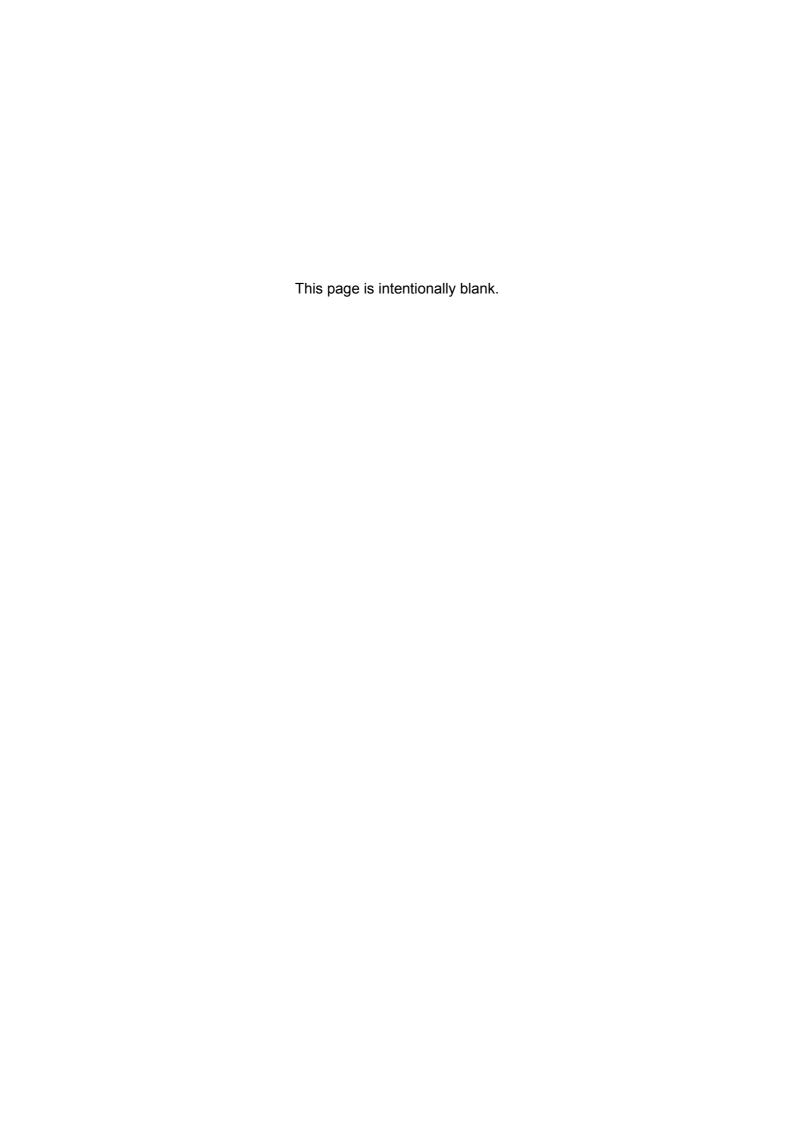

Reasons for the change			
What change is being proposed?	We are proposing to change the model of delivery of the Talking Therapy Services in Southwark to a more integrated step care model with a single point of access and triage to be delivered in a community setting within a locality/neighbourhood hubs, alternative community based settings such as places of worship, other clinical facilities, and public meeting rooms well served by public transport towards a neighbourhood / locality model of delivery It also introduces therapy at home for those who have mobility problems. The change could mean that people may have to travel a bit further to access services within their local area.  However the new model offers better access, equity		
	and choice for patients.

	This was to enable the re-commissioning of a more integrated and enhanced talking therapy service and to reduce the variance in access and service delivery across Southwark.	
What stage is the proposal at and what is the planned timescale for the change(s)?	Plans are at an early development stage. A procurement process is planned to start in June 2014.	
How you planning to consult on this? (please briefly describe what stakeholders you will be engaging with and how)	Prior to the SCCG decision in December 2013 engagement was undertaken with GPs, Counsellors, Clinical Strategy Committee, Local Medical Council (LMC), Mental Health Management Group and at a Mental Health Stakeholder event.	
	Post decision further engagement has been undertaken with LMC, GPs, Counsellors, Mind Service User Council, Primary care Patient Participation Groups, Providers – SlaM, Waterloo Community Counselling, Southwark Carers. Healthwatch have sought views from Kindred Minds.	
	A Survey Monkey is currently running on-line seeking views from wider stakeholders and a public engagement event is planned for 8th April 2014.  www.southwarkccg.nhs.uk/get-involved/our-projects-and-events/talking-about-talking-therapies	
	The views of users of services (SLaM & PBC) have been sought via patient evaluations forms submitted as part of the patient experience questionnaires.

Are changes proposed to the accessibility to services? Briefly describe:		
Changes in opening times for a service	It is planned to increase the times of day that the services are available as an enhancement to the service. This includes offering evening and Saturday appointments. The enhanced service specification will increase access to the service for those people who have long term conditions.	
Withdrawal of in-patient, out-patient, day patient or diagnostic facilities for one or more speciality from the same location	Not applicable.	
Relocating an existing service	Currently the service is available in most GP practices and Mauldsley site with varying waiting times. In the new model the number of GPs offering the service from their premises may reduce, with services being consolidated onto fewer sites linked to geographical areas / localities. This will mean that some users will have to travel further to access services. The waiting lists will reduce as resources are shared over a wider area and the single point of	

	access to the service will reduce waiting times. The new model will also have access to a health therapy bus to engage and deliver services in the community.
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Changing methods of accessing a service such as the appointment system etc.	The capacity to receive and manage self-referrals will be increased, ensuring improved access for those who would not normally be referred.  There will be a single point of access and triage to
	the service with users being directed to the appropriate level of intervention offering choice of therapist and the therapist with the least waiting times.
Impact on health inequalities across all the nine protected characteristics - reduced or improved access to all sections of the community e.g. older people; people with learning difficulties/physical and sensory disabilities/mental health needs; black and ethnic minority communities; lone parents. Has an Equality Impact Statement been done?	Currently some groups are under-represented in uptake of the services, in particular members of the BME community, men and older people. An equalities impact assessment will be undertaken on the new specification.  The EIA undertaken on the practice based counselling component of services identified the access issues for some groups in the community and these will be addresses e.g. encouraging the use of self-referral, ensuring adequate resources for culture and language specific therapies. Services already arranged to provide for older people and those with mobility issues via home visits accessible triage and screening processes. Outreach to various community groups has been identified in the new service specification with planned action to target identified groups of people who may benefit from services. i.e. Black, Asian and Latin American

Impact on other services (e.g. children's / adult social care)	A single point of access utilising a stepped care model should ensure that people enter the service at the right level thus maximising appropriate use of specialist resources. A single access and triage service will also sign post users to other services which will be of benefit to the user.		
What is the potential impact on the financial sustainability of other providers and the wider health and social care system?	Currently the providers of the services are SLaM, Practice Based Counselling (GPs) and two voluntary sector providers - Waterloo Community Counselling and Southwark Carers Bereavement Counselling. Due to the planned open procurement process the current providers can work in partnership with a main provider to provide the service.
