RECOMMENDATIONS

- That the West Central Multi Ward Forum approve the reallocation of underspent funds carried forward from previous years underspend, current programme underspend and current programme project cancellations
- 2. That the West Central Multi Ward Forum approve the allocation of funds for the 2021-22 Cleaner Greener Safer capital programme in the West Central Multi Ward Area Forum the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 3. The Council's Cleaner Greener Safer capital programme has been running since 2003.
- 4. £ 1.88 million has been allocated every year since 2003 for capital projects within the borough.
- 5. Funding is allocated to individual wards based on a per councilor calculation.
- 6. Examples of the types of projects that have been funded include:
 - Parks, community gardens, landscaping, tree planting and wildlife areas
 - Children's playgrounds, youth facilities, ball courts and cycle tracks
 - Lighting, security measures, pavements, streets, and tackling 'grot spots'
 - Grants to local groups to self-deliver projects

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

7. There is £ 447,619 available for the 2020-21 CGS capital programme for new projects in the West Central Multi Ward area.

- 8. There is £ 39,148 in additional funding from previous years underspend, current programme underspend and current programme project cancellations.
- 9. Eligible proposals must bring about a permanent improvement and make an area cleaner, greener or safer.
- 10. Proposals with revenue costs, including salaries, costs for events, festivals, workshops or other one-off events are not eligible for capital funding. CCTV proposals and internal improvements to housing property and works on schools where there is no access to the general public are also not eligible. Works on private property are not eligible unless there is a long-term guarantee of public access or a demonstrable public benefit.
- 11. The application form invited expressions of interest for the applicants to deliver projects themselves. A due diligence exercise to ensure that this is both practical and realistic has been undertaken as part of the feasibility process. In such cases, the Council would give the funding allocation to the applicant in the form of a capital grant, with appropriate conditions attached.

Policy implications

12. The Cleaner Green Safer programme is fully aligned with the Council's policies around sustainability, regeneration and community engagement.

Community impact statement

- 13. The roles and functions of Multi Ward areas include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process and to take decisions about local matters.
- 14. The Multi Ward Forums have delegated authority in the following key areas: The Neighborhoods Fund, Cleaner Greener Safer and Devolved Highways capital programmes and community project banks.
- 15. An explicit objective within Multi Ward areas is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, West Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The Cleaner Greener Safer programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
- 16. In fulfilling the above objectives of Multi Ward areas to bring together and involve West Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the Council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the Council to have due regard when taking decision to the need to:

- a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;
- b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristics and those who do not share it; and
- c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
- 17. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
- 18. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:
 - a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
 - b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic; and
 - c. Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are underrepresented.
- 19. When undertaking the duties under section 149 the Council must ensure:
 - a. The duty must be fulfilled before the decision in question is enacted;
 - b. The duty must be exercised in substance with 'rigour and an open mind'; it is not a matter of ticking boxes and; and
 - c. The duty is continuing; it does not end with the completion of any EIA and due regard must be had as policy evolves and is implemented.
- 20. Ideas for CGS projects come from the local community, the majority via a simple project nomination form available in electronic and paper format.

Resource implications

- 21. The funding for the CGS capital programme from 2011 to 2021 was approved by the cabinet and is part of the Council's overall capital programme as detailed in the Capital Programme 2011–2021 report dated 21 June 2011.
- 22. The allocation of funding per ward for the CGS capital programme was approved by the Cabinet Member for Transport Environment and Recycling as detailed in the Launch of Cleaner Greener Safer Capital Programme 2015-16 report dated 6 August 2014.

- 23. The funding for the 2021/22 CGS capital programme was approved by the Cabinet Member for Environment, Transport Management and Air Quality as detailed in Allocation of funds to wards via Cleaner Greener Safer and Devolved Highways programmes report dated 20 December 2018.
- 24. All professional fees related to the project are also treated as the capital costs of the project. Where projects are awarded as a grant to organisations, the award amount announced at community council includes professional fees. The community council award notification to grant recipients details the grant amount only, excluding these fees.
- 25. CGS projects must be completed within two years of award of funding. Projects that are unlikely to be completed within two years will be reported to Community Council and available budgets may be reallocated to other projects. Revenue costs not covered by maintenance or the contractual liability period will fall upon the asset owner. The department will be notified of the likely costs before the schemes proceeds, in order to secure permission to implement the scheme.
- 26. After the defects and liability period, or three year maintenance period in the case of planting works, all future maintenance is assumed by the asset owner, for example Housing, Parks, Highways, or in some cases external asset owners. Therefore, there are no revenue implications to the Highways division as a result of approving the proposed allocation.
- 27. The total expenditure and sources of funding for the scheme will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall Capital Programme.
- 28. Value for money will be ensured when the contract is procured by following the Council's contract standing orders.

