RECOMMENDATION

1. That the licensing sub-committee considers an application made by Salman Tumay and Suleyman Yuzuguzel to vary the premises licence granted under the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of the premises known as Organic Village Market, 18 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8HN
2. Notes:
 - a) This application seeks to vary existing licensable activities held under current legislation in respect of the premises known as Organic Village Market under Section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003. Existing permitted licensable activities are not the subject of representations and are not under consideration at this meeting. The variation application is subject to representations from responsible authorities and is therefore referred to the sub-committee for determination
 - b) Paragraphs 10 and 11 of this report provide a summary of the application under consideration by the sub-committee. A copy of the full application is attached as Appendix B.
 - c) Paragraphs 14 to 18 of this report deal with the representations received to the variation of premises licence application. Copies of the relevant representations and associated correspondence are attached as Appendix C.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Licensing Act 2003

3. The Licensing Act 2003 received Royal Assent on 10 July 2003. The Act provides a licensing regime for:
 - a) The sale of and supply of alcohol
 - b) The provision of regulated entertainment
 - c) The provision of late night refreshment
4. Within Southwark, this council wholly administers the licensing responsibility.
5. The Act requires the licensing authority to carry out its functions under the Act with a view to promoting the four stated licensing objectives. These are:
 - a) The prevention of crime and disorder
 - b) The promotion of public safety

- c) The prevention of nuisance
 - d) The protection of children from harm.
6. In carrying out its licensing functions, a licensing authority must also have regard to
- a) The Act itself
 - b) The Guidance to the act issued under Section 182 of the Act
 - c) Secondary regulations issued under the Act
 - d) The licensing authority's own statement of licensing policy
 - e) The application, including the operating schedule submitted as part of the application
 - f) Relevant representations
7. The premises licence application process involves the provision of all relevant information required under the Act to the licensing authority with copies provided by the applicant to the relevant responsible bodies under the Act. The application must also be advertised at the premises and in the local press. The responsible authorities and other persons within the local community may make representations on any part of the application where relevant to the four licensing objectives.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

The current premises licence

8. The current licence in respect of the premises known as Organic Village Market, 18 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8HN was issued on 26 July 2011. It allows the following licensable activities:
- Sale of alcohol (off the premises):
Monday to Saturday 08.00 to 23.00
Sunday 10.00 to 22.30.
9. A copy of the existing premises licence is attached as appendix A.

The variation application

10. On 13 July 2015, Mr Salman Tumay and Mr Suleyman Yuzuguzel applied to this Council to vary the premises licence issued in respect of the premises known as Organic Village Market, 18 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8HN.

The application is summarised as follows:

- To extend sale of alcohol hours, to now be from 07.00 to 02.00 on Sunday to Thursday and from 07.00 to 03.30 on Friday and Saturday
 - To extend opening hours to be 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
11. The variation to the premises licence application form provides the applicant operating schedule. Parts J, K, L and M set out the operating controls in full, with reference to the four licensing objectives as stated in the Licensing Act 2003. Should a premises licence be issued in respect of the application the information provided in part M of the operating schedule will form the basis of conditions that will be attached to the licence. A copy of the application is attached to this report as appendix B.

Designated premises supervisor

12. The designated premises supervisor under the existing premises licence is Salman Tumay, who holds a personal licence from Islington.

Representations from other persons

13. No representations were received from other persons.

Representations from responsible authorities

14. There were three representations received from responsible authorities.
15. The public health responsible authority submitted a representation based on the prevention of crime and disorder, and public safety. The representation has been made on the grounds that significantly extending the availability of alcohol is likely to lead to more crime and disorder in the area. There are also concerns that the licensed hours would not be adhered to, as the premises is open 24 hours, however the sale of alcohol on the premises is not. Additional information and research has been provided in the representation.
16. The Metropolitan Police Service submitted a representation which raised concerns that a 24 hour premises that wishes to sell alcohol until 03:30 within a residential street is likely to have a negative impact. The Metropolitan Police Service offered five conditions to be considered by the licensing sub-committee as control measures.
17. The trading standards service submitted a representation, relating to the prevention of crime and disorder and the protection of children from harm. The submission provides information on trading standards visits to the premises, and states that investigations are on-going and with a view to further action. Trading standards is of the view that an extension of the hours should not be granted when the premises is unable to abide by the current conditions on the licence.
18. Copies of these responses are attached as Appendix C.

