RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Cabinet Member for Health and Wellbeing approve the allocation of up to £144,952 to the delivery of the Winter Food and Fun Holiday Programme as part of the Holiday Activities and Food Programme for 2024.
2. That the Cabinet Member for Health and Wellbeing approve the above allocation to 20 providers (offering 33 programmes) identified for the Winter of Food and Fun Holiday Programme.
3. That the Cabinet Member for Health and Wellbeing approve the allocation of up to £25,000 out of £144,952 to support the providers to make places available for children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

4. The Department for Education (DfE) has provided grant funding to all English local authorities, including Southwark, to deliver a Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme during Easter, summer, and winter holiday periods from Easter 2021 to winter 2024. The programme is designed to deliver healthy food and enriching activities to local school-aged children eligible for free school meals (FSM). The Southwark holiday programme is known locally as the Food and Fun Programme.

5. The DfE awarded Southwark Council a £1,477,490 grant to coordinate and deliver the HAF programme over Easter, summer, and winter school holidays in the 2024 calendar year.
6. The programme objectives are for eligible children to:
 - Eat more healthily.
 - Be more active during school holidays.
 - Take part in engaging and enriching activities.
 - Feel safe and not isolated.
 - Have greater knowledge of healthy lifestyles and nutrition.
 - Be more engaged with school and other support services.
7. The Department for Education also requires that:
 - Provision is inclusive and accessible.
 - Provision is offered to all FSM children in the local authority.
 - Ideally provision is offered four hours a day, four days a week, for four weeks in the Summer and for one week at Easter and winter.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

Winter of Food and Fun overview

8. The winter holiday period is from Monday 23 December 2024 - Friday 3 January 2025. The HAF programme will not operate on weekends or public holidays within this timeframe, programmes will not be open on 25 December (Christmas Day), 26 December (Boxing Day), 1 January (New Year's Day).
9. For winter 2024, the base grant funding level of £28 per child per day is recommended, an increase from £24 per child per day for the summer programme. The funding rate takes into consideration (i) staff and food cost pressures (ii) providers feedback (iii) the remaining DfE grant for 2024 and (iv) seasonal celebrations.
10. The base grant award contributes to the cost of programme, staff, administration, healthy meals for participants, resources for programme activities, equipment for sport and play and nutrition classes for the children.
11. Winter Food and Fun programme attendance is usually lower than other holiday periods. Reflecting this trend, programme places this winter will be funded for up to 4 days only, a decrease from up to 6 days in winter 2023.

Each place is equivalent to 1 unique child. Each place will be available for at least 4 hours a day and up to 4 days a week, across the two-week holiday.

12. Each Approved Provider has indicated the number of days they can operate over the 2024 winter holiday period and how many places they can provide per day. In some cases, the total number of places funded for each programme is lower than the places applied for. This reflects attendance at programmes in previous holiday periods at some programmes, to avoid over-funding. For full details of the recommended programme allocations for the grant see Appendix 1.
13. The HAF programme reaches the most vulnerable children in Southwark. Over the winter 2023 programme, 75% were taken up by children eligible for Free School Meals. Of these children, approximately 85% were from the Global Majority.

