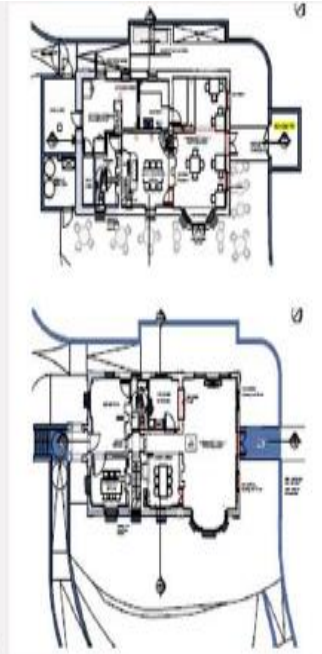

The East Lodge was built as an office for the London Cemetery Company and subsequently converted for a house for the Cemetery Superintendant, being retained to the east of the original site in 1929. The East Lodge has been retained but the South East Lodge is currently in a similar state and is currently a ruin. The East Lodge is one of the Southwark's most important historic buildings.

Southwark Council's intention is to restore the East Lodge from the ruins of this ruin. The Lodge will be restored as closely as possible to its original design externally. It will also be used as a museum for the site including books, maps, photos, paintings etc. and retain them in their original location wherever possible. Elements will also be replaced where necessary.

This project will provide space for community use for local groups. Many rooms are designed to be multipurpose. A cafe/bar located inside the Lodge is proposed as a meeting development to ensure the economic sustainability of the project.

We will also consider the Garden design of the development and the future operation. The restored building will have a garden and outdoor seating, an all-weather hot-pool, as well as an extensive walking path along the site for walking, and outdoor fitness equipment for walking in the Garden.

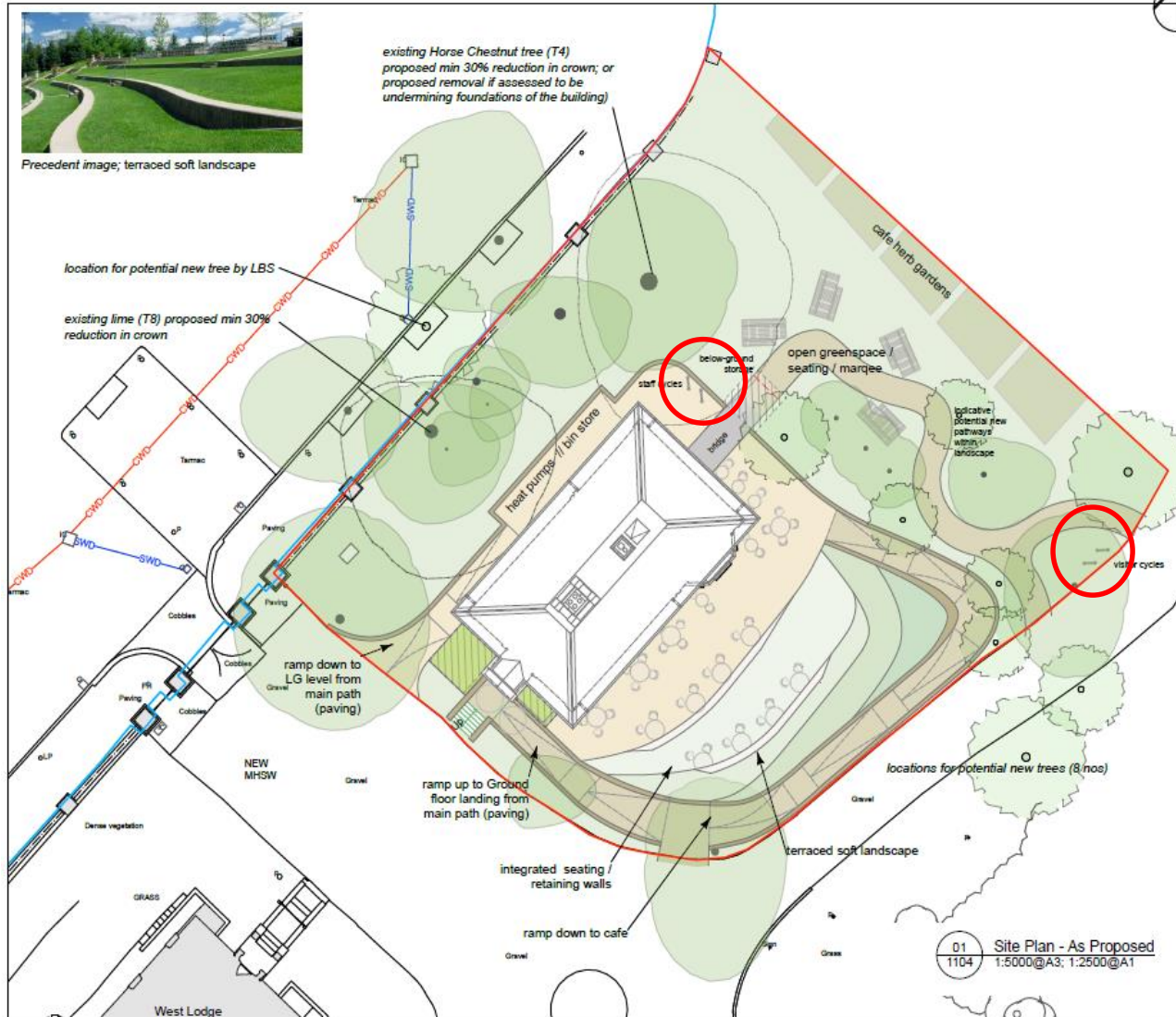


Car Parking and Trip Generation

- The site is not within a CPZ.
- Peak parking demand of 11 spaces could be generated.
- Survey shows 113 available parking spaces within 200m from the site and 12 available spaces within the unmarked Cemetery parking area on Linden Grove during the peak parking time (17:00-19:00). This could be accommodated in the surrounding streets
- Cemetery parking area on Linden Grove can accommodate disabled parking. 13 disabled car parking bays within 200m from the site, with a peak parking demand of 6.

