## RECOMMENDATION

1. That the licensing sub-committee considers an application made by Nine Food Group Limited for the grant of a new premises licence granted under the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of the premises known as Pizza Hut, 35 Vestry Road, London SE5 8PG.
2. Notes:
  - a) The application is for a new premises licence in respect of the premises known as Pizza Hut, 35 Vestry Road, London SE5 8PG.
  - b) The application was subject to two representations from two Responsible Authorities (Metropolitan Police/Trading Standards) which have been conciliated with agreed conditions. There are two outstanding representations from local residents and this matter is therefore referred to the licensing sub-committee for determination.
  - c) Paragraphs 8 of this report provides a summary of the application. A copy of the application is attached as Appendix A.
  - d) Paragraphs 9 to 13 of this report provide a summary of the representations received. A copy of the representations received are attached to this report as Appendix B and C.
  - e) A map showing the location of the premises is attached to this report as Appendix D.
  - f) A copy of the council's approved procedure for hearings of the sub-committee in relation to an application made under the Licensing Act 2003, along with a copy of the hearing procedure, has been circulated to all parties to the meeting.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

### **The Licensing Act 2003**

3. The Licensing Act 2003 provides a licensing regime for:
  - The sale of and supply of alcohol
  - The provision of regulated entertainment
  - The provision of late night refreshment.
4. Within Southwark, the licensing responsibility is wholly administered by this council.
5. The Act requires the licensing authority to carry out its functions under the Act with a view to promoting the four stated licensing objectives. These are:
  - The prevention of crime and disorder
  - The promotion of public safety
  - The prevention of nuisance
  - The protection of children from harm.
6. In carrying out its licensing functions, a licensing authority must also have regard to:
  - The Act itself
  - The guidance to the act issued under Section 182 of the Act
  - Secondary regulations issued under the Act
  - The licensing authority's own statement of licensing policy
  - The application, including the operating schedule submitted as part of the application
  - Relevant representations.
7. The premises licence application process involves the provision of all relevant information required under the Act to the licensing authority with copies provided by the applicant to the relevant responsible bodies under the Act. The application must also be advertised at the premises and in the local press. The responsible authorities and other persons within the local community may make representations on any part of the application where relevant to the four licensing objectives.

## **KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION**

### **The application for a premises licence**

8. On 10 March 2023 Nine Food Group Limited applied to this council for the grant of a premises licence for the premises known as Pizza Hut, 35 Vestry Road, London, SE5 8PG for the following licensable activities (times amended following conciliation with Licensing as a responsible authority):
  - Late night refreshment - indoors for delivery and takeaway
    - Monday to Sunday: 23:00 to 00:00

- Opening hours:
  - Monday to Sunday: 11:00 to 00:00
- A summary of the Applicant's description and intended use of the premises below:
  - Pizza hut selling hot food delivery and takeaway

### **Representations from responsible authorities**

9. The environmental protection team (EPT) oppose the application and rely on Southwark's statement of licensing policy that provides that takeaways are not appropriate for the area. Furthermore, the operating schedule does not fully address public nuisance issues. In the event that the licensing sub-committee being minded to grant a premises licence, EPT suggest conditions regarding the external plant and kitchen extraction systems that should be imposed.
10. Licensing as a responsible authority also objected to the application on the basis that Southwark's statement of licensing policy states that the premises are with a residential area and that takeaways are not considered appropriate for the area. In addition, the applicant also failed to provide suitable measures to promote the licensing objectives.
11. Licensing as a responsible authority suggested a number of conditions including: a reduction in opening hours, the installation of CCTV and associated staff training, incident recording, delivery drivers to turn off engines whilst waiting for or collecting orders and appropriate signage regarding noise nuisance to be displayed. Following consultation, the applicant agreed conditions and reduced the opening and operating hours and the licensing authority have withdrawn their representation.
12. A copy of the representations submitted by the responsible authorities and in the case of Licensing agreed conditions are attached as Appendix B.

### **Representations from other persons**

13. There are a total of 32 "Other persons" all local residents Their representations are summarised below:
  - There will be increased noise nuisance as patrons congregate around the premises
  - Anti-social behaviour will increase with shouting and fighting
  - Children will have their sleep disturbed
  - The premises are not suitable as this is a residential area defined in Southwark's licensing policy
  - There will be an increase in late night traffic and accordingly a rise in delivery drivers riding recklessly
  - An increase in litter form already high levels since the premises opened which in turn attracts vermin

- Idling delivery bikes will increase noise and pollution levels
- Delivery bikes already park illegally by the pedestrian crossing making it unsafe to use and this would increase with extended opening hours.

## **Conciliation**

14. All representations have been sent to the applicant, at the time of writing this report, the representations from EPT and other persons remain outstanding.

