## RECOMMENDATION

- 1. That the licensing sub-committee considers an application made by Thanigasalam Senthuran and Kajananan Thanigasalam to vary the premises licence granted under the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of the premises known as the Local Express, 154 Jamaica Road, London SE16 4BD.
- 2. Notes:
  - a) The application seeks to vary the premises licence held in respect of the premises known as the Local Express – 154 Jamaica Road, London, SE16 4BD of the Licensing Act 2003. Existing permitted licensable activities are not under consideration at this meeting. The variation application is subject to representations submitted by two responsible authorities and is therefore referred to the licensing sub-committee for determination.
  - b) Paragraphs 8 to 11 of this report provides a summary of the current premises licence issued in respect of the premises. A copy of the current premises licence is attached as Appendix A.
  - c) Paragraphs 12 to 15 of this report provide a summary of the application. A copy of the application is attached to this report as Appendix B.
  - d) Paragraphs 16 to 18 of this report deal with the representation submitted in respect of the application. A copy of the representation is attached to this report as Appendix C. A map showing the location of the premises is attached to this report as Appendix D.
  - e) A copy of the council's approved procedure for hearings of the sub-committee in relation to an application made under the Licensing Act 2003, along with a copy of the hearing procedure, has been circulated to all parties to the meeting.

# **BACKGROUND INFORMATON**

# The Licensing Act 2003

- 3. The Licensing Act 2003 provides a licensing regime for:
  - The sale of and supply of alcohol
  - The provision of regulated entertainment
  - The provision of late night refreshment.
- 4. Within Southwark, the licensing responsibility is wholly administered by this council.
- 5. The Act requires the licensing authority to carry out its functions under the Act with a view to promoting the four stated licensing objectives. These are:
  - The prevention of crime and disorder
  - The promotion of public safety
  - The prevention of nuisance
  - The protection of children from harm.
- 6. In carrying out its licensing functions, a licensing authority must also have regard to:
  - The Act itself
  - The guidance to the act issued under Section 182 of the Act
  - Secondary regulations issued under the Act
  - The licensing authority's own statement of licensing policy
  - The application, including the operating schedule submitted as part of the application
  - Relevant representations.
- 7. The premises licence application process involves the provision of all relevant information required under the Act to the licensing authority with copies provided by the applicant to the relevant responsible bodies under the Act. The application must also be advertised at the premises and in the local press. The responsible authorities and other persons within the local community may make representations on any part of the application where relevant to the four licensing objectives.

## **KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION**

## The current premises licence

8. The current premises licence was issued on 9 October 2023 to Thanigasalam Senthuran and Kajananan Thanigasalam following a recent minor variation in relation to the internal lay out of the premises.

- 9. The hours on the current licence are:
  - The sale by retail of alcohol (off the premises):
    - Monday to Sunday: 09:00 to 00:00 (midnight)
  - Opening hours:
    - Monday to Sunday: 00:00 to 00:00 (24 hours per day)
- 10. The designated premises supervisor (DPS) is Thanigasalam Senthuran.
- 11. A copy of the current premises licence is attached as Appendix A.

## The variation application

- On 9 October 2023 Thanigasalam Senthuran and Kajananan Thanigasalam applied to this Council to vary the premises licence granted under the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of the premises known as Local Express, 154 Jamaica Road, London SE16 4BD.
- 13. The application is summarised as follows:

"Extend the current alcohol license to 24 hours. The shop is a 24 hour local convenient [sic] store, no alcohol is consumed on the premises."

- 14. The application seeks to allow the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises as follows:
  - Monday to Sunday: 00:00 to 00:00 (24 hour sales of alcohol).
- 15. A copy of the application is attached to this report as Appendix B.

## **Representations from responsible authorities**

- 16. A representation has been received from the licensing authority in their role as responsible authority.
- 17. The representation states that if the premises is granted a 24 hour licence to sell alcohol, this is likely to have a negative impact on the licensing objectives. Secondly, the premises already benefits from alcohol sales that are beyond those recommended in the Southwark statement of licensing policy.
- 18. A copy of the representation is available in Appendix C.

