RECOMMENDATION

1. That the licensing sub-committee considers an application made by Adam Heaysman and Kavita Sharma (two local residents) for a review of the premises licence granted under the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of the premises known as The Ship York, 375 Rotherhithe Street, London SE16 5LJ.

Notes

- a) *The grounds for the review are stated in paragraph 13 of this report.*
- b) *Five letters have been received in support of the premises licence and these are provided at appendix d to this report.*
- c) *A copy of the council's approved procedure for hearings of the sub-committee in relation to an application made under the Licensing Act 2003, along with a copy of the Hearing Regulations, has been circulated to all parties to the meeting.*

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The Licensing Act 2003 came into effect on 25 November 2005. The act's introduction provided a new licensing regime for the retail sale of alcohol; the provision of regulated entertainment; and the provision of late night refreshment.
3. Under the act a premises user wishing to provide any of the licensable activities listed in paragraph 2 of this report must secure a premises licence from the local licensing authority for the area in which the business concerned is located. Where the retail sale of alcohol is involved a designated premises supervisor holding a personal licence issued by the local authority for the area in which that individual lives must be named upon the premises licence.
4. The premises licence once issued remains valid for the life of the business unless surrendered or revoked. However, under section 51(1) of the act it remains open to any responsible authority or interested party to apply to the local licensing authority for a review of the premises licence where there are concerns regarding one or more of the four stated licensing objectives.

MATTERS FOR CONSIDERATION

The premises licence and operating history

5. On 4 July 2005, during the transitional period of the implementation of the Act, an application was made under Schedule 8 by Mr Dussell and Mrs Lorraine Charalambous for the conversion of existing justices and public entertainments licences into a new premises licence, in respect of the premises known as The Ship York, 375 Rotherhithe

Street, London, SE16 1LJ. The application sought a straight conversion of the existing licence with no variation and the licence was duly granted in August 2005.

6. In October 2005, Mr & Mrs Charalambous made an application to vary the licence so as to extend the hours on a Sunday from 10.30pm to midnight. No representations were received. Mr & Mrs Charalambous now hold a premises licence which authorises the retail sale of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises, live music, recorded music, performance of dance, facilities for making music, facilities for dancing, and late night refreshment with the following hours:-
 - The sale of alcohol, live and recorded music, performance of dance, facilities for making music and dancing on Monday to Thursday from 09.00 to 00.00;
 - The sale of alcohol, live and recorded music, performance of dance, facilities for making music and dancing on Friday and Saturday from 09.00 to 01.00;
 - The sale of alcohol, live and recorded music, performance of dance, facilities for making music and dancing on Sundays from 09.00 to 00.00; and
 - The provision of Late Night Refreshment on Monday to Thursday to 00.30, Friday and Saturday to 01.30 and on Sundays to 00.00
7. A copy of the premises licence is attached as appendix b to this report.
8. The designated premises supervisor named on the licence at the time of this review is Mr Dussell Charalambous.
9. A complaint from Mr Heaysman to the licensing unit was first logged on 29th August 2008 regarding the customers drinking outside of the premises. Mr Heaysman was provided with details of the review procedures.
10. An inspection of the premises was conducted in September 2008. The premises were found to be operating in full compliance of their licence. At the same time a risk assessment of the premises was carried out and the premises were placed in a D category with a next inspection date of two years. Mr Charalambous was also advised of the complaint and reminded to control his customers when they are drinking outside of the premises.
11. Mr Heaysman contacted the licensing unit again in August 2009 and requested a copy of the review procedures.
12. There have be no further complaints to the licensing unit regarding this premises.

The application for a review of the premises licence

13. On the 25 January 2010 an application for the review of the premises licence was received from Adam Heaysman and Kavita Sharma who are both local residents. A copy of the review application is attached as appendix a to this report. The grounds for the review relate to the following licensing objectives and is summarized as follows:-
 - the prevention of public nuisance – The noise caused by customers outside of the premises at a level where it can be heard in Mr Heaysman and Ms Sharma's property. Also that the leaf blower used by Mr Charalambous in cleaning around the pub be restricted to certain times.

Representations from responsible authorities

14. The metropolitan police service, London fire and emergency planning authority and the council's environmental protection team have confirmed in writing that they have no comments to add to the review. A copy of their letters are attached at appendix c.

Representations from interested parties

15. The licensing unit has received three letters supporting the licence held Mr & Mrs Charalambous and they are attached as appendix d.

Representation from the licensee

16. Mr Charalambous has submitted a letter to the licensing unit in response to the complaints made about the premises. Also submitted were photographs of the outside of the premises; an article from Time Out; and the supporting letters. Copies are attached as appendix e.
17. Copies of all the documents have been served on Mr Heaysman and Ms Sharma.

Disability discrimination act

18. The Southwark disablement association have no comments regarding this application.

The local area

19. The nearest premises licensed under the Licensing Act 2003 to the Ship York Public House are:
- The Aardvark, 351 Rotherhithe Street, licensed for the sale of alcohol on and off the premises, late night refreshment, films, indoor sports, live and recorded music and facilities for making music and dancing. The hours of operation are Sunday to Thursday from 10.00 to 23.30, and on Friday and Saturday from 10.00 to 01.30.
 - The Ship & Whale, 2 Gulliver Street, licensed for the sale of alcohol on and off the premises, late night refreshment, live and recorded music the performance and facilities for dancing. The hours of operation are Sunday to Thursday from 10.00 to 23.30 and on Friday and Saturday from 10.00 to 00.30.
20. A map of the area is attached to the report as appendix f.

Southwark council statement of licensing policy

21. Council assembly approved the third revision of Southwark's statement of licensing policy on 5 November 2008. Sections of the statement that are considered to be of particular relevance to this application are
- Section 3 which sets out the purpose and scope of the policy and re-inforces the four licensing objectives
 - Section 5 which sets out the council's approach with regard to the imposition of conditions including mandatory conditions to be attached to the licence
 - Section 6 details other relevant council and government policies, strategies, responsibilities and guidance, including the relevant articles under the Human Rights Act 1998
 - Section 7 provides general guidance on dealing with crime and disorder and deals with licensing hours
 - Section 8 provides general guidance on ensuring public safety including safe capacities
 - Section 9 provides general guidance on the prevention of nuisance
 - Section 10 provides general guidance on the protection of children from harm.
22. The purpose of Southwark's statement of licensing policy is to make clear to applicants what considerations will be taken into account when determining applications and should act as a guide to the sub-committee when considering the applications. However, the sub-committee must always consider each application on its own merits

and allow exceptions to the normal policy where these are justified by the circumstances of the application.

RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

23. No fee is payable for a review application made by an interested party. The cost of administering the review process are borne by the service.

CONSULTATIONS

24. Consultation has been carried out on this application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. Responses are detailed elsewhere in this report.

COMMUNITY IMPACT STATEMENT

25. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Strategic Director of Communities, Law and Governance

26. The Sub-Committee is asked to determine, under Section 52 of the Licensing Act 2003, an application, made under Section 51 of the same act, for a review of premises licence. At any stage, following the grant of a premises licence, a responsible authority or an interested party may ask the licensing authority to review the licence because of a matter arising at the premises in connection with any of the four licensing objectives.

Principles for Making the Determination

27. The principles, which Sub-Committee members must apply, are set out below.

The licensing authority must hold a hearing to consider an application for review of a premises licence where -

- (a) the application is properly made in accordance with Section 51 of the Act.
- (b) the applicant has given notice in accordance with Section 51(3) of the Act.
- (c) the advertising requirements provided for under Section 51(3) of the Act are satisfied.
- (d) the licensing authority has considered the ground(s) of review not to be frivolous, vexatious or repetitious.
- (e) the licensing authority has considered the ground(s) of review to be relevant to one or more of the licensing objectives.

The four licensing objectives are -

- The prevention of crime and disorder.
- The protection of public safety.
- The prevention of nuisance.
- The protection of children from harm.

Each objective must be considered to be of equal importance

The authority must, having regard to the application and any relevant representations, take such of the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are to-

- modify the conditions of the licence by altering, omitting or adding any condition.
- exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence.
- remove the designated premises supervisor.

- suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months.
- revoke the licence.

For the purpose of determining a relevant representation under section 52 of the Act a “relevant representation” means representations which -

- (a) are relevant to one or more of the licensing objectives.
- (b) are made by the holder of the premises licence, a responsible authority or an interested party within the prescribed period
- (c) have not been withdrawn
- (d) if made by an interested party (who is not also a responsible authority), that they are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority frivolous or vexatious.

Modifications of conditions and exclusions of licensable activities may be imposed either permanently or for a temporary period of up to three months.

The authority may decide that no action is necessary if it finds that the review does not require it to take any steps necessary to promote the licensing objectives.

In deciding what remedial action if any it should take, the authority must direct its mind to the causes or concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than a necessary and proportionate response.

It is of particular importance that any detrimental financial impact that may result from a licensing authority’s decision is necessary and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives in the circumstances that gave rise to the application for review.

Reasons

28. Where the authority determines an application for review it must notify the determination and reasons for making it to –
- (a) the holder of the licence.
 - (b) the applicant
 - (c) any person who made relevant representations
 - (d) the chief officer of police for the area (or each police area) in which the premises are situated

Hearing Procedures

29. Subject to the Licensing Hearing regulations, the Licensing Committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that
- The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Cross-examination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations
 - Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing
 - The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to
 - Address the authority
 - If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
 - In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
 - The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant
 - to the particular application before the committee, and

- the licensing objectives.
 - The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
 - In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.
30. This matter relates to the review of a Premises Licence under section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regulation 26(1) (a) requires the Sub-Committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

THE COUNCILS MULTIPLE ROLES AND THE ROLE OF THE LICENSING COMMITTEE

31. Sub-Committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the Council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the Council as authority responsible respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health, and safety and as the planning authority.
32. Members should note that the Licensing Sub-Committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The Sub-Committee sits in quasi-judicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing of the application. In this case, Members should disregard the Council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the Licensing Law, Guidance, and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.
33. As a quasi-judicial body the Licensing Sub-Committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The Sub-Committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The Licensing Sub-Committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.
34. The Licensing Sub-Committee is entitled to consider events outside of the premises if they are relevant, i.e. are properly attributable to the premises being open. The proprietors do not have to be personally responsible for the incidents for the same to be relevant. However, if such events are not properly attributable to the premises being open, then the evidence is not relevant and should be excluded. Guidance is that the licensing authority will primarily focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, and working or engaged in normal activity in the area concerned.
35. Members will be aware of the Council's Code of Conduct, which requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The Code applies to Members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, Members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.
36. The Sub-Committee can only consider matters within the application that have been raised through representations from interested parties and responsible authorities. Interested parties must live in the vicinity of the premises. This will be decided on a case-to-case basis.

37. Under the Human Rights Act 1998, the Sub Committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The Sub-Committee has a duty under section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent crime and disorder in the Borough.
38. Interested Parties, Responsible Authorities and the applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the Sub-Committee to the Magistrates' Court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against.

Guidance

39. Members are required to have regard to the DCMS Guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood, members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.

Finance Director's Concurrent

40. The head of community safety and enforcement has confirmed that the cost of this process are borne by the service.

We live in the block of flats adjacent to the Ship York Pub and have repeatedly suffered disruption at night due to excessive noise as a result of customers drinking and smoking outside the pub on Rotherhithe Street and Elgar Street.

Noise pollution and disruption is very high: there are often large numbers of customers who regularly drink on the street outside the pub late into the night, this is particularly bad on Friday and Saturday nights when the weather is dry. In addition, Mr Charalambous uses a petrol driven leaf blower every morning including weekends to clear rubbish from the area outside the pub on Rotherhithe Street and Elgar Street when preparing the pub for opening.

Following the introduction of the smoking ban, many of the pub's customers smoke at the entrance on Rotherhithe Street. As a result, cigarette smoke enters our properties which poses a severe health risk and has also caused discolouration to our walls. This problem is particularly acute during the summer months when windows are open due to high temperatures.

In addition, Mrs Sharma has a young son who's bedroom faces on to Rotherhithe Street and the noise levels are very disturbing especially as he needs to go to bed early. Also when customers of the pub get drunk they often swear which can be clearly heard by Mrs Sharma's son in his bedroom.

These problems have been communicated to Mr Charalambous on numerous occasions but have not been addressed.

