1. INTRODUCTION AND WELCOME

The chair welcomed members of the public, councillors and officers to the community council meeting.

2. APOLOGIES

There were no apologies for absence.

Councillors Lisa Rajan and Paul Noblet gave their apologies for lateness.

3. DISCLOSURE OF MEMBERS' INTERESTS AND DISPENSATIONS

None were disclosed.

4. ITEMS OF BUSINESS THAT THE CHAIR DEEMS URGENT

There were no deputations or petitions.

5. MINUTES

The Minutes of the Rotherhithe Community Council held on Monday 23 June 2010 were approved as a correct record of the meeting and signed by the Chair.

6. MATTERS RAISED AT PREVIOUS MEETING

Pathway at Surrey Docks Water Sports Centre:

Barry Mason (Southwark Cyclists) referred to item 6 of the minutes (23 June 2010) demanded that the right of way be opened without any further delay as this matter has dragged on long enough.

Members endorsed the comments of Barry Mason. Cllr Richard Livingstone agreed to speak to the relevant cabinet member to contact Fusion.

7. DEPUTATIONS/PETITIONS (IF ANY)

There were none.

8. CHAIR'S ANNOUNCEMENTS AND COMMUNITY PRESENTATIONS

Docklands Settlement

Representatives from Docklands Settlement were present to outline what the project does. It is a charity organisation which is situated in Rotherhithe. The project is looking to identify funds to redevelop the site and update the facilities at the centre in order to make it sustainable for the future. It has served the local community for over 100 years and providing youth and child provision as well as job opportunities in the area.

It also works closely with local councillors and Southwark officers in order to run the project effectively. The architect present made reference to the new build – offering private and shared ownership, brand new sport facilities, 5 aside pitches. Some residents expressed concern about the number of properties being built and problems with parking which is already difficult situation at the moment. The response given by one of the representatives was that there would be some off street car parking. All matters regarding the number of housing units and parking would be determined at the full planning committee stage within the Council.

Changing Livesey

The Community Project Manager was present to talk about the training opportunities available for local residents in Livesey ward. The outreach organisation in conjunction with other local agencies mainly helps people back into employment.

Street Leaders

Street Leader Co-ordinator, Dave Taylor was present to talk about the Street Leaders

scheme and how residents could get involved. The Street Leaders programme is an active citizen scheme consisting of local volunteers focusing on reporting and helping to resolve local environmental issues. This involves conducting visual audits, reporting issues to the council and removing graffiti. The scheme was initially launched in 2003 but has recently been revived to attract more volunteers to become street leaders. There are currently 2000 street leaders across the borough.

A local street leader was present to explain how easy it was to become a street leader stating the role of a street leader is an important one. Any concerns relating to graffiti or antisocial behaviour are reported to the Council via the website, email or dedicated telephone line and resolved within 48 hours.

The Chair thanked the representatives for their attendance and announced that if there were any topics which residents felt should be highlighted at community council meetings - they should speak to local ward councillors or officers during the break.

9. FAIRER FUTURE FOR ALL IN SOUTHWARK

Councillor Richard Livingstone, Cabinet Member for Finance and Resources presented the item on a Fairer Future for All in Southwark. He outlined the framework of the budget, setting out the process and setting out the timescales for consultation and decision.

Councillor Richard Livingstone explained that the Council need to engage with members of the community, as local government are expected to receive a 25% cut in funding from central Government following the announcement of the Comprehensive Spending Review on 20 October 2010.

The purpose of the presentation is to also get the views of residents which could be emailed and information concerning this would be available on the Southwark website. He said it was important to note the cuts likely to be quite significant in the voluntary sector. However the council would continue to work closely with communities, voluntary sector and other services as well as protecting the most vulnerable residents. Cabinet members have agreed seven budget principles which will underpin the Council's next budget and its process.

It was noted that further consultation presentations would be given at future community council meetings to ensure that this process is transparent and that people's views are taken into consideration.

10. MAIN THEME: FUTURE OF ALBION STREET

Tim Thompson, Project Manager for the Canada Water /Bermondsey Spa Regeneration presented this item with PowerPoint slides.

Summary of presentations:

Rotherhithe is an historic part of London where the transformation has been tremendous –

50% of the peninsular was water.