Conciliation

19. At the time of writing this report, no attempt of conciliation has been made by the applicant's agent.

Operating history

20. In December 2005 the existing licence was converted to a premises licence under the Licensing Act 2003.
21. In November 2008 a licensing inspection was conducted and the premises was found to be compliant.
22. In October 2010 a licensing inspection was conducted and the premises was found to be compliant.
23. In May 2011 trading standards submitted a review application as there had been 3 separate occasions where cigarettes had been sold to persons under 18 years of age. Four age check conditions were added to the licence as a result of the review, as well as a condition requiring a personal licence holder on the premises at all times alcohol is provided.

24. In June 2011 a licensing inspection was carried out and the premises was found to be compliant.

Temporary event notices

25. There have been no temporary event notices for Organic Village Market within the last 12 months.

The local area

26. A map of the area is attached to this report as Appendix D. The premises is identified at the centre of the map. For purposes of scale only the circle on the map has a 100 metre radius. The following licensed premises including terminal hours are within the radius shown on the map:

- EDT, 1 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8EW (Monday to Thursday from 08.00 to 00.30, Friday and Saturday from 08.00 to 01.30 and Sunday from 09.00 to 00.30)
- Payless Food & Wine / Costcutter, 24 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8HN (24 hours, seven days a week)
- Kebab & Wine, 19 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8EW (Monday to Thursday from 10.00 to 03.00, Friday and Saturday from 10.00 to 05.00 and Sunday from 10.00 to 02.00)
- Franco Manca, 21 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8EW (Sunday to Wednesday from 07.00 to 00.30hrs and Thursday to Saturday from 07.00 to 01.30)
- The Bishop, 27 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8EW (Monday to Thursday from 11.00 to 01.30, Friday and Saturday from 11.00 to 02.30 and Sunday from 12.00 to 01.30)
- Toast E. D., 38 Lordship Lane, London SE22 8HJ (Monday to Saturday from 07.00 to 00.00 and Sunday from 07.00 to 23.00).

Southwark Council statement of licensing policy

27. Council Assembly approved Southwark's Statement of Licensing Policy 2011-14 on 12 October 2011. Sections of the statement that are considered to be of particular relevance to this application are:

- Section 3 which sets out the purpose and scope of the policy and reinforces the four licensing objectives.
- Section 5 which sets out the council's approach with regard to the imposition of conditions including mandatory conditions to be attached to the licence.
- Section 6 details other relevant council and government policies, strategies, responsibilities and guidance, including the relevant articles under the Human Rights Act 1998.
- Section 7 provides general guidance on dealing with crime and disorder and deals with licensing hours.

- Section 8 provides general guidance on ensuring public safety including safe capacities.
- Section 9 provides general guidance on the prevention of nuisance.
- Section 10 provides general guidance on the protection of children from harm.

28. The purpose of Southwark's statement of licensing policy is to make clear to applicants what considerations will be taken into account when determining applications and should act as a guide to the sub-committee when considering the applications. However, the sub-committee must always consider each application on its own merits and allow exceptions to the normal policy where these are justified by the circumstances of the application.

Resource implications

29. A fee of £190 has been paid by the applicant in respect of this application being the statutory fee payable for premises within non-domestic rateable value band B.

Consultation

30. Consultation has been carried out on this application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. A public notice was published in a local newspaper and a similar notice exhibited outside of the premises for a period of 28 consecutive days.

Community impact statement

31. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Legal Services

32. The sub-committee is asked to determine the application to vary the premises licence under Section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003.

33. The principles which sub-committee members must apply are set out below.

Principles for making the determination

34. Section 35 of the Licensing Act 2003 sets out the licensing authority's powers and duties in considering the determination of an application for variation.

35. The general principle is that applications for variation must be granted unless relevant representations are received. This is subject to the proviso that the applicant has complied with regulations in advertising and submitting the application.

36. Relevant representations are those which

- Are about the likely effect of the granting of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives
- Are made by an other party or responsible authority
- Have not been withdrawn
- Are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority, frivolous or vexatious.

37. If relevant representations are received then the sub-committee must have regard to them, in determining whether it is necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives to:
- Add to, omit, and/or alter the conditions of the licence or
 - Reject the whole or part of the application for variation.