We would ask that the closing time of the the pub be changed to 11pm every night; after 9pm no customers be permitted to drink outside the pub; after 9pm the entrance

on Rotherhithe Street be used as a fire exit only with entrance to the pub after this time being made from Elgar Street only; that the street furniture marked on the attached map be removed; no employee or associated person of the pub be permitted to use a leaf blower on Saturday or Sunday morning; No smoking signs should be put up in the entrance to Rotherhithe Street; in addition, signs informing customers should be that they are in a residential area and to keep noise to a minimum should be put up. Similar restrictions to these are enforced by the staff of the Whitehart Pub, 29 Cornwall Road, SE1 8TJ which is in a similar residential area as the Ship York pub and provides a good precedent.

Noise pollution late into the night (after 11pm) caused by customers of the Ship York drinking outside on Rotherhithe Street occurs every Friday and Saturday night when the weather is dry. However on the dates listed in the attachment, the noise was particularly bad.

The bedroom windows of the flats in Coombrook Court face onto Rotherhithe Street and are approximately 5 metres away from the area where the Ship York has picnic tables and benches which are used by customers of the pub. This causes a great deal of disturbance especially during the summer months when windows are open.

There are two benches marked on the attached plan that are approximately 2 metres from the windows of the flats on Rotherhithe Street which are used by customers when they smoke. Due to the close proximity of these to the flats, cigarette smoke often enters the flats through windows and vents which causes discolouration to walls and is a health risk to residents. In addition, cigarette smoke also enters the flats when customers smoke in the entrance to the pub on Rotherhithe Street.

In addition, each morning (between 9am and 11am), Mr Charalumbas uses a petrol leaf blower to clear the area in front of the pub on Rotherhithe Street and Elgar Street of rubbish. The leaf blower is so loud that it is not possible to hear someone speaking in the same room. Which when combined with the noise from the late night drinking outside of the pub, causes a great deal of sleep disruption, especially at the weekend. This noise also disturbs the sleep of Mrs Sharma's young son.

We have spoken to Mr Charalumbas on at least three occasions about the problems highlighted above with the last being in April 2009 where, we asked Mr Charalumbas to stop his customers from drinking outside after 9pm. He said he would not do this unless he had a "letter from the council telling him to do this." He also refused to stop using the leaf blower at the weekend and wasn't concerned about the nuisance caused by his customers. In addition, we asked the Rosanna Keogh of the licencing team to arrange a formal meeting with Mr Charalumbas but he refused to attend. We were informed by Rosanna that Mr Charalumbas said if we had any problems we should speak to him however he is unreceptive to to any of our concerns.




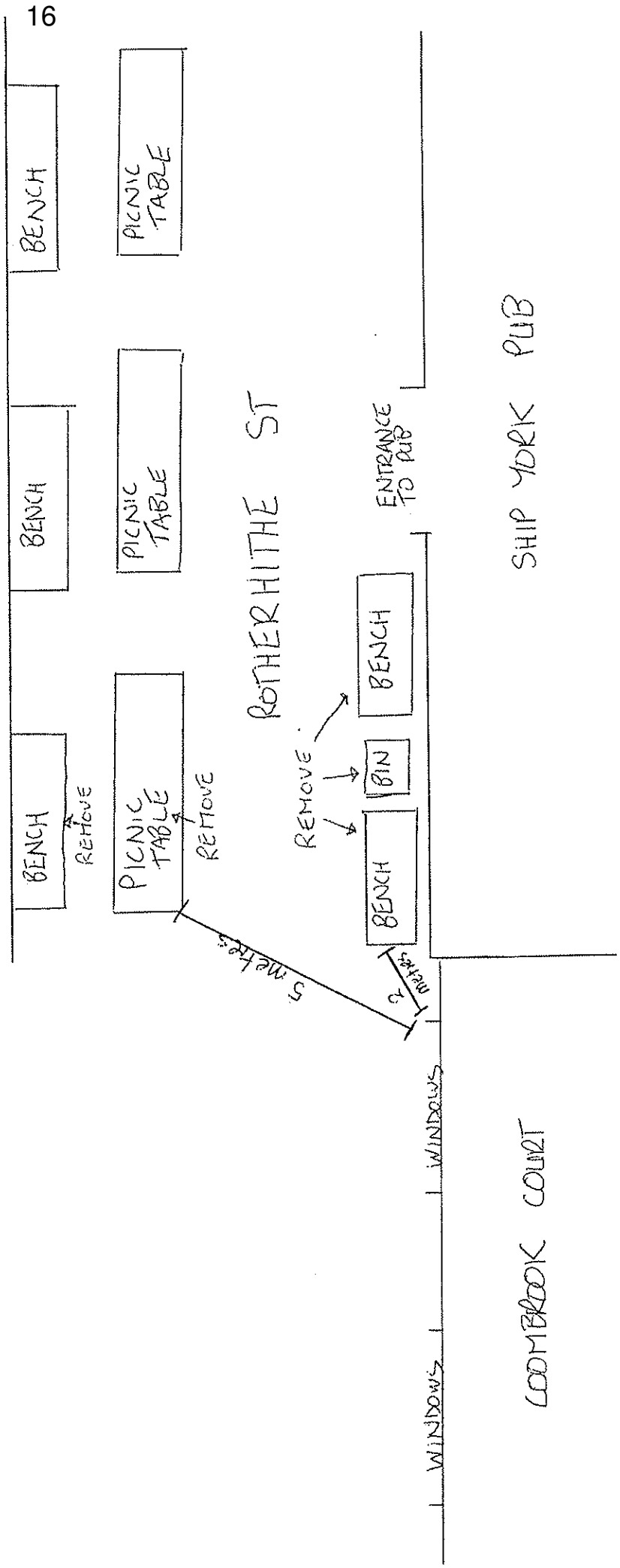

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

1000 No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence -

a. At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence; or

b. At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended.

1001 Every supply of alcohol under the Premises Licence must be made, or authorised by, a person who holds a Personal Licence.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

2000 Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during permitted hours, or during the hours stated below:

a. On New Year's Eve, except on a Sunday, 10.00.a.m. to 11.00.p.m.

b. On New Year's Eve on a Sunday, 12 noon to 10.30.p.m.

c. On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31st December).

The above restrictions do not prohibit;

i) During the first twenty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises;

ii) During the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;

iii) During the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals;

iv) Consumption of the alcohol on the premises or the taking of sale or supply of alcohol to any person residing in the licensed premises;

v) The ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the dispatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;

vi) The sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club;

vii) The sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;

viii) The taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there; or

ix) The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by the persons so supplied; or

x) The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of alcohol so supplied, if the alcohol is supplied at the expense of their employer or the person carrying on, or in charge of, the business on the premises.