## **Representations from other persons**

19. There are no representations submitted by other persons.

# Conciliation

20. At the time of the writing of this report the representation had not been conciliated.

# **Premises licensing history**

- 21. On 11 February 2011 a premises licence was issued in respect of the premises to Mr Shahib Razaq. The premises licence allowed for the off sales of alcohol 7 daysa-week from 08:00 to 02:00, with 24 hour opening.
- 22. Following the introduction of the late night levy in Southwark, the premises applied to reduce their alcohol hours so that the additional fees would be avoided. The licence was then reissued on 1 September 2019.
- 23. On 3 February 2022, the licence was transferred to the current licence holder along with a vary DPS application.
- 24. A minor variation was received in September 2023 to amend the internal layout, producing the current licence.

## Temporary event notices

25. There is no history of temporary event notices at the premises.

## Complaints

26. There are no recent complaints to licensing in relation to the premises.

27. A map showing the location of the premises is attached to this report as Appendix F. Similar premises in the locality (100 metres) include:

  - Monday to Sunday: 24 hours

- Opening hours:
  - Monday to Sunday: 24 hours

## Southwark Council statement of licensing policy

- 28. Council assembly approved Southwark's statement of licensing policy 2021-2026 on 25 November 2020 and it came into effect on 1 January 2021.
- 29. Sections of the statement that are considered to be of particular relevance to the sub-committee's consideration are:
  - Section 3 Purpose and scope of the policy. This reinforces the four licensing objectives and the fundamental principles upon which this authority relies in determining licence applications
  - Section 5 Determining applications for premises licences and club premises certificates. This explains how the policy works and considers issues such as location; high standards of management; and the principles behind condition setting.
  - Section 6 Local cumulative impact policies. This sets out this authority's approach to cumulative impact and defines the boundaries of the current special policy areas and the classifications of premises to which they apply. To be read in conjunction with Appendix B to the policy.
  - Section 7 Hours of operation. This provides a guide to the hours of licensed operation that this authority might consider appropriate by type of premises and (planning) area classification.
  - Section 8 The prevention of crime and disorder. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the first licensing objective.
  - Section 9 Public safety. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the second licensing objective.
  - Section 10 The prevention of nuisance. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the third licensing objective.
  - Section 11 The protection of children from harm. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the fourth licensing objective.
- 30. The purpose of Southwark's statement of licensing policy is to make clear to applicants what considerations will be taken into account when determining applications and should act as a guide to the sub-committee when considering the applications. However, the sub-committee must always consider each application on its own merits and allow exceptions to the normal policy where these are justified by the circumstances of the application.

31. Members should take into consideration both the Southwark statement of licensing policy and the Section 182 Guidance when making decisions. The links for these are below:

## Cumulative impact area (CIA)

- 32. The premises are situated outside of a cumulative impact area but listed as a residential area.
- 33. Under the Southwark statement of licensing policy 2021 2026 the following closing times are recommended as appropriate within this area for premises operating as:
  - Closing time for off licences and alcohol sales in grocers and supermarkets is 23:00 daily

## Climate change implications

- 34. Following council assembly on 14 July 2021, the council is committed to considering the climate change implications of any decisions.
- 35. Climate change is not a legal factor in the consideration of a grant of a premises license under the current licensing objectives, however members can make enquiries and request an agreement from applicants to promote the reduction of the impact of climate change that may be caused by the operation of the premises.
- 36. Examples of such agreements may be:
  - Not use single use plastics, such as disposable plastic glasses, when selling alcohol at the premises.
  - Encourage patrons not to drive to venues by providing details of public transport on their webpages/tickets.

# Community, equalities (including socio-economic) and health impacts

## Community impact statement

38. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

## Equalities (including socio-economic) impact statement

- 39. This report does not result in a policy decision and each application is required to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account. In considering the recommendations of this report, due regard must be given to the public sector equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. This requires the council to consider all individuals when carrying out its functions.
- 40. Importantly, the council must have due regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation, or other prohibited conduct; advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations between people who have protected characteristics and those who do not. The relevant protected characteristics are age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation. The public sector equality duty also applies to marriage and civil partnership, but only in relation to the need to eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation, or other prohibited conduct.

## Health impact statement

43. Health impacts cannot be considered by law when making decisions under the Licensing Act 2003.

## **Resource implications**

44. A fee of £190.00 has been paid by the applicant company in respect of this application being the statutory fee payable for premises within non-domestic rateable value B.

