# CEMETERY STRATEGY EQUALITIES AND HUMAN RIGHTS IMPACT ASSESSMENT

This document frames the existing guidance on conducting equality and human rights impact assessments (EqIA) in a template which can be used to inform the budget process. It has been developed based upon the existing guidance on equality and human rights impact assessments from the council's Equalities and Human Rights Scheme (2008-2011).

The burial strategy proposed for the Cemetery and Crematorium Service provides the council with a strategic approach to addressing the shortfall in burial space in Southwark and enables the council to continue its existing burial provision.  The strategy includes a recommendation to implement projects that will provide burial space until 2035 whilst simultaneously exploring identified opportunities for the future development of the service.  Providing space for burial in the borough's cemeteries is a discretionary service. However the council has a statutory responsibility to continue to maintain the three LBS owned cemetery sites.  The implementation of the strategy will require an allocation of £5 million from the capital programme over the next 25 years.	
Aim, objectives and users of service/function	1. The purpose of this strategy is to Provide a strategic approach to managing the development of the council's burial provision.  Ensure the implementation of a programme of planned development in the boroughs cemeteries that is sensitive to the needs of residents, cemetery stakeholders, local neighbourhoods and the business community.  2. Southwark's three cemeteries are Sites of Importance for Nature Conservation (SiNCs). As well as catering for bereaved families the cemeteries are valued as recreational spaces and heavily used for play, nature walking, sports, dog walking.  3. Grave spaces are required by approximately 30% of bereaved families accessing the Southwark's Cemetery and Crematoria Service. This amounts to a demand for around 210 new grave plots per year.  4. A recent public consultation showed that the preference for burial over cremation is linked to religious and cultural traditions.  Cremation is forbidden in Islamic Law and burial is particularly favoured in African, African-Caribbean, and Chinese communities where there are specific cultural practices around internment. The majority of funerals conducted in Southwark's cemeteries are for residents from these Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) communities.  Those of Catholic, Muslim and traditional Christian faith also choose to be buried rather than cremated.	

The strategy aims to ensure that the needs of all sections of the community continue to be met by the cemetery and crematorium service, by ensuring that burial remains an available choice.

5. Consultation has shown that having a cemetery as a local amenity is particularly important to elderly residents. Proximity to the cemetery is particularly important for the recently bereaved amongst this group who, often wish to visit the grave of a spouse for example, once or more than once a week and for whom travel may be an issue.

The strategy ensures that elderly residents will continue to have access to grave space in a local cemetery

Race	In general the burial strategy will not specifically benefit or disadvantage BME groups, nor is it likely to lead to worsening tensions between communities. The strategy aims to maintain and improve a service already provided by the council. If this service were to cease, it would disadvantage some BME groups for whom burial is an important cultural tradition.
Gender	In general the burial strategy will not specifically have an impact which will benefit or disadvantage different genders, nor is it likely to lead to worsening tensions between communities.
Disability	The burial strategy aims to maintain and improve a service currently provided by the council. If this service were to cease and grave space was not available in local cemeteries, this would disadvantage some disabled residents for whom accessibility and travel are an issue.
Religion/belief	The burial strategy is likely to offer benefits to some religious or faith groups for whom burial is required. This will support equality of choice and the freedom to practice religion. In general it will not disadvantage other groups and is not likely to lead to worsening tensions between communities.
Sexual Orientation	In general the burial strategy will not specifically have an impact which will benefit or disadvantage this equalities group, nor is it likely to lead to worsening tensions between communities.
Age	The burial strategy will ensure that grave plots continue to be available in cemeteries that are local to Southwark residents. If this provision were to cease, the need to travel outside of the borough to visit a relative's grave would disadvantage elderly residents.