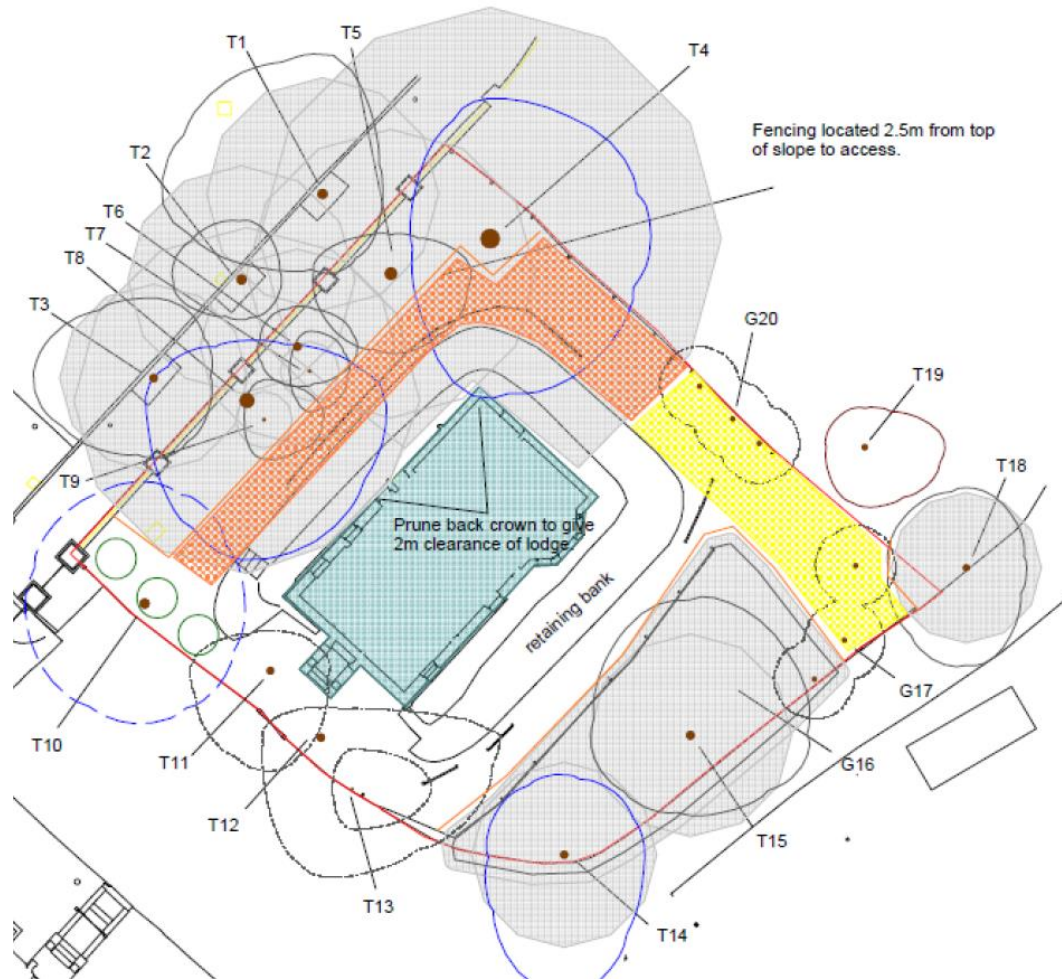
Landscaping, Trees and Urban Greening

- One category B oak and five category C oak, willow and ash require removal
- Suitable mitigation of adverse ecological impacts is proposed via biodiversity improvements encompassed within the urban greening factor of 0.5, which exceeds the minimum required by policy. Suitable replacement planting of six trees can also be provided as part of landscaping or elsewhere within the cemetery
- Bat survey valid until May 2022
- Landscaping condition to include sections drawings, hard landscaping planting and green roofs condition

- A condition requiring details of security measures, to be implemented prior to occupation which shall seek to achieve the Secured By Design” accreditation by the Metropolitan Police

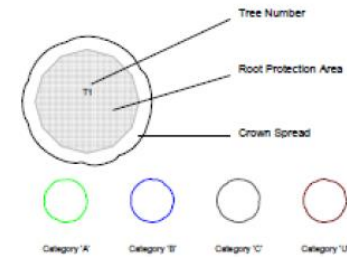

Construction management

A CMP is required via condition to be agreed prior to the commencement of development. A s278 is required by condition for reinstatement of the highway

Flood risk and SUDs

The application site is within flood zone 1 and therefore at the lowest risk of flooding. A Flood Risk Assessment has not been provided as the site area is under 1 hectare in size and does not meet the threshold for an assessment. Updated drainage plans are required by condition as the detailed design progresses

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Environmental Health and ventilation

The café will not provide a full catering service and therefore no recommendation is made for additional odour control. A condition requiring details is acceptable to control the design of the ventilation extract

Energy and sustainability

The application takes into account the Be Lean, Be clean, Be green criteria and BREEAM best practice and proposes the reuse of an existing building and its embodied carbon and utilises energy effective design and construction, low carbon energy supply and renewable energy generation.

The application seeks to apply the criteria of a BREEAM assessment and policies by adopting best practice design solutions in this area. While a formal BREEAM assessment may not be appropriate for a listed building, the spirit of the assessment and the compliance with the above policy criteria is considered to be met.