Consultation

29. All Cleaner Greener Safer projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents, Tenants and Residents Associations and local community groups where appropriate.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Governance

- 30. The Local Government Act 2000 ('the 2000 Act') gives the Leader the power to delegate any executive function to whoever lawfully can undertake the function. The allocation of the CGS capital fund is an executive function.
- 31. Multi Ward forums are 'area committees' within the meaning of the 2000 Act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the Leader. The terms of the delegation are set out in part 3H of the council's Constitution.

- 32. This report recommends that that West Central Multi Ward Forum approves the allocation of funds to the individual projects specified at Appendix 1. Paragraph 14, Part 3H of the Constitution enables Multi Ward Forums to approve "the allocation of neighbourhood funds, cleaner, greener, safer and devolved highway capital schemes of a local nature, using the resources and criteria identified by the cabinet".
- 33. Multi Ward Forums have further powers under Part 3H of the Constitution to oversee and take responsibility for the development and implementation of the local schemes.
- 34. In allocating funding under the CGS programme, Multi Ward Forums must have regard to the Council's equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties need to be considered in the body of the report in the Community Impact Statement above.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance – (CAP20/029)

- 35. This report seeks the approval of the West Central Multi Ward Forum for the allocation of funds (£ 447,619 + £ 39,148 reallocated from previous years) for the 2021-22 Cleaner Greener Safer (CGS) programme in the West Central Multi Ward Area from the list of applications set out in appendix 1.
- 36. The Strategic Director of Finance and Governance notes the resource implications in the report and that the proposed allocations will be contained within the CGS element of the Council's capital programme.
- 37. It is also noted that officers' time and any other costs connected with this recommendation will be contained within existing departmental revenue budgets.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the West Central Multi-ward Forum allocate a total of £150,000 of the Neighbourhoods Fund 2021-22 to the list of applications outlined in Appendix 1 subject to this funding being approved in the 2021-22 budget. This consists of £150,000 for 2021/22 and unallocated amount of £30,797 for 2020/21.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2. The Neighbourhoods Fund (NsF) was introduced in 2015 by merging two former revenue programmes known as Cleaner, Greener, Safer revenue (CGS) and Community Council Fund (CCF). The cabinet member for communities, employment and business authorised the amalgamation of the CGS revenue fund and community council fund into a single funding programme to create a new Neighbourhoods Fund for the 2015-16 round and onwards. This decision was taken on 12 December 2014.
- 3. The NsF has a borough-wide funding budget of £630,000 with an allocation of £10,000 per Councillor, for each ward. This is subject to the annual budget setting process.
- 4. The purpose of introducing the NsF was to give local areas decision-making powers over significant amounts of revenue funding that they could allocate to meet locally determined priorities.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

- 5. Each ward will have £10,000 per Councillor of revenue grants to allocate and it is proposed that any unallocated funds from the previous rounds (years) are to be carried forward and added to the financial year commencing 1 April 2021.
- 6. The Multi-ward forums will use the criteria set out below for the allocation of this funding:
 - a. Creating opportunities for people from different backgrounds to get on well together; (e.g. community cohesion);

- Establishing projects which encourage people to treat each other with respect and consideration (e.g. being a good neighbour, inter-generational contacts);
- c. Encouraging residents to be responsible for their own neighbourhood (e.g. community clean-ups; volunteering initiatives); and
- d. Specific measures to enhance a neighbourhood's environment (e.g. increased cleaning).
- 7. A Multi-ward forum may choose to allocate some of their NsF resources to their CGS capital allocations.
- 8. Subject to the availability of resources, the NsF may be used to 'buy' services from the council.
- 9. As with any executive decision taken by Multi-ward forums, this is subject to the council's existing scrutiny arrangements.

Community impact statement

- 10. The roles and functions of Multi-ward forums include the promotion of involving local people in the democratic process. Multi-ward forums take decisions on local matters, including environmental improvement and community safety, as well as consultation on a wide range of policies and strategies that affect the area.
- 11. An explicit objective within the Empowering Communities Programme (ward and Multi-ward forums) is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared mutual interest.
- 12. The allocation of the 2021-22 NsF West Central Multi-ward forum budget will in the main affect the people living in the North West area. However, in making the area a better place to live and improving life chances for local people, West Central Multi-ward forum NsF activities will have an impact on the whole of Southwark.
- 13. The NsF is an important tool in achieving community participation and cohesion.
- 14. In fulfilling the above objectives that Multi-ward forums have of bringing together and involving Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the council's duty under s. 149 of the Equality Act 2010 which requires the council to have due regard when taking decisions to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct;

- b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and those who do not share it; and
- c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
- d. The 'protected characteristics' under the Equality Act are age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, and sexual orientation.
- 15. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and those who do not share it is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need to:
 - Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
 - Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic; and
 - Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic to participate in public life or any other activity in which they are underrepresented.