Conditions

38. The sub-committee's discretion is thus limited. It can only modify the conditions put forward by the applicant, or refuse the variation, if it is necessary to do so. Conditions must be necessary and proportionate for the promotion of one of the four licensing objectives, and not for any other reason. Conditions must also be within the control of the licensee, and should be worded in a way which is clear, certain, consistent and enforceable.
39. The four licensing objectives are
- The prevention of crime and disorder
 - Public safety
 - The prevention of nuisance
 - The protection of children from harm.
40. Members should note that each objective is of equal importance. There are no other licensing objectives, and the four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.
41. Conditions will not be necessary if they duplicate a statutory position. Conditions relating to late night refreshment and take away aspect of the licence must relate to the night time operation of the premises and must not be used to impose conditions which could not be imposed on day time operators.
42. The Licensing Act requires mandatory conditions in respect of supply of alcohol, the exhibition of films and in respect of door supervisors. The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2003 introduced 3 new conditions in respect of irresponsible promotions, the oral dispensing of alcohol and free tap water. In October 2010 an additional 2 conditions will come into force – age verification policy and smaller measures for alcoholic drinks.
43. Members are also referred to the Department for Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) guidance on conditions, specifically section 7, and Annexes D, E, F and G.

Reasons

44. If the sub-committee determines that it is necessary to modify the conditions, or to refuse the application for to vary the premises licence, it must give reasons for its decision.

Hearing procedures

45. Subject to the Licensing Hearing regulations, the licensing committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that:
- The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Cross examination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations.

- Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing.
- The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to:
 - Address the authority
 - If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
 - In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
- The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant to the particular application before the committee and the licensing objectives
- The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
- In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing

46. This matter relates to the determination of an application to vary a premises licence under section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regulation 26(1) (a) requires the sub-committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

Council's multiple roles and the role of the licensing sub-committee

47. Sub-committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the council as authority responsible respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health and safety and as the planning authority.
48. Members should note that the licensing sub-committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The sub-committee sits in quasi-judicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing of the application. In this case, members should disregard the council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the licensing law, guidance and the council's statement of licensing policy.
49. As a quasi-judicial body the licensing sub-committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The sub-committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The licensing sub-committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.
50. The licensing sub-committee is entitled to consider events outside of the premises if they are relevant, i.e. are properly attributable to the premises being open. The proprietors do not have to be personally responsible for the incidents for the same to be relevant. However, if such events are not properly attributable to the premises being open, then the evidence is not relevant and should be excluded. Guidance is that the licensing authority will primarily

focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, working or engaged in normal activity in the area concerned.

51. Members will be aware of the council's code of conduct which requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The code applies to members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, Members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.
52. Under the Human Rights Act 1998 the sub committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The sub-committee has a duty under section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent crime and disorder in the borough.
53. Other persons, responsible authorities and the applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the sub-committee to the Magistrates' Court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against.

Guidance

54. Members are required to have regard to the DCMS Guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood, members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

100 No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence -

a. At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence; or

b. At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended.

101 Every supply of alcohol under the Premises Licence must be made, or authorised by, a person who holds a Personal Licence.

488 (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2). The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

124 Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during the permitted hours. In this condition the permitted hours means:

- a. On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, 8.00.a.m. to 11.00.p.m.
- b. On Sundays, other than Christmas Day, 10.00.a.m. to 10.30.p.m.
- c. On Christmas day, 12 noon to 3.00.p.m. and 7.00.p.m. to 10.30.p.m.
- d. On Good Friday, 8.00.a.m. to 10.30.p.m.

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- i) During the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises, unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel
- ii) The ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the dispatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- iii) The sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club ;
- iv) The sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces .

125 Alcohol shall not be sold in an open container or be consumed in the licensed premises.

127 Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is sold or supplied, except alcohol sold or supplied:

- a. With and for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time, consumed with the meal and paid for together with the meal;
- b. For consumption by a person residing in the premises or his guest and paid for together with his accommodation;
- c. To a canteen or mess.

Annex 3 - Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

8AA The premises shall operate an agecheck 'Challenge 25' policy whereby customers purchasing alcohol who look or appear to be under 25 years of age will be asked for an approved form of proof of age to verify their age. Approved forms shall include a driving licence, passport or a PASS approved proof of age card such as the Southwark Proof of Age (SPA) card.

8AB All staff involved in the sale of alcohol shall be trained in the agecheck 'Challenge 25' policy. A record of their training, including the dates that each member of staff is trained, shall be available for inspection at the premises on request by the Council's authorised officers or the Police.

8AC Agecheck or 'Challenge 25' signage shall be displayed at entrances to the premises, areas where alcohol is displayed for sale and at points of sale to inform customers that an agecheck 'Challenge 25' policy applies and proof of age may be required

8AI A register of refused sales of alcohol and cigarettes sales, which is clearly marked with the details of the premises, address and name of licence holder shall be maintained in order to demonstrate effective operation of the policy. The register shall be available for inspection at the premises on request by the Council's authorised officers or the Police

836 A personal licence holder shall be on the premises at all times licensable activities are undertaken.

Please note that the London Borough of Southwark's Trading Standards Service, as a responsible authority under the Licensing Act 2003, wish to make representations to the application to vary the premises licence for Organic Village Market at 18 Lordship Lane SE22 8HN

The representations are based on the licensing objective for the prevention of Crime and Disorder, and the protection of children from harm.

