1. INTRODUCTION AND WELCOME

The chair welcomed members of the public, councillors and officers to the community council meeting.

2. APOLOGIES

An apology for lateness was received from Councillor Jonathan Mitchell.
Councillor Andy Simmons announced that he was unable to stay for the duration of the meeting because he had to attend another meeting.

3. DISCLOSURE OF MEMBERS' INTERESTS AND DISPENSATIONS

None were received.

4. ITEMS OF BUSINESS THAT THE CHAIR DEEMS URGENT

There were none.

5. MINUTES

RESOLVED:

That the minutes of the meeting held on 16 September be agreed as a correct record of the meeting, and signed by the chair.

6. COMMUNITY SAFETY UPDATES

The Community Council noted the safer neighbourhood teams ward priorities for the Dulwich area:

Priorities for College Ward SNT:

- Anti social behaviour across the ward.
- Responding to crime incidences involving fireworks and road safety.
- Croxted Road Estate – responding to complaints involving mopeds and burglary, individuals were arrested.
- Cannabis and weapons found on local estates.
- Kingswood Estate – three arrests were made for street robberies during school safe patrols.
- Dawson Heights Estate – arrests based on intelligence gathering.

Priorities for Village Ward SNT:

- Priorities remain unchanged from the last ward panel meeting.
- SNT responded to high number of offences involving robberies particularly during the summer which occurred within or around the Dulwich Park which were mainly theft of bikes and mobile phones.
- Worked actively during Halloween and Bonfire night
- New Police initiative has been introduced which involves undertaking surveys to establish which neighbourhoods need targeting to address issues of crime.

A question was asked about hand held speed cameras. The SNT explained that they have identified roads in the area however it was felt further discussion needed to take place with local Councillors. The Chair suggested members of the Dulwich Society and local residents attend the next ward panel meeting on the 18 January 2011.

Priorities for East Dulwich SNT:

- Priorities remain unchanged from the previous panel meeting, youth crime, burglary and offences concerning licensed premises.
- Requested local residents to pick up ‘ free marking kit’
- The team reported on speed camera offences and cautioned those motorists who were slightly over the speed limit.

7. DEPUTATION PRESENTATION

Traffic calming issues in Red Post Post Hill

Dulwich Community Council agreed the following motion in response to the deputation presentation concerning wider traffic issues around Red Post Hill – particular with regard to the removal of double decker buses from the no 42 bus route which causes vibration to residents' homes in that area.

AGREED:

DCC requests the relevant Cabinet member and/or officers to take all appropriate steps:

1. subject to official consultation with residents to secure removal of
 - (a) the cushions on Red Post Hill between its junctions with Casino Avenue and Herne Hill and their replacement with the minimum number of islands/build-outs to comply with regulations; and
 - (b) subject to resources and compliance with regulations, the set of cushions immediately to the south of the raised pedestrian crossing at the junction of Casino Avenue and Red Post Hill; and
2. to ascertain the intentions of Lambeth Council with regard to proposals, if any, for road closure or other measures on the north-west side of Denmark Hill/Herne Hill which might have an adverse effect on traffic flows in streets on the Southwark side of Denmark Hill/Herne Hill, and to make all necessary representations to Lambeth Council with a view to protecting the amenity of Southwark residents.

8. COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENTS AND PRESENTATIONS

The following announcements were made:

1. The Armistice Day Service on Thursday 11 November at 10:30am at West Lane Memorial, off Jamaica Rd, SE16.
2. The official Remembrance Sunday service on Sunday 14 November at 10:30am at: The Old Municipal Offices, 151 to 153 Walworth Road, SE17. Other services included West Lane memorial, West Lane, SE16; Borough High Street; Kennington Lane; Dulwich Memorial; and Camberwell memorial.
3. Southwark's consultation on Transforming Southwark's National Health Service (NHS) are holding meetings across the borough to update local people on how they are taking their plans forward and what this means for your health services in your area.

