Public questions raised	
Q1	Roy Fielding: Is there any further information about the 42 bus?
A1	Cllr Eckerlsey: There are no further developments on this which has been disappointing particularly with the recent change in personnel at TfL.
Q2	Resident: Introducing a CPZ scheme may not be a preventative measure of controlling traffic in Holmdene and neighbouring roads particularly for those who work late at night – controlled parking may not be solution?
Q3	Resident (Holmdene Avenue): Is this proposal revenue neutral in that no money is to be made from parking – are you able to reassure residents that this would not be the case?
A2	Response to Q2 and Q3: Officers will analyse traffic road by road including Holmdene. The results of this will be presented to DCC at a later date.

5	<p>Chair's announcements</p> <p>DCC noted the following announcements:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Cleaner Greener Safer programme for 2010 – 2011 was launched at the meeting. Details of how to apply and the criteria were highlighted at the meeting. The programme has supported a range of environmental and community improvements, and any local person or community organisation can apply. The deadline for submitted applications was January 8 2010. Global Xchange Programme is an international youth exchange programme run in partnership by VSO (Voluntary Service Overseas) and the British Council. Geors Richards from the Xchange Programme announced that a team of international volunteers will be arriving in Southwark this summer to spend a certain amount of time engaging in voluntary work and on local community projects. They are appealing for community hosts to accommodate 2 volunteers (aged between 18-25yrs from 6 different countries – 6 month programme) Website: www.globalxchange.org.uk 	

6	<p>Minutes from the previous meeting 28 October 2009</p> <p>DECISION: Minutes of the Dulwich Community Council held on October 28 2009 were approved as an accurate record of the meeting subject to a correction that Cllrs Mitchell and Holford were present at this meeting.</p>	Beverley Olamijulo
7	<p>Matters arising from the previous meeting</p> <p>1. Lambeth Recycling Facilities (Environment theme) Cllr Thomas confirmed this is a London wide deal across the board so if residents living on the border are turned away from using Lambeth's recycling facilities they should contact their local councillor. http://www.southwark.gov.uk/YourCouncil/CouncillorsHome/</p> <p>2. CCTV in Norwood Rd /Herne Hill Cllr Thomas stated he checked with the executive member for environment re: ILRE funds being used on surveillance cameras instead of shop frontages. He confirmed no executive decision was taken on this. If funding is being used in a different way – then good reasons need to be given.</p> <p>3. Public Question Raised Question by Maureen Cunningham: The hostel above Somerfield now houses ex-prisoners including sex offenders who should not live within one mile radius of a school. However there are Schools 500 yards away: Grove Vale, Heber Road, Goodrich, Alleyns Girls and Boys Schools, and St Thomas Moore Primary/ Junior Schools.</p> <p>Cllr Jonathan Mitchell agreed to take this up with the East Dulwich Ward Police Panel.</p> <p>At the Meeting of the Dulwich Community Council on 14 Dec 2009 Cllr Mitchell provided the following response:</p> <p>"I have investigated this matter with the local Police and the East Dulwich Police Panel. There is no evidence that any sex offenders are living above Somerfields in Lordship Lane. In any event according to Police Practice no sex offenders would be housed anywhere near our local schools. As a matter of Policy the Police do not disclose information as to where such offenders are housed, other than to support a policing objective or where a strict information sharing Protocol exists.</p> <p>There is a wide range of Acts of Parliament dealing with this issue, and a raft of statutory measures both preventative and punitive to deal with any problems anticipated or real connected with both sexual and violent offenders. All such offenders are rigorously checked by the</p>	

	MAPP (Multi-Agency Public Protection) arrangements when prisoners are released. Our local Police, working with the Courts and the MAPP agencies, are fully aware of what is happening concerning sexual offenders in Dulwich.

8	<p>Deputations: CPZ consultation North Dulwich Triangle</p> <p>DCC heard two deputations from local residents concerning the Council's proposal to introduce CPZ in the North Dulwich area.</p> <p>DECISION:</p> <p>DCC received the deputation and asked officers from environment and housing (public realm) to under take a traffic survey along Holmdene Avenue and surrounding roads to check vehicles coming in and out of the area and those parked (i.e. local residents, commuters and short stay visitors). Any data collected by officers will be conveyed to residents at a later date.</p> <p>It was noted Members will need to see results of the survey first (on a street by street basis) before a formal decision is made.</p>	
9	<p>Cross boundary issues</p> <p>None were identified.</p>