- What happened in the mid 1970s the local docks were not viable?
- The London Docklands Development Corporation (LDDC) further changed the area.
- The late 1990s provided a new public infrastructure where a lot of businesses have transformed.
- Referred to the Canada Water Master plan – the Council decided to consult local groups about regenerating the area – making it sustainable.
- Proposal to have a new town centre.
- In 2007 the Council appoints developer Barratts to regenerate the area which formed part of the master plan and the creation of a new local cinema, library and new homes.
- The new Canada Water Area Action Plan – consulted widely on this and hopefully would be adopted as a new planning policy.
- Referred to the intervention on Albion Street and empty properties in the area which are structurally unsound.
- Concluded by showing slides of how Albion Street looks like now and hopes to attract people to the area with job and housing opportunities

Improving local retail environment (ILRE)

It was noted that the officer who was due to present this gave his apologies to the meeting. Richard Harris, Environment & Housing Officer – responsible for the north part of the borough outlined that the ILRE is a council funded scheme which invests in physical environment improvements to e.g. shop fronts to make it more vibrant. Further information on this presentation would be at the next meeting.

Letting policy

Neil Martindale from the Council's property division was present to give an update on the number of shop units let out in Albion Street – i.e. 15 shop units, 2 units are available to let and 1 was on offer.

Cafe Conversation

Pauline Adenwalla, local resident set the scene for the workshops and talked about the cafe conversation which took place – involving local residents, businesses, Southwark officers and local Councillors discussing the long term prospects of Albion Street. During her presentation a number of proposals were noted they include a new street market, improve the pedestrian crossing, reinstate the Tommy Steele factory and improve the foot fall.

At this juncture the meeting were allocated into the various workshops (with set themes)

which were relayed back after the break.

11. WORK SHOPS - ALBION STREET

AGREED:

That the write up from the various workshops would be given at the next community council meeting.

12. PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

There were none.

13. RELEASE OF S106 MONIES TO CANADA WATER LIBRARY PROJECT

AGREED:

That the Community Council recommends to Planning Committee that funds totalling £1.75 million of section 106 funding from the legal agreement with British Land Canada Quays (BLCQ) (dated 4 May 2007) in respect of the developments at Sites A and B, Canada Water intended specifically for library and leisure facilities, be released to part fund the delivery the new Canada Water Library.

14. LOCAL PARKING AMENDMENTS - ROTHERHITHE COMMUNITY COUNCIL

EXECUTIVE FUNCTION

Feedback form workshops held at the Finnish Church in London, 33 Albion Street, London SE16

Workshop 1 - Public Realm

Public Realm is responsible for the investment in and the maintenance of Southwark's physical environment – controlling parking, footway & carriageway maintenance, tree maintenance, grounds maintenance, signage, projects, public lighting, management of abandoned vehicles.

Please discuss, write down and feedback your ideas for the following question:

What projects have you seen or heard about in other areas, which you think might encourage people to enjoy the public areas in Albion Street?

- The Public Realm workshop was all female; they began by comparing areas of Southwark that had a vibrant environment. This included Potters Field as a good example (others?). One person suggested the amount of events held in the area added liveliness to the space.
- The group then discussed some positive aspects of the street. They identified the Finnish and Norwegian churches, Rotherhithe station, BEC College.
- They suggested the council could encourage more people to visit these places, by providing better and clearer signage. The existing signage is "bitty". In particular, a graphic map placed opposite Rotherhithe station and outside the Norwegian Church, with possibly some attractive lighting on the church and an information point manned by volunteers can be a possibility.
- They maintained that the substandard quality and bad layout around the toilets blocked off the entrance to the street, and asked if the toilets could come under the Compulsory Purchase Order. The group was informed that this could prove to be difficult as CPO's had to be in the public interest to be granted, and this may not be considered essential.
- They asked that the council discussed with the Norwegian Church the idea of a market in the square and tidying up of the environment to make it more attractive. Officers were asked to meet with the Market's Development Manager to discuss the licensing process.
- The areas they identified that might be easily cleaned up are the corrugated fencing opposite Rotherhithe station, the street side of the Rotherhithe Tunnel wall, and the square in front of the Norwegian Church, including tree pruning.
- Greater access to the shops could be given if the pavements area was widened.

Updates:

Highways and lighting - Albion Street is not on the list as it is not high risk, determined from a condition survey on all lights in 2009/10. Lights were replaced in 2006 with an updated system due to crime issues. Four Lamps on Albion Street are due to be repaired as part of the ongoing maintenance.

Signage – Council policy does not allow directional signs to Churches. Signs to Rotherhithe Station can be considered, subject to not being on TfL land as this will require a location survey.

