RECOMMENDATION

1. That the licensing sub-committee considers an application made by TKPC Limited, for a premises licence to be granted under the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of the premises known as More, 104 Tooley Street, London SE1 2TH.

Notes:

- a) This application forms a new application for a premises licence, under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. The application is subject to representations from two interested parties and is therefore referred to the sub-committee for determination;
- b) Paragraphs 7 to 10 of this report provide a summary of the application the premises licence under consideration by the sub-committee (A copy of the full application is provided at Appendix A)
- c) Paragraphs 13 to 19 of this report deal with the representations received to the premises licence application. (Copies of the relevant representations are attached at Appendix B).

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Licensing Act 2003

- 2. The Licensing Act 2003 received royal assent on 10 July 2003. The Act provides a new licensing regime for
 - a) The sale of and supply of alcohol
 - b) The provision of regulated entertainment
 - c) The provision of late night refreshment

Within Southwark, this council wholly administers the licensing responsibility.

- 3. The Act requires the licensing authority to carry out its functions under the Act with a view to promoting the four stated licensing objectives. These are
 - a) The prevention of crime and disorder;
 - b) The promotion of public safety
 - c) The prevention of nuisance; and
 - d) The protection of children from harm.
- 4. In carrying out its licensing functions, a licensing authority must also have regard to

- a) The Act itself;
- b) The guidance to the Act issued under Section 182 of the Act;
- c) Secondary regulations issued under the Act;
- d) The licensing authority's own statement of licensing policy
- e) The application, including the operating schedule submitted as part of the application
- f) Relevant representations
- 5. The Act established a transitional period between 7 February 2005 and 6 August 2005 under which holders of existing justices licenses, public entertainment licenses and night café licenses were able to apply to the local licensing authority for "grandfather rights" conversion of those existing licenses into the relevant licenses under the new system. Licenses that were so converted were converted on existing terms, conditions and restrictions. The 6 August date having passed, operators must now apply for new licenses.
- 6. The premises licence application process involves the provision of all relevant information required under the Act to the licensing authority with copies provided by the applicant to the relevant responsible bodies under the Act. The application must also be advertised at the premises and in the local press. The responsible authorities and other interested parties within the local community may make representations on any part of the application where relevant to the four licensing objectives.

MATTERS FOR CONSIDERATION

The premises licence application

- 7. On the 18th March 2009, TKPC Limited applied to this council for the grant of a new premises licence in respect of the premises known as More, 104 Tooley Street, London, SE1 2TH.
- 8. A copy of the application for the new premises licence is attached to the report as Appendix A.
- 9. The premises licence application form provides the applicant company's operating schedule. Parts L, M, O set out the proposed operating hours. The operating controls, with reference to the four licensing objectives as stated in the Licensing Act 2003, are attached as a separate document attached to the application.
- 10. The application is summarized as follows
 - For the sale by retail of alcohol (to be consumed on and off the premises) from 11.00 to 00.00 on each of the days Monday to Sunday.
 - The provision of late night refreshment from 23.00 to 00.00 on each of the days Monday to Sunday.
 - The proposed opening hours are 11.00 to 00.30 on each of the days Monday to Sunday.

Operating History

11. There is no prior operating history to this premises.

Designated premises supervisor

12. The proposed designated premises supervisor for the premises known as More, 104 Tooley Street, London, SE1 2TH is Ms Paloma Campbell who has been granted a personal licence by the London borough of Hackney.

Representations from interested parties

- 13. There are two representations from interested parties. They are attached as appendix B to this report. The representations relate to public nuisance.
- 14. Copies of the representations were forwarded to the applicant's legal representatives who responded by letter (dated the 29th of April 2009) to their concerns. A copy of this letter is attached as appendix C.
- 15. The applicant's legal representative wrote further a further letter (dated the 6th of May 2009) to the interested parties, courtesy of the council, and this is attached as appendix D. This letter states that the application would be amended to allow the sale of alcohol until 11.00pm, with closing times of 11.30pm each day of the week. This amendment was however subject to both interested parties withdrawing their representations. As this was not the case members are asked to consider the original application as detailed in paragraph 10 of this report.
- 16. The applicant's legal representative wrote further a further letter to the interested parties (dated the 14th of May 2009), courtesy of the council, and this is attached as appendix E. This letter seeks to reassure the interested parties that the operational hours as applied for will not affect the interested parties amenity. It also states that should the representations submitted by the interested parties not be withdrawn that the applicant would seek to attain the operational hours as applied for.
- 17. An interested party wrote a letter (dated the 20th of May 2009 and attached as appendix F) in response to the letter sent to interested parties by the applicant's legal representative dated the 14th of May 2009.
- 18. The applicant's legal representative sent a letter in response to the above letter dated the 27th of May. It is as attached as appendix G.

Representations from responsible authorities

19. There have been no representations received from responsible authorities.

Disability discrimination act

20. The Southwark Disablement Association have no comments regarding this application.

21. The local vicinity

A map of the local vicinity is attached as appendix H. The premises is identified at the centre of the map as a black diamond and labelled as Goode Food to More. For the purposes of **scale only** the circle on the map has a 100-metre radius. Other licensed premises within the local vicinity are also shown on the map.