She said there were 6 wardens but unfortunately due to a recent incident (two wardens injured as a result of a van driver who deliberately drove into them). The wardens are okay now – but are yet to find the culprit.</p>	

	<p>SNTs updates Sgt Jenkinson (Village ward) submitted his apologies for this meeting.</p> <p>The following priorities for Village ward include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • burglary (working across the board on this), motor vehicle crime, bicycle theft (mostly from sheds and flats) and anti social behaviour also Herne Hill Triangle – still tackling crime in the area <p>Questions: What is Village SNT doing about youth crime – particularly for robbery and muggings around Red Post Hill, Beckwith Rd and Dulwich Park? Response: Since the last crime web mapping 2 months ago this has decreased. Website: http://maps.met.police.uk/</p> <p>Recent circular came round from the Dulwich Estate to open up routes which are considered unsafe due to the number of break ins namely in Burbage Road. Before these routes are considered will the Police be consulted? Presentation from CoolTan Arts – Arts Exhibition

Kathrin Kirmann, a representative from CoolTan Arts (a community Council funded project) spoke at the meeting about the recent Arts Exhibition, celebrating World Health Day and the work they do in Southwark. They are a charity run organization based along Walworth Rd, SE17 near Elephant & Castle.

Kathrin said 'We run a varied programme of creative workshops from our vibrant arts centre in Walworth Road; these include visual arts, batik, digital arts, video, poetry, and performing arts.

Our activities include exhibitions, public art projects and websites which help break down the stigma of mental distress. CoolTan's gallery/performance space offers other local community projects somewhere to exhibit and our volunteering programmes offer meaningful engagement and the opportunity to learn useful skills'.

The project's aim is to promote positive mental health/well being, bringing about a change in how participants perceive themselves, enabling people to gain greater focus and to re-establish their relationship with society. The project also aims to offer life long learning and enable people to achieve qualification and accreditation status in the coming year. They hope to achieve this through quality arts education with professional outcomes such as public exhibitions, and social enterprise principles.

PCT Strategy Plan

Presented by Malcolm Hinds and Andrew Bland

Representatives from Southwark PCT gave an update on progress concerning the facilities at Dulwich Community Hospital and spoke about the PCT Strategy Plan.

A few of the issues that were highlighted at the meeting include:

- The proposal is to offer a wide range of care and facilities at the site
- Looking at outpatient visits which may not be considered necessary
- Changes to the Health Strategy which could mean a reduction in staff and some health care buildings
- Moving some care provision to other local sites within the vicinity
- London wide proposals is to improve access whether it be community or hospital based e.g. extending the list of G.P. surgeries

- Primary & Community care strategy – looking at network of care and delivery of services in a affordable way
- Enhance skills – may require community nurses to work in different ways
- Providing a hospital consultant outside hospital settings and to cut down attendance at the A&E department
- Understand concerns that a PCT structure needs to be in place to provide a focal point for primary and community care working in partnership with other Hubs
- Envisage that there are at least 3 main Hubs across the borough (Guy's, King's and SLAM (South London & Maudsley) NHS Foundation)