On 30 April 2015 an exercise was carried out in the Borough to check for the sale of "cheap" [illegal] tobacco. So called Cheap Cigarettes will either be counterfeit versions of known brands, duty evaded established brands illegally brought into this country or "illicit whites" which are cigarettes manufactured for the sole purpose of being smuggled into and sold illegally in another market. A major part of the Government's health strategy to reduce smoking is to use price to deter smoking. This exercise involved an individual going into shops and asking if they had any cheap cigarettes for sale and if so, buying some.. A visit was made to this shop where a sale of Marlboro "Gold" cigarettes was made for £6. These were duty evaded cigarettes from Poland.

The next day Trading Standards visited the shop and seized 15 similar packs that were under the counter and readily available for staff to sell to members of the public who sought such items. Alcohol was on sale to the general public at the time. The conditions on current premise licence were also checked. Neither of the two people working in the shop held a personal licence in breach of 836. No refused sales book was in existence and available for inspection in breach of condition 8AI. No training records were available for inspection as required by condition 8AB. No "Challenge 25" signage was displayed as required by condition 8AC.

No CCTV was in operation.

On 8th June the shop was revisited. The conditions breached conditions outlined above had not been remedied and once again no personal licence holder was on the premise. Alcohol was on sale to purchase

On 17th July the shop was visited again where a check on illegal tobacco was carried out using a trained sniffer dog for this sole purpose. None was found and this was again part of a Borough wide exercise so this premise had not been "singled out". However of note is that the same conditions referred to above were once again breached, including the failure to have a personal licence holder on the premise. Again alcohol was on sale to purchase.

Trading Standards has an on going investigation into these matters and is still considering them with a view to a review of the licence and/or criminal proceedings.

It is of note that the conditions breached were added to the licence when the licence was reviewed in 2011. This review followed repeated sales of tobacco to children on 24 August 2010, 10 September 2010 and 6 February 2011.

The business is currently able to sell alcohol for 102.5 hours a week. It has applied to extend these

by 33.5 hours including an hour earlier each morning. Trading Standards is of the view that an extension of the hours should not be granted when the premise is unable to abide by the current conditions on the licence and the applicant has not demonstrated how he would do this.

Police are in receipt of an application from the above to vary a Premises Licence. Police note that the premises are situated in a residential street with a number of dwellings within very close proximity and as such any extension to the hours allowed for the sale of alcohol should be given great consideration.

I note that the applicant also wishes to extend the hours the premises is open to the public to 24hrs. I have tried to find the current opening times but as yet have been unable to establish the current permitted hours.

I have concerns that a 24hr premises that wish to sell alcohol until 03:30 within a residential street is likely to have a negative impact on the wellbeing of the local residents and therefore recommend that the variation as submitted is not granted.

If however the committee are minded to grant the licence as submitted or a variation of then the following control measures will assist with the promotion of the licensing objectives. Some of the conditions may have already been offered but the wording of each is vital in order to negate any ambiguity.

1. That a CCTV system be installed at the premises and be maintained in good working order and be continually recording at all times the premises are in use under the licence. The CCTV System must be capable of capturing an image of every person who enters the premises.
2. That all CCTV footage shall be kept for a period of thirty one (31) days and shall, upon request, be made immediately available to Officers of the Police and the Council

3. That all staff are trained in their responsibilities under the licensing act 2003 and training records to be kept and updated every 6 months and shall, upon request, be made immediately available to Officers of the Police and the Council.
4. No beers / ciders in single cans, bottles or multi-packs with an ABV of above 7% will be displayed / sold or offered for sale from the premises. Unless written authority is obtained from the Police Licensing Unit prior and this must be kept and made available for inspection immediately on request by any responsible authority.
5. After 23:00 all sales shall take place from a secure serving hatch and that access to the premises shall be restricted to staff only

As Director of Public Health for Southwark(a responsible authority under the Licensing Act 2003) I wish to make representation against the application for variation of licensing hours in respect to Organic Village Market premises.

The representation is made under /relates to the following licensing objective(s):

- 1) The prevention of crime and disorder
- 2) Public safety

The applicant wishes to extend their opening hours to 24 hours a day. They also wish to extend their licensed hours significantly, selling alcohol from 7am instead of 8am, and by closing 3 hours later on Sunday – Thursday (2am instead of 11pm) and by closing four and a half hours later day on Friday and Saturday (3.30am instead of 11pm).