- 22. Council assembly approved the third revision of Southwark's statement of licensing policy on 2 April 2008. Sections of the statement that are considered to be of particular relevance to this application are
 - a) Section 3 which sets out the purpose and scope of the policy and re-inforces the four licensing objectives

- b) Section 5 which sets out the council's approach with regard to the imposition of conditions including mandatory conditions to be attached to the licence
- Section 6 details other relevant council and government policies, strategies, responsibilities and guidance, including the relevant articles under the Human Rights Act 1998
- d) Section 7 provides general guidance on dealing with crime and disorder and deals with licensing hours
- e) Section 8 provides general guidance on ensuring public safety including safe capacities
- f) Section 9 provides general guidance on the prevention of nuisance
- g) Section 10 provides general guidance on the protection of children from harm.
- 23. The purpose of Southwark's statement of licensing policy is to make clear to applicants what considerations will be taken into account when determining applications and should act as a guide to the sub-committee when considering the applications. However, the sub-committee must always consider each application on its own merits and allow exceptions to the normal policy where these are justified by the circumstances of the application.

RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

24. A fee of £190 has been paid by the applicant company in respect of this application being the statutory fee payable for premises within non-domestic rateable value band B.

CONSULTATIONS

25. Consultation has been carried out on this application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. An inspection of the premises was carried out on the 2nd of April 2009; however no notice was displayed at the premises. After discussions with the applicant the notice was correctly displayed at the premises on the 8th of April 2009. Due to the failure to initially display the notice, the last date for receiving representations was extended until the 1st of May 2009.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES IMPLICATIONS

26. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

CONCURRENT REPORT BY THE STRATEGIC DIRECTOR OF COMMUNITIES, LAW & GOVERNANCE

- 27. The sub-committee is asked to determine the application for a premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 28. The principles which sub-committee members must apply are set out below.

Principles for making the determination

29. The general principle is that applications for premises licence applications must be granted unless relevant representations are received. This is subject to the proviso that the applicant has complied with regulations in advertising and submitting the application.

- 30. Relevant representations are those which
- Are about the likely effect of the granting of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives
- Are made by an interested party or responsible authority
- Have not been withdrawn.
- Are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority, frivolous or vexatious.
- 31. If relevant representations are received then the sub-committee must have regard to them, in determining whether it is necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives to
 - (a) to grant the licence subject to-
 - (i) The conditions mentioned in section 18 (2)(a) modified to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and
 - (ii) Any condition which must under section 19,20 or 21be included in the licence in the licence
 - (b) to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - (c) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
 - (d) to reject the application.

Conditions

- 32. The sub-committee's discretion is thus limited. It can only modify the conditions put forward by the applicant, or refuse the application, if it is necessary to do so. Conditions must be necessary and proportionate for the promotion of one of the four licensing objectives, and not for any other reason. Conditions must also be within the control of the licensee, and should be worded in a way which is clear, certain, consistent and enforceable.
- 33. The four licensing objectives are
 - The prevention of crime and disorder;
 - Public safety;
 - The prevention of nuisance; and
 - The protection of children from harm.
- 34. Members should note that each objective is of equal importance. There are no other licensing objectives, and the four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.
- 35. Conditions will not be necessary if they duplicate a statutory position. Conditions relating to night café and take away aspect of the license must relate to the night time operation of the premises and must not be used to impose conditions which could not be imposed on day time operators.
- 36. Members are also referred to the DCMS guidance on conditions, specifically section 7, and Annexes D, E, F and G.

Reasons

37. If the sub-committee determines that it is necessary to modify the conditions, or to refuse the application for a premises licence application, it must give reasons for its decision

Hearing procedures

- 38. Subject to the licensing hearing regulations, the licensing committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that
- The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Cross examination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations
- Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing
- The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to
 - Address the authority
 - o If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
 - o In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
- The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant
 - o to the particular application before the committee, and
 - the licensing objectives.
- The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
- In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.
- 39. This matter relates to the determination of an application for a premises licence under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regulation 26(1) (a) requires the sub-committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

Council's multiple roles and the role of the licensing sub-committee

- 40. Sub-committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the council as authority responsible respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health and safety and as the planning authority.
- 41. Members should note that the licensing sub-committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The sub-committee sits in quasijudicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing of the application. In this case, members should disregard the council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the licensing law, guidance and the council's statement of licensing policy.
- 42. As a quasi-judicial body the licensing sub-committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The sub-committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event,

the occurrence of which would be relevant. The licensing sub-committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.

- 43. The licensing sub-committee is entitled to consider events outside of the premises if they are relevant, i.e. are properly attributable to the premises being open. The proprietors do not have to be personally responsible for the incidents for the same to be relevant. However, if such events are not properly attributable to the premises being open, then the evidence is not relevant and should be excluded. Guidance is that the licensing authority will primarily focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, working or engaged in normal activity in the area concerned.
- 44. Members will be aware of the council's code of conduct which requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The code applies to members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.
- 45. The sub-committee can only consider matters within the application that have been raised through representations from interested parties and responsible authorities. Interested parties must live in the vicinity of the premises. This will be decided on a case to case basis.
- 46. Under the Human Rights Act 1998. The sub committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The sub-committee has a duty under section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent crime and disorder in the borough.
- 47. Interested parties, responsible authorities and the applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the sub-committee to the Magistrates' Court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against.

Guidance

48. Members are required to have regard to the DCMS guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood, members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.