# Consultation

45. Consultation has been carried out on this application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. A public notice was published in a local newspaper and similar notices were exhibited outside of the premises for a period of 28 consecutive days at both the front and rear of the premises.

# SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

## Assistant Chief Executive – Governance and Assurance

- 46. The sub-committee is asked to determine the application for a premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 47. The principles which sub-committee members must apply are set out below.

## Principles for making the determination

- 48. The sub-committee is asked to determine the application for a premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 49. The principles which sub-committee members must apply are set out below.
- 50. The general principle is that applications for premises licence applications must be granted unless relevant representations are received. This is subject to the proviso that the applicant has complied with regulations in advertising and submitting the application.
- 51. Relevant representations are those which:
  - Are about the likely effect of the granting of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives
  - Are made by an interested party or responsible authority
  - Have not been withdrawn
  - Are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority, frivolous or vexatious.
- 52. If relevant representations are received then the sub-committee must have regard to them, in determining whether it is necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives to:
  - To grant the licence subject to:
    - The conditions mentioned in section 18 (2)(a) modified to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives
    - Any condition which must under section 19, 20 or 21 be included in the licence.

- To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.
- To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor.
- To reject the application.

# Conditions

- 53. The sub-committee's discretion is thus limited. It can only modify the conditions put forward by the applicant, or refuse the application, if it is necessary to do so. Conditions must be necessary and proportionate for the promotion of one of the four licensing objectives, and not for any other reason. Conditions must also be within the control of the licensee, and should be worded in a way which is clear, certain, consistent and enforceable.
- 54. The four licensing objectives are:
  - The prevention of crime and disorder
  - Public safety
  - The prevention of nuisance
  - The protection of children from harm.
- 55. Members should note that each objective is of equal importance. There are no other licensing objectives, and the four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.
- 56. Conditions will not be necessary if they duplicate a statutory position. Conditions relating to night café and take away aspect of the license must relate to the night time operation of the premises and must not be used to impose conditions which could not be imposed on day time operators.
- 57. Members are also referred to the Home Office Revised Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 on conditions, specifically section 10.

## Reasons

58. If the sub-committee determines that it is necessary to modify the conditions, or to refuse the application for a premises licence application, it must give reasons for its decision.

## Hearing procedures

- 59. Subject to the licensing hearing regulations, the licensing committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that:
  - The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Cross examination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations.
  - Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing.

- The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to:
  - Address the authority
  - If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
  - In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
- The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant to the particular application before the committee and the licensing objectives.
- The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
- In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.
- 60. This matter relates to the determination of an application for a premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regulation 26(1) (a) requires the sub-committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

## Council's multiple roles and the role of the licensing sub-committee

- 61. Sub-committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the council as authority responsible respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health and safety and as the planning authority.
- 62. Members should note that the licensing sub-committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The sub-committee sits in quasi-judicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing of the application. In this case, members should disregard the council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the licensing law, guidance and the council's statement of licensing policy.
- 63. As a quasi-judicial body the licensing sub-committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The sub-committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The licensing sub-committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.

- 64. The licensing sub-committee is entitled to consider events outside of the premises if they are relevant, i.e. are properly attributable to the premises being open. The proprietors do not have to be personally responsible for the incidents for the same to be relevant. However, if such events are not properly attributable to the premises being open, then the evidence is not relevant and should be excluded. Guidance is that the licensing authority will primarily focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, working or engaged in normal activity in the area concerned.
- 65. Members will be aware of the council's code of conduct which requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The code applies to members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.
- 66. The sub-committee can only consider matters within the application that have been raised through representations from other persons and responsible authorities. Interested parties must live in the vicinity of the premises. This will be decided on a case to case basis.
- 67. Under the Human Rights Act 1998, the sub-committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The sub-committee has a duty under Section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent crime and disorder in the borough.
- 68. Other persons, responsible authorities and the applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the sub-committee to the magistrates' court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against.

## Guidance

69. Members are required to have regard to the Home Office guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood, members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.

## Strategic Director, Finance

70. The head of regulatory services has confirmed that the costs of this process over and above the application fee are borne by the service.



#### Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

100 No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence -

(a). At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence; or

(b). At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended.