## **Premises licensing history**

15. This is an application for a new premises licence. There is no previous licensing history associated with the premises

## **Map**

16. A map showing the location of the premises is attached to this report as Appendix C. There is only one other licensed premises in the locality (100m):

### **Nisa Local 76 Vestry Road, London SE5 8PQ**

- Opening hours:
  - Monday to Sunday: 24 hours
- Sale by retail of alcohol to be consumed off premises:
  - Monday to Sunday: 07:00 to 23:00.

## **Southwark Council statement of licensing policy**

17. Council assembly approved Southwark's statement of licensing policy 2021-2026 on 25 November 2020 and it came into effect on 1 January 2021.
18. Sections of the statement that are considered to be of particular relevance to the sub-committee's consideration are:
  - Section 3 – Purpose and scope of the policy. This reinforces the four licensing objectives and the fundamental principles upon which this authority relies in determining licence applications.
  - Section 5 – Determining applications for premises licences and club premises certificates. This explains how the policy works and considers issues such as location; high standards of management; and the principles behind condition setting.
  - Section 6 – Local cumulative impact policies. This sets out this authority's approach to cumulative impact and defines the boundaries of the current special policy areas and the classifications of premises to which they apply. To be read in conjunction with Appendix B to the policy.

- Section 7 – Hours of operation. This provides a guide to the hours of licensed operation that this Authority might consider appropriate by type of premises and (planning) area classification.
  - Section 8 – The prevention of crime and disorder. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the first licensing objective.
  - Section 9 – Public safety. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the second licensing objective.
  - Section 10 – The prevention of nuisance. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the third licensing objective.
  - Section 11 – The protection of children from harm. This provides general guidance on the promotion of the fourth licensing objective.
19. The purpose of Southwark's statement of licensing policy is to make clear to applicants what considerations will be taken into account when determining applications and should act as a guide to the sub-committee when considering the applications. However, the sub-committee must always consider each application on its own merits and allow exceptions to the normal policy where these are justified by the circumstances of the application.
20. Members should take into consideration both the Southwark statement of licensing policy and the Section 182 Guidance when making decisions. The links for these are below:

### **Cumulative impact area (CIA)**

21. The premises are not situated in a cumulative impact area. The premises are situated in a residential area. According to Southwark's statement of licensing policy 2021 – 2026, the following closing times are recommended as appropriate within this area for the categories of premises stated:
- Restaurants:
    - Monday to Sunday: 23:00

- Public houses, wine bars or other drinking establishments
  - Monday to Sunday: 23:00
- Hotels, hotel bars and guest houses:
  - No restrictions for residents
- Nightclubs (with 'sui generis' planning classification)
  - not appropriate for this area
- Off-licences and alcohol sales in grocers and supermarkets
  - Monday to Sunday: 23:00
- Takeaway
  - not appropriate for this area
- Cinemas and theatres
  - Monday to Sunday: 23:00
- Vessels
  - Monday to Sunday: 23:00
- Qualifying members club:
  - Monday to Sunday: 23:00.

### **Climate change implications**

22. Following council assembly on 14 July 2021, the council is committed to considering the climate change implications of any decisions.
23. Climate change is not a legal factor in the consideration of a grant of a premises license under the current licensing objectives, however members can make enquiries and request an agreement from applicants to promote the reduction of the impact of climate change that may be caused by the operation of the premises.
24. Examples of such agreements may be:
  - Not use single use plastics, such as disposable plastic glasses, when selling alcohol at the premises.
  - Encourage patrons not to drive to venues by providing details of public transport on their webpages/tickets.

## **Community, equalities (including socio-economic) and health impacts**

### **Community impact statement**

26. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

### **Equalities (including socio-economic) impact statement**

27. This report does not result in a policy decision and each application is required to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account. In considering the recommendations of this report, due regard must be given to the public sector equality duty set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. This requires the Council to consider all individuals when carrying out its functions.
28. Importantly, the council must have due regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation, or other prohibited conduct; advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations between people who have protected characteristics and those who do not. The relevant protected characteristics are age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, sexual orientation. The public sector equality duty also applies to marriage and civil partnership, but only in relation to the need to eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation, or other prohibited conduct.

### **Health impact statement**

31. Health impacts cannot be considered by law when making decisions under the Licensing Act 2003.

## **Resource implications**

32. A fee of £100.00 has been paid by the applicant company in respect of this application being the statutory fee payable for premises within non-domestic rateable value A.

## **Consultation**

33. Consultation has been carried out on this application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. A public notice was published in a local newspaper and similar notices were exhibited outside of the premises for a period of 28 consecutive days.

## **Community impact statement**

34. Each application is required by law to be considered upon its own individual merits with all relevant matters taken into account.

## **SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS**

### **Assistant Chief Executive – Governance and Assurance**

35. The sub-committee is asked to determine the application for a premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.
36. The principles which sub-committee members must apply are set out below.