I am writing to object to the above application for a license at a property which is located opposite my home. Whilst it is common for people not to realise that people live on Tooley Street, the area around the application site contains residential properties on both sides of the road, including the upper floors above the shops to the sides of the site and, for this reason, the property is unsuitable for the activity proposed.

The site notice advises that it is intended to sell alcohol for consumption indoors and outdoors until midnight every day and for closure of the property and the associated departure of customers at 12.30am every day. This is an unacceptably late time for the generation of noise and activity in a residential area and, if allowed, this will only lead to constant disturbance and complaints.

Residents in the area recognise and live with its busy nature, but already experience serious disruption from those out late at night on Fridays and weekends in particular. This regularly involves groups of people, as opposed to individuals, and is not only a disturbance at many times throughout the night but is also menacing. In these circumstances, it is unthinkable that a use selling alcohol until midnight and releasing crowds of people at 12.30am could be considered acceptable where residential amenity is highly vulnerable.

It is inevitable that customers will gather on the street outside the property to smoke and drink which can have no other outcome but late night noise every day of the week. This may be acceptable in a commercial area, but can't be so where homes are adjacent and opposite. Whilst I note that the Council's website suggests that the property should have notices advising against creating noise, these are hardly likely to be influential to those who are still drinking at midnight and are unlikely to be under the "control" of the operator once they have left the building and are wandering around Tooley Street.

I'm not sure whether a site visit is normal for a License application, but I would strongly recommend one. Our flats are regularly abused throughout the day and night by people string on the bedroom window cills with drinks and cigarettes.

The cills front the pavement and are the right height for this. You can imagine how disturbing this is throughout the night and there are also problems of threatening behaviour and abuse when one asks them to move on. This is an existing problem which can, clearly, be expected to be exacerbated by the proposed License.

We have no objection to commercial uses or those selling alcohol, but do object to the proposed operating hours. There can be no case of need for this as the area already has a large number of bars and restaurants.

For these reasons, we ask you to refuse this application and show respect for the amenity of local residents.

We assume that the application will be considered by Committee and would be grateful if you will advise us of the date and venue in order that we can attend.

I write as a local resident, a Chartered Surveyor and Deputy Chairman of Lambeth and Southwark Bench. The latter not admitted so as to impress but to advise that I may have a little more local knowledge than most.

Tooley Street was always a shopping street, in its own way, and has gradually changed with the advent of morelondon to embrace other ground floor uses such as takeaways, dentists and a number of former A1 uses have become office space

From Stainer Street moving eastwards we have the long standing Chinese Restaurant at 94, Tooley Street, then at 96 the Fuzzys Sandwich Bar, then 100 a vacant unit which appears now to have an A3 consent, then the Thai Restaurant at 102, and then we arrive at 104. The latter used to be a sandwich shop and was a valued part of the local Community.

So the entirety of the south side of Tooley Street will become totally A3 use, as so is the opposite side of the road with the café bars on the morelondon frontage and within a few yards other A3 uses to encompass Dim Tee, Gauchos, Strada and the facilities to eat and drink within the new Hilton Hotel. There are also more A3 uses proposed to the east in the continuation of the morelondon development.

Whilst this letter is written in haste and without having had time to study the Local Plan I find myself amazed at the ease in which A3 uses take over, but that is not my primary concern.

If you have granted an A3 consent on 104 so be it, but I take most enormous objection to off sales of alcohol, or indeed alcohol sales of any type after say 11.00pm.

There can be no real need for folk to buy alcohol after that hour, they should have done so before they set out. And having not done so they are unlikely to take the alcohol home to drink but to drink in the nearest most convenient place, with or without any toilet facilities.

We live opposite the License Application site and we have suffered for many years from noise, nuisance and disruption, particularly at weekends, from pedestrians and groups of people who are, clearly, affected by alcohol late at night. They sit on the steps and window cills of our property and congregate on the pavement.

We have had to resort to Southwark Noise Control on many occasions and, despite the fact that this is some sort of recourse, it is not the way people should have to live their lives on a daily basis. While we know we have the right to complain via legislation, why should we be forced to have our night-times disturbed by having to make the complaints because people are facilitated in behaving poorly because of late Licenses in unsuitable locations?

Therefore, we most strongly object to the granting of the License and ask that, if there is to be a License at all, that it is for a much shorter period of time and does not allow offsales. The latest suitable time would be 11.00pm, which is adequately late to allow people to enjoy themselves, for the business to flourish and for local residents to enjoy some reasonable amenity.

Will you please record my objection which is made well in advance of the closing date of 1st May as displayed on the Site Notice (although, I see that the Council's website incorrectly records a different date).

I look forward to receiving your response and advice on the date of the Committee.

We act for TKPC Limited which has applied for a premises licence at the abovementioned address. Rosanna Keogh of Southwark Council Licensing Team has forwarded to us a copy of your representation in the hope that, in the spirit of encouraging negotiation between parties, we can attempt to address the concerns you have regarding our client's application.

Firstly, I would like to set out some background information regarding our client and the nature of the proposed restaurant which it intends to operate. Our client runs a small, independent company and has, over the years, run a handful of well-known restaurants around London, some of which operate in residential areas quite similar in nature to Tooley Street. The company is consequently very aware of the need to co-operate and foster a good relationship with residential neighbours and, over many years of trading, is proud not to have received a single complaint as a result of the operation of any of its businesses from local residents regarding disruption or noise. Indeed, restaurant staff and management at all of the businesses have actively encouraged their customers to leave in a quiet and orderly manner.