2001 No statutory regulations for music and dancing shall apply so as to require any licence for the provision in the premises of public entertainment by the reproduction of wireless (including television) broadcasts or of programmes included in any programme service (within the meaning of the Broadcasting Act 1990) other than a sound or television broadcasting service, or of public entertainment by way of music and singing only which is produced solely by the reproduction of recorded sound is permitted.

2002 This licence provides for the provision of private music and dancing entertainment that is promoted for private gain

2300 a. Subject to the following paragraphs, the permitted hours on weekdays shall extend until 2.00.a.m. in the morning following, except that -

i) The permitted hours shall end at midnight on any day on which music and dancing is not provided after midnight; and

ii) On any day that music and dancing end between midnight and 2.00.a.m. in the morning, the permitted hours shall end when the music and dancing end.

b. On relation to the morning on which summer time begins, the reference to 2.00.a.m. in the morning in a. above shall be replaced by a reference to 3.00.a.m. in the morning.

2500 Person under the age of fourteen are permitted in the company of a person over the age of 18 who is responsible for their well being.

2800 Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is sold or supplied, except alcohol sold or supplied:

a. With and for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time, consumed with the meal and paid for together with the meal;

b. For consumption by a person residing in the premises or his guest and paid for together with his accommodation;

c. To a canteen or mess.

4000 The premises shall not open to the public before 9.00.a.m. On Sundays, Good Fridays and Christmas Day the premises shall not open before 2.00.p.m. for the performance of plays.

4002-a. The relevant licence or a copy of it shall be prominently exhibited in a position where the public can easily read it. For the purpose of this condition the licence shall be interpreted to mean the licence document containing the conditions specific to the premises, including any accommodation limits.

b. A copy of the standard licence conditions shall be readily available to the Duty Manager.

c. The premises shall not be used for any purpose for which a licence is required unless specifically licensed for that purpose.

4003 Authorised officers who carry written authorizations and proof of identity, which they will produce on request, shall be admitted immediately to all parts of the premises at all reasonable times.

4011 a. The Licensee shall not permit an entertainment that involves special risks except with consent.

b. The Licensee shall not permit any performances especially for children except with consent.

c. The licensee shall not permit explosives or highly flammable substances to be brought onto the premises except with consent.

4012 a. The Licensee shall not permit the use of special effects, except with consent.

b. The Licensee shall give to the Council at least 10 days notice in writing of any proposal to use special effects. The notice shall include, save in exceptional circumstances, exact details of the proposal including the date and time when the special effects can be demonstrated.

4013 Compressed or liquefied gases shall not be used except with consent. At least 10 days notice in writing shall be given to the Council of any proposal to bring storage cylinders into the premises

4014 a. The Licensee shall ensure that the premises continue to comply with the Council's Technical Regulations.

b. No alterations shall be made to the approved arrangements without consent.

c. The Licensee shall, except with consent, retain control over all parts of the premises.

d. Either the licensee or the Duty Manager shall be in charge of and within the premises whenever the public are present. However, the Licensee remains responsible for the observance of all licensing conditions.

4015 The Licensee may authorize in writing a Duty Manager, who shall be at least 18 years old, to deputise for him. This written authorization shall be kept on the premises and shall be readily available for examination by any Authorised Officer. The Licensee must be satisfied that anyone appointed as a Duty Manager understands the need to comply with the conditions of the licence and is competent to perform the functions of Duty Manager.

4016 The Licensee (if an individual) and any Duty Manager shall

a. Have undertaken an approved training course leading to the possession of the BIIAAB Level 2 National Certificate for Entertainment Licensees, or

b. Possess an equivalent qualification, for example for concert halls, the National Vocational Qualification in

Cultural Venue Administration (Level 3) or

c. Be able to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Council that he possess all relevant knowledge and experience

4017 a. The Licensee / Duty Manager shall ensure that he has sufficient trained staff on duty to ensure the safe evacuation of the premises in an emergency. Such staff shall have been specifically instructed on their duties in the event of an emergency by the Licensee or by a person nominated by him. The instruction given to staff shall include training on the safe and efficient running of the premises and the safe evacuation of the premises.

b. A nominated member of staff in addition to the Duty Manager shall have responsibility for fire prevention measures and for ensuring that all escape routes including exit doors are fully available.

c. No Door Supervisor shall be employed at premises outside London except with consent. Any employment shall be in accordance with additional conditions set by the Council.

d. Staff with specific responsibilities in the event of fire or other emergency, together with deputies, shall receive training and written instruction appropriate to their role. The Licensee / Duty manager shall, once he is satisfied as to the competence of each member of staff, record this in the Fire log book.

4018 a. The Licensee shall cause a Fire log-book to be kept.

4019 The Licensee / Duty manager shall maintain a register indicating the numbers of staff, including any Door Supervisors and all performers, who are present when the public are present. This register shall be produced immediately on the request of an Authorised Officer. This Condition does not apply to any premises that are being used for a closely seated audience.

b. Any authorized officer shall be entitled to obtain a photocopy of any page(s) of the log-book.

4021 a. The Licensee / Duty Manager shall ensure that no nuisance is caused by noise emanating from the premises or by vibration transmitted through the structure of the premises.

b. If required, legible notices shall be displayed at all exits requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and area quietly.

4022 1. The approved arrangements shall be maintained in good condition and in full working order. Fire fighting equipment, the fire alarm warning system and any smoke ventilators shall be maintained as follows:-

i) Fire Fighting Equipment.

a) The approved fire-fighting equipment shall be kept in the approved positions and be maintained in satisfactory working order, unobstructed and available for immediate use;

b) All fire fighting equipment shall be checked weekly. Note: The Council may consent to the variation of the frequency of checks where the premises are used infrequently and this will not endanger safety;

c) Portable fire-fighting equipment shall be inspected at least once a year in accordance with BS 5306-3 and recharged where necessary in compliance with the manufacturer's instructions. The date of inspection shall be clearly marked on the appliance or a stout tab securely attached to it and recorded in the fire log book;

d) Hose reels, drenchers and sprinklers shall be inspected in accordance with BS 5306 once a year to ensure that they are in working order. The date of the inspection shall be clearly marked on the control valves and recorded in the fire log book; and

e) For details of the certificates to be provided see condition 4045.

ii) Fire-alarm warning system

a) Any fire-alarm warning system shall be maintained in satisfactory working order;

b) The system shall be tested weekly. Note: The Council may consent to the variation of frequency of tests where the premises are used infrequently and this will not endanger safety;

c) All checks, tests and inspections shall be recorded in the fire log book; and

d) For details of the certificates to be provided see condition 4045.

iii) Smoke ventilators

- a) Any smoke ventilators shall be maintained in satisfactory working order;
- b) Any smoke ventilators shall be tested at least every 3 months;
- c) For details of the certificates to be provided see condition 4045.