I am making this representation on the grounds that significantly extending the availability of alcohol is likely to lead to more crime and disorder in the area.

Further more as the applicant does not appear to show how they will ensure that customers are aware that alcohol is not available 24 hours a day, it is not clear that the licensed hours would be adhered to.

Research from St Thomas's hospital (Newton, Sarker, Pahal et al, 2007. embedded file) shows that the increase in licensed opening hours following the deregulation of licensing laws led to A&E attendances due to alcohol-related assaults doubling and alcohol related injuries almost tripling.

Currently alcohol-related crime and disorder and measures relating to public safety as well as alcohol-related harm to children are relatively low in this area but it is likely that extending the hours for off-sales of alcohol could lead to a local increase in alcohol-related assaults and injury.

The data in table 2 is also provided pictorially as an appendix. The appendix shows the data above diagrammatically with incidents plotted at 100m intervals from the postcode of the licence to 500m away. It is colour-coded to show how the number of incidents compare to other postcodes within Southwark. This appendix also shows that the postcode is in the top 40-50% for number of licensed premises i.e. it is not in an area with a high density of alcohol outlets which is likely to contribute to relatively low levels of alcohol related harm. It should be remembered that alcohol-related harms are preventable and increasing alcohol availability is likely to increase alcohol-related harms.

Based on the information provided above I would like to see the following:

Refusal for variation of licensed hours.

If the variation is agreed by committee, then I would like to see conditions on the license as follows:

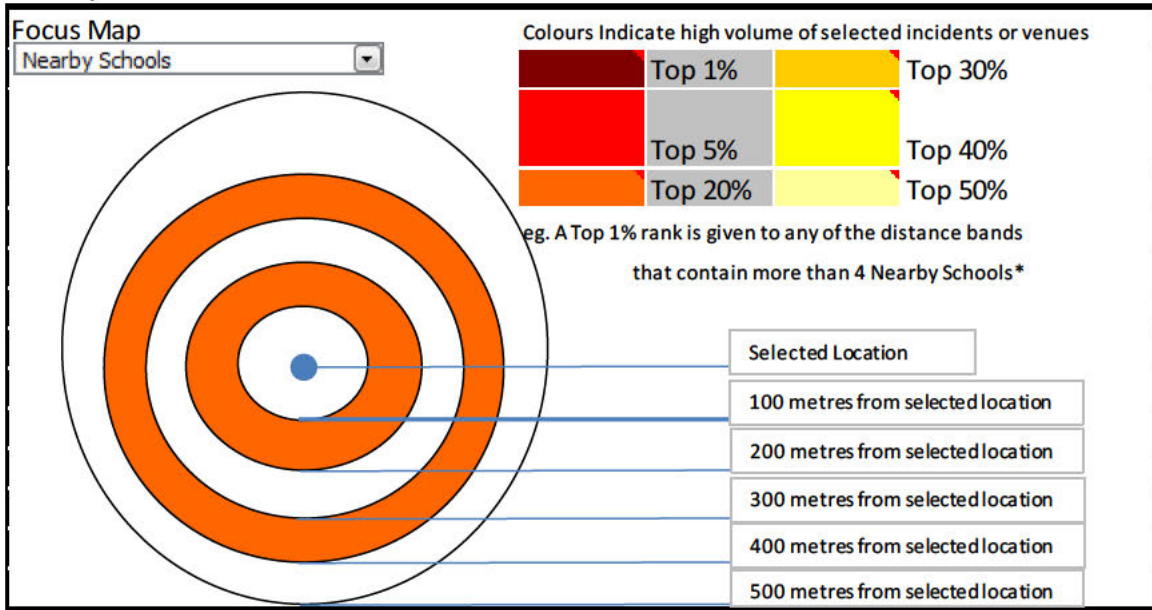
During the hours when shop is open, but alcohol sales are not licensed, all alcohol to be kept behind locked shutters and signs to display hours when alcohol can be sold.