The proposed restaurant will seat approximately thirty people and will very much be focused on food and not alcohol. Evening customers will be required to eat at the restaurant in order to be able to consume alcohol and this policy will avoid attracting any potentially raucous customers. Our client does not wish to attract such people to the area as it recognises the disturbance they could cause to both the restaurant staff and other customers and to the local area. The limited space in the premises will mean that customers cannot simply stand at the bar to drink – the premises will be a sit-down restaurant in the true sense of the word. Although our client has applied for a closing time of 12:30am, this has been done to preserve flexibility and in reality the restaurant will generally be closing at approximately 10:30pm to 11pm.

To turn to the particular concerns noted in your letter, please note that the applicant has already acquired planning permission for the use of the premises as a restaurant. As you will no doubt be aware, the planning process does consider the issues of noise, disturbance and residential amenity. The applicant has applied to be licensed for the sale of alcohol both on and off the premises. There is no suggestion, however, that the restaurant will be selling alcohol for general consumption outside the premises. The provision to authorise off sales is merely to cover circumstances where diners do not finish a bottle of wine with their meal and so wish to take the re-corked bottle home.

In relation to your concern that the premises would be releasing crowds of people onto the streets in the early hours of the morning, we would draw a distinction between a small restaurant with a maximum capacity of thirty people and a large chain restaurant housing many more people than this. It is not envisaged that all customers will leave all together at closing time as may be the case with a restaurant that opens very late and where people go to drink rather than to eat. Our client has many years' experience in the trade and expects customers to arrive and leave at varying times throughout the evening and for the last customers to be leaving at around 11pm.

We note your concern that customers would disturb you and your fellow residents by sitting on your window sills. Our client firmly believes that the style of our operation would attract a clientele that would have sufficient respect for residents' property so as not to engage in such activity and if necessary our client's staff would strongly discourage customers from disrupting residents' peace in any way.

In order to give you a better idea of the restaurant concept and the proposed style of operation, our client would like to invite you to a meeting in order that you can discuss any remaining concerns that you may have and to reassure you that it is very unlikely that the style of restaurant proposed will give rise to the type of disturbance which you describe in your letter.

Should you wish to meet to discuss the issue, please do not hesitate to contact Rosanna Keogh of Southwark Council Licensing who will arrange a meeting time with our client. We hope that this letter has given you sufficient information to set your mind at rest regarding our client's proposals for what is, quite emphatically, a restaurant rather than a bar and which, our client believes, will bring benefit to the community in terms of amenity and in creating some 20 or so jobs locally. We enclose a copy of a sample menu with this letter in order to illustrate again that the 30-seater restaurant will not be a hub for the type of crowd who would normally attend the bars and pubs in the vicinity solely to drink and not to enjoy a meal. Thankyou for your letter of 14th May and I set out below the response on behalf of my wife and me. For ease, a copy of this letter has also been sent to Joelson Wilson, the applicant's solicitor.

First, apologies for the delay in responding, but I have been on leave. I note that Joelson Wilson on behalf of the applicant express disappointment that I have failed to reply to their two letters of 29th April and 6th May but I have only received the latter and, as noted above, this arrived when I was on leave. I would appreciate the applicant showing a little more respect than to criticise me for failing to respond to letters which have not arrived and for waiting only 5 working days to send a reminder letter with a complaint against a lack of reply. Whilst this may be their job for which they are getting paid, some of us have other things to do with our time.

I am pleased, however, that the applicant has taken the trouble to respond to my comments and I welcome their advice. I note, however, that the restaurant is fully in place and has opened today, which seems something of a surprise given the fact that a number of consents are still outstanding.

However, in response to the comments of Joelson Wilson, I make the following replies.

I'm not sure why Joelson Wilson should feel that it knows that it is the Hilton Hotel guests who abuse the use of our window cills, as they are not local and no evidence is offered. I live here and I can clearly say that it is general members of the public; primarily those who have been visiting local entertainment and some of which are still drinking alcohol when deciding to sit, smoke and chat on our property. I can quite clearly imagine this happening with the More customers. There can be no value attached to their assumptions as I would suggest that they lack local knowledge and their comments are made in error and, I suspect, in desperation in defence of their client's proposals.

It would also be more respectful if the letters of Joelson Wilson did not deteriorate into threats as that of $14^{\rm th}$ May; presumably because I failed to reply to their letter of only five working days previous. They claim to have made a great effort in consulting local residents via correspondence but if they attend the Committee claiming that they have written to me on three occasions, I will make it quite clear that this is not true.

I will also make it clear that I appear to have been "threatened" that, if I don't withdraw my objection, they will pursue the applied for opening hours via a hearing – even though that is not justified by their client's proposals. Such a heavy handed attitude seems solely intended to threaten.

The applicant's approach to this process does appear to have been one of seeking a License far in excess of what is needed solely in order to appear to be conciliatory when residents object. This is not a particularly innovative strategy and is one which I feel shows contempt for local people and the application process, particularly when it concludes in threats to pursue a scope of License which is not actually needed, despite resident concerns. Certainly, the publicity of the More restaurant itself shows that it is to close at 11.00pm on Monday to Saturday and 4.00pm on Sunday. There can, therefore, be no need for the extent of the License sought and to which I have objected in terms of late night opening.