Due consideration was given to an equalities impact assessment during the design of this awards process and no adverse impact was evident.

- 16. When undertaking the duties under section 149 the council must ensure:
 - The duty must be fulfilled before the decision in question is enacted;
 - The duty must be exercised in substance with 'rigour and an open mind'; it is not a matter of 'ticking boxes'; and
 - The duty is continuing; it does not end with the completion of any equality impact assessment, and due regard must be had as policy evolves and is implemented.

Resource implications

17. There are no resource implications.

Consultation

18. The NsF projects may require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents and tenants and residents associations where applicable.

Financial implications

- 19. The West Central Multi-ward forum NsF has been allocated a total of £150,000 for 2021-22. The unallocated amount of £30,797 for 2020/21
- 20. It is recommended that Multi-ward forums set aside some unallocated funds from previous years in order to prevent an over-allocation of funds, as well as to act as a contingency from which urgent or incidental requests can be funded throughout the year. It must also be noted that the unallocated figures reported in the previous paragraph represent current best estimates as the 2020-21 funding round is only finally over on 31 March 2021.
- 21. Due to the impact of COVID-19, there are some projects that will not be completed within the 2020-21 financial year. These projects have been reported to the West Central Multi-ward and any available funding will be allocated to other projects or carried over to the following financial year.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Governance

- 22. The Local Government Act 2000 ("the 2000 Act") gives the Leader the power to delegate any executive function to area committees. The allocation of the neighbourhoods fund is an executive function.
- 23. Multi Ward Forums are 'area committees' within the meaning of the 2000 Act.
- 24. The delegation can be found in Part 3H of the Constitution, which enables Multi Ward Forums to "approve the allocation of neighbourhood funds [to] cleaner, greener, safer and devolved highway capital schemes of a local nature using the resources and criteria identified by the cabinet."". This is therefore a decision that the Multi-ward Forum is empowered to take.
- 25. The Localism Act 2011 gives councils a general power of competence whereby they have power to do anything that individuals generally may do. This power can be used even if legislation already exists that allows a local authority to do the same thing. However the general power of competence does not enable a local authority to do anything which it was restricted or prevented from doing under the previous legislation.
- 26. The general power of competence includes the power to:
 - (a) incur expenditure;
 - (b) give financial assistance to any person;
 - (c) enter into arrangements or agreements with any person;
 - (d) co-operate with or facilitate or co-ordinate the activities of any person;
 - (e) exercise on behalf of any person any functions of that person; and
 - (f) provide staff, goods, services or accommodation to any person.

- 27. The provision of funding under the NsF falls within the scope of the kind of activities the council can undertake under the general power of competence as this includes the power to give financial assistance to any person.
- 28. In allocating funding under the NsF, multi-ward forums must have regard to the council's equality duties set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties have been considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 14, 15, and 16 of the report.
- 29. This report is recommending that the multi-ward forum approve the allocation of monies from the NsF 2021-22 as specified at Appendix 1.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance (FIN1241 – JB)

- 30. The 2021-22 budget allocation for the neighbourhoods fund will be agreed by council assembly as part of the budget setting process. The report notes the allocation is £10,000 per councillor by ward and thus £150,000 should be awarded to the West Central Multi Ward. The report allocates a further £30,797 from prior year allocations, this being the current estimate of the funds available at the conclusion of 2020-21.
- 31. Paragraph 19 notes the need to maintain a contingency element from the funding available for urgent or incidental requests. This is a prudent measure to assist in the effective running of the Neighbourhoods Fund. Paragraph 20 notes the likelihood of an increase in projects unable to complete in the current financial year and the options of carrying forward the funding or reallocation.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- That the West Central Multi-ward Forum approve the reallocation of underspent funds carried forward from previous years underspend, current programme underspend and current programme project cancellations.
- 2. That the West Central Multi-ward Forum approve the allocation of funds for the 2021-2022 Devolved Highways capital programme in the West Central Multi Ward Area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 3. The Council's non-principal road investment programme prioritises works on non-principal roads on a borough-wide basis and this investment forms the largest part of the annual investment programme.
- 4. Multi Ward areas are allocated a devolved fund of £800,000 each year from the total annual programme to spend on their priorities for highway renewal and maintenance that may not be prioritised as part of the borough-wide programme.
- 5. The financial provision for each community council is pro-rata by ward, as published in the Highways Capital Investment Programme 2014/15 report.
- 6. Commencing in 2017/18, the scope of the fund has been widened to permit the full range of minor traffic and highway capital schemes rather than solely like-for-like repair and replacement. Examples of the types of works which can now be funded include:
 - Footway and carriageway resurfacing;
 - Traffic calming:
 - Localised repairs;

- Accessibility improvements;
- Footway buildouts;
- Cycle hangars.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

- 7. There is £274,295 available for the 2021-2022 Devolved Highways programme for new projects in the West Central Multi Ward area.
- 8. There is £160,010 in additional funding from previous years underspend, current programme underspend and current programme project cancellations.