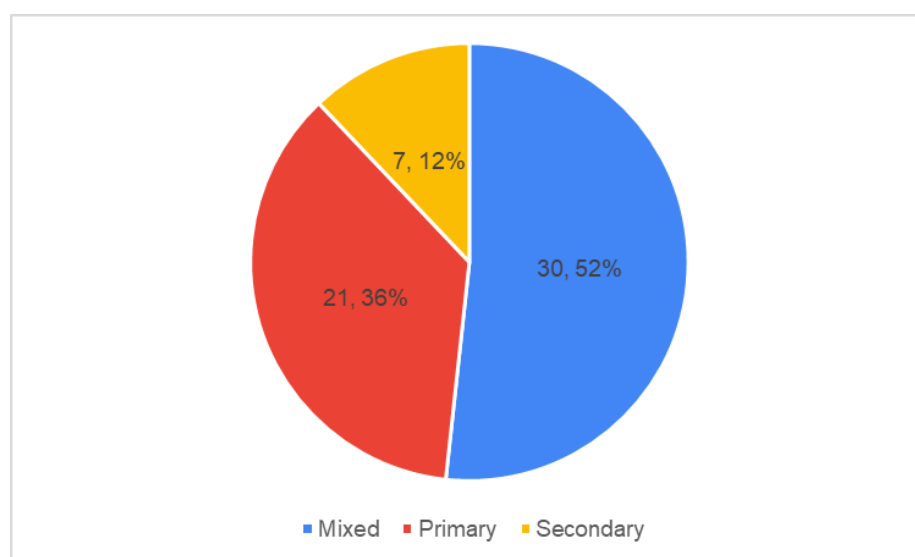
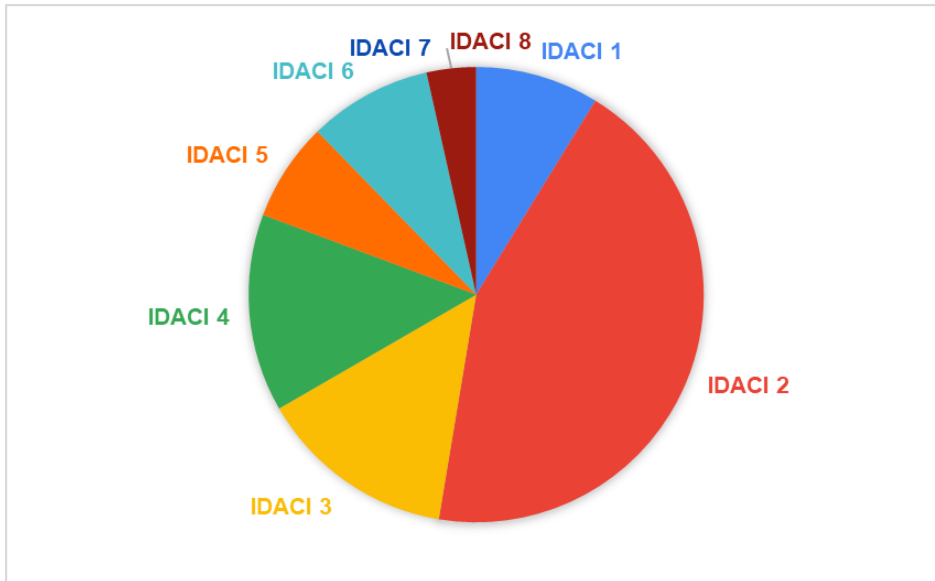
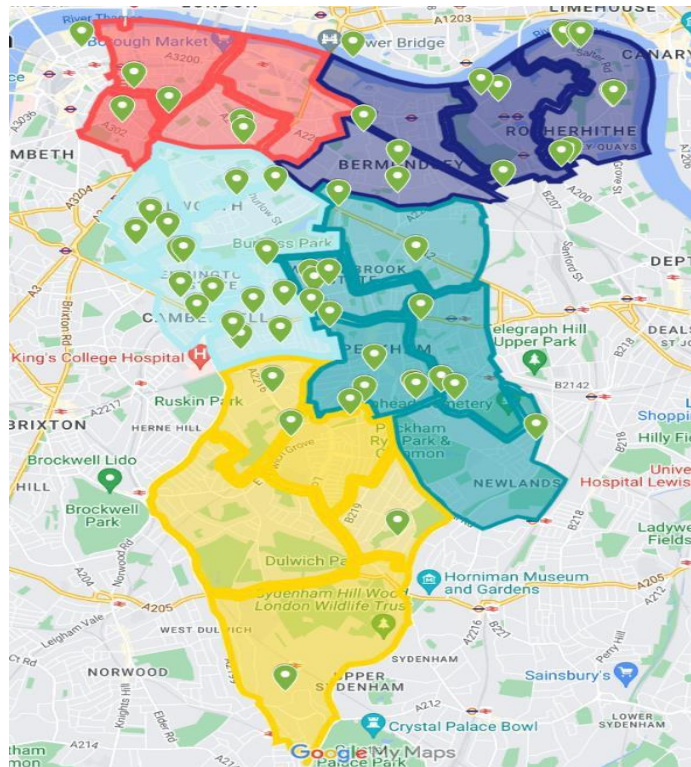