In the context of More's own publicity, the revised offer of Joelson Wilson to close at 11.30pm under the License is still excessive – the need is, clearly, only until 11.00pm. For this reason, I propose that any License granted should only allow alcohol on-sales until 11.00pm on Monday to Saturday as per the applicant's own publicity. Sales on Sunday should be restricted to a maximum of 4.00pm as per the restaurant's current proposals. Neither of these suggestions would compromise the More Restaurant proposals as expressed in its menu and publicity information. I trust that the Council will set an appropriate start time to any License which will not compromise residents' amenity.

In terms of the off-license, this continues to be unacceptable. The restaurant displays on its windows the fact that it offers "take away" and I assume that this is the planning consent which it holds, as a take away is quite distinct in the Use Classes Order from a restaurant. In the context of the business being a take away, there is a clear risk of local problems from this also involving off-sales of alcohol.

Whilst Joelson Wilson suggests that the off-sales license is only to cover circumstances where diners have not finished a bottle of wine, this seems an extremely excessive provision for such a rare event. I don't mind diners taking home a half consumed bottle of wine but I do mind persons being able to buy alcohol for consumption off the premises which may compromise our personal amenity and the safety and reputation of Tooley Street.

I do hope that the More Restaurant proves to be a successful and sensitive operation, but I must protect our personal amenity from the

consequences of a take-away and off-license. The operators will apply no control to their clients as to where they eat or drink their take-aways and, given that we are directly opposite and offer seemingly easy places to sit, we are most likely to suffer from their operation. The dumping of food remnants and rubbish is bad enough, but the consequences of the sale of alcohol for off-site consumption is unacceptable.

The decision on the License cannot be taken without reference to the local circumstances and the potential for local problems.

In summary, I continue to oppose the application for the off-sale of alcohol and request that on-sales and opening hours are restricted to 11.00pm at the latest on Monday to Saturday and 12.00 noon to 4.00pm on Sundays as per the More publicity information as this will, clearly, not compromise the business. The off-sale of alcohol should not be allowed at all.

I attach a copy of the restaurant's publicity information which explains the opening hours which fit with my suggestion above.

If you or the applicant have any queries, I will be pleased to try to help.



RECOMMENDATION

 That the Licensing Sub-Committee considers an application made by Mrs Ajike Erejuwa for a grant of a Premises Licence under the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of the premises known as: AFRICAN RESTAURANT AND GROCERIES 346 EAST STREET, LONDON SE17 2SX.

2. Notes:

- a) This application forms a new application for a Premises Licence, under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. The application is subject to representations from a Responsible Authority and Interested Parties and is therefore referred to the Sub-Committee for determination;
- b) Paragraphs 9 to 11 of this report provide a summary of the application the Premises Licence under consideration by the Sub-Committee (A copy of the full application is provided as Appendix A)
- c) Paragraphs 13 to 16 of this report deal with the representations received to the Premises Licence application. (A copy of each of the relevant representations are attached as Appendices B-D)

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Licensing Act 2003

- 3. The Licensing Act 2003 received Royal Assent on 10 July 2003. The Act provides a new licensing regime for
 - a) The sale of and supply of alcohol
 - b) The provision of regulated entertainment
 - c) The provision of late night refreshment
- 4. Within Southwark, the licensing responsibility is wholly administered by this Council.
- 5. The Act requires the licensing authority to carry out its functions under the Act with a view to promoting the four stated licensing objectives. These are
 - a) The prevention of crime and disorder;
 - b) The promotion of public safety
 - c) The prevention of nuisance; and
 - d) The protection of children from harm.

- 6. In carrying out its licensing functions, a licensing authority must also have regard to
 - a. The Act itself;
 - b. The Guidance to the act issued under Section 182 of the Act;
 - c. Secondary regulations issued under the Act;
 - d. The Licensing Authority's own Statement of Licensing Policy
 - e. The application, including the operating schedule submitted as part of the application
 - f. Relevant representations
- 7. The applications process involves the provision of all relevant information required under the Act to the licensing authority with copies provided by the applicant to the relevant responsible bodies under the Act. The application must also be advertised at the premises and in the local press. The responsible authorities and other interested parties within the local community may make representations on any part of the application where relevant to the four licensing objectives.

MATTERS FOR CONSIDERATION

The Application for a New Grant

- 8. On 16 March 2009, an application was made by Mrs Ajike Erejuwa for a grant of a Premises Licence in respect of the premises known as African Restaurant and Groceries, 346 East Street, LONDON SE17 2SX under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. A copy of the application is attached to the report as appendix A.
- 9. The application is summarized as follows:

To permit the provision of regulated entertainment

- (live music, recorded music, performances of dance, provision of facilities for dancing)
 - Monday to Wednesday between 18.00 hrs to 00.00 hrs on the following morning
 - Thursday to Saturday between 18.00 hrs to 03.00hrs on the following morning
 - o Sunday between 18.00 hrs to 00.00hrs

• To permit the provision of late night refreshment

- Monday to Wednesday between 23.00 hrs to 00.00 hrs on the following morning
- Thursday to Saturday between 23.00 hrs to 03.00hrs on the following morning
- Sunday between 23.00 hrs to 00.00hrs

To permit the sale and or supply of alcohol

 Monday to Wednesday between 10.00 hrs to 00.00 hrs on the following morning

- Thursday to Saturday between 10.00 hrs to 03.00hrs on the following morning
- o Sunday between 10.00 hrs to 00.00hrs