2.No alterations (including temporary alterations) shall be made except with the consent of the Council.

4023 The Licensee shall ensure that all performances or activities minimize any danger to the public.

4024 The Licensee / Duty manager shall ensure that, whenever disabled people are present, adequate arrangements are made to enable their safe evacuation in the event of an emergency and that they are made aware of those arrangements.

4025 The Licensee / Duty Manager shall ensure that all necessary safety checks have been carried out before the admission of the public. Details of the checks shall be entered in the Fire log-book; this may be by use of a separate check list.

4026 a.All escape routes and exits including external exits shall be maintained unobstructed, in good order with non- slippery and even surfaces, free of trip

hazards and clearly identified in accordance with the approved arrangements.

b.All exits door shall be available and easily operable without the use of a key, card, code or similar means. Only approved fastenings shall be used.

c.Any removable security fastening shall be removed from the doors prior to opening the premises to the public. All such fastenings shall be kept in the approved positions.

d.If required, exit doors shall be secured in the fully open position when the public are present.

e.All fire-doors shall be maintained effectively self-closing and shall not be held open other than by approved devices.

f.Fire-resisting doors to ducts, service shafts and cupboards shall be kept locked shut.

g.The edges of treads of steps and stairways shall be maintained so as to be conspicuous.

4027 a.Hangings, curtains and temporary decorations shall be maintained fire-retarded

b.Any upholstered seating shall continue to meet the pass criteria for smouldering ignition source 0, flaming ignition source 1 and crib ignition source 5 when tested in accordance with section 5 of BS5852;1990

4028-a. Any scenery shall be maintained flame- retarded in accordance with Additional Conditions S

b.Temporary decorations shall not be provided except with consent. When seeking consent for temporary decorations the Licensee shall advise the Council of the period for which it is desired to retain them

c.Curtains, hangings and temporary decorations shall be arranged so as notto obstruct exits, fire safety signs or fire-fighting equipment.

4029 The Licensee / Duty manager shall ensure that the accommodation limit(s) specified on the licence are not exceeded and shall be aware of the number of the public on the premises. This information shall be provided to any authorized officer immediately on request.

4030 Notices detailing the actions to be taken in the event of fire or other emergencies, including how the fire brigade can be summoned, shall be prominently displayed and shall be protected from damage or deterioration.

4031 The fire brigade shall be called at once to any outbreak or suspected outbreak of fire, however, slight, and the details recorded in the fire log-book.

4032 The Licensee / Duty manager shall have readily available the telephone number of the local Fire Control Centre. The Licensee / Duty Manager shall notify the local Fire Control Centre as soon as possible if he is aware that the water supply to any hydrant, hose reel, sprinkler, drencher or other fire extinguishing installation is cut-off or restricted.

4033 Refuse receptacles shall be emptied regularly.

4034 Access for emergency vehicles shall be kept clear and free from obstruction.

4035 a. The Licensee / Duty Manager shall ensure that an adequate and appropriate supply of first aid equipment and materials is available on the premises.

b. If required, at least one suitably trained first aider shall be on duty when the public are present. If more than one suitably trained first-aider is present, each person's responsibilities shall be clearly identified.

4036 a. Toilet accommodation shall be provided free of charge and be kept clean and in proper working order.

b. An adequate supply of hot and cold (or warm) water, toilet paper in holders or dispensers, soap and suitable hand and face drying facilities shall be provided in toilet accommodation.

4037 Where free drinking water is provided for the public, it shall, except with the consent of the Council, only be provided in a supervised area.

4038 a. Heating apparatus shall be maintained in a safe and functioning condition.

b. Portable heating or cooking appliances shall not be used except with consent.

4039 If required, a competent person shall be in charge of the electrical or other installation.

4040 a. In the absence of adequate daylight the management lighting in any area accessible to the public shall be fully in operation whilst the public are present.

b. Except as permitted under d. below there shall be adequate illumination to enable people to see their way out of the premises

c. Fire safety signs shall be adequately illuminated except as permitted under d.

below.

d. of essential to the entertainment and subject to consent, the management lighting in the entertainment area may be reduced or extinguished provided

(i) the lighting be controlled from a position with a clear view of the entertainment area; and

(ii) An operator remain by the controls whilst the lighting is reduced or extinguished; and

(iii) The operator restore the management lighting at once in the event of any emergency; and

(iv) The escape route signs remain adequately illuminated.

4041 a. The emergency lighting battery shall be fully charged before the admission of the public.

b. The emergency lighting battery shall be fully charged before the admission of the public

c. In the event of failure of the normal lighting

(i) If the emergency lighting battery has a one hour capacity the public shall leave the premises within 20 minutes unless within that time the normal lighting has been restored and the battery is being re-charged; or

(ii) If the emergency lighting battery has a 3 hour capacity the public shall leave the premises within one hour unless within that time the normal lighting has been restored and the battery is being re-charged.

d. The public shall not be re-admitted to the premises until the normal lighting has been fully restored and the battery fully recharged except

(i) Where the emergency lighting battery has a one hour capacity and if the failure of the normal lighting was fully rectified within 20 minutes of failure and the battery is being re-charged; or

(ii) Where the emergency lighting battery has a 3 hour capacity and if the failure of the normal lighting was fully rectified within one hour of failure and the battery is being re-charged.

4042 a. Temporary electrical wiring and distribution systems shall not be provided without notification being given to the Council at least 10 days before the commencement of the work.

b. Temporary electrical wiring and distribution systems shall be inspected and certified before they are put in use. A copy of the certificate shall be sent to the Council as soon as possible.

c. Temporary electrical wiring and distribution systems shall be provided only for a period of up to 3 months. This period may be extended subject to a satisfactory electrical test and inspection report being submitted to the Council at the end of each 3 month period.

4043 a. The premises shall be effectively ventilated.

b. Where the ventilation system is designed to maintain a positive air pressure within that part of the premises, that pressure shall be maintained whenever the public are present in that part of the premises.