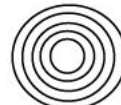

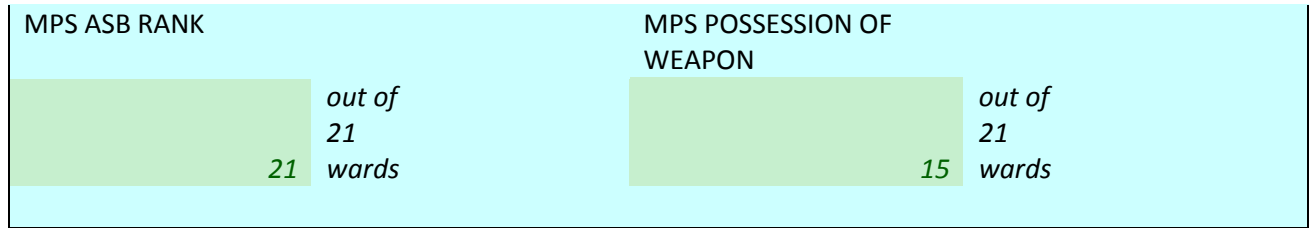

Impact of the new UK licensing law on emergency hospital attendances: a cohort study

Objectives: To assess the effect of the new UK alcohol licensing law on overnight attendances to the emergency department.

Methods: A retrospective cohort study at the emergency department of St Thomas' Hospital, London over 2 months, one before and one after the introduction of the new legislation. All people over the age of 16 years who attended the emergency department between 21:00 and 09:00 during the two study periods (March 2005 and March 2006) were included. An alcohol related attendance was defined as having occurred if there was documentation of alcohol consumption before attendance, or of alcohol intoxication in relation to the patient's physical examination or final diagnosis. The primary outcome measure was change in the number and percentage of alcohol related attendances to the emergency department between the two study periods. Secondary outcome measures, compared between the two study periods, were number and percentage of alcohol related attendances as a consequence of assault, and of injury; and number and percentage of alcohol related attendances resulting in admission to hospital.

Results: In March 2005 there were 2736 overnight attendances to the ED, of which 79 (2.9%) were classified as alcohol related. In comparison, in March 2006 there were a total of 3135 overnight attendances, of which 250 (8%) were alcohol related, representing a significant increase ($p < 0.001$). There were also significant increases in percentage of alcohol related attendances as a consequence of injury ($p < 0.001$) and assault ($p = 0.002$); and in admission rates for alcohol related attendances ($p < 0.001$) between the two study periods.

Conclusions: Overnight alcohol related emergency attendances to St Thomas' hospital increased after the introduction of new alcohol licensing legislation. If reproduced over longer time periods and across the UK as a whole, the additional burden on emergency care could be substantial.

The European Union (EU) is the heaviest drinking region in the world. Within the EU, UK adults have the third highest rates for binge drinking.¹ Furthermore, around 23 000 incidents of alcohol related violence occur every week in the UK,² a cause of major concern for the police, healthcare workers, and society. In addition to violence related injuries, alcohol represents a major burden for UK health services in general, and in emergency departments (EDs) in particular.³ Intoxicated patients are more difficult to manage effectively and often consume more resources than those who are sober. As increased levels of alcohol related morbidity have been directly associated with increased alcohol availability,⁴ the introduction in November 2005 of the UK Government's Licensing Act 2003, permitting 24 h drinking, has been a major cause for concern among doctors.⁵ The new Licensing Act was specifically designed to prevent crime and disorder and to enhance public safety, by reducing the amount of binge drinking and allowing pubs and clubs to stagger closing times.⁶ However, fears have been expressed that the new Licensing Act could have exactly the opposite effect. As yet there has been no systematic attempt to investigate the direct effects of these alcohol licensing changes on the number, or type, of alcohol related ED attendances. We therefore conducted a review of consecutive overnight ED attendances before and after the introduction of the new legislation to assess the effects of the legislation on our ED workload.

METHODS

Design

The study was designed as a retrospective cohort study over two time periods, before and after the introduction of the new UK

alcohol licensing legislation. All adult patients attending the ED overnight during the months of March 2005 and March 2006 were included in the respective cohorts.

Setting

St Thomas' Hospital is a large inner city London teaching hospital with 900 inpatient beds. The ED at St Thomas' hospital sees approximately 120 000 new patient attendances each year.

Study population and data collection

All patients over the age of 16 years who attended the ED between 21:00 and 09:00 during each of the two study periods (1 31 March 2005 and 1 31 March 2006) were included in the analysis. The ED attendance cards, including the London Ambulance Service patient record form (PRF), were individually reviewed by hand for evidence of alcohol ingestion before ED attendance.

We defined an alcohol related attendance as having occurred if there was documentation in the patient's ED attendance card or PRF of alcohol consumption before attendance, or documentation in the ED attendance card of alcohol intoxication in relation to the patient's physical examination or final diagnosis. We excluded patients with alcohol related medical problems who had no documented evidence of alcohol consumption before attendance.

For all alcohol related attendances the following information was recorded: age, sex, reason for attendance (injury or non injury), reported assault or no assault, and patient outcome (admission to hospital or discharge).