Figure 2: Winter HAF places 23rd Dec – 3rd Jan 2024 by IDACI Decile

14. For winter 2024, the 20 providers and 33 programmes recommended for funding are well distributed across the borough, reaching areas of high deprivation, and catering to all eligible age groups (see figure 1 and 2 below).

Figure 1: Winter HAF places 23rd Dec – 3rd Jan 2024 by Age Group

16. The applications received for the winter programme from approved providers are summarised in Table 1 below.

17. Two providers were rejected due to one or more of the following.
- There are multiple programmes for the provision of 4-6 years old that already exist within the location that has been applied for.
 - There was no evidence to suggest that the provider has established community links to ensure likelihood of attendance.
 - There are funded established HAF programmes nearby the location applied for.

18. Table 2. compares HAF winter programme 2024 operating dates and funded days with those of neighboring Local Authorities.

19. To ensure the programme meets the Department for Education standards, Southwark Council will also be directly procuring the following:

- [Take and Make Boxes](#) through Kitchen Social, distributed to children each week. These are healthy recipe-kit boxes that support families to cook nutritious meals together at home, supported with physical recipe cards and online videos.
- Deliveries of fresh fruit from an East Street Market trader to support our providers in offering healthy snacks as part of their programmes.

The Approved Provider List overview

20. The Approved Provider List (APL) was introduced in 2023 to improve quality assurance processes, the experience of funded holiday programme providers the efficiency of funding allocations.

21. To be included on the APL, providers are subject to an application process and quality assurance checks. There are currently 37 organisations on the APL and who were quality assured in 2023. Of these organisations, 56% are Global Majority led.

22. Holiday providers offer a wide range of inclusive activities across the borough, suited to meet the requirements of and engage children and young people aged from 4-16.
The majority of providers offer a mix of sports and play, activities which include arts and crafts, mindfulness activities such as yoga, meditation, and cooking. A number specialise in the following:

- mixed sports and physical activities (Activities 4 U, Ballers Academy, Burgess Sports, Dynamic Coaching, Millwall Community Trust, ProTouch SA, and Skyway Charity)
- supporting children who are struggling with emotional and social difficulties, through nature based residential trips (Free to Be Kids)
- making technological education accessible to all children, allowing them to develop invaluable STEM skills (Next Thing Education and Bizzie Bodies).

23. Once included on the APL, providers are not required to repeat due diligence checks ahead of future HAF funding bids.

24. APL providers are informed of the funding allocation further before the school holidays. Providers on the APL can also access training opportunities and tailored support. Being a member of the APL does not guarantee that an organisation will receive a grant. Only current members of the APL were able to submit bids to run programmes during winter of 2024.

Winter Food and Fun grants: grant criteria and allocation methodology

25. The third funding round of the Southwark 2024 HAF programme is for the winter holidays. Applications were open to providers on 22nd July 2024. Applications were closed on 28th July 2024.
26. The grant criteria are designed to ensure that all providers meet the required standards of both Southwark Council and the Department for Education.
27. Organisations applying for winter grant funding must meet the following general and specific criteria.