4044-a. Ventilation ducting and other shafts shall be kept clean.

b. Any air filters shall be periodically cleaned or replaced so as to maintain a satisfactory air supply.

c. All interior surfaces of extract ventilation ducting serving kitchens and serveries shall be thoroughly cleaned as frequently as necessary to prevent the accumulation of grease and fat and at least once per year.

d. Grease filters in extract ventilation hoods in kitchens and serveries shall be cleaned weekly or at other intervals as required.

4300 The Licensee shall not permit conduct on the premises that is likely to cause disorder or a breach of the peace or drug misuse. In particular the licensee shall ensure that none of the following shall take place

a) indecent behaviour, including sexual intercourse, except as permitted by the Theatres Act 1968;

b) the offer of any sexual or other indecent service for reward;

c) acts of violence against person or property and / or the attempt or threat of such acts; and

d) unlawful possession and / or supply of drugs controlled by the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971.

7100 That the maximum number of persons that may be accommodated within the licensed area at any one time shall not exceed 100.

8002 That notices shall be displayed and announcements made requesting that customers leave the premises in a quiet and orderly manner

9007 All children on the premises will be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult at all times.

9501 That all staff supplying intoxicating liquor shall undertake a recognised training course on relevant law.

I have reviewed the above papers for a Licensing Review; the Council's database shows that no noise nuisance has been witnessed. I therefore recommend the following conditions to control the licensing objective of Public Nuisance:-

- That all windows and doors must be kept closed during regulated entertainment, including windows to the front of the premises.
- That when regulated entertainment is provided a responsible person shall carry out regular perimeter checks. This person must address any noise outbreak or noisy patrons. A record of when checks take place shall be recorded and be readily available for inspection by council officers or the police.
- The sound limiting device shall be maintained in full working order, and remain at the level set by the noise team.
- That all amplified sound is to be played through the sound-limiting device approved by the responsible authority for noise issues. The sound level should be set to the satisfaction of the noise team.
- That music will be reduced in volume one hour before closing

To whom this may concern,

I write on behalf of the landlord of the Ship York Mr Dussell Charalambous whom I have known for some 12 years. The Ship York falls within my parish where there are 8 pubs, although only six are fully functioning. Of these pubs, the landlords come and go, take an interest in their business, but little as such in the wider community. I think Dussell has been at the Ship York for some 30 years and has taken a very active interest in the community around him. Dussell will not boast or make a fuss himself, quietly helping out those in need or supporting various community groups or organisations, but I am pleased to do that on his behalf. In an area which is constantly changing and in which there is little stability or sense of community, the Ship York is the only pub which has provided this at a consistent level. Dussell will put himself out for others and will fund raise for community groups, scouts, youth football teams, youth clubs, even the church after we had the copper stolen from our roof. At the same time he provides an establishment which is friendly and welcoming to all and which expects standards of behaviour and decency to be maintained.

The church choir drinks in the Ship York most Monday evenings, I have take local pensioners there for meals, groups of clergy, families after I have taken their funerals, even the Bishop of Woolwich when he is in the area. We go there because it is a well run pub, because we do not feel threatened or intimidated and because we know there will be no trouble and no disrespect for the elderly and even clergy (even if we don't always deserve it).

I often pass by the pub late at night after meetings or visiting parishioners and have yet to see bad behaviour as such. The only noise and intimidation I have witnessed coming from gangs of youths who sometimes congregate near and around the underpass.


I have lived in Coombrook Court for four and a half years. Before I purchased my flat, I visited the area at different times of the day to gauge the likely busyness and noise from the adjoining pub, The Ship York, and satisfied myself that it would not adversely affect me in my flat.

During my time in Coombrook Court, I have suffered no disturbance or noise from The Ship York. In fact my only complaint, which I reported to the noise team, was unacceptable noise from the Aardvark PH some 50 yards away, which has regular rowdy weekends.

The landlord of The Ship York keeps the environs surrounding his property and also the area outside the entrance to Coombrook Court, spotlessly clean at all times of the year.

As I see it The Ship York provides an invaluable focus for the local community and those who participate in it. The landlord and his clientele are respectful of its neighbours, both in the noise generated and the general tidiness of the areas outside of what is a popular and busy local pub.

To whom it may concern,

I own and reside at 2 Chandlers Court. My property is located directly opposite the door to the Ship York pub on Elgar Street, Southwark, SE16.

I would like to express my views on the impact of living in the immediate vicinity of the pub pending the allegations of the negative affect on the local community made towards the general running and maintenance of the pub.

I have resided at the property for almost 2 years and frequent the pub once or twice a week. I am grateful to the pub owner/staff for keeping the grounds of the pub in tip top condition. This includes having the paths free of leaves. The leaf blower is never used before 1030 and has never woken me up. The duration of the noise is a matter of minutes, little more than when the recycling bins/communal bins are emptied. Smokers do smoke outside either of the 2 exits, naturally. I have never been affected by this.

The pub is very well run and the standard of cleanliness and discipline are second to none. The clients respect and react positively to any requests by the landlord to comply with the rules. I have not known the police be called to respond to any incidents.

In summer, the clients do congregate outside the pub. There is naturally a higher level of noise than outside a normal residential block but this is to be expected when living next to a pub. I park my car on the street outside the pub/my flat and even if there are groups of people outside I have never had reason to be concerned for my property.

Occasionally there are domestic arguments on the street outside my flat; this tends to be caused by people on the way home from the direction of the Aardvark pub much later at night. This would happen whether the Ship York pub was a residence/restaurant or pub as it is a public street.

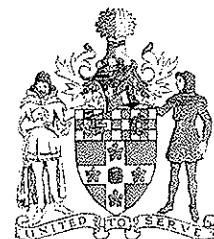
And finally, the Ship York was there when I bought the property. If other residents have issues with living in the immediate vicinity of the pub, they should have looked into this before buying/renting their property and should discuss with the landlord any concerns with a view to resolving them professionally. The expectations of living next to any public house should be proportionate to the fact that it is not just a residential building and that all reasonable measures are being taken by the landlord to ensure this does not negatively impact on others.

I write in connection with The Ship York public house. I heard today via a neighbour in our local community here in Rotherhithe that somebody had made a series of complaints about the establishment.

I am not privy to the exact details of the allegations which I understand to be about noise nuisance and the seating area adjacent to the pub.

