Good morning,

Southwark School Streets Programme aims to create a pleasant environment that feels safer in the immediate vicinity of a school, discourage travelling to school by car in cases where alternative means of travel are available, and encourage walking, scooting and cycling to school, thereby achieving positive health outcomes for the school community.

The programme aims to meet the following objectives:

- 1. Improve road safety outside the vicinity of the school entrance.
- 2. Provide a healthier environment and improve local air quality outside schools for vulnerable user groups.
- 3. Encourage the use of active travel, such as walking, cycling, scooting or park and stride.

We have seen positive results of the school streets, especially with regards to road safety and improvements in air quality outside of the schools. Please note that the request for the measures came from the school, and there would also be plans at a later date to utilise the public realm within the pedestrianised area for the benefit of the school and the local community.

Previously, the section of Bird in Bush Road outside the school was used a cut through by traffic trying to bypass Commercial Way. The proposed extension of the closure up to the junction with Green Hundred Road will improve safety by preventing vehicles from parking unsafely by the junction which results in reduced visibility for pedestrians and cyclists. The purpose of the proposed camera enforcement between Commercial Way and the estate road to the East of the school is to prevent vehicles from parking dangerously near the junction during whilst maintaining access for local residents and businesses during the hours of operation.

Could you also please let us know if you live within the extents of the proposed closure area? If you do, you would be entitled to a free school street exemption permit.

I hope that this information helps to explain why the decision was made to proceed with this School Street proposal. Please can you reply to this email to let us know if you have any other queries or issues with this proposal, or if you would now be happy to withdraw your objection? Many thanks in advance.