Policy implications

9. N/A

Community impact statement

- 10. The roles and functions of Multi Ward areas include the promotion of involvement of local people in the democratic process.
- 11. An explicit objective within Multi Ward areas is that they be used to actively engage as widely as possible with, and bring together, Southwark's diverse local communities on issues of shared or mutual interest. The Devolved Highway programme is an important tool in achieving community participation.
- 12. In fulfilling the above objectives of Multi Ward areas to bring together and involve Southwark's diverse local communities, consideration has also been given to the Council's duty under The Equality Act 2010 which requires the Council to have due regard when taking decisions to the need to:
 - a. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct:
 - b. Advance of equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristics and those who do not share it;
 - c. Foster good relations between those who share a relevant characteristic and those that do not share it.
- 13. Of particular regard are issues of age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation.
- 14. Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity is further defined in s.149 as having due regard to the need of:

- a. Remove or minimise disadvantages connected with a relevant protected characteristic;
- b. Take steps to meet the different needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic;
- Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic participate in public life or any other activity in which they are underrepresented.
- 15. Ideas for Devolved Highway projects come from the local community, the majority via a simple project nomination form available in electronic and paper format.

Resource implications

16. The total expenditure and sources of funding for the scheme will be monitored and reported on as part of the overall Capital Programme.

Consultation

17. All Devolved Highway projects require consultation with stakeholders, including the project applicant, local residents, Tenants and Residents Associations and local community groups where appropriate.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Director of Law and Governance

- 18. The Local Government Act 2000 ('the 2000 Act') gives the Leader the power to delegate any executive function to whoever lawfully can undertake the function. The allocation of the Devolved Highway capital fund is an executive function.
- 19. Multi Ward areas are 'area committees' within the meaning of the 2000 Act and executive functions can be delegated to them by the Leader. The terms of the delegation are set out in part 3H of the Council's Constitution.
- 20. This report recommends that the West Central Multi Ward area approves the allocation of funds to the individual projects specified at Appendix 1. Paragraph 14, Part 3H of the Constitution enables Multi Ward areas to approve "the allocation of funds to Devolved Highway schemes of a local nature, using the resources and criteria identified by the cabinet".
- 21. Multi Ward Areas have further have powers under paragraph 16, Part 3H of the Constitution to oversee and take responsibility for the development and implementation of the local schemes.

- 22. The Equality Act 2010 introduced the public sector equality duty, which merged existing race, sex and disability equality duties and extended them to include other protected characteristics; namely age, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, religion and belief and sex and sexual orientation, including marriage and civil partnership. In summary, those subject to the equality duty, which includes the Council, must in the exercise of their functions:
 - (i) have due regard to the need to eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation; and
 - (ii) foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not. Paragraph 12 of the report informs that the proposals will have no disproportionate impact on any particular age, disability, faith or religion and ethnicity and sexual orientation.
- 23. In allocating funding under the Devolved Highways programme, Multi Ward Areas must have regard to the Council's equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The report author has demonstrated how those duties need to be considered in the body of the report at paragraphs 12 to 14 In regard to the equality duty under the Act, the allocation of funds from the devolved highways capital programme does not impact on equality of opportunity and protected characteristics of persons within the local community.

Strategic Director of Finance and Governance (CAP20/034)

- 24. This report seeks the approval of the West Central Multi Ward area for the allocation of funds £274,295 for the 2021-22 Devolved Highway programme in the West Central Multi Ward Area from the list of applications set out in Appendix 1.
- 25. The Strategic Director of Finance and Governance notes the resource implications in the report that the proposed allocations will be contained within the council's capital programme.
- 26. It is also noted, that officers' time and any other costs connected with this recommendation will be contained within existing departmental revenue budgets.

What is a Housing Allocations Scheme?

An allocations scheme is a way of allocating social housing to eligible applicants on the housing register.

The process means that once a resident on the housing register apply for social housing, the Allocations Scheme then determines who should be prioritised and on what grounds. Our current scheme was set out in November 2013.



Aims of the proposed Consultation

- * Examine the existing Housing Allocations Scheme confirming this provides a fair process for allocating housing stock
- * Examine stakeholder's views on the Housing Allocations Scheme and the alignment with Southwark's Fairer futures commitments
- * Guidance on non statutory priority categories to be awarded reasonable preference.
- * Empower groups so they are able to buy into the changes made to the scheme.
- * Ensure local law centres and advocates are fully aware of the changes and leave little scope for challenges from these organisations.