I am a neighbour of the pub – living as I do at; 42 Harwood Point, 307 Rotherhithe Street, London SE165HD – but apart from being a weekend mid week regular have no other relationship with the pub.

The Ship York is in my view a very valuable local community asset being as it is a family orientated establishment. Having lived in Rotherhithe for a decade and a half I may assure you that you will not find a better community asset with better behaviour than the Ship York. I am frankly amazed that anybody could hold the pub up as anything other than being a beacon of good behaviour respect and a social asset. I have never witnessed any antisocial behaviour either in the pub or in its surrounds nor have I ever seen anybody drunk or abusive in any way or exhibiting any anti social behaviour.


In my work across government including with the Home Office and the Department for Communities & Local Government I am acutely aware of the impact of antisocial behaviour upon communities however in this case I feel nothing could be further from the truth. The Ship York is an anchor of good behaviour, decency and family enjoyment to our community.

I have seen the local community enjoying the pub and people enjoying the benches surrounded by the well kept garden and its lawn. I myself took one of our prospective parliamentary candidates there for a drink in the autumn and we sat outside enjoying the sunshine.

I write because I feel I believe I represent the silent law abiding community here in Rotherhithe. I obviously cannot comment on the allegations made to you, but I understand, by a resident in the recently constructed flats nearby. However from my experience of being a neighbour to the pub and also a local resident I feel that they are likely to be found to be, on investigation, without foundation and querulous in their nature.

I should be happy to make a formal statement to this effect if this would support resolution of this matter.

Just replying to your letter regarding the complaints from mr, headsman. these complaints keep referring to as WE being mr, heaysman & mars,Sharma, I have never met mars ,Sharma and do not know of mrs, sharmas complaint , but I will add that when youths congregate outside,(not the pub) by the underpass and the wall, I do ask them to move along because there is a baby trying to sleep, unaware to rs, Sharma,

Regarding mr,heaysmans, complaints about me these are not quite true, he said that we have spoken on 3 occasions this is true. the 1st time he approached me was a sunday morning before opening about 10.30 am, about the leaf blower when I was using it to clean the area by the way his description of this is that I clean only outside my pub. this is nonsense as any resident in the area will tell you the fact is that not only do I clean outside the pub but also, HIS ENTRANCE to his flats as in picture no 1. and along both sides of road (elgar street) .also along Rotherhithe street as far as the entrance to the docklands settlement. Along around the recycling bins. as in picture no 2, then I clean outside the front of the pub up to the underpass (sometimes the underpass. stairs. And also up to bonding yard walk) picture no 3 ,this can be varyfied by speaking to mr. colin palmer of southwark council street cleaning ,tel; no 7732 4643, I work closely with colin regarding any problems in the local area. I have had his permission to give you his details.

Second time we met he came into the pub whilst I was cleaning with a very nice lady that lives next door, I have forgotten her name, I think she was head of there association, I explained once again that the blower had to be used to clean the area. he suggested this be done at 11 am I explained that I could not do this because the pub opens at 11 am on Saturdays, at that time ,I now open at 12. The blower is used no earlier than 10 45 am, at weekends. so I am trying to accomidate his wishes. he said that his words "between 9 & 11am." The erliest this can be done is 9.45 to 10am , I do not live on the premises but I am in work at 9.25am. seven days aweek.

On the third visit he came to me once again whilst I was working outside about 11am,to complain about the same thing ie; leaf blower. I was so fed up with his attitude and told him to leave me alone to get on with my work, and go away , and if he had any complaints to take this up with the council,

Regarding the noise issue, outside is public right of way. his flat in picture no 4 as you can see is almost on the walkway my benches are not outside his flat, there is also a brick wall which people can sit on, whether the benches are there or not is irrelavant, please bear in mind that these benches are also used by the local community not just my customers (they have been there over 20 years.) this is a very tranquil

area to sit and read, children play in this unique spot in safety under the supervision of their parents. As do groups of teenagers, and I do ask them to move along. The area outside Mr Heysman's flat is a very busy thoroughfare so lots of people pass his flat, I notice he has not mentioned anything about the children playing outside his window, that is another story, anyone could stand there it does not mean it is my customers outside his window. There are two pubs in the area. One closes at 1AM. None of this has been mentioned. I close at 12pm Fridays & Saturdays, (I have had a 12pm closing for the past 25 years with no complaints, as you may check in your records plus with the police,) 10.30 Sundays .11pm during the week. NO DRINKS ARE ALLOWED OUTSIDE AFTER 10.30 PM, and I strongly enforce this rule. Also there is no admittance after 10.30 pm. and I do ask customers to leave quietly. Regarding the smoking issue I totally cannot accept that people outside are staining his walls to his flat.



RECOMMENDATION

1. That the Sub-Committee decide whether or not to issue a Counter Notice in respect of a Temporary Event Notices” given by Mr Olarenwaju Jimoh, concerning events to be held at Oriwu Spot, 44 Wanley Road, London, SE5 8AT on the mornings of 20 March, 2,3,& 4 April 2010.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. On 24 November 2005 the Licensing Act 2003 came into effect establishing a new licensing regime for the following licensable activities -
 - a) The retail sale of alcohol;
 - b) The supply of alcohol to club members or on behalf of a club;
 - c) The provision of regulated entertainment; and
 - d) The provision of late night refreshments.
3. As part of the new regime, the Act establishes a process for the giving of “Temporary Event Notices” (TEN).
4. A premises user may serve a TEN, where it is proposed to use the premises concerned to provide one or more licensable activities for a period not exceeding 96 hours for less than 500 persons.
5. A person holding a Personal License issued under the Act may serve up to 50 TEN's in a calendar year. Non Personal License holders may serve up to 5 TEN's in the same period. No premises may be used for more than 12 TEN's in a calendar year or for more than 15 days in a calendar year.
6. No premises may be used for temporary events that are less than 24 hours apart.
7. The TEN's process is designed to be a simple process. The person giving the TEN must give at least 10 working days notice to the licensing authority and must provide 2 copies of the notice to that authority and a further copy to the police within 24 hours. The police have 48 hours from receipt of the notice to consider and respond to it. If the police consider that the notice gives rise to concerns under the crime and disorder objective then the police will give an “objection notice” to the licensing authority.
8. The giving of the “objection notice” initiates arrangements for the matter to be considered at a hearing in front of the Licensing Sub-Committee at least 24 hours before the date of the event. If a negotiated outcome can be reached between the police and the premises user before the hearing takes place, then the TEN may be amended and a copy returned

to the premises user and the hearing need not take place. If no negotiated outcome may be reached then the matter proceeds to the hearing where the Sub-Committee will consider whether to issue a "Counter-Notice" in respect of the event, prohibiting it from taking place.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