• The opening hours of the premises are

- Monday to Wednesday between 10.00 hrs to 00.30 hrs on the following morning
- Thursday to Saturday between 10.00 hrs to 03.30hrs on the following morning
- o Sunday between 10.00 hrs to 00.30hrs

Non standard timings

- New Years Eve to remain open until 04.00am
- o Bank Holidays till 04.00am
- 10. The application form provides the applicant's operating schedule. Parts E, F, G, L, M and O set out the proposed operating hours in full.
- 11. Part P of the application provides any additional steps that are proposed by the applicant to promote the four licensing objectives as set out in the Licensing Act 2003. In the event that the Sub-Committee should approve the application any proposals stated here must become conditions on any subsequent Premises Licence issued.

Designated Premises Supervisor

12. The proposed designated premises supervisor Licence is Ajike Erejuwa. who holds a Personal Licence issued by the London Borough of Greenwich.

Representations From Interested Parties

- 13. There are 3 representations and accompanying photos lodged by interested parties and a petition signed by 20 local residents. The representations are primarily concerned with the possibility of noise nuisance, and anti social behaviour already being experience and escalating as a result of the proposed grant. The representations point out that there has been a history of noise nuisance anti social behaviour and crime and disorder arising from the operation of the premises in the past. The representations also indicate a lack of confidence in the management of the premises to operate responsibly.
- 14. Copies of the representations and photos lodged by interested parties are attached as appendix B and C to the report.

Representations From Responsible Authorities

- 15. There are two representation lodged by the Metropolitan Police and the Council's Environmental Protection Team (EPT). Both representations outline control measures that should be undertaken to reduce the risk of crime and disorder and noise nuisance if the licence is granted.
- 16. Copies of the representations are attached as appendix D to the report.

SOUTHWARK COUNCIL STATEMENT OF LICENSING POLICY

- 18. Council Assembly approved the Southwark Statement of Licensing Policy on 2 April 2008. Sections of the Statement that are considered to be of particular relevance to this application are
 - a. Section 3 which sets out the purpose and scope of the policy and reinforces the four licensing objectives
 - Section 5 which sets out the Council's approach with regard to the imposition of conditions including mandatory conditions to be attached to the licence
 - c. Section 6 details other relevant Council and Government policies, strategies, responsibilities and guidance, including the relevant Articles under the Human Rights Act 1998
 - d. Section 7 provides general guidance on dealing with crime and disorder and deals with licensing hours
 - e. Section 8 provides general guidance on ensuring public safety including safe capacities
 - f. Section 9 provides general guidance on the prevention of nuisance
 - g. Section 10 provides general guidance on the protection of children from harm.
- 19. The purpose of Southwark's Statement of Licensing Policy is to make clear to applicants what considerations will be taken into account when determining applications and should act as a guide to the Sub-Committee when considering the applications. However, the Sub-Committee must always consider each

application on its own merits and allow exceptions to the normal policy where these are justified by the circumstances of the application.

RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

20. A fee of £190.00 has been paid by the applicant in respect of this application being the statutory fee payable for premises within non-domestic rateable value Band B.

CONSULTATIONS

21. Consultation has been carried out on this application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. A public notice was placed in the 'Southwark News' and a similar notice exhibited outside of the premises.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES IMPLICATIONS

22. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

CONCURRENT REPORT BY THE STRATEGIC DIRECTOR OF LEGAL & DEMOCRATIC SERVICES – LEGAL ISSUES

- 23. The Sub-Committee is asked to determine the application for a grant of a premises licence.
- 24. The Sub-Committee can only consider matters within the application that have been raised through representations from interested parties and responsible authorities. Interested Parties must live in the vicinity of the premises. This will be decided on a case-by-case basis.
- 25. Under the Human Rights Act 1998, the Sub-Committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The Sub-Committee has a duty under Section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent and crime and disorder in the Borough.
- 26. Interested Parties, Responsible Authorities and the applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the Sub-Committee to the Magistrates' Court within a period of 21 days beginning with day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against.
- 27. The principles that Sub-Committee members must apply are set out below.

PRINCIPLES FOR MAKING THE DETERMINATION

- 28. The general principle is that applications for Premises Licence applications must be granted unless relevant representations are received. This is subject to the proviso that the applicant has complied with regulations in advertising and submitting the application.
- 29. Relevant representations are those which
- Are about the likely effect of the granting of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives

- Are made by an interested party or responsible authority
- Have not been withdrawn (in this case, the initial objections from the Fire Service have been withdrawn).
- Are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority, frivolous or vexatious.
 - 30. If relevant representations are received then the Sub-Committee must have regard to them, in determining whether it is necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives to
- Add to, omit, and/or alter the conditions of the licence or,
- Reject the whole or part of the application

Conditions

- 31. The Sub-Committee's discretion is thus limited. It can only modify the conditions put forward by the applicant, or refuse the application, if it is necessary to do so. Conditions must be necessary and proportionate for the promotion of one of the four licensing objectives, and not for any other reason. Conditions must also be within the control of the licensee, and should be worded in a way which is clear, certain, consistent and enforceable.
- 32. The four licensing objectives are
 - a. The prevention of crime and disorder;
 - b. Public safety;
 - c. The prevention of nuisance; and
 - d. The protection of children from harm.
- 33. Members should note that each objective is of equal importance. There are no other licensing objectives, and the four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.
- 34. Conditions will not be necessary if they duplicate a statutory position. Conditions relating to late night refreshment and take away aspect of the license must relate to the night time operation of the premises and must not be used to impose conditions which could not be imposed on day time operators.
- 35. The Licensing Act requires mandatory conditions in respect of supply of alcohol, the exhibition of films and in respect of door supervisors.
- 36. Members are also referred to the DCMS guidance on conditions, specifically section 7, and Annexes D, E, F and G.