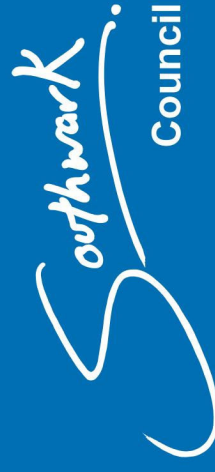

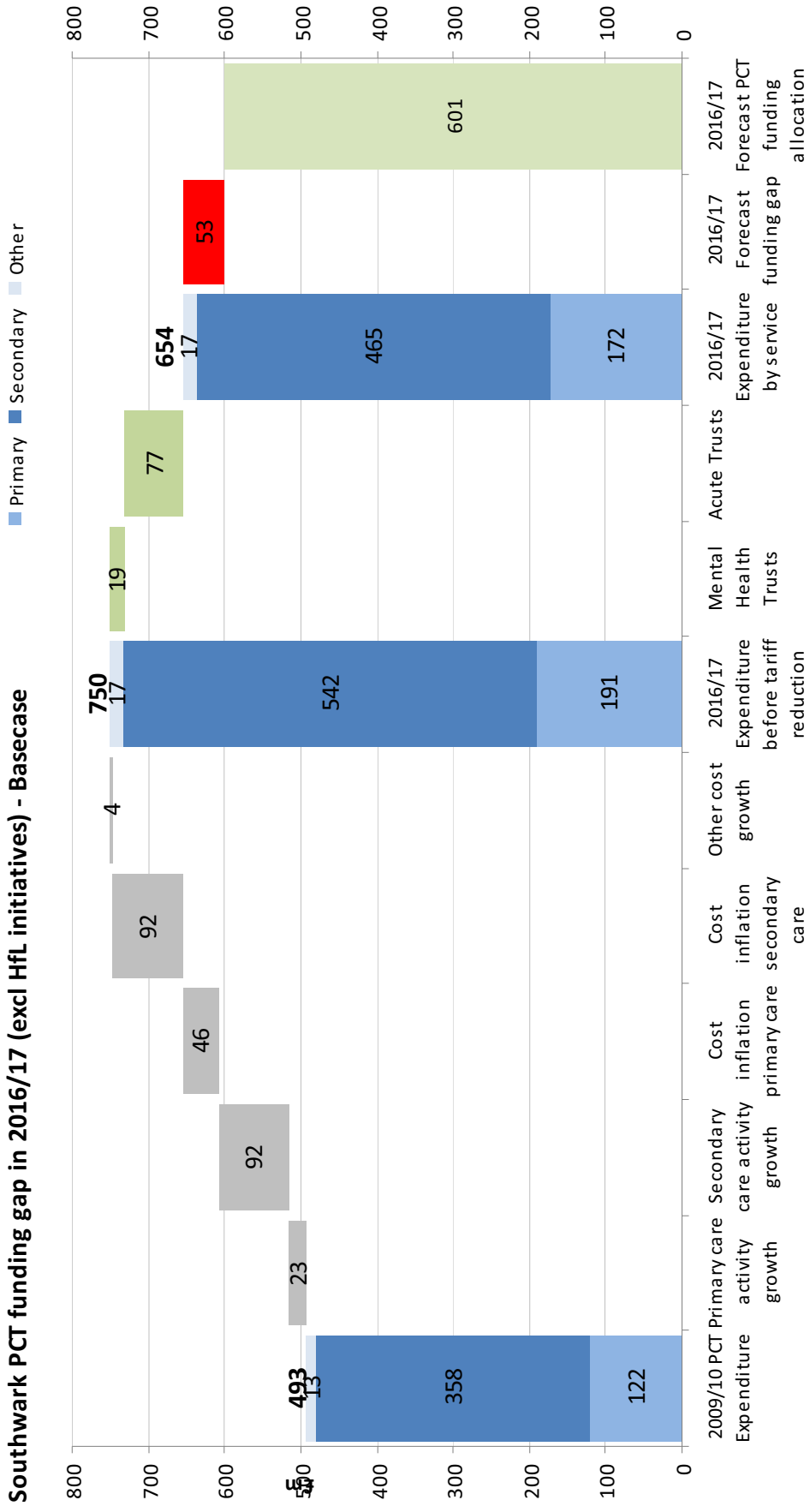

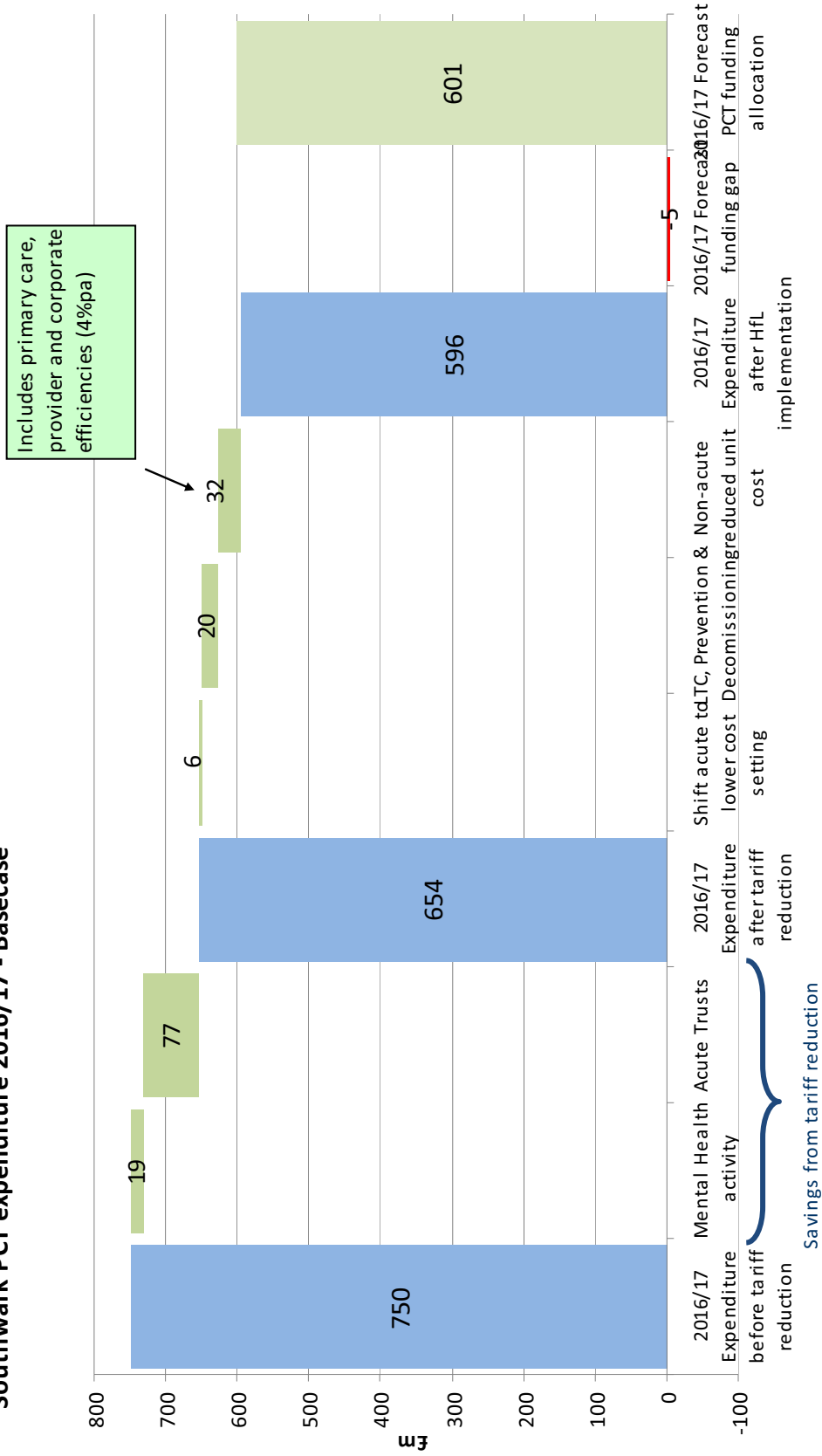
NHS London planning assumptions

HfL - improved quality & reduce costs

Core proposals of HfL to improve quality

- Improved access to urgent care services in the community to reduce use of A&E and admission to hospital
- Improved management of long term conditions through better coordination of primary and community care services
- Consolidated model for provision of primary and community care over population of 50 - 80K to provide more integrated care
- Integration of primary and community and secondary care and shifts of care out of hospital closer to home