The Temporary Event Notice

9. On both 9 February & 2 March 2010 Temporary Event Notices (TENs) were received from Mr Olanrewaju Jimoh in respect of events to be held at the premises known as Oriwu Spot, 4 Wanley Road, London, SE5 8AT.
10. The TENs is summarised as follows;
 - Saturday 20 March 2010 - 01.30 - 03.30 ;
 - Friday 2 April 2010 - 01.30 – 04.00,
 - Saturday 3 April 2010 – 01.30 – 04.00
 - Sunday 4 April 2010 – 00.30 – 03.30
- Events to be held will be birthday party and Easter party celebrations. Maximum people permitted on the premises at any one time not to exceed 65. Licensable activities to be the extension of the sale of alcohol by retail and the provision of regulated entertainment. Copies of the TENs are attached as Appendix A

The Objection Notice

11. Metropolitan Police served objection notices in respect of both TENs. The objection notices are on the grounds of crime and disorder complaints received by the Safe Neighbourhood Team from local residents. Copies of the notices are attached as Appendix B

CURRENT PREMISES LICENCE

12. The premises currently holds a premises licence under the Licensing Act 2003 which allows for the follow licensable activities;

Regulated Entertainment

- Films - Sun – Thurs 10.00 - 12midnight; Fri & Sat 10.00 – 01.00:
- Live Music, Recorded music, Dance performances and facilities for dancing indoors: Sun – Thurs – 19.00 – 23.00; Fri & Sat 19.00 12 midnight
- Late night refreshment – Sun – Thurs : 23.00 – 12 midnight; Fri & Sat 23.00 -01.00

Sale and supply of alcohol

- Sale of alcohol on and off the premises –Sun – Thurs 10:00 to 12 midnight and Fri & Sat 10.00 – 01.00:00 on Monday to Sunday

Opening hours

- Sun – Thurs 10.00 – 00.30: Fri -& Sat 10.00 01.30 .

13. Mr Olarenwaju Jimoh is the Designated Premises Supervisor specified on the premises licence.

Consideration by the Sub-Committee

14. It has not been possible to reach a negotiated outcome of this matter and the Sub-Committee is asked to consider whether the issue of a Counter-Notice is necessary for the promotion of the crime and disorder objective.

Map

15. A map of the local area is attached as Appendix C. The premises is shown at the centre of the map and has a triangle and its name indicating its position. The circle shown on the map has a radius of 100 meters and is shown for the purposes of scale only.

16. Other licensed premises in the local vicinity are also shown and named on the map.

Policy Considerations

13. Section 4 of the Southwark Statement of Licensing Policy on “Administration, Exercise and Delegation of Function” deals with the parameters under which TEN’s may be considered.

COMMUNITY IMPACT STATEMENT

14. Members are advised that under the Act, the only matter to which consideration may be given in this instance is the pursuit of the crime and disorder objective.

15. In considering the TEN in terms of community impact the Sub-Committee must restrict its considerations to this matter.

RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

16. A fee of £21.00 has been paid by the applicant in respect of each TEN, this being the statutory fee payable.

CONSULTATIONS

17. The Act provides for no consultations to take place other than process outlined in this report.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Strategic Director of Communities, Law & Governance

18. The Sub-Committee is asked to determine the application for a Temporary Event License under Section 105 of the Licensing Act 2003 and to consider whether or not counter notice should be issued in the circumstance. It must only issue a Counter Notice if they believe the event would undermine the crime prevention objective set out in the Act

19. The principles, which Sub-Committee members must apply, are set out below.

Principles for making the determination

20. The general principle is that applications for temporary event notices applications must be granted unless relevant representations are received from the Police. This is subject to the proviso that the applicant has complied with regulations in advertising and submitting the application within a prescribed time.

21. Relevant representations are those which

- Are about the likely effect of the granting of the application on the promotion of the crime prevention of the licensing objectives
- Are made by an interested party or responsible authority
- Have not been withdrawn
- Are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority, frivolous or vexatious.

22. If relevant representations are received then the Sub-Committee must have regard to them in determining whether they are necessary for the promotion of the crime prevention objective of the Licensing Act

- Issue a counter notice by adding to, omit, and/or alter the conditions of the license or,
- Reject the whole or part of the application for variation

Conditions

23. The Sub-Committee's discretion is thus limited. It must not attach any conditions on the carrying on of permitted licensable activities. The Sub-Committees function is limited to determining whether a Counter Notice should be issued.

24. Members are also referred to the DCMS guidance on conditions, specifically section 7, and Annexes D, E, F and G.

Reasons

25. The Sub-Committee must give reasons for its decision to issue or not to issue a counter notice.

Hearing Procedures

26. Subject to the Licensing Hearing regulations, the Licensing Committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that

- The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Cross examination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations
- Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing
- The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to

- Address the authority
 - If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
 - In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
 - The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant
 - to the particular application before the committee, and
 - the licensing objectives.
 - The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
 - In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.
27. This matter relates to the determination of an application for a Temporary Event Notices License under section 105 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regulation 26(1) (c) requires the Sub-Committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.
28. Sub-Committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the Council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the Council as authority responsible respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health and safety and as the planning authority.
29. Members should note that the Licensing Sub-Committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The Sub-Committee sits in quasi-judicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing of the application. In this case, Members should disregard the Council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the Licensing Law, Guidance and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.
30. As a quasi-judicial body the Licensing Sub-Committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The Sub-Committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The Licensing Sub-Committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.
31. Members will be aware of the Council's Code of Conduct which requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The Code applies to Members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, Members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.
32. Under the Human Rights Act 1998. the Sub Committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The Sub-Committee has a duty under section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent crime and disorder in the Borough.

33. Where the relevant a counter notice under section 105(3) is given the premises user may appeal against that decision. Where a counter notice is not given, the chief officer of police may appeal against that decision. The appeal must be made to the Magistrates' Court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against. No appeal may be brought later than five working days before the day on which the event begins.

Guidance

34. Members are required to have regard to the DCMS Guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood, members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.