9. A FAIRER FUTURE FOR ALL IN SOUTHWARK

DCC notes the presentation from the leader of the Council concerning the budget consultation. Residents were given an opportunity to vote for their preferences for spending or savings within the Council.

Officers confirmed the responses from residents and ward councillors would be collated in form of a report on the data received and a cabinet member shall feedback this information in the New Year.

10. HOLMDENE AVENUE - 2ND STAGE CONTROLLED PARKING ZONE (CPZ) CONSULTATION RESULTS

Executive function

AGREED:

1. That the results of the Holmdene Avenue 2nd stage controlled parking zone (CPZ) consultation be noted.
2. That the parking layout for Holmdene Avenue (as an extension of Herne Hill CPZ), as detailed in appendix 1 of the report be approved subject to the outcome of any necessary statutory procedures.

11. PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

There were no public questions.

12. LOCAL PARKING AMENDMENT - RED POST HILL

Executive function

AGREED:

That the local parking amendment detailed in appendix 1 of the report, and outlined below, be approved for implementation subject to the outcome of any necessary statutory procedures:

- a) Red Post Hill (between Herne Hill and approx No. 81 Red Post Hill) – ‘at any time’ parking restrictions
- b) Half Moon Lane (near junction with Red Post Hill) – reduction and extension to some lengths of ‘at any time’ parking restrictions
- c) Red Post Hill (near junctions with Half Moon Lane and Village Way) – amendments to operational hours and length of existing parking restrictions.

13. COMMUNITY COUNCILS HIGHWAYS AND LIGHTING CAPITAL INVESTMENT 2010-11

Executive function

Dulwich Community Council deferred the above item to ascertain further information on the proposed schemes.

14. REALLOCATION OF THE CLEANER GREENER SAFER FUNDING 2010 -2011

Executive function

AGREED:

1. That the changes of scope of Sydenham Hill Estate greening and We Love East Dulwich, outlined in paragraphs 10 and 14-15 respectively be noted.
2. That the reallocation of the available £10,000 from the Giles Coppice project (subject to further information and consultation with the Dulwich Estate) to the Croxted Road Security Gates and Little Bornes footpath as set out in paragraph 11 of the report be approved.
3. That the reallocation of available monies totalling £33,500 to the We Love East Dulwich scheme from the Eco Dry Cleaners and North Cross Road Alleyway scheme as set out in paragraphs 12-15 of the report be approved.
4. That £5,000 of the £30,000 originally awarded to the East Dulwich Carbon Fund, be reallocated to fund a potential shortfall in the cost of installing electric pop up points in North Cross Road. If all or some of the £5000 is not needed – this would remain within the budget for East Dulwich Carbon Fund as set out in Appendix 1 of the report.
5. That the reallocation of available monies totalling £35,000 to Calton Avenue 20 mph zone works be approved.
6. That £35,000 originally awarded to the Dulwich Sports Club be available for re-allocation.
7. That the £10,500 originally awarded to Positive Education Learning Organisation (PELO) be reallocated to East Dulwich Grove Estate Tenants & Residents Association (Edge TRA) meeting room.
8. Agreed that £40,000 of funds available for reallocation be allocated to Red Post Hill 20mph zone works.

Dog Control Order Consultation

Tell us what you think about Dog Control Orders

The council in partnership with the RSPCA, Southwark Police and Battersea Dogs Home are working hard to encourage responsible dog ownership, and deal with irresponsible dog owners and incidents of dangerous and out of control dogs.

We want to know if you would like the council to introduce new powers, called dog control orders (DCOs), which would allow on the spot fines of £50 for such offences borough wide.

These separate orders are:

- Failing to remove dog fouling (fouling of land by dogs order) - all public land borough wide
- Not putting and keeping a dog on a lead when asked to by an authorised officer (dogs to be placed on a lead when requested by an authorised officer) - all public land borough wide
- Permitting a dog to enter an area from which it is excluded (dogs exclusion order) - specific areas only i.e. gated children's play areas.