Reasons

37. If the Sub-Committee determines that it is necessary to modify the conditions, or to refuse the application, it must give reasons for its decision.

Hearing Procedures

38. Subject to the Licensing Hearing regulations, the Licensing Committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that

- The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Cross examination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations
- Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing
- The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to
 - Address the authority
 - o If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
 - In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
- The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant
 - o to the particular application before the committee, and
 - o the licensing objectives.
- The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
- In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.
 - 39. As this matter relates to the determination of an application for a grant under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003, regulation 26(1)(a) requires the Sub-Committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

Council's multiple roles and the role of the Licensing Sub-Committee

- 40. Sub-Committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the Council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the Council as authority responsible respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health and safety and as the planning authority.
- 41. Members should note that the Licensing Sub-Committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The Sub-Committee sits in quasi-judicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing of the application. In this case, Members should disregard the Council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the Licensing Law, Guidance and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.
- 42. As a quasi-judicial body the Licensing Sub-Committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The Sub-Committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision

must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The Licensing Sub-Committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.

- 43. The Licensing Sub-Committee is entitled to consider events outside of the premises if they are relevant, i.e. are properly attributable to the premises being open. The proprietors do not have to be personally responsible for the incidents for the same to be relevant. However, if such events are not properly attributable to the premises being open, then the evidence is not relevant and should be excluded. Guidance is that the licensing authority will primarily focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, working or engaged in normal activity in the area concerned.
- 44. Members will be aware of the Council's Code of Conduct that requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The Code applies to Members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, Members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.

Guidance

45. Members are required to have regard to the DCMS Guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood, members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.

We have put up with the extremely loud talking and shouting that seems to echo up as well as the potent smell of cooking.

The food they seem to sell/cook encourages cockroaches which have been a huge problem for us over the past years and once they manifest themselves in our property, it is very hard to get rid of them. Their also appears to be a blue bottle manifestation which must be due to the food they store.

If this license is approved, this will be devastating to us and to the local residence. Their are residential properties above all the business properties on this stretch of East Street and we will all be affected.

The late night music license will cause great disruption to our sleep as well as cause us great anxiety.

I have suffered from 2 heart attacks in the past and am on continuous medication for my heart, diabetes and Asthma. The noise will only add to this stress.

What are the current opening hours according to their current license, as they often do not close until past midnight and they do not leave quietly! Surely they should respect the local residences.

I would appreciate some feedback and also the outcome once the representation period has expired.

To Whom it may concern:

We are writing to contest the above application for reasons stated herewith.

Firstly, the actual trading name is NOT as stated on the register as 'African Restaurant and Groceries' but ABC Global Asset.

The business owners applied 2 years ago for a licence for a restaurant and take away but it was eventually refused. It is a grocery store and money exchange.

We strongly object to the applicant receiving an alcohol and entertainment licence as we live on the first and second floors above the premises which is situated on the ground and basement of a terrace house in a highly populated residential area.

For the last 6 months we have had to put up with the disturbing noise i.e. extremely loud shouting and the pungent cooking smell every day and especially nearly every Friday night until 1-2 am in the morning.

We and the neighbours have complained directly to the shop owners when they open late and the noise is excessive, also the 3 noisy shutters being pulled down when they leave the shop which vibrates in the whole building as well as the shouting to one another when leaving the premises and the banging of car doors in the early hours.

Every time there is a football or rugby match on TV we put up with the shouting cheering and banging on the floor and with the smell of cooking we have to turn our TV up and continuously spray air de-odourizer as otherwise we cannot hear our own TV clearly.

With the air de-odourizer in mind, I suffer from Asthma and depend on my inhalers, the air fresheners aggravate my asthma and therefore cause a risk to the onset of an Asthma attack. It is unfair that I have to go to such extremes which are detrimental to my health.

Our only entrance is at the back of the property which is also where the shop's fire exit door is which is often left open and this is where people seem to congregate to smoke and use their mobile phones, which unfortunately the smoke drifts up to my house and the inconsiderate loud tones in which they talk on their phone is disturbing to us as the noise echoes.

This is a fire exit and not a place for people to socialise at our expense - is this where they intend to have smoking if open to 3am? The intense noise due to their music at such a late time in the night is totally unacceptable and the local residence will need to be considered. Has the premise adequate fire precautions for cooking as we live directly above and have only one way out.

Over the past few years we have also had to deal with Cockroach manifestation as well as being swamped with Blue Bottle flies. The flies tend to swarm around the food area downstairs and eventually find their way up to our house. In the summer, this causes great distress as we have to keep our windows closed and as you can imagine, in the summer we would like to keep our windows open.

We are OAP's aged 63 and 67 both taking blood pressure medication asthma pumps and Mrs Speer is diabetic and does not need this extra stress. Our 3 year old grand daughter often resides with us on Fridays and has in the past been woken up by the noise when they leave and that is 2 floors up.