Data analysis

All data were entered on to an Excel (Microsoft Corp, Seattle, Washington, USA) database. The primary outcome measure was change in the number and percentage of alcohol related attendances to the ED between the first and second study periods. Secondary outcome measures were: number and percentage of alcohol related attendances as a consequence of assault, and as a consequence of injury; and number and percentage of alcohol related attendances resulting in admission to hospital. All secondary outcome measures were compared between the two study periods.

Comparison of the number of alcohol related attendances to the ED between the two study periods was done using a two sample proportion test. Hypothesis testing with the categorical variables (for example, sex, assault, injury, hospital admission) was also done using a two sample proportion test. Differences between the two time periods in median ages among the ED patients categorised as having an alcohol related attendance was assessed using the Mann Whitney U test. We used this non parametric test as the distribution of ages in our study populations was positively skewed. Differences were considered significant at the 5% level.

RESULTS

During the period 1 31 March 2005 there were a total of 10 290 attendances to the ED. In comparison, during 1 31 March 2006 there were a total of 9978 attendances, representing a reduction of 3%. In March 2005 there were 2736 overnight attendances to the ED compared to 3135 in March 2006, a rise of 15%.

Of the 2736 ED attendances in March 2005, 79 (2.9%) were classified as alcohol related, whereas in 2006, 250 (8%) of the total 3135 attendances were alcohol related. This difference in attendances between March 2005 and March 2006 represents a significant increase in the number of patients attending the ED having consumed alcohol (proportion test, $p < 0.001$).

The demographics of those with alcohol related attendances are outlined in table 1. The median age of patients who attended the ED in March 2005 and 2006 after consuming alcohol were 27 years and 31 years, respectively ($p = 0.06$). The table also shows that there was a slightly higher proportion of male alcohol related attendances in 2006 (73.6% vs 62.2%, $p = 0.05$).

The primary and secondary outcome measures for the two study periods are shown in table 2. There were significant increases in the percentage of alcohol related attendances as a

consequence of injury ($p < 0.001$) and assault ($p = 0.002$) between March 2005 and March 2006. Additionally there was a significant increase in admission rates for alcohol related attendances ($p < 0.001$) between the two study periods.

DISCUSSION

We have found that overnight alcohol related attendances to St Thomas' Hospital ED increased significantly between March 2005 and March 2006. It is likely that this increase is at least in part related to the introduction of new UK alcohol licensing legislation, an event certain to have an important effect on alcohol consumption, which occurred between the two study periods.⁶ The increase in alcohol related problems we have recorded is the opposite of the effect the legislation was designed to produce. In addition, our data suggest that, to date, the new legislation has also failed to achieve its intended improvement in public safety and reduction in alcohol related crime and disorder, as we found a significant increase in alcohol related assaults, injuries and alcohol related hospital admissions between study periods.

Another factor which could account for the rise in alcohol related attendances we found is the relatively low number of patients who presented to the ED after consuming alcohol in March 2005. Rates of alcohol use among patients attending EDs vary widely, with some investigators reporting that as many as 35% of attendances relate to alcohol misuse.³⁻⁷ Part of the reason for the apparent variation in rates of "alcohol related attendances" is the variable use of the term. Some authors use the term to describe any medical or surgical condition that may be related to the ingestion of alcohol for example, pancreatitis, alcoholic liver disease, delirium tremens or alcohol associated seizures. For the purposes of our study we used the term "alcohol related attendance" to indicate only patients who had documented evidence of alcohol consumption before attendance, which could contribute to the low percentage of alcohol related attendances found in our study. In addition, inconsequential consumption of alcohol before attendance is not routinely documented by doctors in the ED at St Thomas' hospital; therefore, this type of attendance was not included in the study numbers.

In 2006 we found that ED patients who had consumed alcohol were slightly older and more likely to be men compared with those in 2005. Although age and sex may influence alcohol consumption, it is very unlikely that the marginal demographic differences we found between our study cohorts could have accounted for the differences in alcohol related presentations we observed between the two time periods.

A potential source of the increase in alcohol related attendances could have been increased awareness of alcohol related issues by the medical staff between the two time periods. However, there were no additional availability of alcohol resources in the ED nor was there any change in the doctors' educational programme to account for this. In order to avoid introducing bias we did not use a proforma for the study, nor did we make any of the doctors within the department aware of the study. Additionally, we chose a time period which was several months after the introduction of the new legislation in an attempt to minimise the influence of any media coverage on the ED doctors' practice.