**101** Every supply of alcohol under the Premises Licence must be made, or authorised by, a person who holds a Personal Licence.

**488** (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

(3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either

(a) a holographic mark; or

(b) an ultraviolet feature.

**491** 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

2. For the purpose of the condition set out in paragraph (1):(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula

#### $\mathsf{P} = \mathsf{D} + (\mathsf{D} \times \mathsf{V}),$

where-

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale

or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence –

(i) the holder of the premises licence:

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence; or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(iv) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

When alcohol is not for sale, the area where it is available during licensable hours will be blocked off so that the public cannot have access to it. A clear notice stating "Alcohol is not for sale between 01:00hrs and 09:00hrs" shall be displayed during these hours at the entrance to the area where alcohol is offered for sale during the licensable hours. The signage shall be kept free from obstruction at all times.

We object to the grant of an application to vary a premises licence, submitted by Mr Thanigasalam Senthuran & Kajananan Thanigasalam under The Licensing Act 2003 (the Act), in respect of the premises known as Local Express, 154 Jamaica Road, London, SE16 4RT.

## 1. The extant licence –

The extant premises licence (licence number 881220) allows for licensable activities and opening hours as follows –

## The sale of alcohol to be consumed on the premises:

Monday - Sunday: 09:00 – 00:00 (midnight)

## The opening hours of the premises are:

## Monday - Sunday: 00:00 – 00:00 (24 hour opening)

The premises are a convenience store.

A copy of licence 881220 is attached as appendix 1.

## 2. The variation application –

The purpose of the variation is described in the application as follows (verbatim) -

• "Extend the current Alcohol license to 24 Hours. The shop is a 24 Hour local convenient store, no alcohol is consumed on the premises."

The application seeks to allow the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises as follows:

## The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises:

Monday to Sunday: 00:00 – 00:00 (24 hour sales of alcohol)

## 2. The Locale

The premises are located towards approximately half way along Jamaica Road, which is a busy thoroughfare. The premises are in a parade of shops in close proximity to Bermondsey Tube Station and local bus stops. The area has many high-density residential housing estates / blocks in the immediate and wider vicinity of the premises, in all directions. A map of the local area is attached as appendix 2. Photographs showing the premises and its immediate

surroundings (including residential dwellings adjacent to, and in close proximity to, the premises) are attached as appendix 3.

## 4. Our objection

According to section 7 of this council's statement of licensing policy 2021 – 2026 (the SoLP), the premises fall within a residential area.

A copy of the SoLP is available via:

Licensing and Gambling Act policy - Southwark Council

The following closing times are recommended in our SoLP in respect of the type of licensed premises located residential areas as follows –

Off licences and alcohol sales in grocers and supermarkets:

Monday - Sunday: 23:00

Our objection relates to the promotion of all the licensing objectives.

In the interest of transparency, the section 7 of the SoLP relates to 'closing times'. The premises is *already* permitted to open for 24 hours.

Notwithstanding the above, we say that the 24 hour sale of alcohol is likely to have a negative effect on the promotion of all of the licensing objectives and be detrimental to the quality of life for local residents.

Anecdotally, my experience (as a licensing officer for 16 years) is that off-licenses that allow for the 24 hour sale of alcohol often attract problem drinkers (e.g. alcoholics, street drinkers and / or people with substance abuse problems), post club / late night venue attendees who wish to consume alcohol further (to 'carry the party on') after the venues they have attended have shut, and also people from outside the area who wish to purchase alcohol because their locale does not have premises selling alcohol 24 hours a day.

Again, anecdotally, I contend that off-licences allowing for the 24 hour sale of alcohol often become a hub for irresponsible alcohol consumers and often contribute disproportionately to crime and disorder in the area that they are located in.

Although the SoLP relates to 'closing times', rather than the times permitted for licensable activities, I contend that it is sensible that recommended closing times, and the terminal hours for licensable activities should be considered equitable.

Premises selling alcohol late at night, or into the early morning, have increased risk factors. We do not think it is appropriate to allow premises to sell alcohol 24 hours a day in a residential area.