### **Principles for making the determination**

37. The sub-committee is asked to determine the application for a premises licence under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.
38. The principles which sub-committee members must apply are set out below.
39. The general principle is that applications for premises licence applications must be granted unless relevant representations are received. This is subject to the proviso that the applicant has complied with regulations in advertising and submitting the application.
40. Relevant representations are those which:
- Are about the likely effect of the granting of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives
  - Are made by an interested party or responsible authority
  - Have not been withdrawn
  - Are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority, frivolous or vexatious.



41. If relevant representations are received then the sub-committee must have regard to them, in determining whether it is necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives to:
- To grant the licence subject to:
    - The conditions mentioned in section 18 (2)(a) modified to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives
    - Any condition which must under section 19, 20 or 21 be included in the licence.
  - To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.
  - To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor.
  - To reject the application.

## **Conditions**

42. The sub-committee's discretion is thus limited. It can only modify the conditions put forward by the applicant, or refuse the application, if it is necessary to do so. Conditions must be necessary and proportionate for the promotion of one of the four licensing objectives, and not for any other reason. Conditions must also be within the control of the licensee, and should be worded in a way which is clear, certain, consistent and enforceable.
43. The four licensing objectives are:
- The prevention of crime and disorder
  - Public safety
  - The prevention of nuisance
  - The protection of children from harm.
44. Members should note that each objective is of equal importance. There are no other licensing objectives, and the four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.
45. Conditions will not be necessary if they duplicate a statutory position. Conditions relating to night café and take away aspect of the license must relate to the night time operation of the premises and must not be used to impose conditions which could not be imposed on day time operators.
46. Members are also referred to the Home Office Revised Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 on conditions, specifically section 10.

## **Reasons**

47. If the sub-committee determines that it is necessary to modify the conditions, or to refuse the application for a premises licence application, it must give reasons for its decision.

## **Hearing procedures**

48. Subject to the licensing hearing regulations, the licensing committee may determine its own procedures. Key elements of the regulations are that:

- The hearing shall take the form of a discussion led by the authority. Cross examination shall not be permitted unless the authority considered that it is required for it to consider the representations.
- Members of the authority are free to ask any question of any party or other person appearing at the hearing.
- The committee must allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights to:
  - Address the authority
  - If given permission by the committee, question any other party.
  - In response to a point which the authority has given notice it will require clarification, give further information in support of their application.
- The committee shall disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant to the particular application before the committee and the licensing objectives.
- The hearing shall be in public, although the committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in private.
- In considering any representations or notice made by a party the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.

49. This matter relates to the determination of an application for a premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. Regulation 26(1) (a) requires the sub-committee to make its determination at the conclusion of the hearing.

## **Council's multiple roles and the role of the licensing sub-committee**

50. Sub-committee members will note that, in relation to this application, the council has multiple roles. Council officers from various departments have been asked to consider the application from the perspective of the council as authority responsible

respectively for environmental health, trading standards, health and safety and as the planning authority.

51. Members should note that the licensing sub-committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of licensing authority. The sub-committee sits in quasi-judicial capacity, and must act impartially. It must offer a fair and unbiased hearing of the application. In this case, members should disregard the council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the licensing law, guidance and the council's statement of licensing policy.
52. As a quasi-judicial body the licensing sub-committee is required to consider the application on its merits. The sub-committee must take into account only relevant factors, and ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, that is to say material, which tends logically to show the existence or non-existence of relevant facts, or the likelihood or unlikelihood of the occurrence of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The licensing sub-committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representations to them.
53. The licensing sub-committee is entitled to consider events outside of the premises if they are relevant, i.e. are properly attributable to the premises being open. The proprietors do not have to be personally responsible for the incidents for the same to be relevant. However, if such events are not properly attributable to the premises being open, then the evidence is not relevant and should be excluded. Guidance is that the licensing authority will primarily focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, working or engaged in normal activity in the area concerned.
54. Members will be aware of the council's code of conduct which requires them to declare personal and prejudicial interests. The code applies to members when considering licensing applications. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, members are required to avoid both actual bias, and the appearance of bias.
55. The sub-committee can only consider matters within the application that have been raised through representations from other persons and responsible authorities. Interested parties must live in the vicinity of the premises. This will be decided on a case to case basis.
56. Under the Human Rights Act 1998, the sub-committee needs to consider the balance between the rights of the applicant and those making representations to the application when making their decision. The sub-committee has a duty under section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 when making its decision to do all it can to prevent crime and disorder in the borough.
57. Other persons, responsible authorities and the applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the sub-committee to the magistrates' court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the applicant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision to be appealed against.

## Guidance

58. Members are required to have regard to the Home Office guidance in carrying out the functions of licensing authority. However, guidance does not cover every possible situation, so long as the guidance has been properly and carefully understood, members may depart from it if they have reason to do so. Full reasons must be given if this is the case.

## Strategic Director of Finance and Governance

59. The head of regulatory services has confirmed that the costs of this process over and above the application fee are borne by the service.
