Objection to Traffic Order -ref as above

As residents of Shenley Road, I am writing to express our fervent objection to the above Traffic Order which proposes the introduction of a CPZ in the Lucas Gardens area. As residents of one of the roads which will be severely affected by displacement parking, we feel that this order will bring have a totally unnecessary and adverse effect on the quality of our lives here. For many years we, along with the residents of Crofton, Bushey Hill, Talfould, Graces and Wilsons Road have shared our parking with workers at the art college, Southwark council and the Maudesley Hospital. Parking has sometimes been awkward but not impossible. This traffic order threatens to make it unbearable. We are also stunned by the fact that a number of residents in the Lucas Gardens area do not actually realise that a permit comes with a price tag - something which we think should be made crystal clear before any action is taken. In these austere times it seems surprising that so many families can afford this. This will also make the lives of a number of key workers very difficult at a time when we believe a Labour run council should be supporting them.

The parking problems which have hitherto been shared across a number of roads are now, it seems, to be concentrated in a smaller number of roads - something which, as people who will be most affected, is totally unacceptable to us.

One of the major problems in the Wilson Road area is the fact that there are a number large properties divided into three or more dwellings resulting in a large number of cars. If the residents feel that commuter parking is such an issue, could not Southwark follow the example of Lambeth, for example, and introduce a two-hour restriction - something like 10.30-12.30. This scheme appears to work in the roads adjacent to Balham underground and overground station, where the transport links are far more attractive than in Camberwell. For those of us who feel completely overlooked in this so-called consultation process, this might just about represent an acceptable compromise and for the council, might even be more cost effective.

I live at ______ I'm writing regarding the plans to enforce a CPZ in the Lucas Garden area of Camberwell.


I would like to strongly object to the plan. It's not needed, and the timing in the present economic climate is awful.