I do note however that originally the premises licence (number 833499) issued in respect of the premises allowed for alcohol sales until 01:00 hours. These hours were amended by the prior licensee, on 12 August 2019, to finish at 00:00 (midnight), i.e. the current permitted hours for the sale of alcohol, to avoid the prior licensee having to pay the late night levy.

# I strongly object to the proposal for the 24 hour sale of alcohol.

I also object to *any* extension of the hours permitted for the sale of alcohol, however should the licensing sub-committee be minded to grant any extension to the hours permitted for the sale of alcohol we suggest that a maximum daily terminal hour for the sale of alcohol of 01:00 be considered.

If *any* extension of hours is granted by the licensing sub-committee we recommend the following amendments to existing licence conditions, and additional licence conditions, to address the licensing objectives be considered:

## Conditions 288, 289 and 351 to be replaced by the following:

- That a digital CCTV system shall be installed at the premises, shall be maintained in full working order and shall be continually recording at all times that the premises are in use. The CCTV system must be capable of capturing a clear facial image of every person who enters the premises. The CCTV system shall be correctly time and date stamped at all times. The CCTV system shall cover all interior and exterior areas of the premises, including the frontage of the premises, and shall collect clearly defined / focused footage.
- That all CCTV footage shall be kept for a period of thirty one (31) days and shall be made immediately available to responsible authority officers on request.
- That a member of staff shall be on duty at all times that the premises are in use, who is trained in the use of the CCTV system and who is able to view, and download to a removable storage device, CCTV footage at the immediate request of responsible authority officers.
- That clearly legible signage shall be prominently displayed where it can easily be seen and read by customers advising to the effect that CCTV is in operation at the premises. The signage shall be kept free from obstructions at all times.

### Condition 348 to be replaced by the following:

- That an incident log shall be kept at the premises to record details of any of the following occurrences at the premises:
  - I. Instances of anti-social or disorderly behaviour
  - II. Calls to the police or other emergency services
  - III. Any complaints received
  - IV. Ejections of people from the premises
  - V. Visits to the premises by the local authority or emergency services
  - VI. Any malfunction in respect of the CCTV system
  - VII. All crimes reported by customers, or observed by staff
  - VIII. Any other relevant incidents

The incident log shall record the time, date, location in the premises and description of each incident, details of any action taken in respect of the incident and the printed name of the person reporting the incident and. The incident log shall be available / be accessible at the premises at all times that the premises are in use, and shall be made immediately available to responsible authority officers on request. Details of incidents shall be recorded contemporaneously. If the incident log is a paper hardcopy then the signature of the person reporting the incident in the log shall also be included. All relevant staff employed at the premises shall be trained in the use of the incident log. Details of such training, including the printed name(s) of the trainee(s) and the date(s) that the training was given, shall be recorded in the staff

training logs at the premises.

Further to the control measures proposed in part 'm' of the application, the following conditions are also recommended, should the licensing sub-committee be minded to grant any extension to the hours permitted for the sale of alcohol :

- That a minimum of 16 HD CCTV camera are installed at the premises, covering all public areas.
- That the premises is fitted with automatic doors that can be locked by operating switches away from the entrance. All relevant staff employed at the premises shall be trained in the use of the operating switches. Details of such training, including the printed name(s) of the trainee(s) and the date(s) that the training was given, shall be recorded in the staff training logs at the premises.
- That at any time that alcohol shall be sold after 00:00 (midnight), a minimum of three (3) staff shall be employed, and on duty on the shop floor of the premises at all times.

In addition to the above, we also recommend the following addition conditions:

- That all relevant staff shall be trained in their responsibilities under the Licensing Act 2003, the promotion of the licensing objectives and the terms and conditions of this licence. Records pertaining to such training ('the staff training logs') shall be kept at the premises, shall be updated every 6 months and shall be made immediately available to responsible authority officers on request. The training logs shall include the trainee's name (in block capitals), the trainer's name (in block capitals), the date(s) of training and a declaration that the training has been received and understood by the trainee. If the staff training logs are a paper hardcopy then the signature of the trainee, the signature of the trainer shall be included.
- That a written record of all staff authorised to sell alcohol at the premises shall be kept at the premises and will be made available to responsible authority officers immediately on request. The authorisation record shall include the name and address of the premises, the name of the licensee, the name of the DPS and the names, addresses and dates of birth of all staff authorised to sell alcohol at the premises.
- That clearly legible signage shall be prominently displayed where it can easily be seen and read by customers, at all exits from the premises and in any external areas, requesting to the effect that customers leave the premises and locale in a quiet and orderly manner with respect to local residents. Such signage shall be kept free from obstructions at all times.
- That any 'off sales' of alcohol shall be provided in sealed containers to be taken away from the premises.
- That clearly legible signage shall be prominently displayed where it can easily be seen and read by customers at all exits requesting to the effect that customers do not consume alcoholic drinks bought at the premises in the vicinity of the premises. Such signage shall be kept free from obstructions at all times.
- That if and when required, staff shall interact with customers to ensure that customers behave at the premises in a quiet and orderly manner and also leave the premises and locale in a quiet and orderly manner. Customers deemed by staff to be engaging in