The DCO consultation is taking place to see if there is a public desire and need to have these regulations adopted across the borough. Should the results show a need to introduce DCOs then residents will be consulted on the details of what and where the DCOs will be introduced.

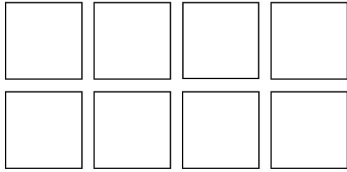

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. To select the works to be funded from the proposed schemes in the Dulwich community council area as set out in appendix 2.
2. To note budget breakdown including underspend by ward from last year 2009-10 as set out in appendix 2.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

3. The declining quality of public highway coupled with extreme weather events has led to further deterioration – with some non principal, unclassified roads being particularly affected. Given the nature of these roads and the lower level of traffic flows it is unlikely that such locations will feature in any major resurfacing programme. Without the necessary capital allocation to attend to such locations, complaints of poor road surfaces can only be dealt with through the reactive maintenance programme.
4. As part of the approved Highways capital investment programme for 2010 -2011 a significant proportion has been devolved to each community council area
5. Each Community Council will receive £100,000 for highways surface improvements and £75,000 for Lighting improvements of their choice
6. At the last Dulwich Community Council on 16 September 2010, Members agreed that a revised list of the lighting and highways schemes should be presented to the next meeting on 10 November 2010 giving particular regard to the roads suggested by local ward councillors in order of priority and breakdown of costing for each scheme.
7. Dulwich Community Council also requested a budget breakdown including underspend by ward from last year's highways and lighting capital investment which is attached to this report.
8. There is an current underspend of £66,666.66 across the Dulwich Community Council area and this can be brought forward into the project schemes for 2010 – 2011.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

Engineers Selections

5. As an aid to the selection process relevant engineers have provided a range of required works and indicative costs for their implementation.
6. In addition to the resurfacing selections provided it has been agreed and authorised that it could appropriate to spend the surfacing money on minor patching and pothole repairs should a Community Council wish to do so.

Community Council Selections

7. This money can be spent on any asset renewal or replacement project selected by the Community Council with the caveats that it cannot be spent on traffic safety or parking schemes, non functional or decorative installations and / or non-essential works.

Delivery

8. Once the Community Council has made their selections by the method of their choice the Asset Management BU will design and deliver the works as soon as possible.

Community Impact Statement

9. There are no specific community impact issues arising from the recommendations.

Briefing Note to Dulwich Community Council – 13 December 2010**North Cross Road Market Consultation results**

A consultation was carried out in October 2010 to ascertain the views of the local community, traders, and businesses on extending the current Market from 20 to 30 pitches, and adding Sunday as an extra trading day. An advert was placed in the press on 30th September to advise of consultation, and 2000 questionnaires were distributed to residents in the streets around the market. The questionnaire was also put up online.

The consultation for North Cross Road came to an end on 5 November 2010. It was left open until Friday 12 November for 7 residential properties of the Old School Building as these were missed out during the delivery process.

The consultation results came out in favour of both questions agreeing to add 10 pitches to the existing 20 and add Sunday trading to the existing designation of Monday - Saturday.

The results were as follows:-

A total of 339 responses were returned.

Of those written responses received 88 from 89 were from residents of the SE22 area. Of those responses:

76% are in favour of the extension of 20 pitches to 30 pitches.

66% are in favour of adding Sunday to the Monday to Saturday designation.

Of those returned by email, the remaining 150, identified by their IP address.

79.2% are in favour of the extension of 20 pitches to 30 pitches.

63% are in favour of adding Sunday to the Monday to Saturday designation.

Of total responses the results were:

92.9% are residents

78.2% are in favour of the extension of 20 pitches to 30 pitches.

64% are in favour of adding Sunday to the Monday to Saturday designation.

58.9% didn't want the market to stay the same.

A report will be written up on the basis of the consultation findings and presented to a Licensing Committee in January 2011.

If agreed by the Licencing committee, the changes would be formally implemented from March 2011.