I hope to receive a response ASAP.

I am writing as a concerned local resident to oppose the application for a new premises licence in for the shop currently at this address, ABC GLOBAL ASSET, 346 EAST ST, LONDON, SE17 2SX.

These premises have already been operating for some time as an unofficial social club and there have been occasions in the past when quite a lot of noise has been made from there. This had been especially prevalent over the weekends. I have noticed that since their licensing application has been entered, the shop has been closing earlier.

To allow a club/restaurant, takeaway and off licence to open until 3AM Thurs to Saturday as they want, in a residential area will cause a considerable amount of nuisance to local people as will the provision of entertainment. East ST is a narrow but busy street, with houses and flats of domestic occupation on all sides. There will inevitably be parking by those using the premises, which will spill over into neighbouring streets and estates. I am concerned that the noise will continue throughout the night as customers congregate in the vicinity. There is another restaurant in the locality which closes at 1AM. There is much disturbance from the customers and staff then. I am worried that they then might go to 346 East St to continue their revelry. There will be the nuisance caused by folk consuming and then throwing away the remains of their takeaway meals. The stairs to my flat is opposite these premises and I think that they will be used as a convenient open air dining room.

The times that they want to open are, given the residential nature of the area and the nuisance that we can expect from such premises, far from reasonable, so I write to oppose their application for the nature and hours that they wish.







Police are in receipt of an application from the above for a New Premises Licence and have the following representation to make:

The applicant has applied for a New Premises Licence with extensive hours, particularly at weekends and has failed to address adequately the four main licensing objectives. The premises are located on a busy thoroughfare and within very close proximity of many dwellings and as a consequence additional control measures would be required to ensure that there would be no detrimental effect upon the local community and indicate that the management of the premises have given sufficient consideration to the four main licensing objectives.

If the permitted hours for the sale/supply of alcohol were to be increased as per the application, Police would like to see the following control measures placed on the Premises Licence:

- That SIA registered Door Supervisor, shall be employed at all times
 after 22,00hrs and the terminal hour that the premises are in use under
 this licence and provided with Hand held metal detection units in order
 to ensure that searches are carried out in respect of all admissions to
 the premises, whether members of the public or performers and their
 assistants and Mechanical counting devices to ensure that the maximum
 accommodation limit of the premises is not exceeded.
- 2. That signs shall be displayed in the entrance fover to the premises that state 'Drugs Free Zone' and 'No Search No Entry, Management reserve the right to refuse entry'

- 3. That all matters relating to drugs shall be in accordance with the Metropolitan Police Best Practice Guide on the handling of drugs in pubs and clubs
- 4. That suitable notices shall be displayed and announcements made requesting people to leave the premises in a quiet and orderly manner so as not to disturb local residents
- 5. That a CCTV system be installed at the premises and be maintained in good working order and be continually recording at all times the premises are in use under the licence. The CCTV System must be capable of capturing an image of every person who enters the premises.
- 6. That all CCTV footage shall be kept for a period of thirty one (31) days and shall, upon request, be made immediately available to Officers of the Police and the Council
- 7. That you shall require any regular and external promoters hiring the premises to complete the 'Venue Hire Agreement' provided by Southwark Council and, once completed, you shall ensure that a copy of the agreement is provided to the Police and Licensing Unit a minimum of fourteen days prior to the date of hire.
- 8. That a Personal Licence holder is on the premises and on duty at all times that intoxicating liquor is supplied.
- 9. That the Premises Licence holder and/or Designated Premises Supervisor join and support a local Pub Watch Scheme should there be one in existence for the area in which the premises is located.
- 10. Customers shall use no outside area after 22.00hrs other than those who temporarily leave the premises to smoke a cigarette. Those who do temporarily leave for this reason shall be the subjected to the requirement of a further search.

Police would be available should a conciliation meeting be arranged.

Thank you for referring the application to Environmental Protection Team.

I have reviewed the application and location and discussed the proposals with the applicant.

The premises is located in a terrace of shops with separate living accommodation above and faces parts of the residential Congreve Estate. Backhouse Place residential development is to the rear. The application, if granted, would permit live and recorded music and dancing on each Sunday to Wednesday until midnight and until 0300 the day following Thursday Friday & Saturday.

I am not satisfied that the prevention of public nuisance measures set out in the application are adequate to prevent music and people noise from becoming a public nuisance.

I understand the music and dancing will be confined to the basement area. This area will need to be sufficiently insulated to prevent sound escape and transmission both within the structure and to surrounding properties. This must include treatment to the rear windows and formation of a lobby since door marked 'emergency exit' will also serve as accees to the 2 WC's. The basement area will need to be equipped with extract/ intake ventilation which would need to be baffled. Until I have seen the technical details of sound insulation works, I can not a position to suggest whether a sound limiter installation would be essential.

I am concerned that lateness of the hours of opening until 0300 on Thursday > Saturday may not be able to be accommodated without giving rise to public nuisance and would suggest earlier curfew hours; however I would need to consider this in context of other responsible authority and local responses.

I do not accept that 'consumption of alcohol outside the premises only by smokers' would serve to prevent public nuisance, smokers should not be permitted to take drinks off the premises.

I therefore object to the application until these matters have been addressed by the applicant and her advisors.