Workshop 2 - Economics

Please discuss, write down and feedback the agreed points for the following questions.

1) What can the council do to improve local economic conditions to attract inward investment?

2) What can anyone, other than the council, do to improve and attract inward investment?

3) What can I do to improve the Albion Street economy?

The workshop mainly focused on the Albion Street Library and its long term usage.

- Bring people into Albion Street after new library is completed and opened
- School of SAMBA, BEC and Morley College - ensure that they are fully involved as stakeholders and utilising the old library
- Advertise shops people would like to invest in and remove restrictions and introduce clear guidelines
- Parking restrictions should be applied on an level playing field
- No more housing developments or dwellings in Albion Street
- Shops only on one side - no viability
- Provisions for cafes on the ground floor of old library to be considered to encourage greater footfall and usage of facilities.
- Lighting needs to be upgraded from a 'community safety' point of view
- Better use of shops - ILRE (improving local retail environment) - with a community feel to them
- Library to remain and turn into theatre - Albion Theatre
- Focus on the real solutions to a small area - energy and resources
- Having a market again

Updates:

Market - a real possibility of providing license for occasional trading (pilot programme). Officers are currently speaking to the Norwegian Church and plan to speak to Finnish and Swedish Churches to discuss ideas of a Scandinavian themed market.

ILRE - designers and contractors who will be responsible for the works on Albion Street are presently finalising the specification of works and gaining final approval of the design elements from traders, and will be aiming to start work straight after Christmas.

Workshop 3 - Density & Development

Please discuss, write down and feedback your ideas for the following question.

If there was to be a development proposal for Albion Street, what type and density should the council support? I.e. size of buildings, retail, residential, leisure etc...

- Living versus vibrancy need to be considered
- Knit into the local area
- Bermondsey Street - limited comparison with Albion Street
- Shops in Albion Street - can they in reality compete with the likes of Tesco?
- Revive the street market
- Do not want high rise development
- Need focal point - community space e.g. cafe
- Can't find Albion Street, not easily accessible
- Access to Canada Water interrupted by development
- What worked before and could they be revived?
- Future of library - gallery or something linked with the history of the area
- Area has the feel of a village, this should be encouraged
- Need greater involvement from local residents
- Nisa (local shop) is a good example of inward investment
- Is there capacity in local health provision?
- Library is an important part of the street
- What type of shops? - Green grocers, not too many specialist shops.

Updates:

Workshop 4 - Links & Accessibility

Please discuss, write down and feedback your ideas for the following question:

How can we make Albion Street more accessible so that it benefits from the investment in Canada Water and Rotherhithe Station?

- The question of accessibility initially focused on the lack of connection between Albion Street and the Canada Water development, in particular the tube station.
- There was a sense that the private developments do not take into account the local community. E.g. Will the Barrett's development have a direct link through to Albion Street? – Any improvement to the retail environment on Albion Street would depend on increased footfall.
- On the same theme, it was pointed out that the Pumphouse development entrance is blocked off at both ends, prohibiting access to Canada Water Station. The gate for the Pumphouse is exclusive and private. Is it possible to create a cut through in the wall of the passageway (where the apple tree is!) beside the station?
- Is a road linking Needleman Street to Albion Street a possibility? The main thrust of this discussion was the definite need for an alternative link between Albion Street and Canada Water station, for residents of the Canada Estate, who currently have to go a very long way, with no signage and poor lighting. The lights in the park are obscured by foliage, and it feels very unsafe at certain times of day. Indeed the park is shut at night to deter anti-social behaviour. (There is a rough patch of ground near the bus stop by the roundabout/city business centre/Norwegian Church -rear access – Renforth Street?)
- It is currently easier to use the over-ground as routes are not direct.
- People who have lived in the area all their lives have been denied access by private developments and there is an urgent need to integrate all residents. The external wall is both a physical and psychological barrier in this regard.
- Local residents feel that they are not being consulted or informed about decisions which affect them personally, and they are being cut out of the benefits of the investments at Canada Water.

Updates:

Pumphouse development entrance – There is no part of the fence that adjoins council land, so agreement of the Pumhouse Estate owners would be needed to create such an access.

What Happens next?