General criteria

28. Organisations eligible for funding include registered charities, voluntary, community or faith organisations, companies limited by guarantee, community interest companies, social enterprises, schools, and parent-teacher friends associations. All organisations are required to run a not-for-profit HAF programme.
29. Organisations cannot be funded by another local authority to run HAF provision at the same location they are applying for funding from Southwark Council.
30. Organisations are based in and/or providing services within the London Borough of Southwark.
31. Organisations operate from fit-for-purpose premises and show evidence of ability to adapt services to meet the needs of their clients.
32. Organisations must have quality assurance measures in place.

Specific criteria

33. The programme will be free of charge for eligible families.
34. Providers must include the following in their programmes every day:
 - a) Food and nutrition skills aimed at improving knowledge and awareness of healthy eating.
 - b) Structured physical activity for at least 60 minutes each day
 - c) Enriching activities which offer children the opportunities to develop new skills or knowledge or have different experiences.
35. Programmes must be able to provide at least one meal a day and all food provided, inclusive of snacks, must meet National [school food standards](#). Meals provided must be culturally diverse to reflect the preferences of residents. Providers must be running or linked to an Ofsted-registered child provider if children of 8 years or below are attending (where their parents/carers are not on the premises)

36. for:
- (i) More than 2 hours per session
 - (ii) More than 14 days a year
 - (iii) Unless their programme is exempt, and the programme is registered as an activity-based setting offering no more than two types of activities.

Cross-programme criteria

37. The following criteria have been applied when considering funding applications to ensure the Winter of Food and Fun programme is inclusive and caters to the needs of the borough:

- a) Sufficient geographical spread: The geographical spread of applicants was checked to ensure all wards within the borough had adequate holiday provision, particularly in areas of higher need in terms of food insecurity and mapped against the Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index (IDACI).
- b) Focus on 12-16-year-olds: The winter programme caters to the full age range stipulated by the Department for Education (4-16-year-old school children). A particular focus has been placed on 12-16-year-olds as previous holiday periods have shown a lack of sufficient provision for and/or engagement with this age group.
- c) Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) requirements: Sufficient provision is available to support eligible children and young people with SEND requirements.
- d) Delivery is in line with the "gold standard" model: as stipulated by the DfE, programmes can deliver provision a minimum of 4 hours a day and 4 days a week over the winter holiday period.
- e) According to DfE guidance for local authorities that have a winter holiday that spans one full calendar weeks, participating children should be offered face-to-face provision during the winter school holidays.

38. To ensure the allocation of funding amongst organisations was fair, the following rules were applied:

- a) All individual programmes have been recommended funding for a maximum of 4 days over 1 week of the winter holiday period.
- b) All individual programmes were capped at 150 places per day per location.
- c) Programmes and locations that have previously taken part in Southwark's Food and Fun programme were capped to the number of children per day that attended previously as evidenced during quality assurance visits and in monitoring and attendance data from previous programme cycles.

39. Applications were received for two new holiday programme locations. Of these, no new holiday programme locations were recommended for funding due to:

- a) Being geographically close to one another. This is to prevent competition between programmes whilst prioritising organisations with experience in running successful Food and Fun holiday programmes.
- b) Prioritising funding holiday programmes that have provided sufficient evidence of their relationship with the target beneficiaries of the programme.

- c) Prioritising funding programmes specifically for 12–16-year-olds. Engagement with this age group has previously been challenging where programmes have only offered a programme for both younger and older children together. Evidence indicates that programmes for older children only are more attractive to this age group.
- d) Prioritising funding programmes in areas of high deprivation.

SEND funding allocations.