- Centralisation of complex services onto major acute sites

Levers to reduce costs of care

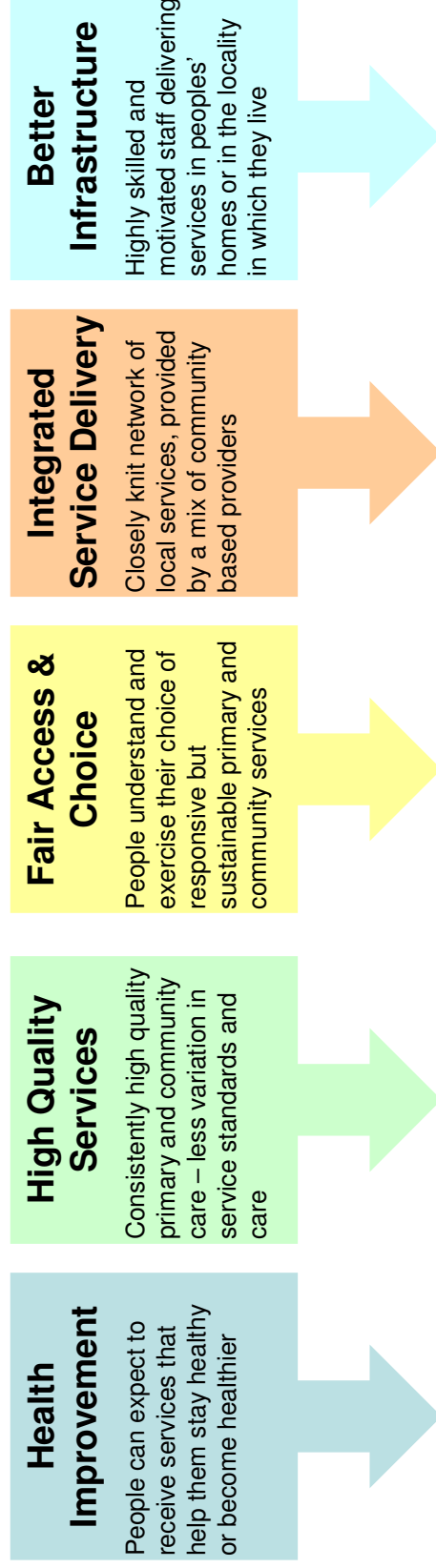
- Reduced “double running costs” through single point of access to urgent care (merged MIU/WIC, GP out of hours, GP in hours)
- Reduced costs of clinical staff through improved utilisation and role substitution from doctors to nurses/AHPs – underpinned by management of care across larger populations
- Reduced costs of overheads (receptionists, premises) through improved utilisation
- Shift of care out of acute sector into non acute sector where appropriate
- De-commissioning of some services
- Increased scale, efficiency and quality from centralisation contributes to expected tariff reductions