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. To agree the works to be funded from the proposed schemes in the Rotherhithe community council area as set out in appendix A.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The declining quality of public highway coupled with extreme weather events has led to further deterioration – with some non principal, unclassified roads being particularly affected. Given the nature of these roads and the lower level of traffic flows it is unlikely that such locations will feature in any major resurfacing programme. Without the necessary capital allocation to attend to such locations, complaints of poor road surfaces can only be dealt with through the reactive maintenance programme.
3. As part of the approved Highways capital investment programme for 2010 -2011 a significant proportion has been devolved to each community council area
4. Each Community Council will receive £100,000 for highways surface improvements and £75,000 for Lighting improvements of their choice

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

Engineers Selections

5. As an aid to the selection process relevant engineers have provided a range of required works and indicative costs for their implementation.
6. In addition to the resurfacing selections provided it has been agreed and authorised that it could appropriate to spend the surfacing money on minor patching and pothole repairs should a Community Council wish to do so.

Community Council Selections

7. This money can be spent on any asset renewal or replacement project selected by the Community Council with the caveats that it cannot be spent on traffic safety or parking schemes, non functional or decorative installations and / or non-essential works.

Delivery

8. Once the Community Council has made their selections by the method of their choice the Asset Management BU will design and deliver the works as soon as possible.

Community Impact Statement

9. There are no specific community impact issues arising from the recommendations.



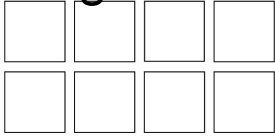

RECOMMENDATION(S)

1. That the Rotherhithe Community Council approves the allocation of £7,270 community funding.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2. The Community Council Fund provides revenue grants of between £100 and £1,000 for community projects. Applications are considered by the borough's eight community councils, which have £15,260 each, for projects that will benefit the community. Rotherhithe Community Council awarded £7,990 in June 2010 and Members asked for the remaining £7,270 to be awarded later in the year, to allow groups to submit applications for Christmas/winter activities.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

3. Appendix 2 contains the funding guidelines for the fund.
 - The Community Council Fund forms part of Southwark 2016 objectives of
 - Improving life chances
 - A better place for people
 - Delivering quality services.

Community impact statement

4. The allocation of the Rotherhithe Community Council fund will, in the main, affect the people living in the Rotherhithe Community Council area. However, in making the area a better place to live and improving life chances for local people, the Community Fund activities will have an impact on the whole of Southwark.
5. The Rotherhithe Community Council fund aims to increase community participation and activity within the area and provide such groups with the support that they would have not been able to access otherwise.

Resource implications

6. The budget for the Rotherhithe Community Council Fund is £15,260 to be spent by the 31 March 2011.

Legal/Financial implications

7. The Council has power under section 2 of the Local Government Act 2000 (“the Act”) to do anything which it calculates is likely to promote or improve the economic, social or environmental well being of the area. This power can be exercised for benefit of the whole or any part of the council’s area or for the benefits of any person resident or present in the area.
8. Section 2(3) of the Act requires the Council to have regard to its Community Strategy when determining whether or not to exercise this power. Section 2(4) of the Act specifies that this includes a power to give financial assistance to any person.
9. The Council has power under the Act to provide funding to voluntary organisations but in exercising this power regard must be had to the Council’s sustainable community strategy. These grants, from the community fund, are from revenue budgets.
10. The Executive in November 2005 agreed for this to be done by the community councils. The money can be granted to community projects ranging from cultural celebrations to providing equipment for local sports teams.

REASONS FOR URGENCY

11. In order for funding to be allocated to allow completion of projects in the winter/Christmas period.

REASONS FOR LATENESS

12. The report could not be circulated 5 clear working days before the meeting as the closing date for applications was after the agenda publication date.

Your community council has **£7,270** to support activities run by local groups. Bids for grants of between £100 and £1000 can be made to Rotherhithe community council via a very simple application form.

Who can apply?

The Community Council Fund was set-up for new and emerging groups and small organisations to hold one-off events and activities. Groups are encouraged to work in partnership with other groups. Who can apply:

- Any constituted local group (i.e. that has a business bank account and letter-headed paper) or any group/individual that has a sponsor organisation (with bank account & letter-headed paper) who can administer the funds on their behalf.
- Any community group that is based in the community council area they wish to bid to, and plan to hold their project in that area. (Please see the enclosed community council postcode list and map to find out which is your community council).

What kind of things can be funded?

The Community Council Fund can fund a variety of projects. Examples include:

- a one off event such as a fun-day or a football tournament
- a series of workshops/activities involving members of the local community
- Publicity/merchandise to advertise the event you are doing

What kind of things we will not be funded?

Anything which is capital funding. Examples include:

- building works
- large playground equipment

How much can groups bid for?