- 40. All 20 providers have confirmed that they can make places available for children with SEND needs, meaning all 33 programmes will support children with SEND needs. The holiday programme team have allocated the grant budget for winter the amount of £25,000 to provide additional funding and support for those who provide places for children with SEND needs.
- 41. Funding is also recommended for 2 providers (Autism Voice and Angels Breakfast and Afterschool Programme) to run specialised SEND programmes for children and young people who may have complex needs and require specialist support.
- 42. Once the grant recommendations have been approved and communicated to successful holiday programmes, they will be invited to apply for funding to support children with SEND needs. Applicants will be required to detail:
 - a) The number of individual children they are planning to support.
 - b) Whether the children attend mainstream or specialist schools, alongside a list of the specialist schools.
 - c) The level of SEND needs their programme can cater for, for example, physical access for young people in wheelchairs or providing 1 to 1 or 1 to 2 support for children with more complex needs.
 - d) The benefits their programme will offer children with SEND.
 - e) For what the funding will be used? For example, to hire specialist staff with appropriate experience and qualifications or specialist equipment such as sensory activities or software to help with engagement.
- 43. This budget will be awarded based on the applications made and previous programme delivery. Programme registration and attendance data and evidence of SEND-specific expenditure are required for providers to receive the full awarded grant, which is an addition to the base grant funding awarded per child. This funding will be used to support SEND children to access the programme by enabling providers to pay for support workers and specialist equipment. The HAF team will verify the details of children eligible for additional SEND funding with the relevant team in Southwark Council.

Conditions of Grant Funding

44. Organisations awarded grant funding are subject to monitoring through the council's Conditions of Grant Funding (COGF). Schedules to this cover the key areas of governance and employment; finance; employment practices, monitoring, and information. In addition to a requirement to comply with these conditions, organisations are subject to an annual monitoring visit, and the monitoring framework includes a monitoring checklist, which assesses each of the areas covered within the COGF as well as service delivery.
45. Where any significant issues are identified during monitoring which could give rise to a breach in the COGF, the council will write to the relevant organisation and set out what action needs to be taken. In such cases, they will be advised that the funding continuation be subject to their taking the necessary remedial action to address concerns. Failure to do so may result in the council taking the appropriate action to terminate the funding by way of a further report.

Policy framework implications

46. The Food and Fun holiday programme directly contribute to Southwark Council's Delivery Plan themes of tackling health inequalities and ensuring all children have the best start in life by providing children who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals with nutritious meals and a safe and enriching environment during the school holidays.

Community, equalities (including socio-economic) and health impacts. Community impact statement

47. The Food and Fun holiday programme intend to provide targeted support to children, young people, and families vulnerable to food insecurity to access nutritious food and enriching activities over the school holidays in 2024.
48. The 2019 Survey for Londoners highlighted the stark issue of food insecurity in Southwark. 23.5% of people over 16 years and 25.8% of children surveyed were food insecure, equating to approximately 75,000 residents over 16 years and over 15,000 Southwark children. Food insecurity for both adults and children are worse in Southwark than the London average (21% for adults and 17.5% for children).
49. The pandemic and subsequent cost of living crisis further exacerbated the issue of food insecurity across the country. The Food Foundation's most recent data published in March 2021 highlighted that 41% of households with children on free school meals reported experiencing food insecurity in the last 6 months, equating to four million people including 2.3 million children. Black and mixed-ethnicity households with children continue to experience higher levels of food insecurity than their white counterparts.

50. The school holidays can be a pressure point for some families because of increased costs (such as food and childcare) and reduced household incomes. This can result in children from low-income families being less likely to access organised out-of-school activities, and more likely to experience poorer nutrition and physical health and to experience social isolation. The impact of the pandemic and the cost-of-living crisis is likely to have increased the need for this provision, with more families experiencing reduced household incomes and increased food insecurity. The Food and Fun programme intend to benefit a cohort of Southwark's most vulnerable children and young people, contributing to the reduction of health inequalities over the long term. A joint Equalities and Health Impact Assessment was completed for the holiday programme. This assessment demonstrates that the holiday programme shows no potential for discrimination and the holiday programme team has taken appropriate steps to advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations between the council, providers and residents accessing the programme with different protected characteristics.
51. The application for joining the Approved Providers List (APL) for the Food and Fun holiday programme was advertised widely, including amongst local VCS organisations, schools, faith groups and childcare providers.
52. As part of the APL application scoring process, points were awarded to grassroots organisations founded in areas where target beneficiaries are based. By supporting local organisations, this programme supports Southwark's economy as many funded organisations employ residents with local knowledge and lived experiences.
53. The holiday programme team have worked with local food businesses to create a list of approved meal suppliers to signpost holiday programmes without cooking facilities so that they can supply meals that meet school food standards. These suppliers cater to a variety of cultural and religious needs. The fresh fruit supplier for the holiday programme is an East Street Market Trader who lives and employs locally. This collaboration with local businesses supports the local economy and improves cohesion within the local community.