Primary and Community Care Strategy

Delivering system wide sustainability will require Borough led commissioning plans which deliver enhanced primary and community care services

Southwark’s Polysystems are enablers in this context – local networks of care that underpin the delivery of Southwark’s strategic objectives and secure affordable models of care delivery.

Over the next five years NHS Southwark will commission a ‘Hub and Spoke’ model of primary and community care that secures improvement in the five key areas below:



A Federated Model of Primary and Community Care – POLYSYSTEMS

Emerging Polysystems and system wide sustainability

Southwark's Polysystems will offer a networked model of existing practices, health centres providing general practice alongside community services to the local population beyond the 'registered list', and larger community facilities that will provide a full range of services, accessed by the entire locality population.

Southwark's affordability analysis identifies the scale of service redesign required for the future. In response Polysystem development must fundamentally change the way care is delivered, particularly across the traditional boundaries of primary and secondary care. Affordable Polysystems will give immediate focus to:

- **Out of hospital delivery** – shift of services (such as outpatient clinics) from acute hospitals to the community and redesign of services that enhance community based models of care
- **Reducing activity / avoiding cost** - Delivery of enhanced / integrated primary and community based services to support the appropriate de-commissioning of care in more expensive settings
- **Productivity in Primary Care** - Address variation in the performance, and support the commissioning, of enhanced productivity in primary and community care through the contracting process and by establishing more efficient structures (e.g. skill mix, overheads)
- **Prevention and Self Management** – Keep people healthy through the delivery of pathways and interventions to support the management of long term conditions and support self care

Polysystem Implementation - Progress to date

Vision & Public Consultation – Transforming Southwark’s NHS

- NHS Southwark has developed a clear vision for the development of primary and community care supported by a clinical strategy and delivered through four locality based networks of care, covering populations of between 60k and 90k. In the first half of 2009 the PCT undertook a public consultation on these proposals, engaging more than 1,300 residents and gaining a clear mandate for implementation.
- ‘Transforming Southwark’s NHS’ provides a local response to HfL, fundamentally changing the shape of community based services, securing more effective and efficient delivery of care as the key driver of quality and improved health outcomes.