anti-social behaviour shall be asked to leave the premises. Staff shall be trained in this and details of such training, including the printed name(s) of the trainee(s) and the date(s) that the training was given, shall be recorded in the staff training logs at the premises and shall be made immediately available to responsible authority officers on request.

We reiterate that we suggest this application is refused and that *no* extension to the hours permitted for the sale of alcohol is granted.

100 No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence -(a). At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence; or (b). At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended. 101 Every supply of alcohol under the Premises Licence must be made, or authorised by, a person who holds a Personal Licence. 488 (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol. (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy. (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served

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alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either

(a) a holographic mark; or

(b) an ultraviolet feature.

**491** 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

2. For the purpose of the condition set out in paragraph (1):

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula  $P = D + (D \times V),$ 

where-

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale

or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence –

(i) the holder of the premises licence:

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence; or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(iv) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
(v)"value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

Where the permitted price given by paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
 (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax;
 (2) the permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the

period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

#### Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

255 That a fire precaution system shall be installed at the premises.293 That all staff shall undertake a recognised training scheme in respect of the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor.

**340** All staff involved in the sale of alcohol shall be trained in the age check 'Challenge 25' policy. A record of their training, including the dates that each member of staff is trained, shall be available for inspection at the premises on request by Council authorised officers or the Police.

**341** Age check or 'Challenge 25' signage shall be displayed at entrances to the premises, areas where alcohol is displayed for sale and at points of sale to inform customers that an age check 'Challenge 25' policy applies and proof of age may be required.

**342** A register of refused sales of alcohol shall be maintained in order to demonstrate effective operation of the policy. The register shall be available for inspection at the premises on request by Council authorised officers or the Police.

**343** That alcohol shall be stored and / or displayed away from the front entrance / exit at the premises

**345** That shop front and door shutters shall be installed at the premises.

**346** That an intruder alarm shall be installed at the premises.

347 That health and safety and fire risk assessments shall be devised in respect of the premises and revised periodically or whenever the operation of the premises changes. The risk assessments shall be kept at the premises and be made available to council officers on request348 That an incident log shall be maintained at the premises.

**349** That the premises and the area immediately outside of the premises shall be maintained in a clean and tidy manner.

**350** No Beers, lagers or ciders in single cans, bottles or multi – packs with an ABV of more than 6.5% will be displayed, sold or offered for sale from the premises.

288 An approved CCTV system shall be installed at the premises that records clear images of both the interior and the exterior of the premises. The CCTV installed inside the premises shall be positioned to capture the sale of alcohol and tobacco products
289 The CCTV system shall have a minimum of 31 days recording facility and will be mainytained in full working order at all times and be

continually recording at all times the premises is in use under the licence. The CCTV system must be capable of capturing a clear facial image of every person who enters the premises. All CCTV footage shall be kept for a period of thiry one (31) days and shall. Upon request, be made immediately available to the Police and /or Authorised Officers from Southwark Council.


**351** All Staff working at the premises shall be trained and be fully conversant in the correct operation of the CCTV and be able to demonstrate its operation on immediate request by Police and /or Authorised Officers from Southwark Council.

**352** When alcohol is not for sale, the area where it is available during licensable hours will be blocked off so that the public cannot have access to it. A clear notice stating "Alcohol is not for sale between 01:00hrs and 09:00hrs" shall be displayed during these hours at the entrance to the area where alcohol is offered for sale during the licensable hours. The signage shall be kept free from obstruction at all times.