Equalities (including socio-economic) impact statement.

54. The Joint Equalities and Health Impact Assessment was undertaken to assess the need for the provision to be delivered as part of the Food and Fun holiday programme and the cohort of children and families who would be most likely to benefit from it. The holiday programme is anticipated to have positive impacts on all children, young people, and families that it reaches.
55. As illustrated in the Joint Equalities and Health Impact Assessment, particular groups are more likely to experience food insecurity and health inequalities than others. For example, children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) needs are more likely to

be eligible for free school meals and thus be at a greater risk of food insecurity than other students. Alongside this, in 2019 a higher proportion of Black residents were vulnerable to food insecurity compared to white residents.

56. The Food and Fun programme specifically target families vulnerable to food insecurity in Southwark by funding programmes across the borough with a focus on areas with higher levels of deprivation, as well as programmes that deliver SEND provision. These areas of high socio-economic disadvantage also have a higher concentration of Black residents. It is anticipated that the programme will continue to have a positive impact on this community as evidence suggests a higher proportion of children and young people of Black ethnicity will be eligible for the programme and the programme locations have been mapped to ensure they are in areas of high deprivation. The Holiday Programme team works with the wider Public Health team to advertise the programme directly to asylum seekers and refugee families based in temporary accommodation who may not otherwise be reached by this programme.
57. To ensure the holiday programme is an attractive offer to the diversity of prospective participants, a variety of holiday programmes have been recommended for funding including sports programmes, religious groups and camps offering Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math (STEAM) activities and arts and crafts. All holiday programmes are supported to serve food that is culturally varied and takes into consideration religious preferences.

Health impact statement

58. As described in the Joint Equalities and Health Impact Assessment (2022), the Food and Fun holiday programme is anticipated to have positive health impacts on all children, young people, and families that it reaches. Providing nutritional education to participants and their families and recipe boxes to children who attend the programme helps improve the food security of Southwark residents. The recipes in these boxes are healthy, low cost and simple to make to encourage families to cook healthy meals, which will improve their health and wellbeing.

Climate change implications

59. To reduce the impact the delivery of the programme has on the environment and climate change, the Take and Make recipe boxes and fresh fruit will be delivered in bulk to the holiday programmes rather than across multiple days. The Holiday Programme team will be looking to ensure that delivery vehicles used to deliver any food to the holiday programmes are low or zero-emission.
60. The Take and Make Recipe Boxes contain exclusively vegetarian recipes, which supports the children and families attending the Food and Fun holiday programme to learn to cook, taste and enjoy meat-free meals. Holiday programmes cooking their meals for the programme are also trained in how to create a more environmentally sustainable menu with more plant-based options. This will contribute to a shift in mindset around vegetarian and vegan meals, which may encourage families to eat meat-free options more often. This has benefits for sustainability as meat consumption contributes significantly to the climate emergency.

61. Kitchen Social (the Take and Make recipe box supplier) incorporated education around sustainability into their recipe videos and added information about sustainability into their recipe cards. This helps encourage conversations around eating an environmentally sustainable diet, which ties into the training new and existing holiday programmes receive about adjusting the food served during the programme to benefit the environment.

Resource implications

62. The organisations receiving grant funding will be monitored and managed by the Holiday Provision Programme Officer.
63. Each holiday programme will be subject to a quality assurance visit to assess compliance with the programme and to support providers with any issues identified. They must also submit monitoring and evaluation data, which will be utilised to inform future commissioning strategies.