Clinically led Implementation and Modelling

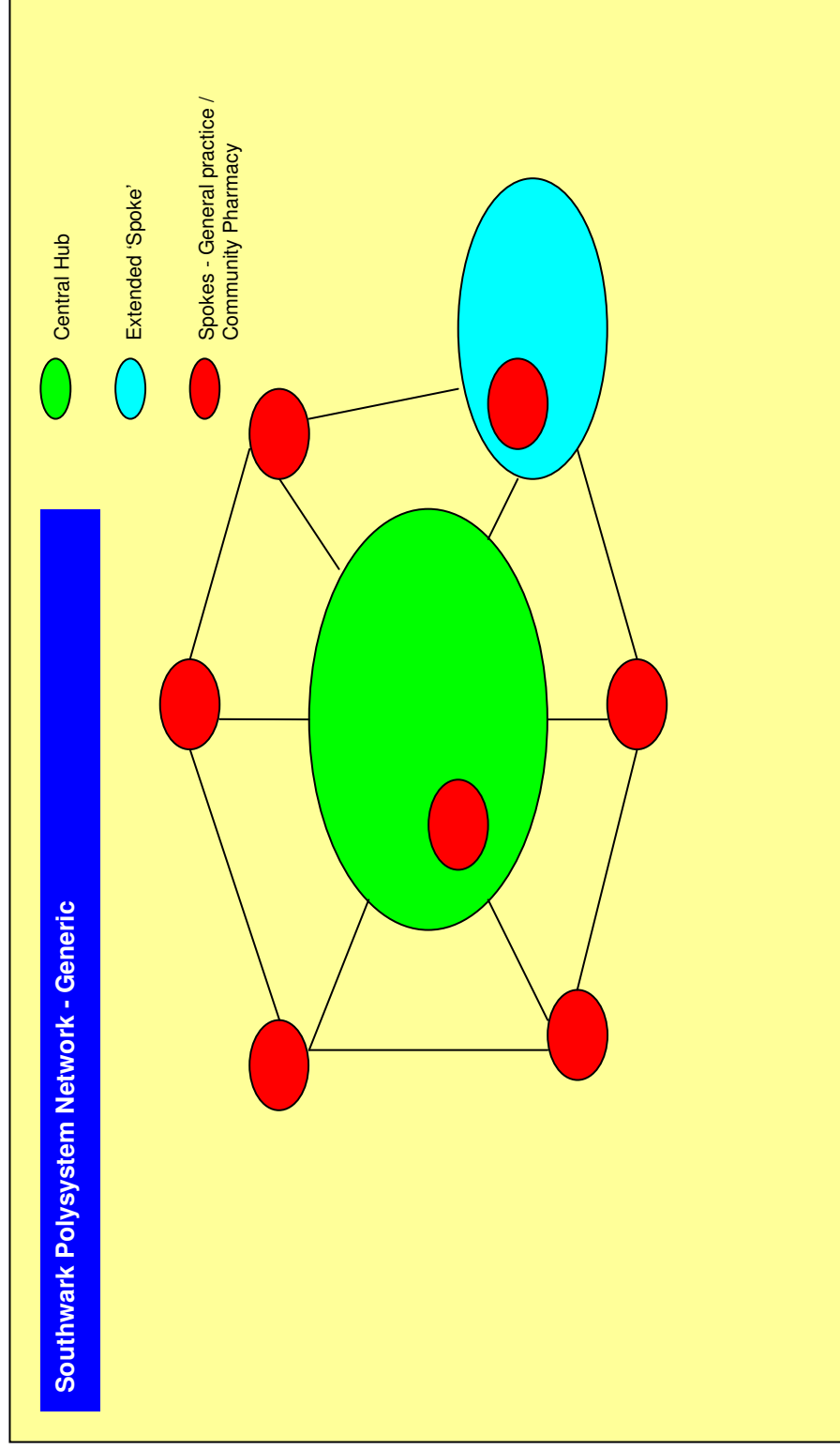
- Implementation in Southwark is clinically led - the PCT has re-organised Practice Based Commissioning (PBC) in the borough to establish its clear leadership role in the local development of each Polysystem
- NHS Southwark has instigated a programme of work focused upon ‘System wide sustainability’ with primary and secondary care teams to develop new ways of working in areas where immediate ‘shift’ of activity from acute hospitals will provide more affordable models of delivery.

Polysystem Implementation - locality delivery

The immediate focus upon 'System wide sustainability' has engaged Practice Based Commissioners and has focused upon service transformation to reduce the unit cost of activity undertaken in secondary care and to move care, where appropriate, out of hospital to more cost effective settings. Initial areas of work are highlighted below:

Polysystem Implementation - Networks of Care

Local Networks - Polysystems will primarily focus upon the construction of a 'Network' in each locality supported, in the first instance, by enhanced use of existing facilities, ensuring adequate community infrastructure to support our plans.

Polysystem networks will consist of:

'Hubs' - a key focal point for each network providing a wider range of services for the locality that the polysystem serves. 'Hubs' will provide primary care led Urgent Care provision, access to outpatient services, Imaging and other more specialist services to the whole locality. They will be open between 8am and 8pm, 365 days a year.

'Spokes' that will vary in size, as community sites do now. 'Extended spokes' will provide general practice alongside a wider range of community services, as well as outpatients and basic diagnostics to the populations of the locality they serve. These services will be provided in the locality, closer to home.

The majority of 'Spokes' will be individual general practices that will be commissioned to deliver higher quality services that ensure improved access and choice to patients within the minimum of 8am to 6pm opening. A 'Spoke' might also be a community pharmacy working to enhanced services.