The ED at St Thomas' is one of the largest in the UK, and is located close to the city centre where there are many licensed premises. Therefore, although from a single centre study, we feel that our main findings are likely to be representative of inner city EDs in the UK. If reproduced over longer time periods and across the UK, as a whole the additional numbers of patients presenting to EDs with alcohol related problems could be very substantial.

In conclusion, we have found that overnight ED attendances in patients having consumed alcohol increased rather than decreased after introduction of new alcohol licensing legislation in the UK. Compounding this increase in numbers of patients is the difficulty in managing patients who have consumed alcohol and the increased resources they require. Larger and longer term assessments of the effects of the new licensing legislation are required if healthcare workers and the police are to be adequately prepared to deal with the health and societal problems caused by alcohol.

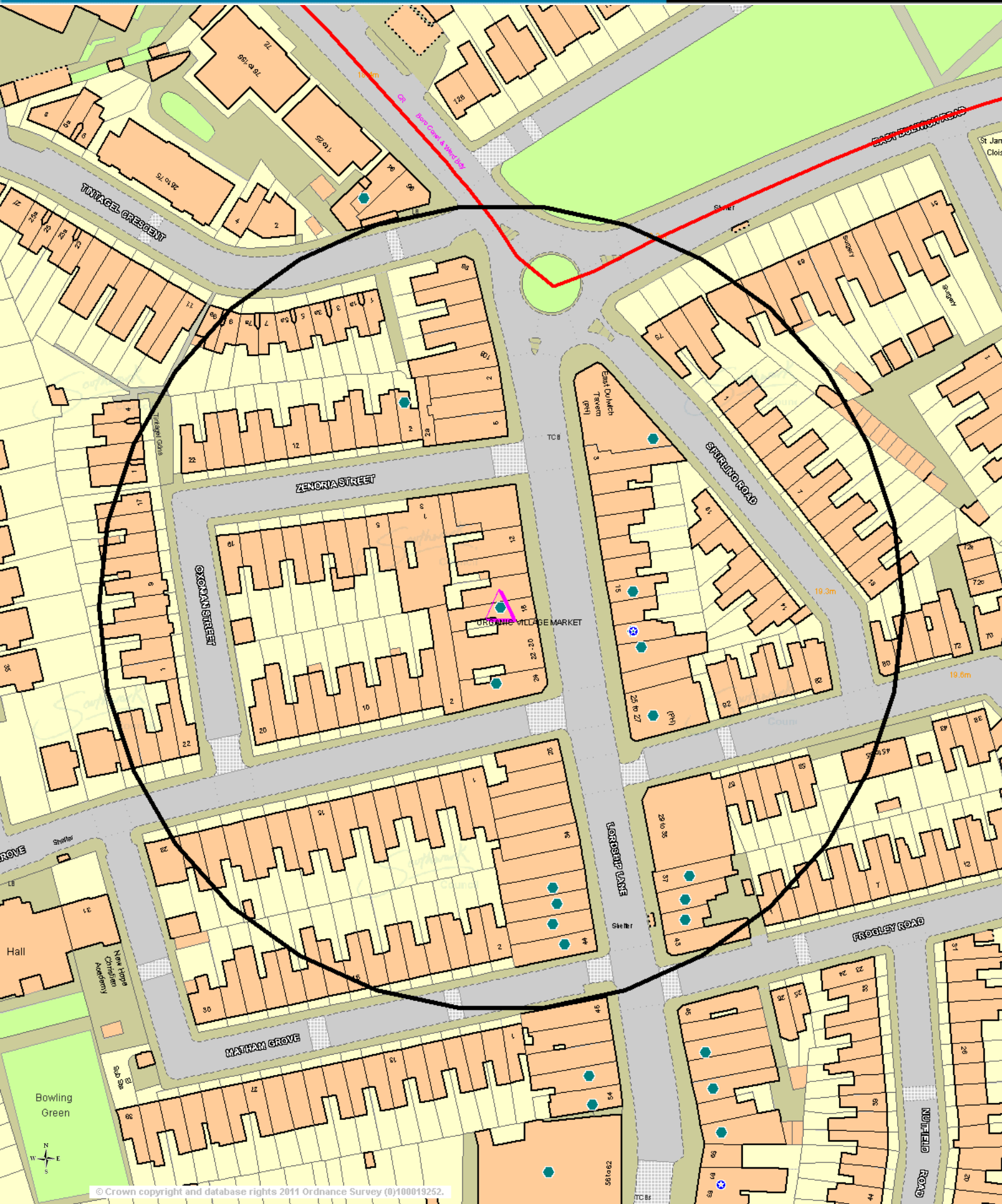