Financial implications

64. Southwark Council has been allocated a £1,477,490 grant from the DfE to coordinate and deliver the HAF programme.
65. In 2024, a total of £144,952 of DfE funding is available to deliver the winter programme for up to 4 out of a possible 7 days of the winter holidays. This allows the programme to be delivered in line with DfE guidelines.
66. Of this, £25,000 will be allocated as a grant to support providers to make places available for children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities.

Legal implications

Consultation

68. Throughout Southwark's Food and Fun programme, which began in the summer of 2020, the HAF team have engaged with various stakeholders to understand their experience of the holiday programme and to identify areas for improvement in the future.
69. Stakeholders consulted included holiday programme providers, prepared meal suppliers, children and families, the holiday provision coordinators, other local authorities running HAF programmes and the Southwark Holiday Provision Network. This network includes providers and staff from relevant council departments who participate in supporting holiday provision including colleagues working to improve access to cultural food in the borough.
70. Feedback and insights gained from previous programmes have directly influenced planning for the 2024 programme. The Holiday Provision Network continues to meet and will be consulted throughout the year.

71. Between 2022 and 2023, the PHIRST (Public Health Intervention Responsive Studies Teams) Fusion research team collaborated with the council to evaluate the council's holiday programme and sought the views of families on the acceptability, reach, and benefits of this programme to families and children in the borough. In 2023, the council began implementing the following recommendations:
- a) Implement a central repository of all HAF information to parents and carers access information on the HAF provision across the borough.
 - b) Explore SEND training for HAF workforce and support HAF needs to further improve SEND provision.
 - c) Work with HAF providers to increase referrals and signposting to community support available such as food banks and welfare support services.
72. There is a cross-council working group that shapes and informs the HAF programme development which includes Public Health, Education, Children's Services, Youth Services, Leisure, and Communications.
73. Funded holiday providers are also invited to share the impact of this programme on their communities and the challenges faced by their organisations and service users so that the programme team can be receptive to these needs when planning future holiday cycles.

SUPPLEMENTARY ADVICE FROM OTHER OFFICERS

Head of Procurement

74. Not applicable as this report relates to a grant fund and is not in relation to procurement of a contract.

75. This report seeks approval to allocate up to £144,952 for the delivery of the Winter Food and Fun Holiday Programme as part of the Holiday Activities and Food Programme for 2024.
76. The report notes that the funding has been allocated by the Department for Education (DfE) and includes funding for SEND provision. Each recipient provider is on the council's Approved Provider List which was established in 2023.
77. Paragraphs 25 to 36 note the DfE and council criteria that applicant organisations are required to satisfy and the factors that have been considered to ensure that the local allocation is fair and reasonable, both in its inclusivity and geographical reach. The report also confirms that a robust and transparent process for inviting and evaluating funding applications has been followed and that this has been informed both by a consultation exercise and by the Joint Equalities and Health Impact Assessment which has been undertaken to assess the need for the provision to be delivered in this programme and the cohort of children and families who would be most likely to benefit from the programme.

78. The report also notes that recipients of the grant awards will be required to observe and comply with the council's conditions of grant funding and will be monitored to ensure appropriate service delivery and value. Paragraphs 69 to 74 note how the programme will be kept under regular review and consultation to assess its impact and determine how it can be improved and developed.
79. The decision to approve the recommendations in this report is expressly reserved to the Cabinet Member under Part 3D of the Council Constitution.

Strategic Director, Resources

80. The Strategic Director of Resources notes the recommendations set out in this report seeking approval for the allocation of £144,952 to 20 providers identified for the Winter Food Holiday Programme as part of the Holiday Activities and Food Programme for 2024.
81. The Strategic Director of Resources notes that £25,000 will be made available from the DfE grant for Special Educational Needs and Disabilities to make more places available.
82. There is sufficient budget within the DfE grant of £1,477,490 to fund the winter programme.