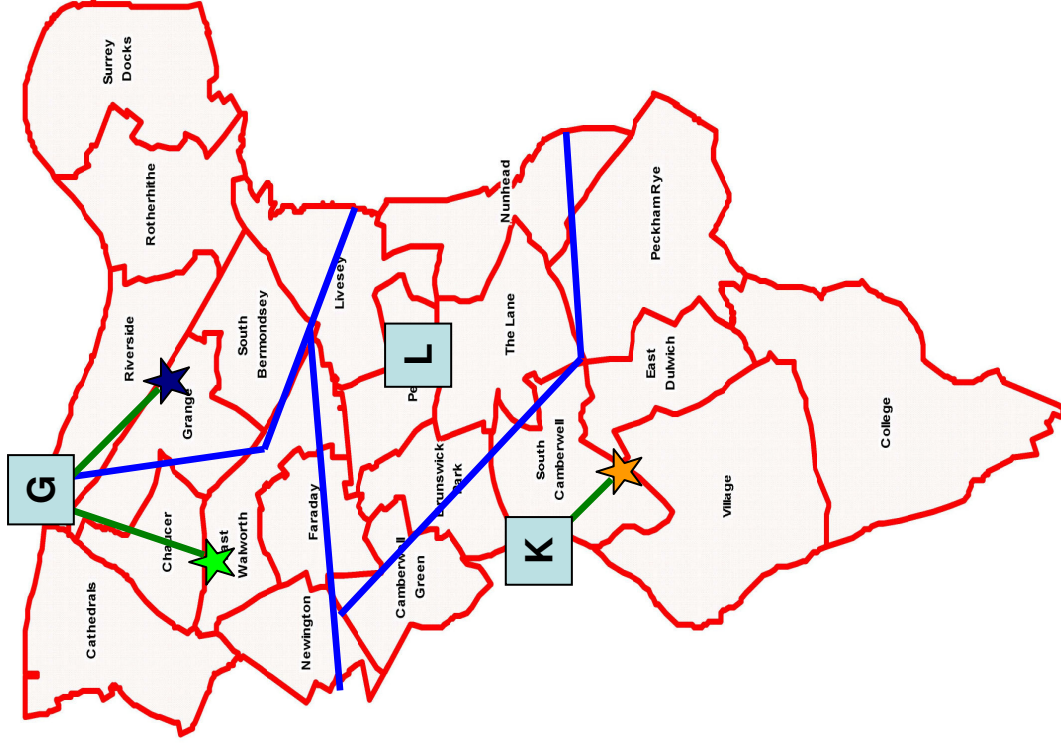

RECOMMENDATION(S)

1. It is recommended that the local parking schemes detailed in the appendices to this report are approved for implementation subject to the outcome of any necessary statutory procedures.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. This report presents proposals for a number of local parking amendment schemes, which are matters reserved to Community Council for decision.
3. The origins and reasons for the proposals are discussed in the main body of the report.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

Elsie Road (0910_Q3_018)

4. The network development team received concerns from a business on Grove Vale regarding the current loading facilities available for businesses in the immediate area.
5. An officer from the network development team met with the business on 4/11/09 to discuss the current loading provisions and possible solutions.
6. At present the business receives approximately 25 deliveries per week and currently drives onto the wide footway outside the store to unload goods from the cash-and-carry.
7. There is a single yellow line, west of the bus stop which provides the option to load and unload for up to 40 minutes, however this does not guarantee space as the sign has often gone missing in the past.
8. The business has therefore requested a loading bay in Elsie Road under the advertising board on the flank wall of 56 Grove Vale.
9. An email was sent to all councilors within the Dulwich Community Council area seeking comments on the proposal to install a loading bay in Elsie Road.
10. The network development team received one response, from Councillor James Barber supporting the proposal.

11. Based on the site meeting with the business and observations made on site, it is proposed to install a loading bay (8 meters in length) operating 7am – 7pm in Elsie Road (Appendix 1).

Townley Road (0910_Q3_022)

12. The council received an email in October 2009 from Councillor Eckersley concerning coach parking outside Alleyn's School on Townley Road.
13. Coaches are occasionally parking on the single yellow lines outside Alleyn School causing vehicle obstruction by the traffic island and the entrance to the school.
14. The council has a duty under Section 122 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 "to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular and other traffic (including pedestrians)" when exercising any of its functions under the Act. Road safety is therefore a matter that the council pays regard to when considering whether to make an Order under S.6 of the Act.
15. It is proposed to upgrade the existing single yellow lines outside the school to double yellow line to maintain traffic flow and improve vehicle and pedestrian safety (Appendix 2).

North Cross Road (0910_Q3_046)

16. The network development team has been asked by the Parking Services and Development Manager to upgrade the existing single yellow line restriction outside The Lord Palmerston PH to a double yellow line.
17. The existing single yellow line which is approximately 13 meters in length and operates Mon – Sat, 8am – 6.30pm offers the opportunity for motorists to load and unload for 40 minutes.
18. Civil Enforcement officer are currently unable to enforce the restriction as the time plate has gone missing on a number of occasions. A time plate was last erected on 10 September 2009 and has now gone missing.
19. It is therefore recommended to upgrade the section of single yellow line to double yellow line as shown in appendix 3. This will still enable loading and unloading for up to 40 minutes.

Alleyn Park (0910_Q3_028)

20. The network development team was contacted by the head teacher of Dulwich College Preparatory School regarding the current parking provisions outside the school in Alleyn Park.
21. Concerns were raised about the traffic volume in the area on weekdays, between 8.00am and 9.00am and between 3.15pm and 4.30pm.
22. The head teacher requested a site meeting with officers to discuss possible solutions to alleviate the parking problems and conflicts occurring outside the school during the school drop off / pick up period.

23. An officer from Network development and officers from Transport Planning met with the head teacher at the school on 19 November 2009.
24. The head teacher requested that the single yellow line located outside the school, which operates 7.30am -9.30am, 3.30pm – 6.30pm, 1st Sept to 31st July be removed, as it currently serves to purpose and will increase space during the drop off / pick up period.
25. It is therefore proposed to remove the single yellow line and refresh any faded road markings outside the school (appendix 4)

Underhill Road / Barry Road (0910_Q3_010)

26. The network development team received an email in November 2009 from Transport Planning concerning parking at the Underhill Road, Barry Road junction.
27. Transport planning have carried out a safety review of the junction and have identified the following issues:
- Vehicles waiting to cross from west to east on Underhill Road have limited visibility of approaching southbound traffic on Barry Road. This is exacerbated by guardrail at the nearby pedestrian crossing.
 - Despite footway build outs at the junction headway of Underhill Road visibility of traffic approaching the junction from Barry Road is still relatively poor.
 - Traffic traveling along Barry Road approaching the junction at excessive speed.
 - Stacking of vehicles wishing to cross the junction from one side of Underhill Road to the other especially apparent during peak hours.
28. It is therefore recommended to install double yellow lines at the Underhill Road, Barry Road junction to improve pedestrian and vehicle safety as shown in appendix 5.

Tarbert Road (0910_Q3_031)

29. An application has been received by the network operations team for the installation of a disabled persons (blue badge) parking bay. The applicant met the necessary criteria for an origin, disabled persons parking bay.
30. The network development team has subsequently carried out a site visit to evaluate the network and ascertain the appropriate location for the disabled bay.
31. It is recommended that this disabled bay be installed in Tarbert Road outside the applicant's house. (Appendix 6).

Lordship Lane (0910_Q3_032)

32. An application has been received by the network operations team for the installation of a disabled persons (blue badge) parking bay. The applicant met the necessary criteria for an origin, disabled persons parking bay.
33. The network development team has subsequently carried out a site visit to evaluate the network and ascertain the appropriate location for the disabled bay.

34. It is recommended that this disabled bay be installed in Lordship Lane outside the applicant's house. (Appendix 7).

Etherow Street (0910_Q3_035)

35. An application has been received by the network operations team for the installation of a disabled persons (blue badge) parking bay. The applicant met the necessary criteria for an origin, disabled persons parking bay.

36. The network development team has subsequently carried out a site visit to evaluate the network and ascertain the appropriate location for the disabled bay.

37. It is recommended that this disabled bay be installed in Etherow Street outside the applicant's house. (Appendix 8).

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

38. The recommendations contained within this report are consistent with the policies of the PEP and associated Local Implementation Plan (LIP)

39. The proposals will support the council's equalities and human rights policies and will promote social inclusion by:

- providing improved access for emergency vehicles, refuge vehicles, residents and visitors;
- improving sight lines for all road users; and
- improving junction and pedestrian safety, especially those with limited mobility or visual impairment

COMMUNITY IMPACT STATEMENT

40. The policies within the Parking and Enforcement Plan are upheld within this report have been subject to an Equality Impact Assessment (EqIA).

RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

41. All costs arising from implementing the proposals, as set out in the report, will be fully contained within the existing local parking amendment budget.

CONSULTATION

42. No informal consultation has been carried out.

43. Should the community council approve the item, statutory consultation will take place as part of the making of the traffic management order. A proposal notice will be erected in proximity to the site location and a press notice will be published in the Southwark News and London Gazette. If there are objections a further report will be re-submitted to the community council for determination.

44. The road network and parking manager has been consulted on the proposals and has no objections.

45. No consultation or comment has been sought from the borough solicitor & secretary or the chief finance officer.
